Historical group to meet tonight



Grilled Fajitas Etc.

Serves 8

Serving size: 1 cup of salad and rice and 4 oz meat Prep time 10 minutes Cook time 40 minutes

1 (6 oz) pkg Uncle Ben's Long Grain and Wild Rice Sun-Dried Tomato Florentine

2 lbs skirt or flank steak

Salt & pepper

2 tsp cumin, separated

1 lg onion, sliced 1 green pepper, sliced into strips

1 ripe avocado, diced

Juice of 1 lime 1/4 cup fresh cilantro, chopped

1/4 cup olive oil

1 tbsp red wine vinegar 1 head romaine lettuce, chopped

Follow cooking instructions in rice package to cook the rice. While rice is cooking, heat grill or broiler. Salt and pepper each side of the meat. Sprinkle 1 teaspoon of cumin on both sides as well.

In medium bowl, toss sliced onion and green pepper with salt, pepper, and 1 teaspoon cumin.

Grill or broil meat, onions and peppers for about 5 minutes on each side. While meat and rice are cooking,

Life is not about things

There is another warning from the New Testament. It is simply this: rather than bringing life, fulfillment and happiness, "things", rob people of the greatest of values.

Jesus said that those who have riches will find it difficult to enter the Kingdom of God. (Matthew 19:23). Why would this be true?

It's true because those who possess riches are honored in the world. They are socially accepted. They enjoy the best of things and a sense of pride is created that makes it difficult to do the humble things of Jesus. Serving the poor may become difficult, communicating the needs of those less fortunate, etc. A sense of values is lost.

Real life is not found in things but in other values. People are more important than things. Let's learn to set our sights not on things of this life, but on things that are eternal. (Read II Corinthians 4:16-18.)

Life laid out

BY REV. BUCK MALONE, Union Congregational Church I heard of a little girl who was suffering from a rare and serious disease. Her only chance of recovery appeared to be a blood transfusion from her brother who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibodies needed to combat the illness. The doctor explained the situation to her little brother and parents; asked the little boy if he would be willing to give his blood to his sister. I don't know if this story happened like this or not; I just know it's true.

After a few minutes, the brother said, "Yes I'll do it if it will save her." As the transfusion progressed, he lay in bed next to his sister and smiled. Then his face grew pale as his smile faded. He looked up at the doctor and asked with a trembling voice, "Will I start to die right away". Being young, the little boy had misunderstood the doctor. He thought he was going to have to give his sister all of his blood in order to save her but he chose to save her anyway, even if it meant sacrificing his own life. Jesus speaks of childlike faith, not childish faith. So much we see is of the latter - myself included.

"Greater love hath no person than to lay down one's own life to save another" means many things, but at least it means this: sacrifice can mean our mortality, but it definitely can mean all those other "little deaths" we face each and every day in the name of love. We should be keeping a daily list of little deaths. It would do us good as we celebrate All Hallows Eve and All Saints Day at the midnight hour on the 31st.

On All Hallows Eve it would be good to review the previous year with that list in hand, ending out the year of harvest, storing up for winter with hopes and dreams of a fruitful new year not far ahead. That's exactly what our ancestors did as they met in worship on the 31st and the 1st. Why? There is nothing more spooky than love not wastefully given and a list empty of little deaths.









- Damage to electrical equipment is very expensive to repair. Lines may be cut or weakened from a shot, and they may sag or break, becoming a severe hazard for anyone who comes in contact with the line.
- Broken insulators can cause power outages that are hard—and expensive—to find. An insulator cracked by a bullet can remain online for a long time before it finally fails.

Enjoy your sport, but be a responsible hunter. Teach your children to respect power lines, electrical equipment and guns so that they, too, will be responsible hunters.
