Shooting Leaves FHS Senior Critical

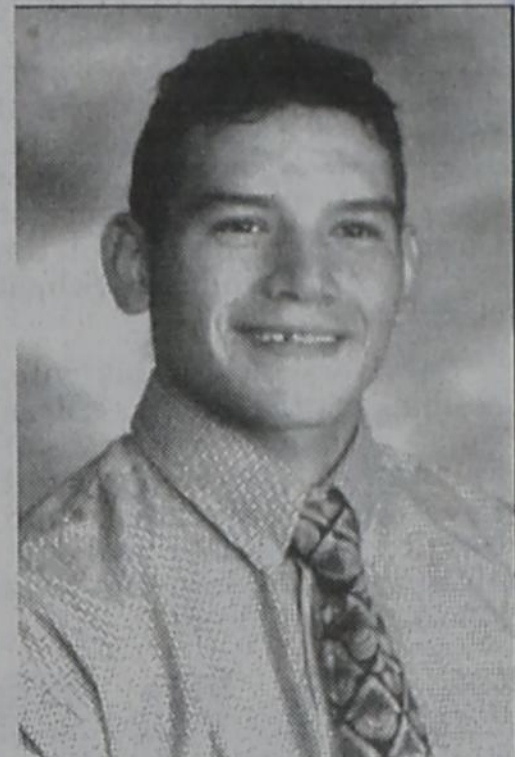
On Monday night, March 18, another teenage party in the country involving alcohol produced tragic consequences.

In what Sheriff Randy Gerries is describing at this point as "the serious, tragic result of some teenage horseplay," Friona High School senior Eric Rubio, 18, was shot in the head and remains in critical condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

A classmate, 19-year-old David Orozco, remained in Parmer County jail at press time, charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in the shooting. According to Sheriff Gerries, the case is being evaluated and additional charges or arrests are possible.

Charges against Orozco will depend on any changes in Rubio's condition. It was reported that doctors were able to operate on Rubio Wednesday morning to relieve pressure on his brain caused from damage and swelling. He is still listed in critical condition.

Ironically, Sheriff Gerries and Deputy Wayne Gruben were on the way to the residence, eight miles north of Friona on Highway 214, after receiving a tip that the party

was being held and alcohol was present.

It is the same residence where deputies broke up a similar party two weeks ago as reported in a story in the March 1 Friona Star.

Gerries said 10-12 teens had gathered at the house Monday night. As he and Gruben neared the residence, the first 911 report of a shooting was received by the Friona Police Department and Friona EMS was dispatched.

Gerries and Gruben were on the scene within a minute or two of the 911 call. They found Rubio inside the house with the gunshot wound to the head.

In the meantime, Orozco, accompanied by friends, drove to the Friona police department and turned himself in along with the weapon, a small caliber .22 pistol.

Friona EMS personnel brought Rubio to Parmer County Community Hospital. Doctor Bob Alexander and emergency personnel called for helicopter transfer of Rubio to Amarillo but both Lifestar of Amarillo and Aerocare of Lubbock were unable to fly because of cloudy weather conditions. Friona EMS then transferred him to Amarillo.

On Wednesday evening, March 20, acting on warrants issued by the district attorney, Sheriff's Deputy Andy Stormes arrested Roxan Trevino Mendoza, 31, and Morgan Baize, 18, both of Friona. They were charged with contributing and providing alcohol to minors.

The charges are Class A misdemeanors, subject to fines up to \$4,000 and jail time not to exceed one year. Both Mendoza and Baize were booked into Parmer County jail and released on \$1,500 bonds.

Sheriff Gerries says the investigation is continuing and additional charges could be filed in relation to the Monday night incident.

It was the first appreciable moisture since January 30-31 of this year, when a total of 1.07 was measured. February ended with just .17 in the moisture bucket, and only .02 had been measured during a 26-day period since February 20.

YE EDITOR HAS BEEN a bit remiss in the fact that he hasn't bragged about the basketball accomplishments of his old Alma Mater down Lubbock way, so here goes.

What a season by the Red Raiders and Lady Raiders! For the first time in a number of years, the Tech men's team had the better record, and with Bob Knight at the helm, a new attendance record was easily achieved at Tech's sparkling United Spirit Arena.

Tech's acquisition of Knight may turn out to be the best deal since the U.S. acquired Alaska for less money than it costs to fill up an 18-wheeler's gas tank today.

The Raiders' athletic director, Gerald Myers, was my good friend at Tech. We both started as freshmen in the fall of '55. Ye Editor worked as assistant Sports Publicist for Tech for a couple of years, and as such became well acquainted with most of the athletes, but mainly the basketball players.

Gerald had been an outstanding point guard at Berger High School. He teamed with a couple of guys from tiny Sudan--"Podd" Hill and Charley Lynch, and a pair of Lubbock boys, Wade Wolfe and Chuck Key, and inaugurated Lubbock Municipal Coliseum in 1956 with a team that threatened for the old Southwest Conference title from Tech's very first year in the conference.

Those five-plus Don Apple of Aledo--started for a potent Texas Tech freshman team in '55-'56. Colleges no longer have freshman teams, and more's the pity. Fans saw that '56 freshman team play, and followed them three more years.

Myers made more than 85 per cent of his free throws in his basketball career, and in one season hit something like 45 consecutive shots from the line, leading the nation.

But his friendship with Bob Knight may turn out to be a bigger accomplishment than he had on the court himself, both as a Red Raider player and coach, and he had several.

And, how about those Lady Raiders?!?! This year's team had a lot of adversity to overcome, and they did it in style.

I was already an admirer of Coach Marsha Sharp, and her star glitters even more after the big wins this past weekend at the sub-regional tournament in Lubbock.

For whatever reasons, Marsha saw fit to dismiss Plenette Pierson in early December. Pierson was Tech's leading scorer a year ago, and was their "go to" player in the post position. For awhile this season, it looked as though having to dismiss the player might cost the Lady Raiders getting into the NCAA playoffs--and that would have been okay. Even "star" players need to follow the team rules.

But Tech's 6-5 freshman from Clovis, Cisti Greenwalt, had to mature in a hurry, and all she did this past Sunday was score 19 points and haul down 12 rebounds. Tech's tenacious defense shut down Mississippi State's All-American Tan White in Sunday's game, holding her to ten points below her season's average in the 77-55 Lady Raider win.

Marsha Sharp, herself a native of Tulia, where she played against our FHS Squaws, believes in using local talent, and this has helped the Lady Raiders' fan base for the last several years. Sharpshooting Jia Perkins is from Amarillo, and Jolee Ayers is from Canyon. Both Perkins and Ayers are sophomores, so the future looks good for the Tech women.

We saw it mentioned recently that if you combined the men's and women's attendance for an average, the Tech teams would probably be in the top three or four in the nation in this regard.

Marsha Sharp and Bob Knight have the Tech teams headed in the right direction. Knight turned the men's team around from a 9-19 record a year ago to 23-9 this season. With a year behind him, you can expect Knight to keep the men's team in contention. They have a lot of their talent returning, as well.

Way to go, Big Red! Guns up!

FORMER STAR PUBLISHER

Bert Neelley, 82 Dies In Lubbock

Funeral services for Bert Neelley, 82, a former publisher of the Friona Star, were held Wednesday afternoon at St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Lubbock, with Rev. Elton Wyatt and Glenn Reddell officiating.

Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park.

Neelley died Sunday, March 17, 2002, in Lubbock.

He was born June 4, 1919, in Snyder, and married Melba Avent on February 2, 1941, in Canadian. He graduated from Tulia High School in 1936, and served in the U.S. Army from 1944 to 1947.

Neelley had worked for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for 25 years as the business and industrial editor, until retiring in 1985.

He served as publisher of the Friona Star from April of 1950 until April of 1956, selling to W.H. Graham, Jr. and Joe Osborn. He printed the paper in Friona for the first time while he was owner. He later worked for the Perryton (Ochiltree County) Herald from 1956-59.

He was past president of the Lubbock Garden and Arts Assn. in 1985 and 1986, and had taught art for continuing

education at Texas Tech and Lubbock Christian University.

Neelley was a member of St. Luke's United Methodist Church, where he taught the John Wesley Sunday School class.

Survivors include his wife, Melba, of the home, three sons, Robert Neelley of Friona, Rick Neelley of Loveland, Colorado, and David Neelley of Austin; seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Friona Has Ties To '02 Olympics

Kay Bursleson Cash, a native of Friona, was telling us this week about her husband Don's involvement in the recent Winter Olympics, held outside their home of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Cash was president of the Salt Lake City Chamber of Commerce about 15 years ago, and brought up the subject of making a bid to

hold the Olympics in Salt Lake City.

"He thought that the Salt Lake City area would make a wonderful setting for the Olympics (which it did!), and he continued to lobby for the project in the intervening years," Mrs. Cash said.

Folks in Salt Lake City felt that the city would continue to reap benefits from having held the Winter Olympics, through tourism, etc.

With the time proximity to last September 11, Olympic officials were extra sensitive to security for both the athletes and fans attending the recently concluded games.

The Olympic officials hired over 18,000 security specialists who worked during the 17-day period when the events were going on.

"We feel that the Olympics were, and will continue to be a big boon to the economy not only of Salt Lake City, but to the entire West," Kay told us.

Staging the Olympics was not a cheap undertaking. The local Olympic committee borrowed \$87 million from the state of Utah, to finance the building of the permanent buildings, such as the ice-skating facility, the main Olympic stadium, the luge and bobsled facility, and so forth.

The Friona native said that on the Tuesday following the closing ceremony of the Olympics on Sunday evening, her husband took a check for the \$87 million that the local committee had borrowed, and still had \$40 million left over, which has been placed in an endowment to be used to maintain the permanent facilities on a continuing basis.

The ParaOlympics, for handicapped athletes are currently underway. "To my way of thinking, these are the athletes that are the real heroes," Kay said. "When you watch those youngsters give their blood, sweat and tears, you can't help but admire them." She explained that the city which plays host to the regular Olympics are obligated to hold the ParaOlympics.

There are some 30 countries represented in the handicapped Olympics, and some 18,000 athletes.

"If we can win Thursday, we'll be tied for second place (in district). We just need to win the games we're supposed to, and we'll be all right," Fair added.

The win was the third road win for the Chieftains, who failed to win a game away from home last season, so that's a plus!

Friona opened district play last Thursday, losing to state-ranked Lockney, 14-2 in five innings. The Longhorns are ranked seventh in the state, and showed why.

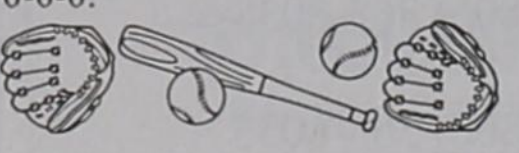

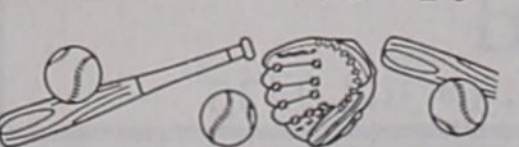

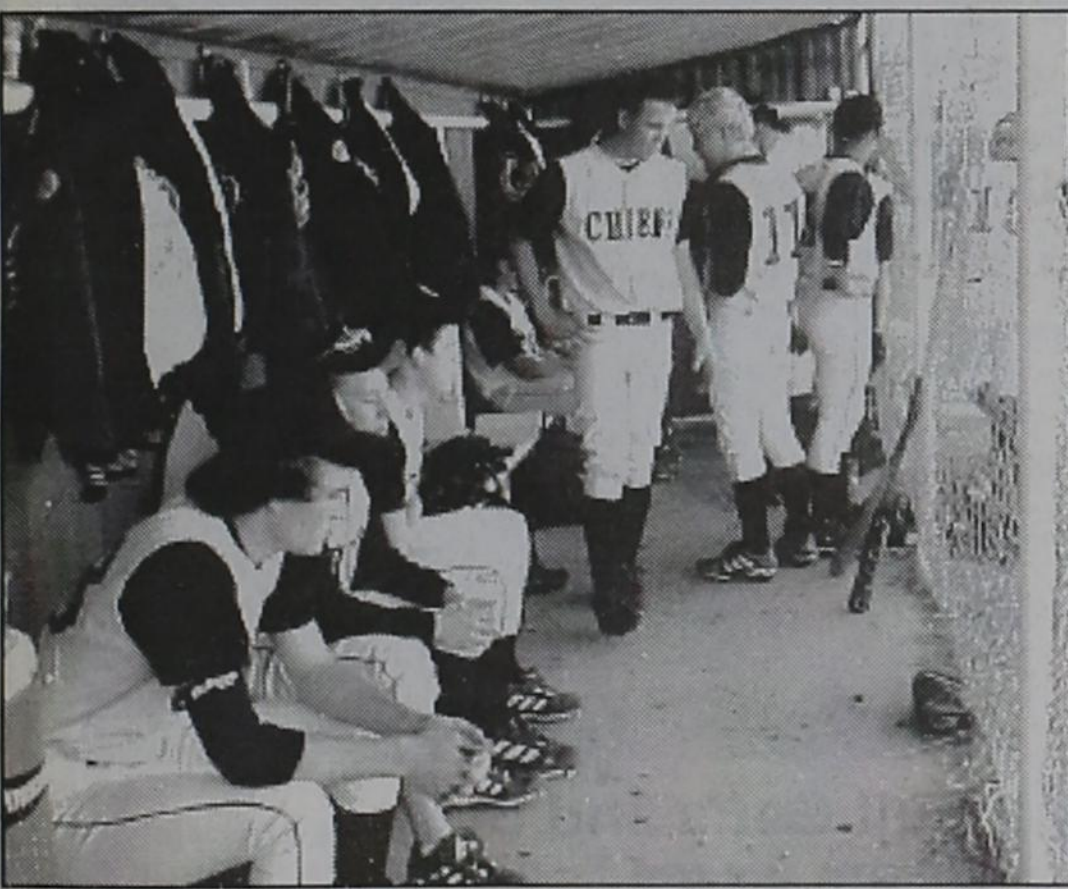

Betsy Clark placed third in the high jump, clearing four feet, four inches.

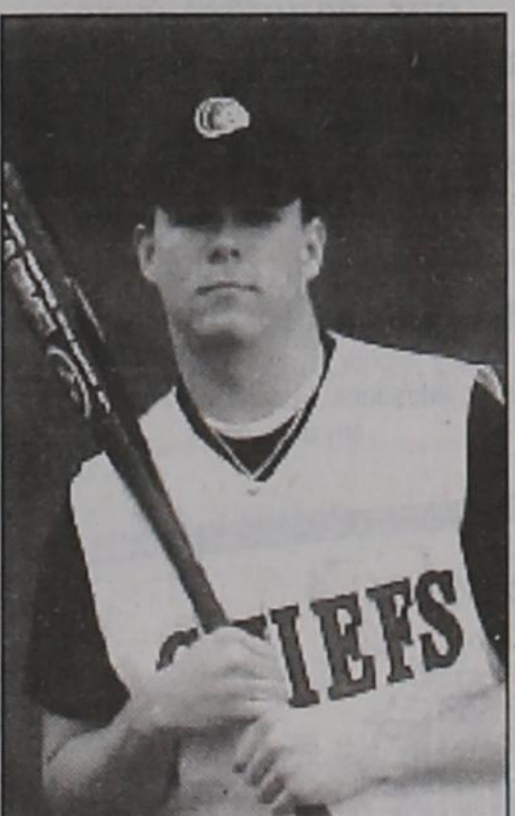

Out Here

"Sorry! No Commission, No Service"



This week, Delta, American and Continental Airlines stopped paying commissions to travel agents.

That is not big news to most people. It didn't rate much space in the national news either.

But to many of the 30,000 or so travel agents in America it was pretty much the final chapter in their business lives.

As an airline customer, you can get an airline ticket over one of the many internet systems, directly through the airline's website, or at the airport.

Airlines have been battering travel agents for many years, especially hard since 1995 when they started whittling down the commission percentage.

When I left Braniff Airlines and opened a travel agency in Dallas in 1968, airlines were paying five percent commission on domestic airline tickets and eight percent on international.

In those days there were many airlines with names like Pan Am, National, Eastern, Western, Ozark, Sabena, Aitalia, Southern and North Central.

In those days air fares were regulated by the federal government (Civil Aeronautics Board-CAB) and tickets were written by hand. There was very little stuff that could qualify as automation.

If a client needed to know the fare to New York, for example, we knew what it was without looking it up. There was either first class, coach or family plan. All airlines had to charge the same amount.

Same fare rules applied to all the airlines. Travel agents subscribed to Air Tariff catalogs which were updated about once a quarter. Any air fare increases had to be approved by the government and have a definite effective date.

Changing the fares every fifteen seconds all night long was not permitted. There were some group promotional fares, and the international airlines liked to play games to compete with Pan Am and TWA. But for the most part, a travel agent's life was simple.

Write a ticket for \$200, deduct your \$10, send the airline their \$190 in your weekly sales report and everybody is happy.

Later, the airlines started paying 7%. By the time deregulation hit, full force, in October 1978, agents were earning 10% commission. With a large sales volume, aggressive travel agents would negotiate even more than 10%.

The math was pretty simple. If you had a travel agency that wrote \$5 million a year in air tickets, your income would be \$500,000. Add in hotel, rent car, cruise or tour commissions and an owner could have a lot of fun, travel around almost free and even make a good living.

Since the deregulation in 1978, there are now about five airlines. The big ones have gobbled up the other ones. As the big ones get bigger, consumers like you have fewer choices, probably will pay more for the ticket, and are at the mercy of your particular carrier.

If you call American, they will not give you schedules or fares on Delta. Try it. No airline will give you information on a competitor.

That is where the travel agent value is. Call a travel agent and they will give you a choice of fares and schedules, regardless of the airline. The commission compensated them for sorting out all the confusion for you.

But no more. The airlines can save \$3 BILLION by not paying commissions to travel agents, they say. We'll see.

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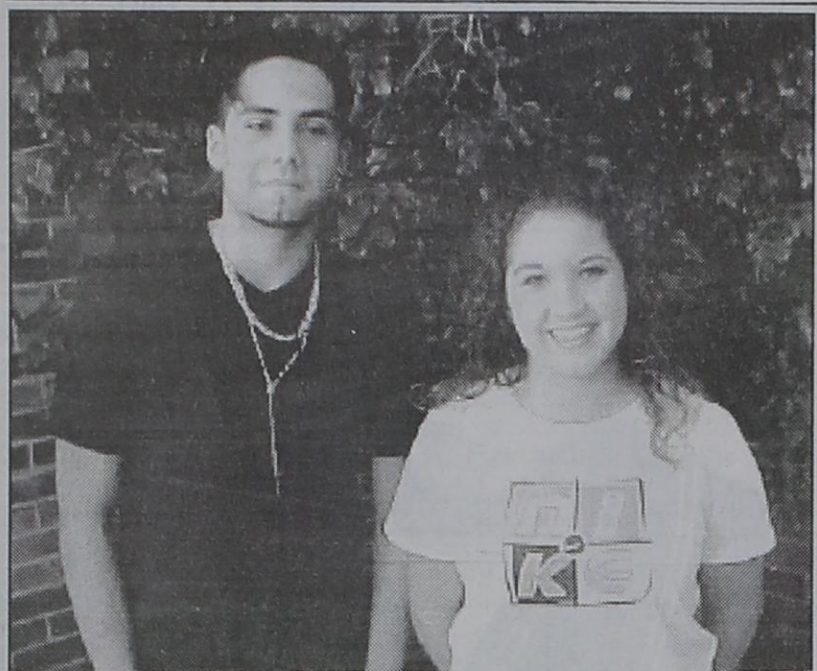
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U.S. Could See Increase In Beef Exports To Europe

Concerns over BSE-contaminated beef in Europe could lead to increases in U.S. beef exports within the next two years.

Parr Rosson, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the director of the Center for

North American Studies, says beef consumption within the European Union has been reduced by approximately 50 per cent in the last three months, followed by a 35 per cent reduction in retail prices for beef as a result of BSE, also known as "Mad Cow" disease.

"In the near term, we might pick up some extra markets where European beef was previously shipped and now is banned because of the presence of BSE (Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy)," Rosson said.

"This is most likely to occur in North Africa, the Middle East and possibly in some of the Asian markets. Longer term, the second impact could be that we'll see herd rebuilding occur in many parts of the European Union."

World wide, approximately 182,000 head of cattle have been slaughtered because of BSE, with the United Kingdom the center of the BSE outbreak and having the most cattle slaughtered.

"Before this they relied on the European Union for their supplies. Now it appears the U.S. might be in a position to move in and meet some of that demand in Central and Eastern Europe," Rosson said.

An Easter Interpretation

What was Jesus' resurrection like? That is a question that cannot be answered in enough authoritative detail to satisfy the curiosity of even the most dedicated believing bible scholars. This statement does not diminish in any way the reality of the power of the personal religious experience of the earliest Christian disciples or of any believers today who personally experience by faith Jesus as alive from the dead.

There is, however, one thing the Bible has taught me about the Easter faith that is very helpful in understanding what the resurrection appearances of

Jesus were like to those first disciples who began the Christian movement in the birth of the church. This conceptualization of Jesus' resurrection appearances strengthens my deeply held belief that there is no contradiction between scientific truth and sound religious faith.

I believe that Jesus' appearances were vision experiences by the first disciples. In 1 Cor. 15:3-8 we have the first written report that we know of telling of an appearance of Jesus as alive from the dead. Paul writes these words in the 50's A.D. several years before the four gospels were written. There Paul refers to Jesus'

appearance to him on the road to Damascus as though it was the same type of experience of seeing the risen Jesus as occurred to Peter, the Twelve, James and more than 500 disciples at one time. This appearance to Paul would have been about eight to ten years after Jesus' resurrection-ascension and it was definitely a vision experience that Paul alone saw that others with him could not see. At this time Paul heard Jesus as his Boss speaking to him telling him what to do. But Paul's traveling companions who saw a bright light saw no risen Jesus and heard no intelligible voice. This is Paul's testimony in three different references in the book of Acts (9:3-8; 22: 6-11, 26:12-18).

So Paul saw the risen Jesus as his Lord in a vision that others with him did not see nor interpret in any religious way. But it intruded with overwhelming power into Paul's consciousness and henceforth Paul organized his life around this heavenly vision. These are the earmarks of a real personal religious experience. And Paul implies in 1 Cor. 15:3-8 that his experience of seeing the risen Jesus is the same kind of experience the other apostles and early believers had.

I find this interpretation very helpful.

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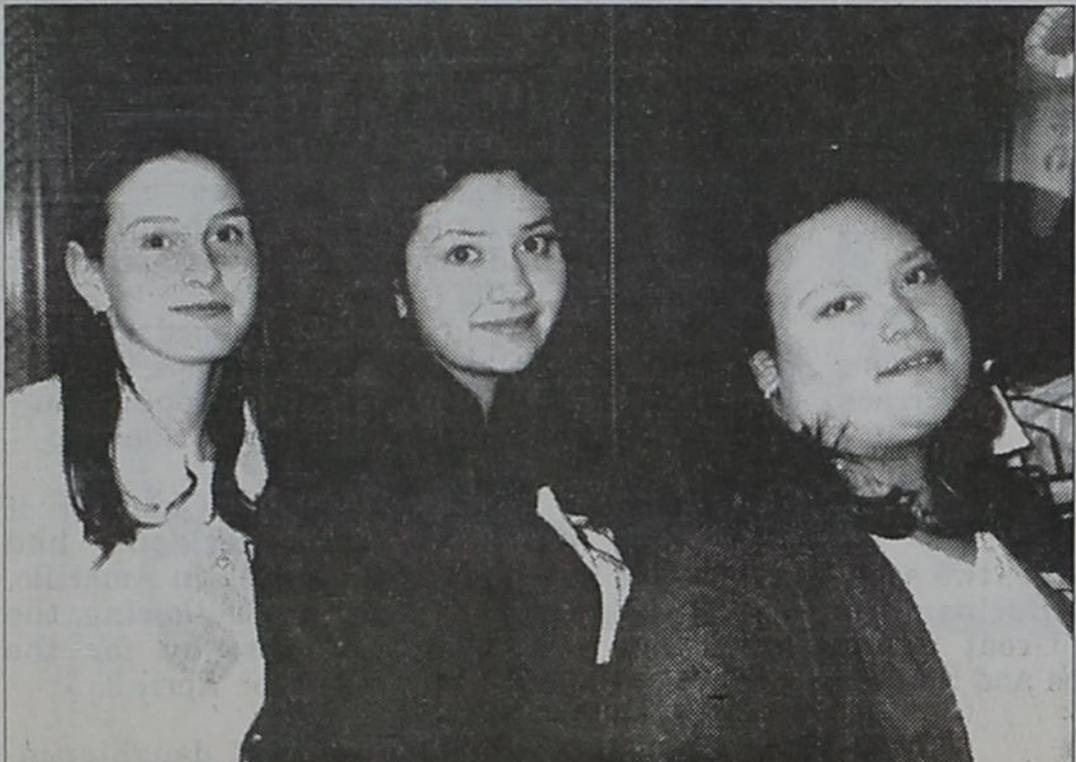

Investment Guidelines For All Seasons

Your investment professional can help you find these vehicles and then discuss the consequences of making adjustments.

Review your cash balance--It's always a good idea to have some six months' to one year's worth of living expenses available in a highly liquid vehicle, such as a money market account. But beyond that, if you have too much "cash" in your portfolio, you may be depriving yourself of opportunities for long-term growth or current income. Once you're sure you have cash set aside for emergencies, put the rest to work for you.

Never stop investing--When is the best time to invest? Today. No matter what's happening in the market at any given point, you will always have goals you want to meet--college for your kids, a comfortable retirement, etc. If you are going to meet these goals, you must invest consistently. And the sooner you start investing, the more time you will have for your money to potentially grow.

Diversify--At any given time, you'll find different classes of investments moving in different directions. Stocks may be up, while bonds are down. Or growth stocks may be up, while international stocks are down. Or municipal bonds may be up, while government-sponsored, mortgage-backed securities are down. You simply can't afford to put all your dollars in any one type of investment. By spreading your money around a variety of vehicles--stocks, bonds, Treasuries, etc.--you'll take advantage of the asset classes that are prospering, while cushioning the impact of the one's that are slumping.

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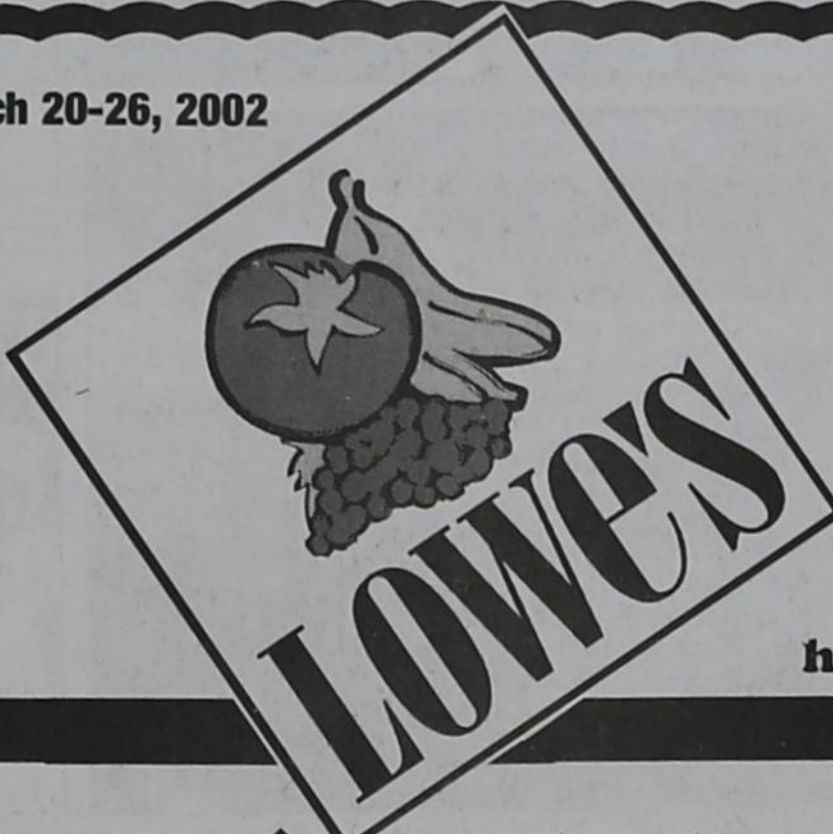

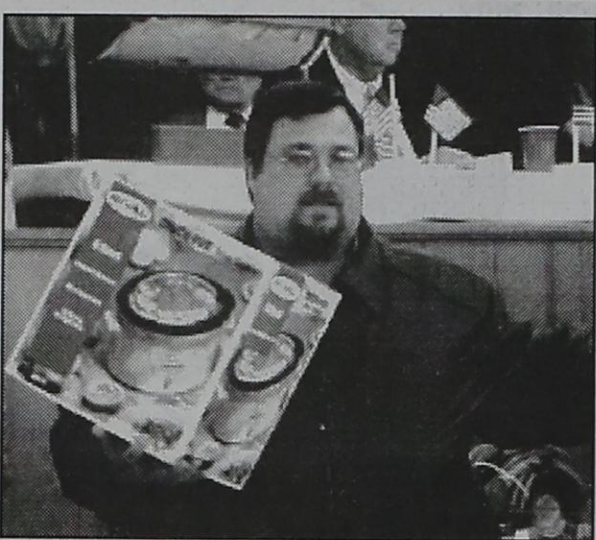
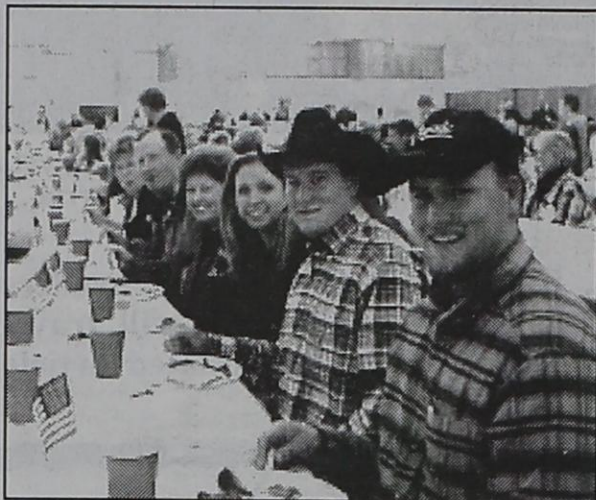

Sales Tax Distributed

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered March sales tax payments to Parmer County. She said that so far this year, local tax allocations across the state are down 0.2 percent compared to 2001.

March payments include local sales taxes collected in January and reported to the Comptroller in February.

In March, Parmer County received \$22,830 in payments, down 17.26% over the same month in 2001. In 2002 to date, Parmer County has received \$73,576 compared to 2001 revenue of \$89,909, a decrease of 18.16%.

March's payment was broken down to Bovina, \$1,963; Farwell, \$4,512; and Friona, \$16,354.

BSA Hospice Sets Class

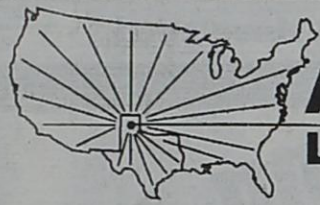
BSA Hospice is presenting an evening Volunteer Training and Community Education Class starting Monday, April 1 and continuing through April 13 in Hereford.
