2004 Now Second Wettest On Record

An exceptionally wet weekend, which deposited 3.66 inches of rain in Friona's official gauge helped push the total moisture for the year into second place all-time, according to a check of moisture records. A total of 4.09 inches fell between September 20 and 27, placing the month's total at 4.80 inches, and hiking the year's total to 27.62 inches.

Until this week, the year 1997 had been the second-wettest year on record, 27.40. The all-time record for Parmer County, since rainfall records have been tabulated, is 40.57 inches in 1941, the year which is the granddaddy of all rainfall years for most counties in the Panhandle-South Plains.

Although it seems unlikely that the 1941 record will be broken, lacking 12.95 inches from the current total with just three months left in the year, perhaps we'd better not make any bets.

September became the fourth month locally for a monthly total of over four inches. Two months, April and June, had exactly the same recording of 4.81 inches, and July rang in with 4.18 inches.

(If I mis-read the month's total by only .01 inches, that would make a third month with exactly the same amount-quite a coincidence for this high of a total.) With the exception of April, the latter third of each month has turned out to bring the most rainfall.

Last Sunday, the measurement was 2.67 inches, and fell like a mountain shower, lasting practically the entire day. Another .65 inches fell on Monday, and a total of .71 inches had fallen in the four days prior to the weekend.

The rain will be a big boost for the area's wheat, but without exception, the row crops are needing some hot, dry weather in order to mature, and the pattern will have to change drastically.

Sunday's temperature varied by only six degrees, from 54 to 60 degrees. The sun came out Tuesday afternoon, and looked good to most residents.


It was a game made for the fans as Friona's JV broke some huge plays and routed the Dalhart JV 40-22 at Dalhart.

West Texas Agriculture Is The **Cornerstone Of Our Way Of Life**

BY CONGRESSMAN CHARLIE STENHOLM

As a farmer I understand the support we need to preserve terrorism. I am also working to implement an animal identificaour unique way of life. My family and I grow cotton, wheat, tion system to protect the health of the U.S. livestock industry. grain sorghum, and have a few cattle on our Jones County farm.

House Agriculture Committee. In this position, I help oversee efforts to establish one. every federal agricultural agency, law and regulation. I provide guidance to other members of the committee and Congress as they form new agriculture policies. This position allows me a seat at the table when any agriculture policy is being discussed.

With little visible movement occurring on the FY2005 Homeland Security Appropriations bill that passed the Senate late last week, agriculture's focus continues to center on what has unexpectedly become a much anticipated appropriations bill.

The Senate bill included a couple of welcome late additions in corn and sorghum producers, and boost oilseed and livestock the form of emergency hurricane and agriculture disaster relief. The agriculture disaster portion of the bill is estimated to provide some \$3 billion for weather related losses endured by farmers in 2003 or 2004.

> That is why encouraging completion of the Homeland Security spending bill is at the top of the list for cotton and other commodities that endured crop losses due to drought in some areas and hail and similar severe weather in others.

Plains Cotton Growers officers and Executive Vice President Steve Verett will be discussing the importance of the disaster package during a round of appointments in Washington, DC September 28-29.

The latest news from Washington indicates that some technical issues need to be addressed before the bill can go to conference.

For Texas High Plains producers the good news was the Senate's apparent recognition that significant crop damage occurred in 2003 as well as 2004. Over one million acres of cotton were lost in 2003 on the Texas High Plains alone. The vast majority of the losses were caused by hailstorms that crisscrossed the region early in the growing season.

On the other end of the spectrum is the 2004 crop. With the arrival of Fall on the Texas High Plains, the big unknown is if the weather will continue to cooperate. A few more weeks of warm, sunny days would be just what many of them need to finish out the crop.

Unfortunately, Fall's arrival hasn't been exactly what many had hoped for going into the last week of September. For many areas the rain that has fallen over the past few days will mostly be viewed as a welcome addition to a crop that was beginning to show some signs of moisture stress. What is less welcome is the forecast over the next 7-8 days The Texas Animal Health that projects daytime highs only reaching the middle to upper 70s. Nighttime lows are also projected to fall to the lower 40s in northern counties and into the 50s in counties south of Lubbock. With more and more cotton reaching a point where harvest aid applications are imminent, the overall effect of the cool-down will be hard to judge. No matter what the weather brings, a gradual acceleration of both harvest aid application and harvesting activity will occur in the next few weeks. . In many fields the crop is essentially made and the next step is plant preparation and harvest. Slow to develop cotton in northern areas and all of the area's late-planted cotton needs more time, heat and sunshine to realize its potential. Unfortunately, nobody knows what October will bring. Regardless of the crop situation, High Plains producers are all looking for the same thing. Warm, open weather provides the best scenario for both ends of the high Plains cotton spectrum.

Does Your Child Have an Anxiety Disorder? You may think that your toddler's cries as you leave the day care, or your college freshman returning home after one semester, are signs of unconditional love or laziness. However, your child could be suffering from an anxiety disorder.

Anxiety can cause people to feel extremely frightened or uneasy at times when most would not. Anxiety disorder is the most common mental illness in American-one in 10 children may suffer from it. Here are some of the common anxiety disorders found in children:

Obsessive-compulsive disorder is characterized by repetitive behaviors, such as continuous hand washing, counting and/or arranging and rearranging objects. Young children will not realize this behavior is abnormal and may be upset when forced to change.

Post-traumatic stress disorder is usually seen in children who have suffered such trauma as abuse, natural disasters or extreme violence. Many children will have nightmares, depression, anger, and are easily startled.

Phobias are irrational fears of things that involve little danger. Children usually have social phobias, such as a fear of going to school or of criticism.

If you believe your child may have an anxiety disorder, contact your family physician.







Parents need to realize that their children have been given as a stewardship from God. God has given us our children as a treasured trust, a gift. Our children are influenced by what we communicate to them, not by what we think. We need to ask God for wisdom and patience as we speak the language of love to our children, and we need to realize that we communicate louder and stronger by what we DO rather than what we SAY. Love is spelled "TIME". We need to show a genuine interest in our children. No one ever came to their deathbed and said, "I wish I had spent more time at work." The family is the first group your children belong to, if they don't feel love there, they likely never will.



APPLICATION Friona Industries, L.P., has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for renewal of Air Quality Permit No. 1140A which would authorize continued operation of their Animal Feedmill Facility located at 1201 East 11th Street, Friona, Parmer County, Texas. The existing facility is authorized to emit the following air contaminants: organic compounds, sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide, and particulate matter including particulate matter less than 10 microns in diameter.

The TCEQ received this application on August 31, 2004. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEO central office, TCEO Amarillo regional office, and the City of Friona Public Library, 623 Main Street, Friona, Parmer County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Amarillo regional office of the TCEQ.

The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the application indicates that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

PUBLIC COMMENT You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. According to the Texas Clean Air Act 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.



#5: The company that offers the lowest price is the company you should hire.

No. We've seen so many problems arise from the lowest bid companies that we suggest you NEVER hire the company that quotes the cheapest price. The two most common problems are:

#6: Any honest carpet cleaning company should be able to give you an exact price over the telephone.

We wish this were true, but it isn't. Honest, reputable carpet cleaning companies almost never price carpet cleaning by the room. Instead, carpet cleaning is usually priced by the square foot. So if you'd like us to tell you the exact cost of cleaning your carpet, we need to know the exact number of square feet that you want cleaned. To get an accurate measurement, we use a measuring wheel or hand held sonic measuring device to calculate the exact size of the carpet area.


