Friona Shares Stitches Of Warmth With China

Jacquelyn (Hight) Franklin, a former Friona resident, is a teacher and missionary in Suzhou, China. We have written about her in the past and she was a visitor in Friona during the July 4 weekend this year. Her sister Denise lives in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and is also involved in foreign missionary work.

Peggy Monroe and others of Friona have been in touch with, and have helped Jacquelyn over the years.

Peggy said Jacquelyn recently asked for a bag of marshmallows and two boxes of powdered sugar, items that are hard to get in China. Peggy bought the items here at the grocery store, which probably cost her about \$3, but she spent almost \$50 in postage to send them to China. "I sent her a note and told her I couldn't afford her sweet habit," Peggy said.

Recently Peggy and a group of her friends, that form a quilting club they call the Stitchin' Post, had an opportunity to help Jacquelyn's orphanage in China again.

A missionary in Oklahoma came into possession of a large amount of cloth. She contacted Jacquelyn in China to see if she wanted it and Jacquelyn told her to call Peggy and her friends here to see if they would turn it into quilts for her.

Peggy knew that Friona High School FCCLA teacher Patsy

Allen's classes had quilted about 80 quilts for an orphanage in Mexico. So Peggy, the Stitchin' Post ladies, and Patsy and her students collaborated to turn the provided cloth into 80 more quilts, which this week were on their way to China.

By law Chinese couples are allowed to have only one child. If the child is born in any way impaired or imperfect, they give

it away or abandon it, then try again to have a normal healthy child. For many years, boy babies were not even allowed. Mothers carrying boy children were required to have an abortion. Those too poor to pretest their baby's gender and had a boy often had to hide it, kill it, or give it away.

Now in China the law is being reconsidered since there are

too many females and a shortage of males. All these conditions bring children to Jacquelyn Franklin's orphanage, mostly unwanted children with cleft palates, deformed extremities, and many other conditions they suffer.

Patsy Allen's classes that participated were Early Childhood Professions I & II, Apparel, and Parenting. The stu-

dents made 27 of the 80 quilts. They corresponded with Jacquelyn and learned about the customs and geography of Suzhou, China, and the orphanage. The area is noted for flowers and gardens so the students also chose many fabrics that had floral designs, Allen said. The project was part of the K-12 School to Community Partnership Program.

The Story Behind the Symbol

Enrique "Kiki" Camarena grew up in a dirt-floored house with hopes and dreams of making a difference.

Camarena worked his way through college, served in the Marines and became a police officer. When he decided to join the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, his mother tried to talk him out of it. "I can't not do this," he told her. "I'm only one person, but I want to make a difference."

The DEA sent Camarena to work undercover in Mexico investigating a major drug cartel believed to include officers in the Mexican army, police and government. On February 7, 1985, the 37-year-old Camarena left his office to meet his wife for lunch. Five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him in a car. One month later, Camarena's body was found in

a shallow grave. He had been tortured to death.

In honor of Camarena's memory and his battle against illegal drugs, friends and neighbors began to wear red badges of satin. Parents, sick of the

destruction of alcohol and other drugs, had begun forming coalitions. Some of these new coalitions took Camarena as their model and embraced his belief that one person can make a difference. These coalitions also adopted the symbol of Camarena's memory, the red ribbon.

The National Family Partnership organized the first Nationwide Red Ribbon Campaign in 1988. Since that time, the campaign has reached millions of U.S. children.

In 1997, the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse began committing resources to ensure the continuation of the Red Ribbon Campaign in Texas, as well as the hopes and beliefs behind this grassroots effort to protect children from the dangers of alcohol and other drugs.

October is 5th Month Over 4" Of Rainfall

Friona's official rain gauge caught another .33 inches of rain as of 9 a.m. Wednesday, pushing the October total to 4.44 inches.

A quick shower Monday evening accounted for .30 inches of that total. The latest moisture brought Friona's total for the year to 32.05 inches.

October became the fifth month to register over four inches of rain. That's one more month than the all-time record year of 1941, which measured 40.57 inches in all.

Dee Clark said he received .6 inches on Monday, and Lloyd Rector has measured 35.6 inches since April 1. Friona recorded over five inches during the January-March period, which probably means that the area south of town has received over 40 inches—and no doubt has exceeded the longstanding record.

Texas Taxpayers Finally Get Their Due

The year 2004 marks two important milestones for young Texans. Eighteen-year old Texans will get their chance to cast their first ballot in a Presidential election. Secondly, for the first time since these young men and women were born, Texas taxpayers can again take advantage of a major federal tax write-off. President Bush recently signed into law a bill restoring the ability of Texans to deduct their state and local sales taxes from their federal income taxes for fiscal years 2004 and 2005.

Simply put, the law reinstates the sales tax deduction, which had been dropped in a 1986 overhaul of the tax code. The 1986 legislation allowed residents of states with income taxes to deduct the taxes they paid to support their state governments, while Texans were denied a similar deduction for taxes paid to support their state government. The reason was solely because Texas and six other states did not levy an income tax and relied primarily upon the sales tax.

The result of that change eighteen years ago was to force 55 million Americans, or nearly one in five, to pay more than their fair share of federal taxes. This measure costs Texas families itemizing their deductions an average of \$408 per year.

Since I came to the Senate, I have worked with my colleagues and sponsored legislation to restore the state sales tax deduction. Today, I am pleased to announce this victory for tax equity.

The American Jobs Creation Act of 2004 (H.R. 4520/S. 1637) includes language to allow a state sales tax deduction. This will give Texas taxpayers and those living in the six other states without a state income tax the option of deducting state and local sales taxes on their federal income tax returns in 2004 and 2005.

The 1986 change was not fair to those citizens living in states which do not levy income taxes.

Local voters, through their elected representatives, have chosen to fund their state and local governments through income taxes, sales and property taxes, or some combination of these systems. It is simply not right for the federal government to provide favorable treatment to one system of taxation and not the others.

The change was wrong for another reason: Texans should not be taxed on our taxes.

The restoration of the sales tax deduction will not force Texas taxpayers to keep a shoebox filled with a year's worth of sales receipts, unless they choose to do a full itemization. Instead, they will be able to use sales tax tables compiled by the Secretary of the Treasury to determine the amount of the deduction to which they are entitled. These estimates will take into account the taxpayer's state of residence, filing status, number of dependents, adjusted gross income, and state and local sales tax rates. It is important to note that Texans will want to hang onto receipts for big-ticket items such as boats, cars or trucks. The new law allows a taxpayer to write off the taxes on those large items in addition to the amount they derive from the sales tax tables.

This relief for Texas taxpayers took a lot of work, and was the result of bipartisan cooperation in both the Senate and House of Representatives. Congressman Kevin Brady (R-Woodlands) and House Majority Leader Tom DeLay (R-Sugar Land) led the effort in the House. In the Senate, I found many Republicans and Democrats who understood this was a matter of tax fairness.

The Texas economy will also benefit from fixing this flaw in our federal tax system. The average family of four will save \$928 in federal taxes each year. This means, according to the Texas Comptroller, more than \$974 million will stay in the hands of Lone Star State taxpayers and will lead to: 21,798 new jobs, an increase in state sales tax income of about \$49.7 million, and an increase of \$1.2 billion in state gross product, including \$819 million in new investment. That positive impact explains why I am committed to making this deduction permanent.

Red Ribbon Week

Slain DEA Agent's Son Carries His Memory

In the weeks before Drug Enforcement Administration agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena was tortured and slain by Mexican drug traffickers, he would come home late at night, and wake up his 11-year-old boy, telling him not to become a drug agent. The child, Enrique Jr., groggy with sleep, would make a promise. Yes, I will not be a cop. Camarena, 37, knew he did dangerous work and he didn't want his oldest son to follow his footsteps.

Enrique Camarena's killing in Guadalajara, Mexico, in 1985 rocked the DEA. It was a turning point for an America beginning a relentless war on drugs. His son, Enrique Camarena Jr., now an assistant prosecutor for the San Diego County District Attorney's Office, carries the mantle of his dad's fight against drug abuse. And he makes sure that his father's name is never forgotten.

Without fanfare, Camarena, 30, travels around the country, to help raise money for victims of crime, exhorting children to maintain drug-free lives. "I want people to remember all that happened and all the suffering that my dad went through. It wasn't for naught," said Camarena.

When he gets the chance, Camarena speaks about his father for the National Red Ribbon Campaign, a group that espouses drug-free lives. On other occasions, Camarena speaks on behalf of the DEA Survivors Benefit Fund. The fund supports families of law enforcement officers who may have been killed or wounded. At the DEA headquarters in Arlington, Virginia, the name of Camarena is sacrosanct.

"He would stay out and hang out in the bars with the drug dealers as part of his job," Camarena, 30, said of his father in the days when the late DEA agent was working undercover in Guadalajara. "He would wake me up. I would be sort of sleepy. He'd ask me what I wanted to do. I said I wanted to be in the DEA." "No, no you're not," Camarena Sr. would insist.

Camarena's eldest son never joined the DEA

or other law enforcement agencies, like a police department. But he became a lawyer and a prosecutor, the past five years in San Diego, doing his part to help society.

"I kept my options open and often gravitated back toward it, naturally it was criminal law," Camarena said. "I think my father's sense of duty was really passed down to me. And public service was passed down." When groups call him, Camarena is there to speak about the danger of drugs. For the DEA Survivors Benefit Fund, he has a special role. And in his heart, he has a special place for them. The fund helped pay for his own education at Dartmouth College and University of Southern California Law School. "They helped me and I'm eternally grateful," he said. "I was completely amazed. Every time they call for me to speak or do something, I jump to attention and go."

A brother, Erik, is also attending San Diego State University, and is expected to be assisted by the fund. Another brother is Danny, 25. The fund now totals \$730,000 for families of victims of crime, and it has helped dozens of children attain an education, organizers said.

"The DEA family is extremely proud of Enrique Camarena Jr. and the fact he is an accomplished prosecutor," said Richard J. Crock, a special agent for the DEA in Atlanta and one of the founders of the fund. "He has honored his father's sacrifice and the promise he made not to be a DEA agent because it is too dangerous. Enrique Jr. has inspired us to renew our commitment to the war on drugs, just like his father did." Enrique grew up in Guadalajara where his father was assigned to work for the DEA and infiltrate the Guadalajara drug cartel. As his father worked the dangerous streets, Enrique's parents were very protective of him. There were certain streets he just wasn't allowed to cross because the Camarens worried there might be trouble.

"When (Enrique Sr.) joined the DEA, he didn't sign up to be a hero. The application didn't have a box you could check for that," Enrique

Jr. says of his father in one of his speeches. "My dad joined law enforcement because he had lost friends to drug addictions and he wanted to be part of the solution." In the months before Enrique Camarena Sr. was killed, the family was supposed to move to San Diego, but it didn't come to pass. Enrique Camarena was too busy with the DEA. But he took time to talk to his eldest son. Sometimes, they would talk about the Padres or the Chargers, what they did that day. Sometimes, the topics were much more serious, about what Enrique's plans were for the future, about how his father wanted him to get an education.

While Enrique Camarena Sr. served in Mexico, the country was becoming a major foreign source of heroin and marijuana and the trans shipment point for cocaine. "In September 1984, one of the informants told my father to be careful because an American might be next," Enrique Jr. said. Enrique was spending so much time working; he wanted to spend some time with his wife, Geneva, the mother of their three children. On February 7, 1985, they had plans for lunch.

In his prepared remarks for one of the speeches about his dad, Enrique Camarena Jr. reports in vivid detail what happened to his father. "He crossed Calle Libertad to get into his pickup truck. He turned off the alarm to his light blue Ford truck. Before he could get into the

implicated in Camarena's death, was sentenced to 34 years in prison in Mexico.

"Perhaps no single event had a more significant impact on the DEA than the abduction and murder" of Camarena, the DEA Website says. "His murder led to the most comprehensive homicide investigation ever undertaken by the DEA, which ultimately uncovered corruption and complicity by numerous Mexican officials."

On a windblown March 8, 1985, little Enrique Jr., in a jacket and tie, could be seen with his mother walking near an airport tarmac after Camarena's body was returned to the United States. "I can still see myself standing before the casket that carried my father," Camarena wrote in one of his speeches. "I was at the time 11 years old. They said some awesome things about dad. They were telling me that he was a hero."

As a prosecutor in San Diego, Camarena tries some vicious crimes. It is difficult sometimes, but he tries to separate what he sees in the courtroom from what happened to his father. Now the father of two children himself, Camarena wants them to find their own way, for whatever they want to do. Some days there is news about the latest drug-deaths, or the cartels in Tijuana. "The violence is always going to be there, but we can make good headway against it," Enrique Camarena Jr. said.

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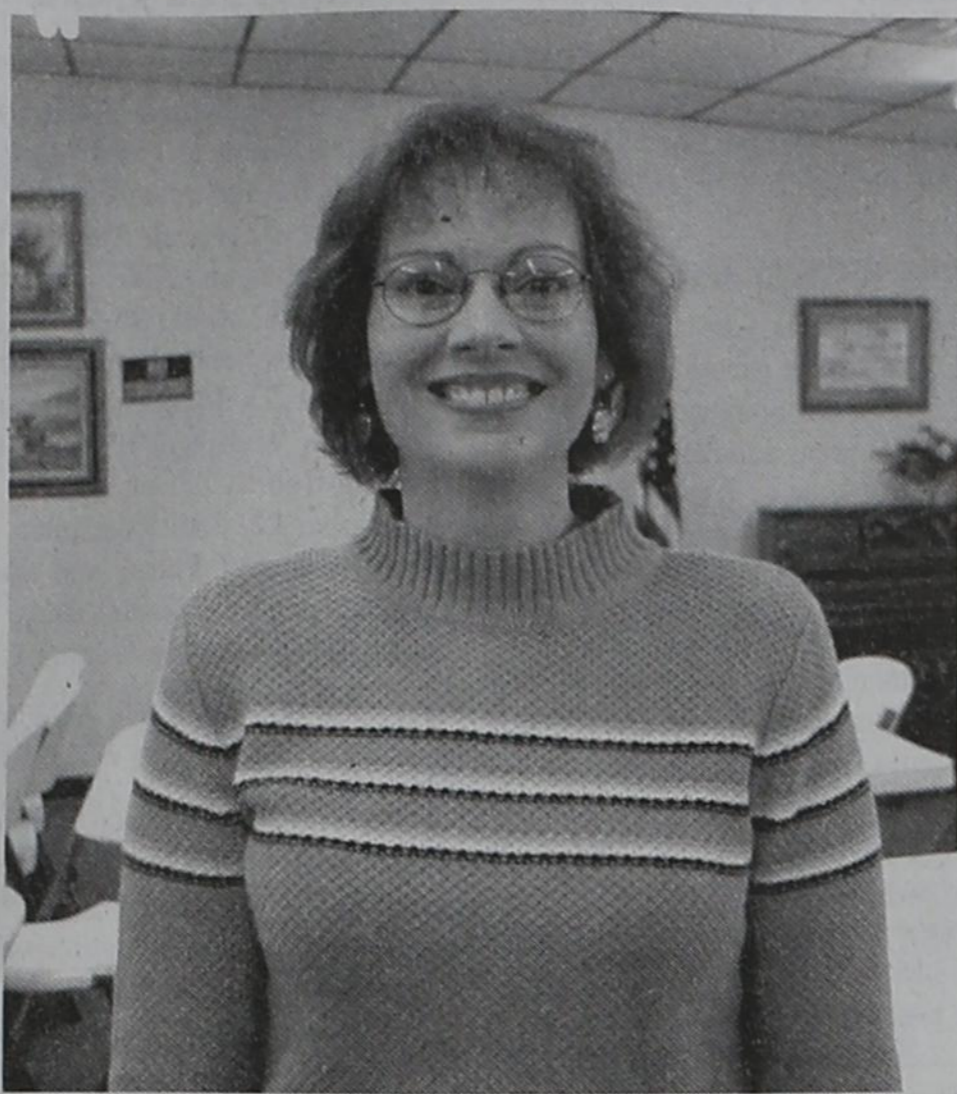
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Kendrick Honored By Girl Scouts

in pewter, depicts a young girl kneeling on a stone, gazing at the success and vision of the honoree's own reflection in the water.



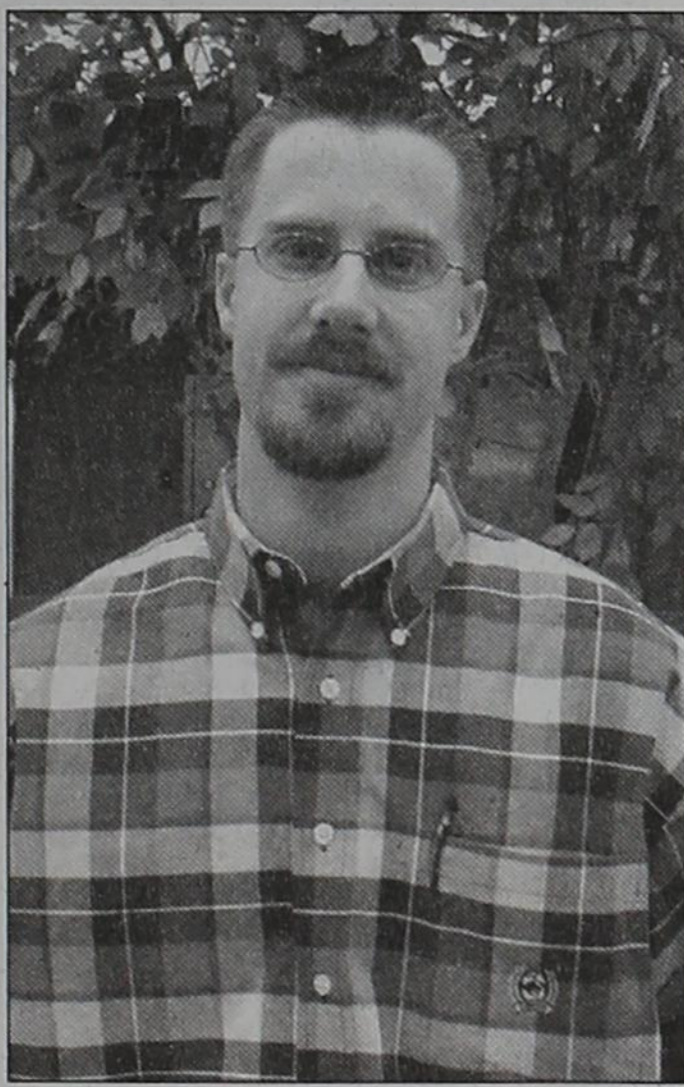

Chieftains 'De-Whirl' the 'Winds 17-6

The Floydada Whirlwinds were preseason favorites to win the District 6-2A title. Time has not been kind to the 'Winds this season. Playing Friday night without their top player, senior quarterback Luke Miller, the 'Winds were unable to mount a serious offense. Miller was out with a shoulder injury so quarterback duties fell to junior Trey Helms who was harassed all night by the pesky Chieftain defense.

Friona won the often ragged contest 17-6 to go 2-1 in district play, 4-4 season. Floydada falls to 3-5 season and 1-2 in district. This week Friona visits Olton, who lost to district leader Lockney by only 14-6 last week. The Chiefs close out district play vs. the Lockney Longhorns in Friona November 5, the season finale game and senior Parent's Night!

In Friday night's first quarter, Floydada received the opening kick-off and went three and out. Friona began at their 30-yard line, ran five plays, faced fourth and inches and didn't make it. The ball went over to Floydada who promptly fumbled on the first play and the Chiefs recovered. Friona went three and out, but Floydada fumbled on the possession and the Chiefs recovered again at Floydada's 27-yard line.

It took ten plays to score. Chief

QB Derek Fairweather took a keeper to the 14 but there was a 10-yard penalty on the play. A pass to Freddy Reyes was good to the 3-yard line and 1st and goal. Sergio Saenz plunged to the one-yard line but two consecutive quarterback sacks set Friona up with 4th and goal at the 15. Antonio Monreal banked a field goal high off the right upright and through for a 3-0 Chief lead with 1:13 left in the 1st quarter.

On the first Friona possession in the 2nd quarter, the Chiefs once again staggered a series of great plays with penalties. A Fairweather to Reyes pass was good to Floydada's 21-yard line. A holding penalty gave Friona a 1st and 20.

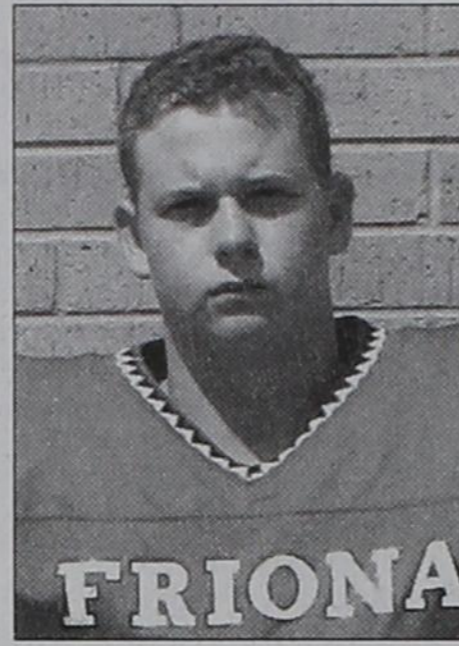
A recovered fumble, gave them 2nd and 24. A delay of game penalty resulted in 2nd and 30. An incomplete pass and the Chiefs faced 4th and 30.

A desperation Fairweather pass to the end zone was tipped by a Whirlwind into the grasp of a speeding David Davila who raced in for a touchdown, Friona's version of a successful Hail Mary. Monreal was good on the kick and Friona led 10-0 at the half.

Friona's first possession in the second half was more of the same. A 10-play possession was scarred with a block-in-the-back penalty, false start penalty, and another QB sack. When the Chiefs got around to punting, Monreal fumbled the snap giving Floydada the ball at the Chiefs' 38-yard line.

The Chiefs defense held, for a moment. On 4th and 14, the Whirlwinds ran a double reverse good to about Friona's six. A quick pass over the middle and Floydada was on the scoreboard. The extra point try was short leaving the score 10-6 with 4:38 left in the 3rd quarter.

On the ensuing kickoff speedster Freddy Reyes returned out to the Floydada 45-yard line. Alas, a fumbled snap, a holding penalty, and a false start penalty forced Friona to punt. The two teams traded possessions into the 4th

quarter where Antonio Monreal picked off a Whirlwind pass and returned it to the Chiefs 9-yard line. A holding penalty on the interception return moved to ball back to the 32-yard line.

In maybe the best play of the night, Fairweather lofted a pass to Hayden Patton who out-jumped

the Floydada defender for the completion at the 6-yard line. From there, the Chieftain bulldozer Sergio Saenz battled into the end zone. With Monreal's kick the Chiefs led in what would be the final score, 17-6.

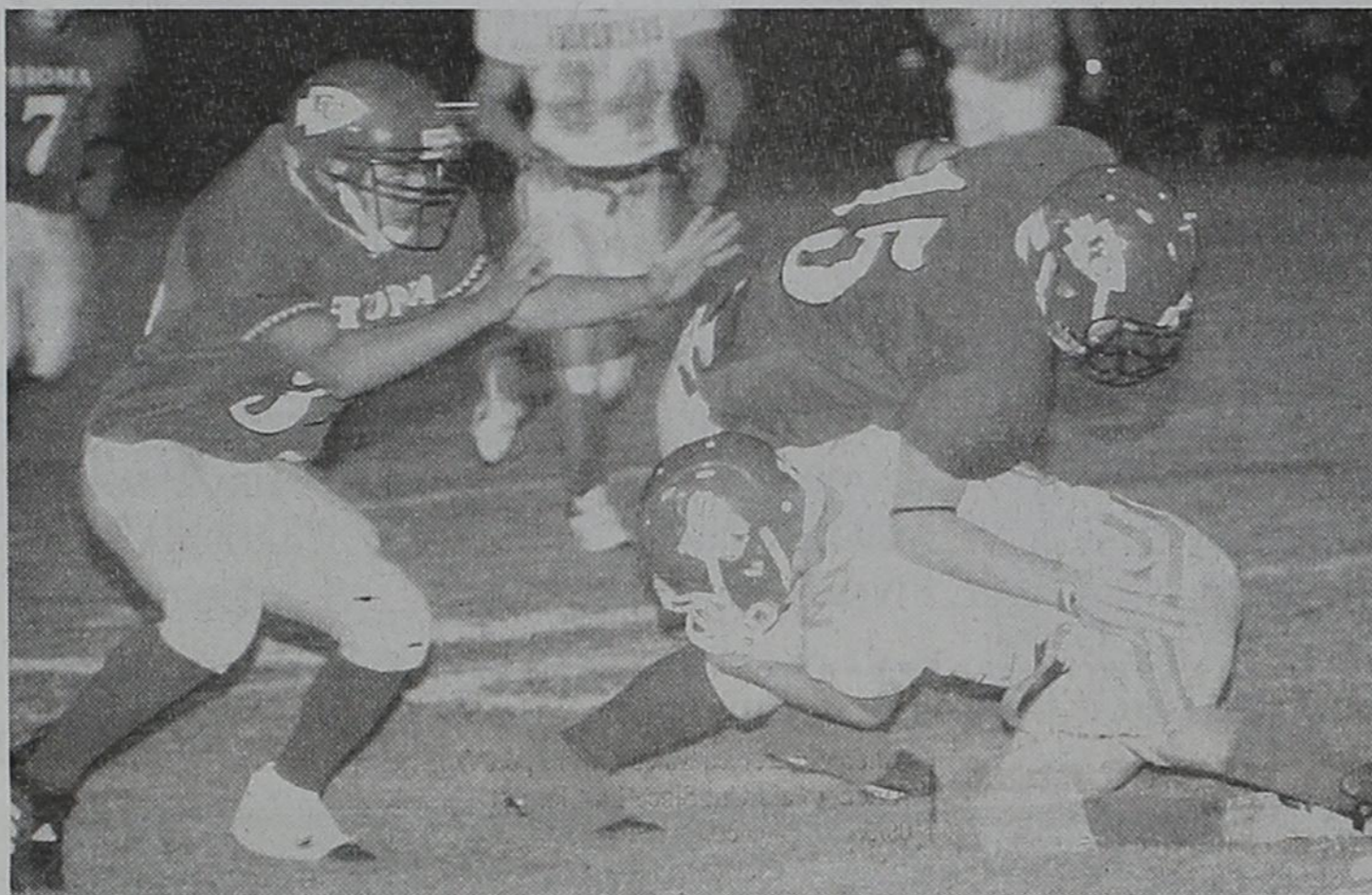
Later Floydada intercepted a Friona pass and drove down field. Floydada actually scored on a nice 17-yard run but the TD was called back for holding. The Chiefs took possession and were backed up to their goal line when a roughing the kicker penalty against Floydada gave the Chiefs a 1st down and

plenty of time to run out the clock. Jacob Hoon led the Chieftains in rushing with 93 yards on 13 carries. The Floydada offense, without their star quarterback turned the ball over three times on two fumbles and an interception.

It was a fun but ragged game which the Chiefs cannot afford to duplicate the next two weeks as they face probably the two best running backs in the district in David Phares of Olton and Mark Ford of Lockney. A win against one or both would go a long way toward the playoffs.

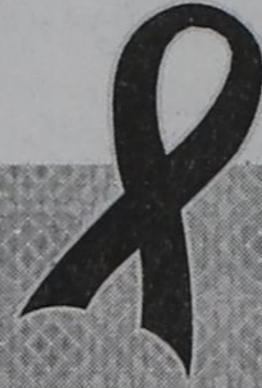

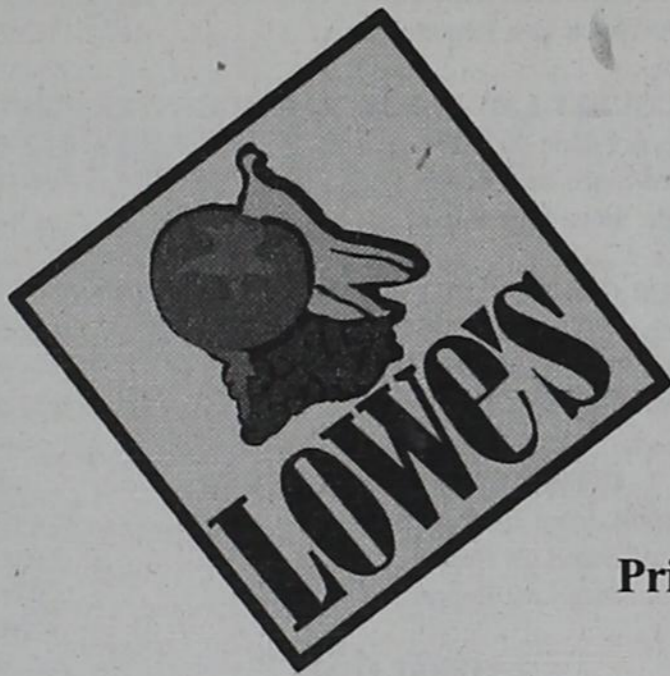

Don't Be Scared To Get Early Screening For Breast Cancer

For most Americans, the scariest event in October isn't really scary. It's the arrival on our doorsteps of little witches and goblins seeking Halloween treats. But this month we should remember to prepare against a real and frightening threat to women's health. October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and a good time to remember the threat breast cancer poses to women all year long.

According to the National Breast Cancer Coalition, 266,471 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed among women in the United States in 2004. Other health organizations predict 43,300 will die as a result. With age, the risk of breast cancer increases. One woman in eight either has or will develop breast cancer in her lifetime.

Breast cancer strikes women of all ages and ethnic groups, but according to the Women's Surgery Group, the incidence rate for breast cancer in Texas varies among different ethnic groups. Anglo-American women have the highest rate of breast cancer at 107 cases per 100,000 women, while Hispanic women have the lowest occurrence at 69 cases per 100,000. African-American women are struck by breast cancer at a level of 96

per 100,000; however, they have the highest mortality rate: 33 per 100,000 compared with the lowest mortality rate of 17 per 100,000 among Hispanic women.

These statistics are cause for concern, but we also know survival rates for cancer victims are improving. More Americans are beating breast cancer each year thanks to early diagnosis and improved treatments. The American Cancer Society reports that the five-year survival rate for those discovered with stage one cancer stands at over 96 percent. The key is to discover the cancer early, while it is still at stage one.

To catch breast cancer in its early stages, experts say women in their 20s and 30s should have a clinical breast exam, along with a periodic health check-up, about once every three years. At age 40 and beyond, women should have a yearly screening mammogram. This program of screenings can provide the early detection so crucial to beating the disease.

To help promote Breast Cancer research and awareness, I was the original proponent of the Breast Cancer Research Stamp, the first in our nation's history dedicated to raising funds for a specific cause. The

stamps, which were first issued in 1998, have raised almost \$40 million for breast cancer research. The stamp, designed by a breast cancer survivor, was expected to expire in 2000, but has been such a strong seller that I have sponsored legislation to extend its life twice. It will now be issued until 2005. This stamp costs 8 cents more than a first class stamp, with the difference earmarked toward breast cancer research.

Yet, while early detection is key to better survival rates, far too many women still do not get screenings. Millions of U.S. women 40 years of age or older

have never had a single mammogram. This is a tragedy, because all the medical advances in the world cannot help a woman who does not take the first step of getting a mammogram.

The scariest thing in October is not Halloween, nor possibly the threat of breast cancer itself, but the idea that some of our friends, mothers, aunts, sisters and daughters are still putting off live-saving screenings. That should scare all of us and motivate us to do our parts this month to raise awareness of this simple, but often overlooked precaution.

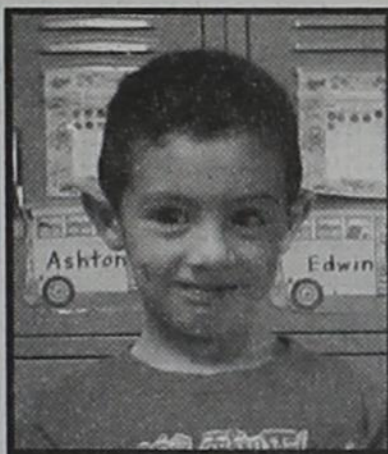

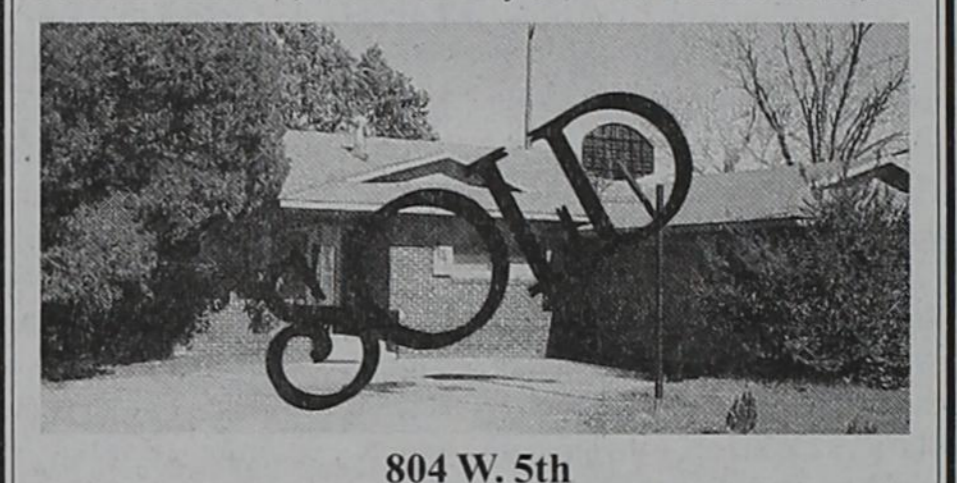

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain, flash flooding, hail, high winds and lightning that occurred on 6-16-04, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Farwell, Thomas S. Taylor said.

Parmer County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive rain, flash flooding, hail,


high winds and lightning. Thomas S. Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Thomas S. Taylor said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.


"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 31, 2005, but farmers should apply

as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season," Thomas S. Taylor said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding majority interest. The FSA office in Farwell is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

School Foodservice Directors Study Beef

Loans Available For Beginning Farmers

FSA is authorized to assist beginning farmers/ranchers and members of socially disadvantaged groups to finance agriculture enterprises. Under these programs, FSA can provide financing to eligible applicants through direct or guaranteed loans. A beginning farmer is one who:

- Has operated a farm or ranch for not more than 10 years.
- Will materially and substantially participate in the operation.
- Agrees to participate in a loan assessment, borrower training, financial management program sponsored by FSA.
- And must now own an operation in excess of 25% of the county's average size.

Each member of the entity must meet the eligibility requirements. Socially disadvantaged groups include Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians, Pacific Islanders, and Women.

Cotton Producer Checks Need TDA Endorsements

Northern High Plains producers who recently sold cotton and were given a check with the Texas Department of Agriculture named as a joint payee must obtain an endorsement from TDA before cashing or depositing the check.

Endorsements may be obtained at TDA and foundation locations. For office locations nearer to you, call Abilene Headquarters at (866) 672-2800.

In general, assessments must be paid before an endorsement will be given, but if other parties are named on the check, producers should call to find out what procedure to follow.

TDA and the foundation will make every attempt to be as accessible as possible, but producers are highly encouraged to call before going to any office. This will help ensure someone is available to assist them and that their visit can be handled efficiently.

TDA staff will be available Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon and at other times with an appointment.

Immunize to Prevent Infectious Diseases

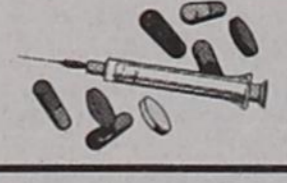
Control and eradication of many infectious diseases is considered one of the top 10 public health achievements in the United States.

Rural and urban areas have seen improvements in meeting the Health People 2010's immunization goals. However, a survey conducted by researchers at the Southwest Rural Health Research Center at the School of Rural Public Health found that immunizations and infectious diseases were the 13th highest ranking rural health concern out of 28 health focus areas.

While both rural and urban school-age children exceed the nation's goal for immunizations, infants and toddlers fell below the goal of 90 percent immunization. Rural children lag behind urban and suburban children in immunization rates for the chicken pox and pneumococcal conjugate vaccine, which protects against bacterial infections such as meningitis.

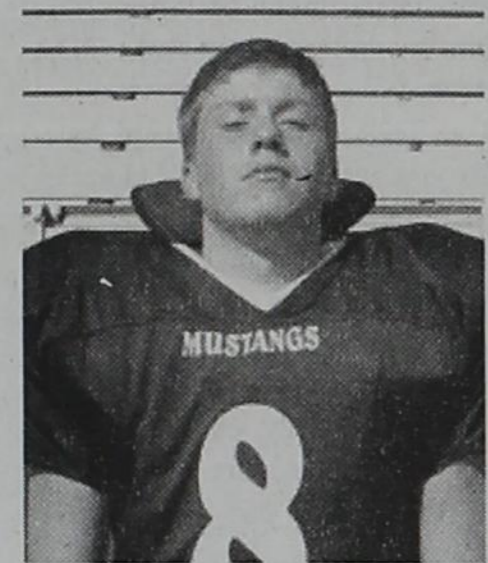

Blood Drive In Bovina Tuesday!

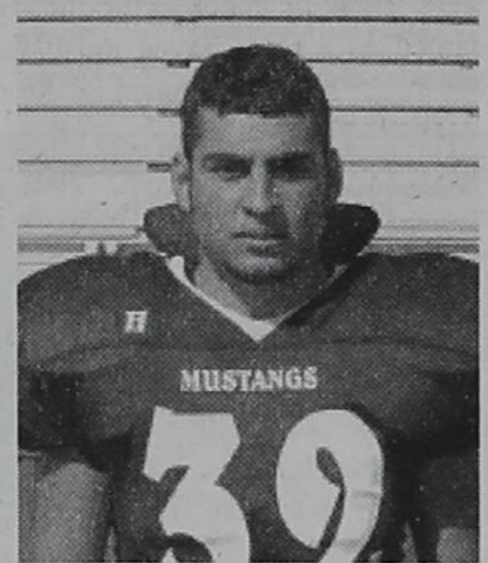
On Tuesday, November 2, Coffee Memorial Blood Center will be in Bovina at the Ambulance Center from 4-7 p.m. To schedule an appointment please call 1-800-678-6178.

Donors will be experiencing a new procedure this time. Donors are now responsible for filling out the questions that normally would be asked by a phlebotomist. Once the donor is through with the self assessment, they go to a phlebotomy area where their hemoglobin, blood pressure and temperature are checked. The donor survey will be reviewed by a staff member to make sure that all questions have been answered. Once that is done the donor goes to the bed area to begin the donating process.

If you are not a blood donor, please consider becoming one. It is really quite simple, you must be 17 years of age, in general good health and weigh a minimum of 115 pounds. Over the past 12 months, approximately 20,000 units of red blood cells were transfused to patients of the High Plains Region. This would never be possible without volunteer blood donors. Mustangs Corral Longhorns 27-20

The Bovina Mustangs held off a late Hart surge to win an offensive match 27-20. The win gives Bovina a 1-2 district record (2-6 overall) with Nazareth and Farwell looming on the horizon.

Behind the offensive force of Eddie Segovia's 201 yards on 31 carries and three touchdowns, the Mustangs led the game 27-6 in the fourth quarter and appeared to have the game sewed up. 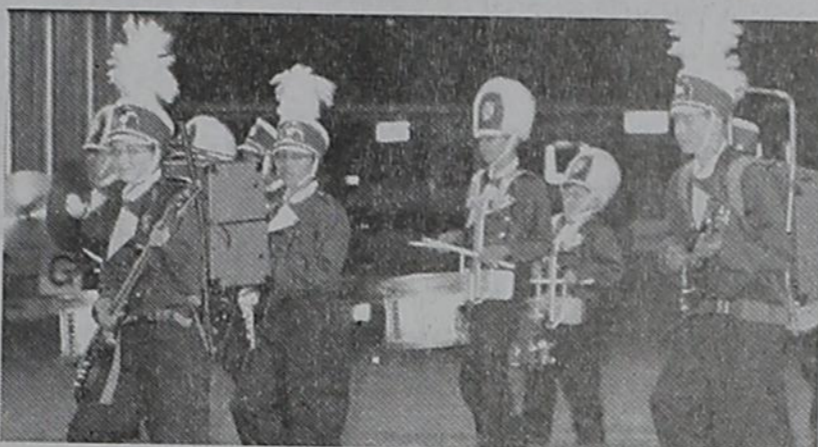

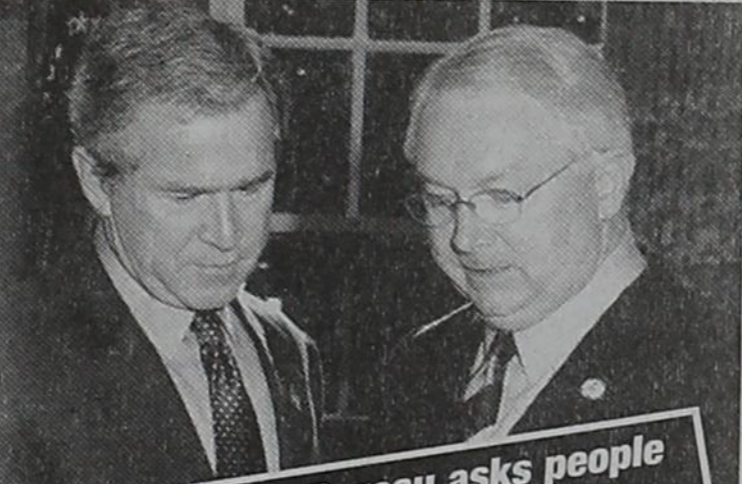

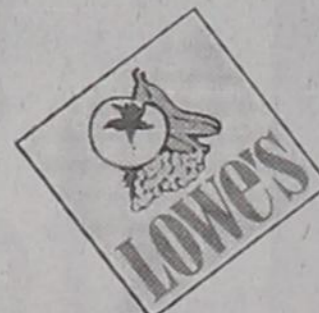

How To Talk To Your Kids About Drugs

The best thing about this subject is that you don't have to do it well. You simply have to try.

If you try, your kids will get the message.

That you care about them.

That you understand something about the conflicts they face.

That you're there when they need you.

The alternative is to ignore the subject. Which means your kids are going to be listening to others who have strong opinions about the subject. Including those who use drugs. And those who sell them.

ACCEPT REBELLION.

At the heart of it, drugs, alcohol, wild hairstyles, trendy clothes, ear-splitting music, outrageous language are different ways of expressing teenage rebellion.

"Drugs take all the promise of being young and destroy it."

"I love you too much to see you throw your life down the drain."

SOME DO'S AND DON'TS.

The do's are as simple as speaking from the heart.

The biggest don't is don't do all the talking. If you listen to your kids — really listen and read between the lines — you'll learn a lot about what they think. About drugs. About themselves. About the world. And about you. They'll also feel heard and that, too, is a step along the path towards self esteem.

There are other do's and don'ts: Don't threaten. Don't badger them. Don't put your kid on the spot by asking directly if he or she has ever tried drugs. They'll probably lie, which undermines your whole conversation.

If you suspect your child is on drugs — there are all sorts of symptoms — that's a different matter. Then you've got to confront the subject directly.

In the meantime, just talk to them.

It's okay if you don't know much about drugs.

Your kids' do.

But they need to know how you feel about the subject.

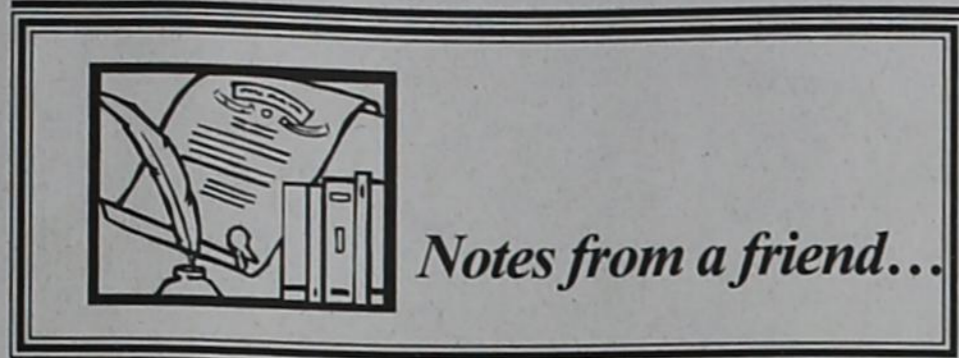

So another in the series of Mrs. Murphy mystery books begins. The author has to be an animal lover. Her animals have wonderful human as well as animal characteristics. 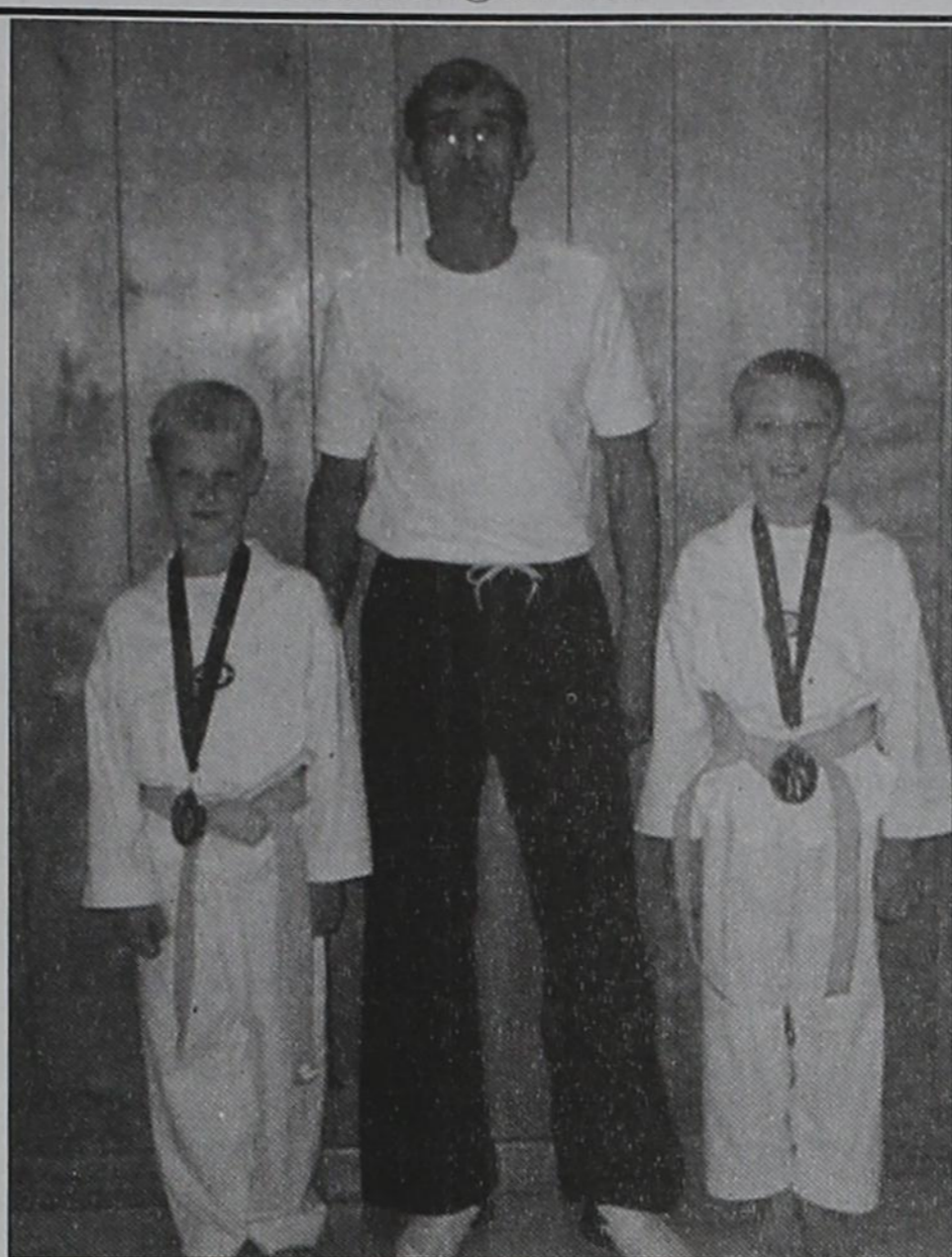
Harry and her animals are the main characters, having the insatiable curiosity of a cat plus good detective abilities. She runs a small farm as well as the Post Office.

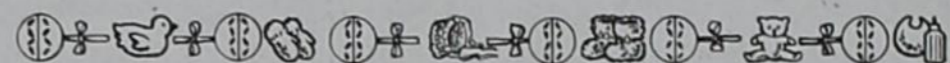

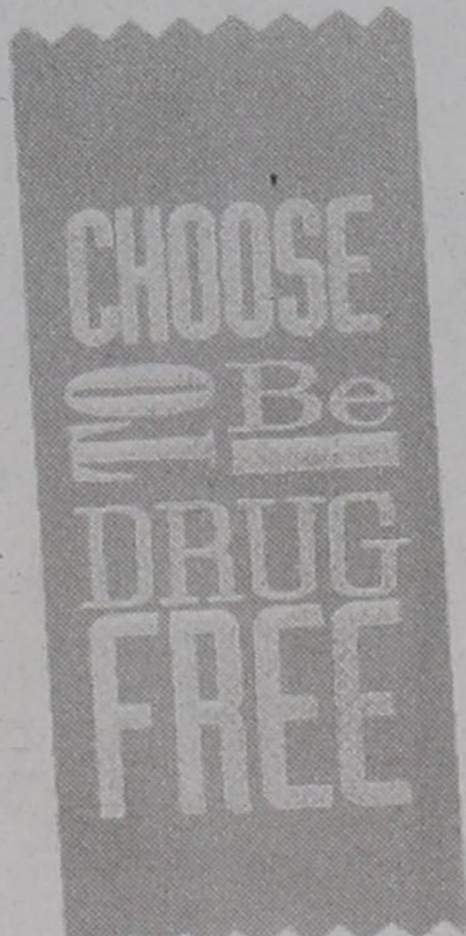

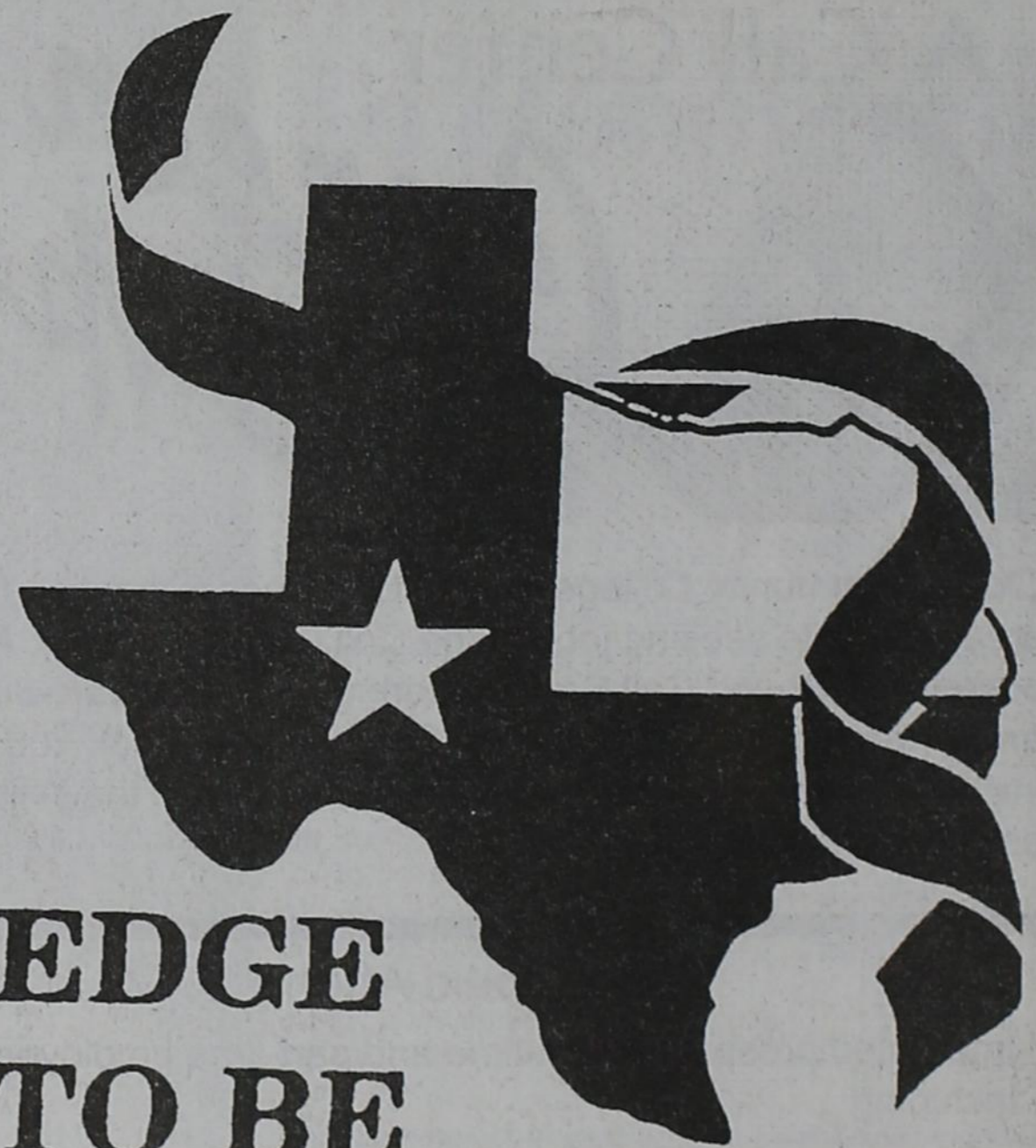
