## Prairie Acres employees speak to the community

(The following was received via email from Prairie Acres employees. Except for editing for paragraphs and punctuation, the letter is printed as received.)

Dear Friona Community,

Firstly we would like to thank everyone who is supporting us and trying to help us in this difficult time. We appreciate the efforts with the fundraiser and trust this will be a great event.

The first time we realized there would be a change is the day the people from Transition Health Services (THS) walked through our front doors. We had no idea that they were hired and how much their contract would impact our jobs.

Transition Health Services

was hired by the City of Friona to support Prairie Acres and to help us in getting more residents. To the best of our knowledge none of the new admissions have been referred by THS. Prairie Acres/Friona Heritage Estates employees have gone out and done some PR in the area.

Transition Health Services have helped in some areas but in other areas we still lack training and support. With Jo Blackwell gone we really need support/training as she truly ran this whole place. Communication can

sometimes be a problem with them being 400 miles away.

We've had some miscommunication between the City of Friona saying one thing and the management team saying another. Therefore we are not always sure where we stand day to day. We were told that there will be no more contributions to the profit sharing plan but we don't know what will happen to the money already invested. Will the employees keep that? Can we only get it once we resign or will we have the option to take it

earlier and invest somewhere else where we could contribute to it?

The Prairie Acres Board was disbanded after supporting us from the very beginning. Employees at Prairie Acres/Friona Heritage Estates was offered new, cheaper medical insurance as mentioned in a previous issue of the Friona Star but it wasn't mentioned that this new insurance policy was only a supplemental policy "in addition to other" insurance as stated in their booklet. This plan is not intended to re-

place or provide major medical insurance.

Daily hours were cut in some departments. Many of our employees cannot afford to work less hours. Our resident food budget went from more than \$7 per resident per day to \$5.70 per resident per day. We are told this is the normal budget for facilities.

Prairie Acres/Friona Heritage Estates has provided quality care for 32 years and we continue to do so. We have yearly inspections from State and never have any major deficiencies.

All checks (payroll included) now have to be signed by the City of Friona. We need two signatures on each check and it takes some planning to get both city employees (city manager and city secretary) available on certain days to get these signed. Maybe this will change if they find a permanent administrator to replace Jo Blackwell. So far they have had no luck in getting this position permanently filled.

We now have our second interim administrator. Changes come with each new person, as can be expected. As mentioned in the Friona Star nu-

merous times THS gets \$6,750 per month but nowhere has it been mentioned that Prairie Acres pays that fee every month. Prairie Acres also has to pay the Underwood Law Firm consultation for discussions done in May 2008 between the law firm and the president of THS and for work with Mr. Slater Elza regarding scheduling the potential management company to meet with the city council.

We were told that THS has been hired for 6 months (which expires November '08) but THS is already talking about changes for the new year. Of these changes mentioned is that the secretarial position at Prairie Acres for the last 32 years (current secretary has been in this position for 20 years) will no longer exist and that payroll and accounts payable will be done from their offices in Argyle, Texas, by a Transition Health Services employee.

We love our residents and strive to give them the best care we possibly can. We pray for Prairie Acres/Friona Heritage Estates and trust we will come out on top again.

## School board plans building renovation and sets tax rate

The Friona ISD school board met in regular session Monday September 15 at 7 p.m. in the administration building.

Plans were approved for the renovation of the M&M building at the corner of Euclid and 8th St. Roofing was begun this week. Plans call for four classrooms plus space for reading recovery, Headstart, and speech

therapy. Early childhood and day care will also move from the Migrant Center building on Main St. to the building. Superintendent Kenny Austin said utilization of the building should start with the Fall 2009 school year.

The board passed a resolution to set the tax rate at \$.85 per \$100, the same rate as last year and approved the surrender of \$600,000 in additional bank securities by Friona State Bank.

A resolution was passed recognizing Deaf Smith County 4-H as approved for extracurricular status and adjunct faculty status for members of Deaf Smith County and Parmer County Extension offices. The School Safety and Security Audits for 2008-09 were reviewed.

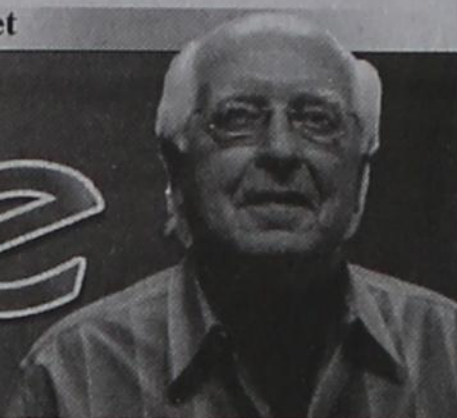

### Scooter's Good Time Spaghetti Soup

- 1 lb hamburger
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 2 chopped garlic cloves
- 1 small pkg spaghetti
- 1 can (30 oz) spaghetti sauce with mushrooms & peppers
- 1 10 oz can beef broth
- 2 cups water
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 16 oz frozen vegetables or 1 lg can mixed vegetables
- 1 10 oz can Rotel mild
- 1 tsp sugar
- 1 tsp salt & pepper

Cook hamburger, onion, & garlic. Add sauce & spaghetti. Add next 3 ingredients. Simmer 20 minutes, stir in Rotel and vegetables. Cook 20 more minutes.....Enjoy!!

We would like to express our appreciation and our concern for Prairie Acres and Heritage Estates. Both of our mothers were residents of each facility before their deaths. Their care was excellent in both places.

The employees were kind and loving to them and showed compassion and concern as they attended to them. The realization of how important an assisted living facility and a nursing home are to Friona has made it one of our priorities.

The occupancy of both places is down from previous years and has created a shortfall in their income. As a result, the bond payment that is due in February of \$150,000 is not available in their funds. This amount must be raised by the community or our taxes will be raised to meet this obligation.

We have chosen to serve on a committee, made up of members of the community, to help raise this amount. Friona is such a caring, giving community, with this in mind, we see this goal as attainable.

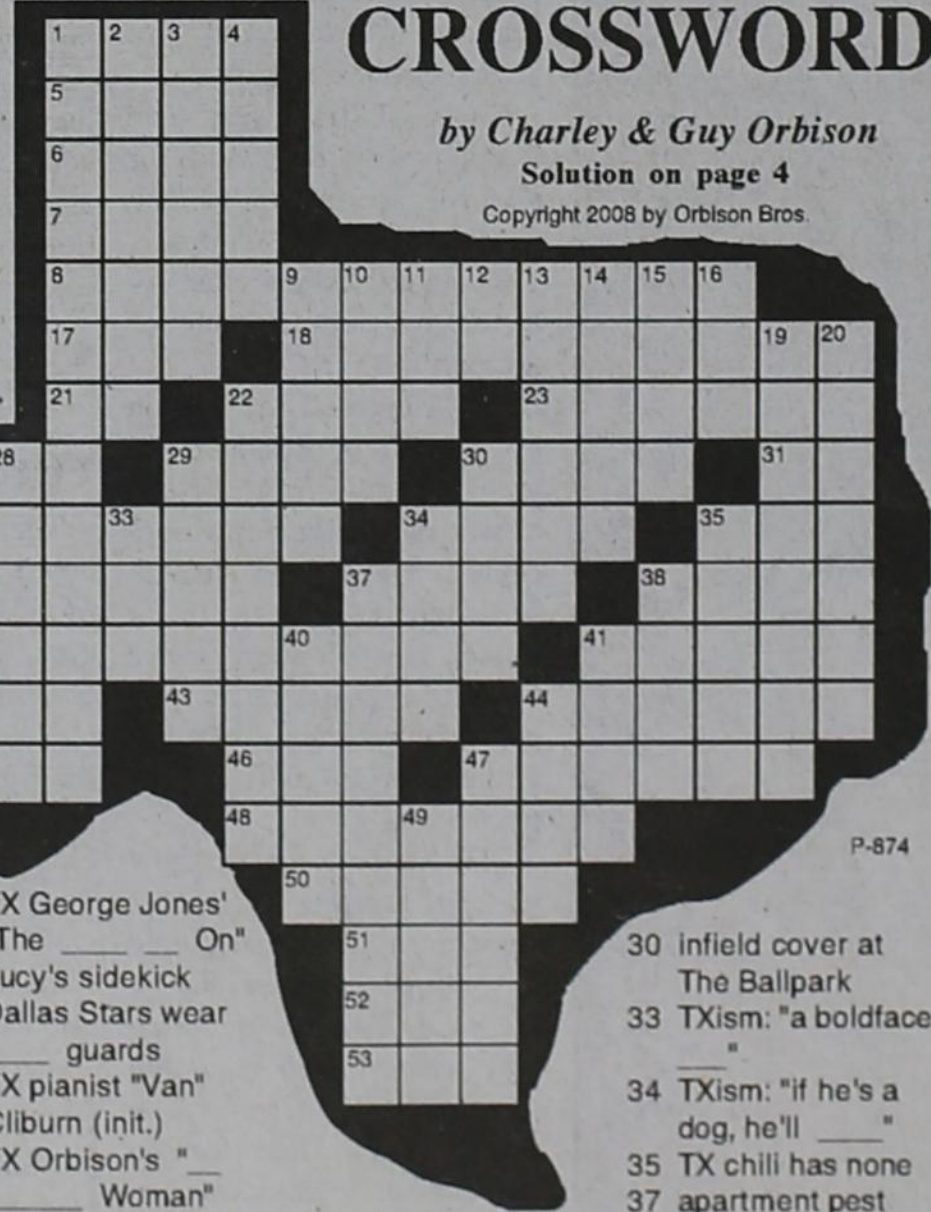

ably need support until they can make a decision about what to do.



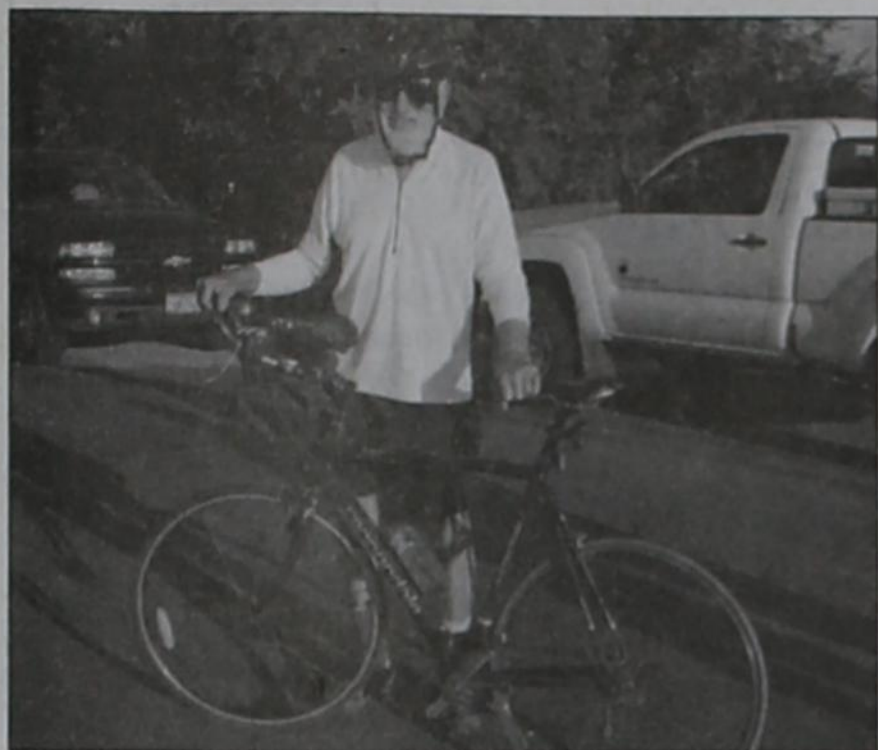

for the Chieftains who held the Hornets to 50 yards of total offense.

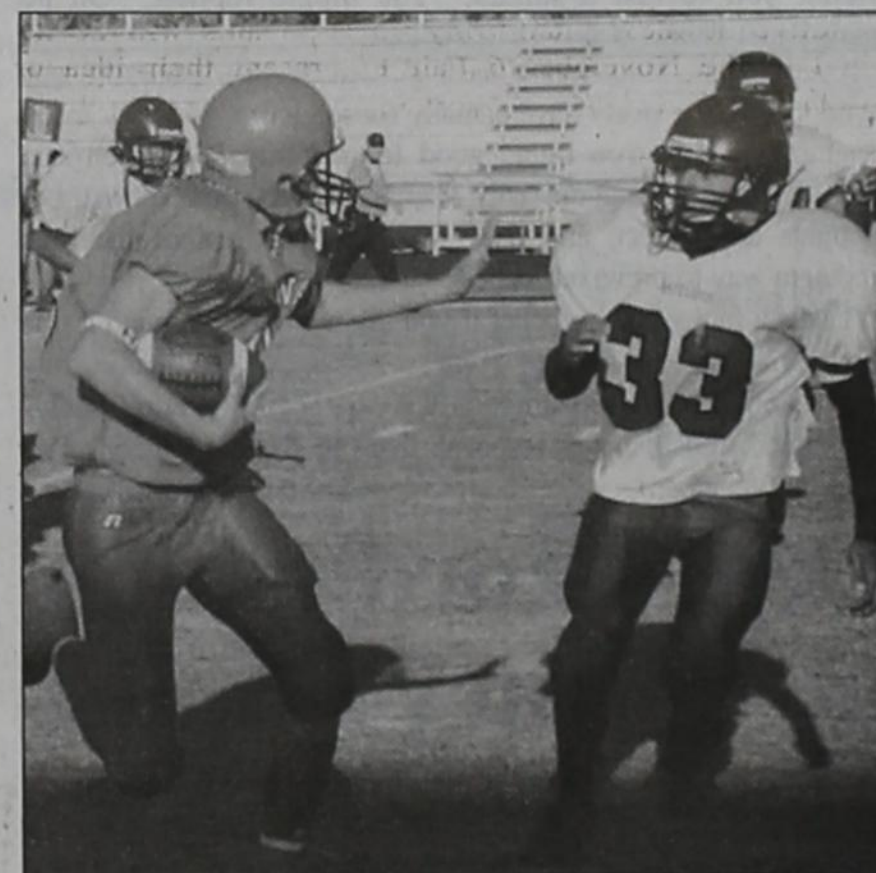

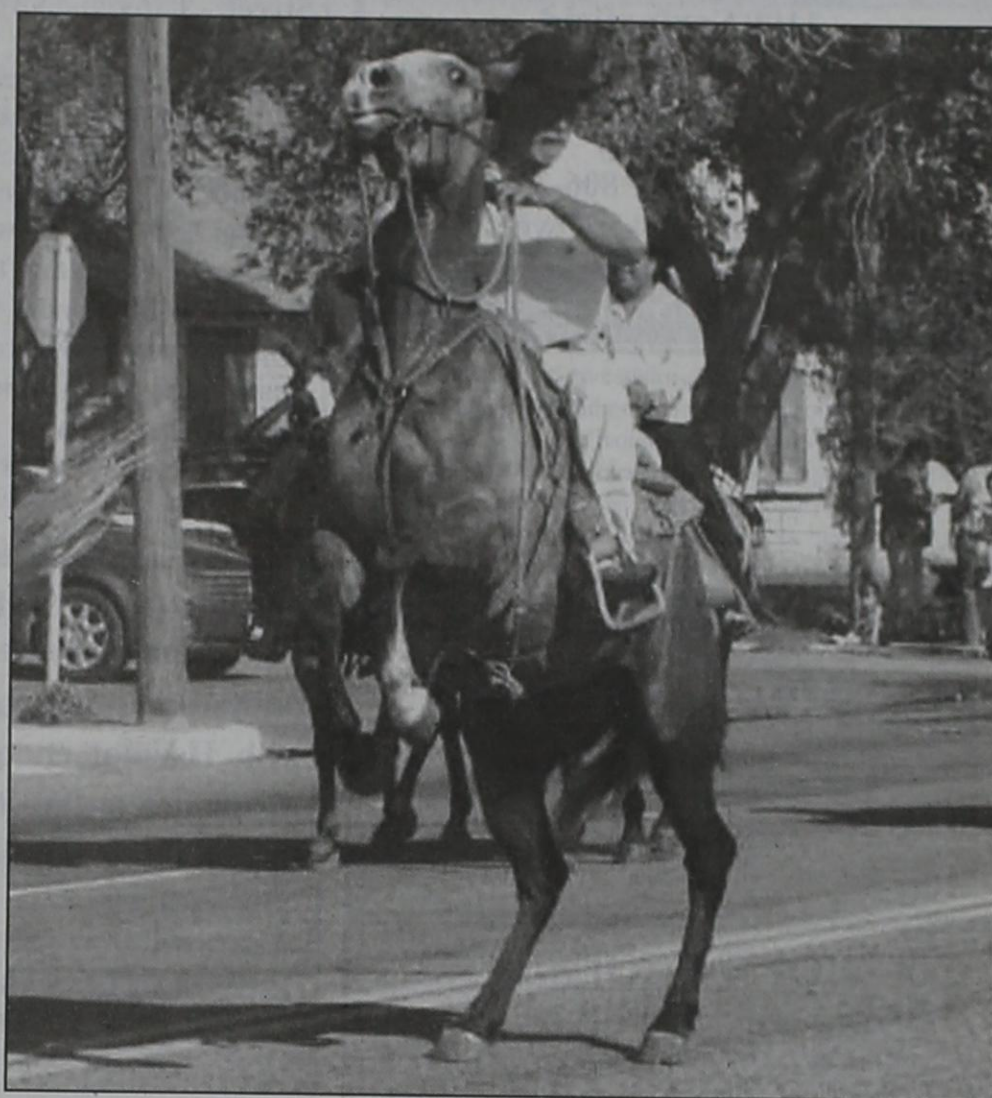

# Lakeview School remembered with official historical marker

There is not much out there anymore except a field full of memories. On Sunday, September 21, 2008, a small group of folks gathered southeast of Friona at the intersection of FM2397 and County Road 27 to dedicate an official historical marker to honor the Lakeview School which served students from 1928-1942.

The marker is on FM2397 in front of the big AT&T cell phone tower. The Lakeview School was located a mile south on CR 27. It is still a dirt road. A house near the intersection, now abandoned, was home to John Hand's family. Mr. Hand, a Lakeview student, was present at Sunday's ceremony.

Where the school building used to be is now a cotton field. Across the road is where the "lake" was. It is just a big pasture where a playa lake forms after a good rain. To the children of the area in the 1920s and 30s it was a lake, hence the name of the two-room schoolhouse, Lakeview School.

Former students of Lakeview shared their memories at

Sunday's ceremonies. Present were Tom O'Brian now of Dimmitt, John Hand, John Allen, Sam Mears, and Billy Joe Mercer, all of Friona, and Sue Crow Inman of Hereford.

They said the building was divided in half. Grades 1-4 were in one room and grades 5-7 in the other side. After all these years they could even recall the names of their teachers. A three-room house was built for the teachers to live in.

Sam Mears and Billy Joe Mercer said they were the only two students in first grade when they started school at Lakeview. Mr. O'Brian, now 93, remembers graduating from the school in 7th grade. Mrs. Inman brought along a scrapbook with a few old photos and shared about the kids bringing lunches to school each day.

Sam Mears recalled a lot of peanut butter sandwiches. Since kids didn't have watches in those days, he remembered one time thinking the 10 a.m. recess was dinner so he ate his lunch and when the dinner hour arrived he didn't have anything to eat. He didn't do that again.

Billy Joe Mercer said if a student needed to be excused to go to the bathroom they needed to ask permission early because the "bathrooms" were a quarter of a mile away from the schoolhouse, the boys in one direction and the girls in another.

John Allen's family came to Parmer County in 1938. His dad was a farmhand and they lived 3-4 miles from the school. Most of the time John rode the bus, which gathered the Lakeview students, dropped them off, then took the high school students into Friona. They had to wait for the bus to come back from Friona in the evenings to take them home again.

Mr. Allen remembers, with a touch of humor, the daily lunch sack. "We were poor and I usually brought a sausage on a biscuit. Some of the other kids had baloney on light bread and I remember thinking how good that looked and wanting to trade with them. I know now I probably had the best lunch. Today I wouldn't trade a sausage biscuit for a baloney sandwich."

All the former students remembered that Lakeview had a good softball team that played other teams from Rhea, Oklahoma Lane, Easter, and Muleshoe. Both boys and girls were allowed to play on the team. One of the

best pitchers, they recalled, was a girl student.

Many of the school activities centered around the "lake" across the road from the schoolhouse. They also recalled on occasion a preacher would come to the school and "preach an entire sermon" to the students, a concept that has long since disappeared from modern school activities.

The Parmer County Historical Commission, chaired by Gladys Spring, organized the

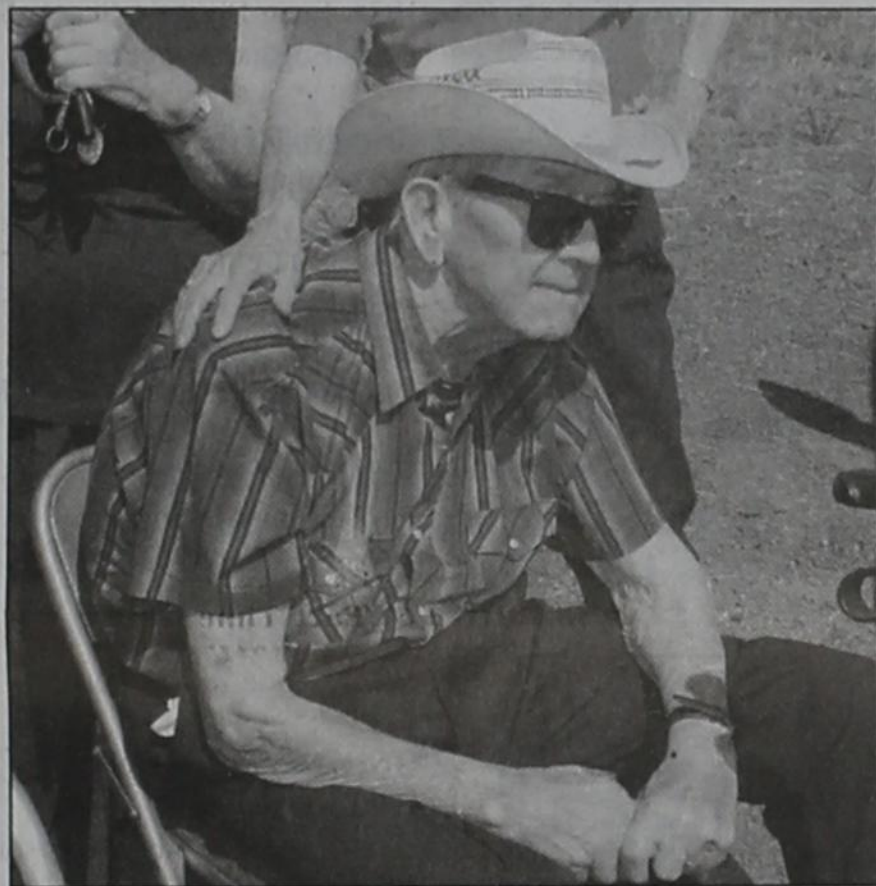
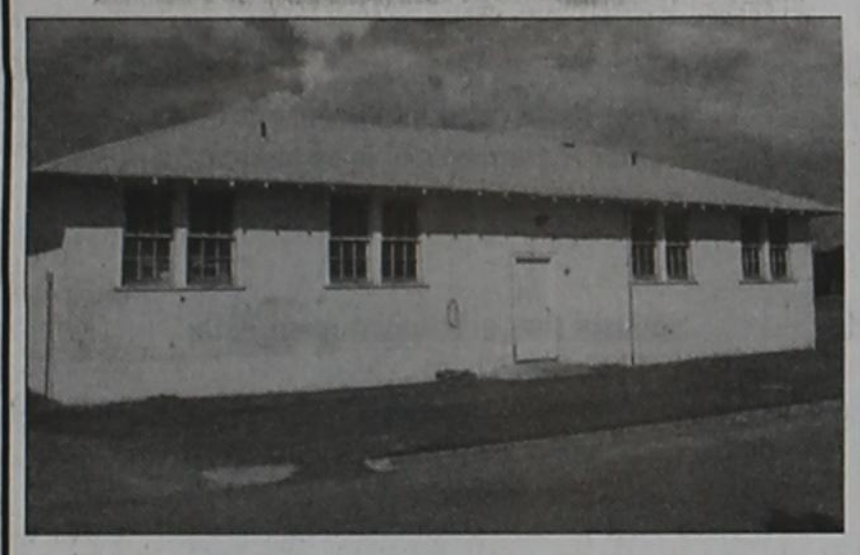
effort to have Lakeview School designated as an official historical place. The idea for the marker was introduced a few years ago by John Allen, now 80, who was a Lakeview student from 1938 to 1942. Mr. Allen is a retired electrician and a 50-year member of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

The school building was moved to Friona long ago and is still used by the school district, mainly for storage. It is located on Euclid Street on the east side of the junior high football field. Mrs. Spring told the gathering that a plaque will also be placed on the building designating its historical significance.



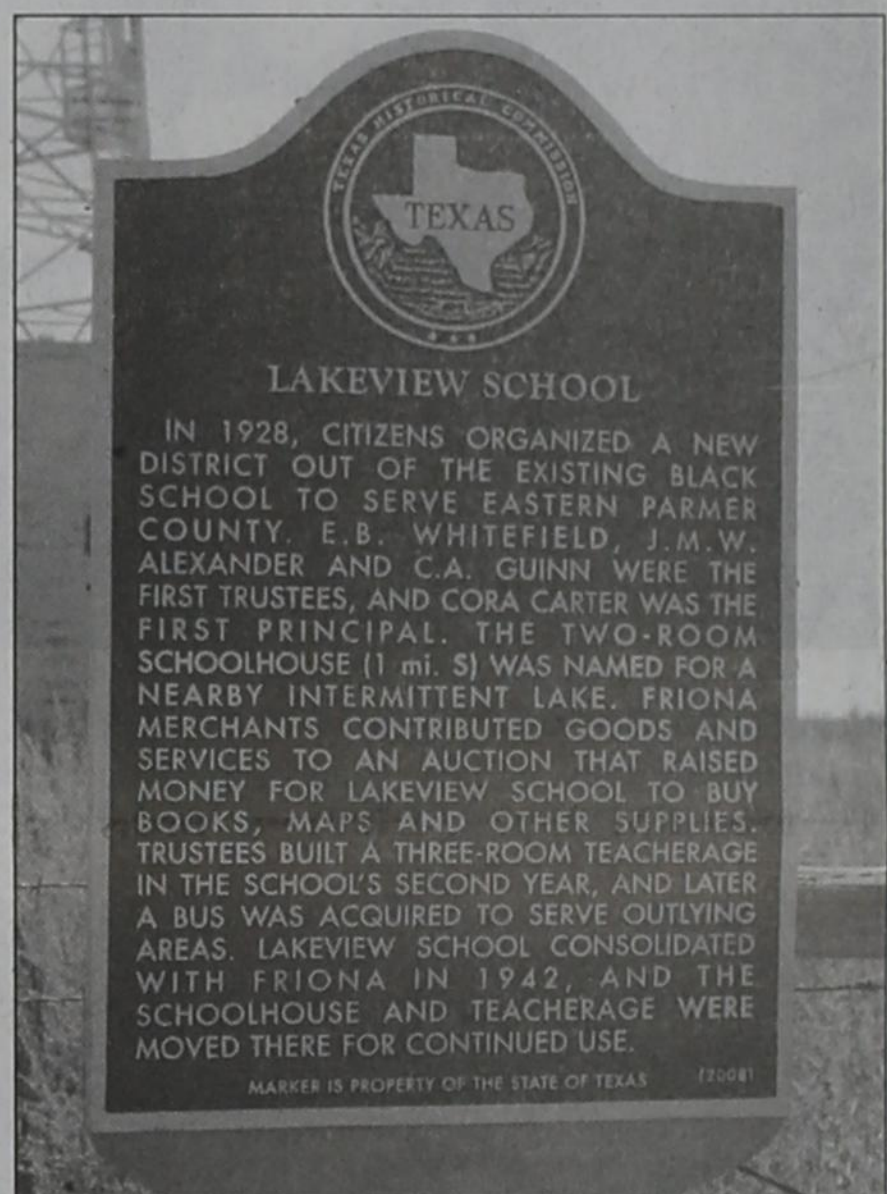
Lakeview School, Then and Now.

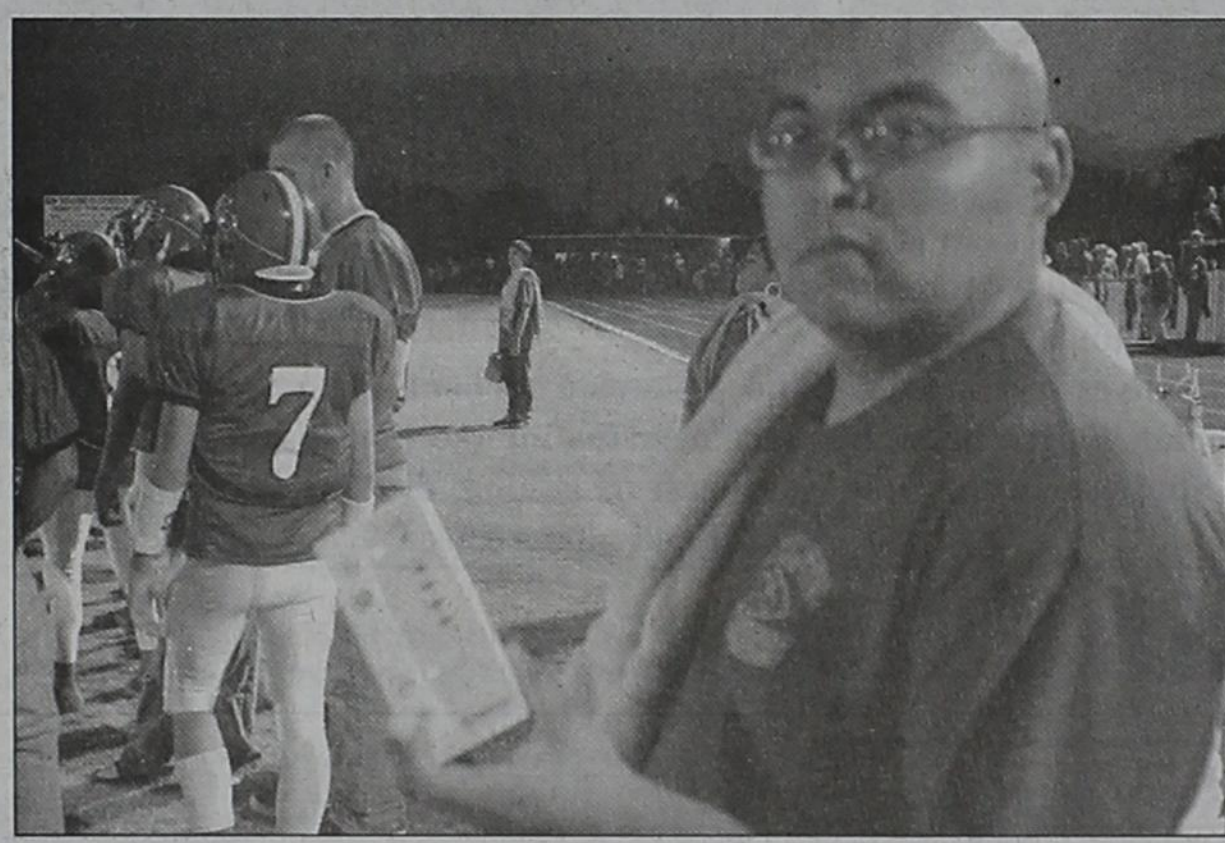

### The Boggess Family and Friona Schools

(Submitted by Patsy Bandy)

In June 1926, Ed Boggess came to Parmer County from the Woodward, Oklahoma area and bought a section of land southeast of Friona. In the late summer, 1928, Ed and Bessie moved with their family of five children, Juanita, Irene, Eugene, Geneva and Thelma, to the farm. For a while they lived in a house, divided by a partition, with 400 chickens. Later that year they built their four room house and gave the other house to the chickens. They lived there until the early forties when they moved to town.

Eugene and Doris Boggess moved into the house and later built on a bathroom and another bedroom. They moved in January 1954 to a place they bought, 2 1/2 miles northeast of the home place. The Clay Bandy's now live in Eugene's home place. Bob and Geneva Riethmayer lived in the home place in the winter of 1953-'54 during cotton harvest.

Eugene and Patsy Bandy moved into the house in November 1954 and still live there. It has been remodeled and built on to through the years. The Bandy boys never lived in another house until they went to college.

In the fall of 1928, three of the Boggess children, Juanita, Irene and Eugene, started school in Friona. Geneva and Thelma started when they were old enough. Juanita married before her senior year and did not graduate; all the others graduated from Friona High School.

From 1928 until now there has been at least one direct descendant attending the Friona school system, except from the time Adam Bandy graduated in 2003, until Colton Riethmayer started in 2007.

A number of those who graduated went on to college and a number of them graduated there.

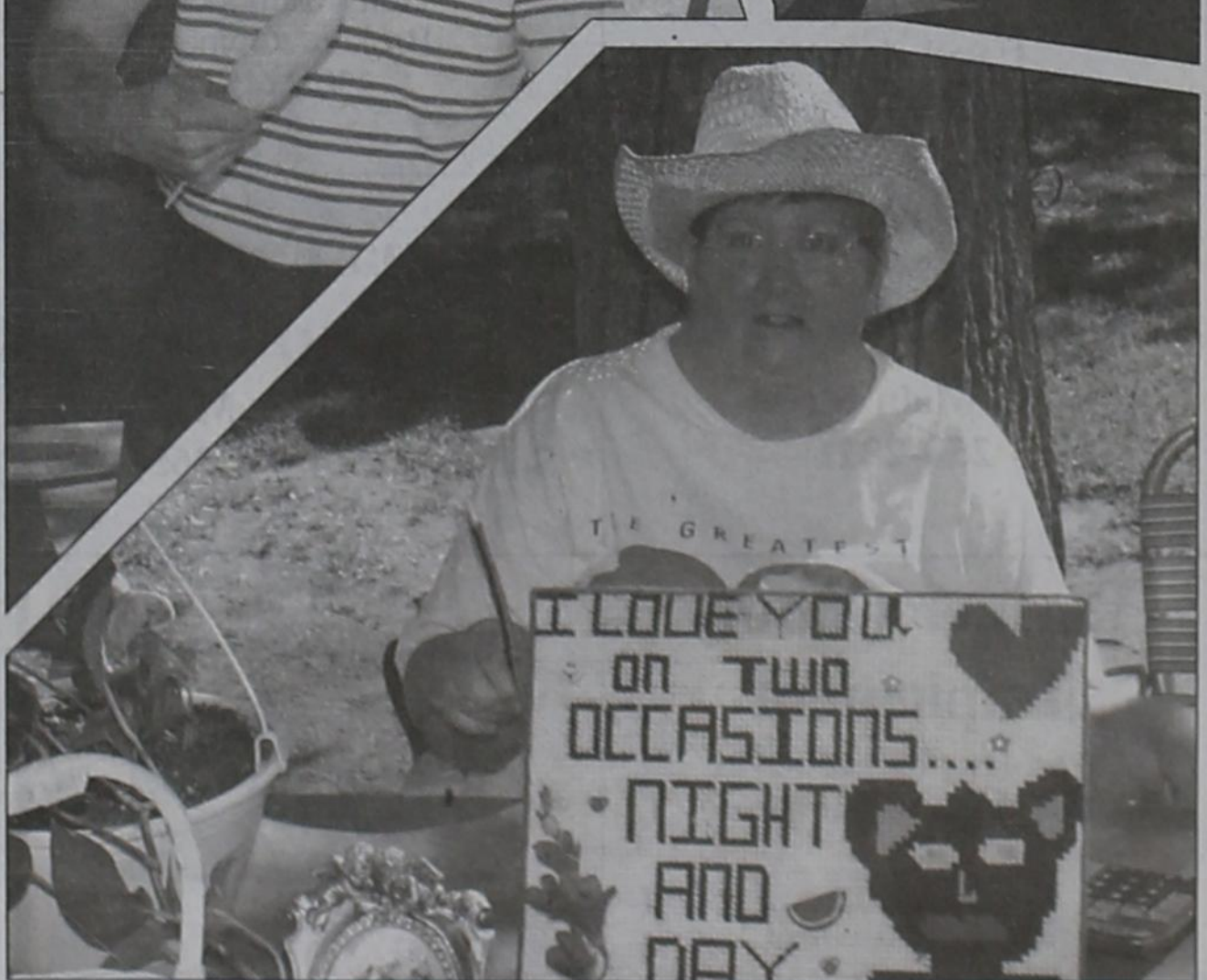
