Chamber seeks Miss Friona and Little Miss contestants

The Friona Chamber of Commerce is seeking entrants to participate in the 2008 Miss Friona and Little Miss Friona pageants.

Following orientation hot dogs and other refreshments will be served.

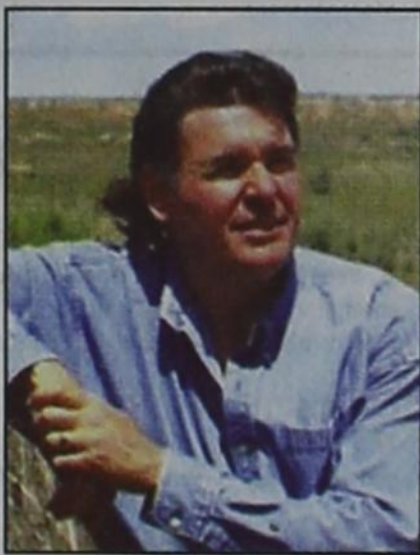

Maines concert on the lawn Saturday

The Union Congregational Church of Friona will sponsor a concert by Kenny Maines on the lawn of the church Saturday at 8 p.m. Everyone in the community is invited to attend. Maines is a noted musician from Lubbock. His niece is one of the Dixie Chicks.

Kenny's dad James Maines, along with two brothers, formed the original Maines Brothers Band in the late 1950s. James often took his boys along on the rodeo dance and VFW Hall circuit. The boys started singing together when Kenny was 7-years-old and the "Little Maines Boys" loved entertaining the crowds.

Eventually the "Little Maines Boys" became the new generation "Maines Brothers Band" and forged their own style of West Texas music. Kenny's older brother Lloyd joined forces with the Joe Ely Band during the 1970s. Kenny headed to Las Vegas and worked for three years as a bass player for a Las Vegas show band.

Later the Maines Brothers reunited and developed a brand of music termed aggressive country. They recorded 8 albums and shared the stage with the likes of Alabama, Reba McEntire, Barbara Mandrell, Ronnie Milsap, Dr. Hook, and The Judds.

After years of being on the road the band settled down to raise families and pursue other careers. Kenny Maines was elected Lubbock County Commissioner in 1992 and served for 12 years. He continued to write songs and perform around the Lubbock area. In 2004 he left politics and returned to music. Since then he has recorded three CDs, including an acoustic Christian CD entitled, "Out of Control."

The latest project is a collection of Hank Williams music recorded in conjunction with the play, "Lost Highway: The Life and Music of Hank Williams," in which Kenny plays the lead role of Hank Williams.

Kenny now performs as an acoustic solo act and says he is excited about getting back on the road and performing for anyone who enjoys great West Texas music.

Wheat harvest yields disappointing

Following record wheat yields experienced in the High Plains last year, 2008 was a disappointment, said a Texas AgriLife Extension Service Agent.

Throughout the Panhandle, many dryland and even a few irrigated fields, were not harvested due to drought and virus infection, said Dr. Brent

Bean, AgriLife Extension agronomist.

The year was marked by less than 5.5 inches of precipitation from September through June in some places, Bean said. Additionally, wheat virus infections of both dryland and irrigated fields were worse than they have been in several years. The best wheat yields were generally

found in the northeast portion of the Panhandle where more timely precipitation was received.

Planting date also seemed to make more of a difference than usual, Bean said. Wheat planted just a couple of weeks later than optimum (around Oct. 4) did not yield as well, especially if planted no-till behind corn or cotton.

Some wheat root rot was also observed in the fall and led to poor establishment in some fields. This was likely

due to the previous wet spring and summer that increased soil fungi activity. Although there were some very good irrigated yields reported, overall they were a disappointment.

"Although we did not get especially cold during the spring, we did have just enough freezing weather just prior to heading to cause some sterile heads, further contributing to lower yields," he said.

July weather report

Weather guy John Gurley reported Friona received 2.39 inches of rain during the month of July. Rainfall was recorded on eight different days. July 10 counted 0.76 inch, the most on any one day.

As can be expected the average high temperature was 85 and the average low was 65. The highest temperature was on July 29 at 95 degrees. The thermometer plummeted all the way to 59 degrees for the lowest temp on July 13.

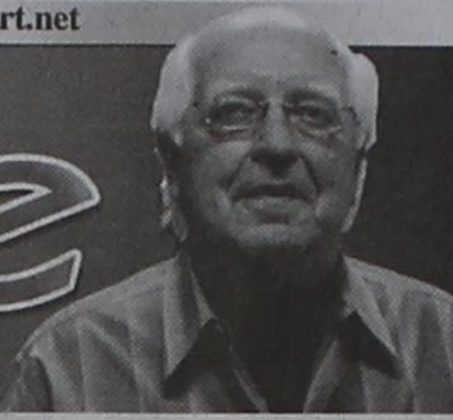

gations as politicians always will. The Senate Ethics Committee (a perfect oxymoron) welcomed Old Man Stevens back as some kind of reigning monarch.

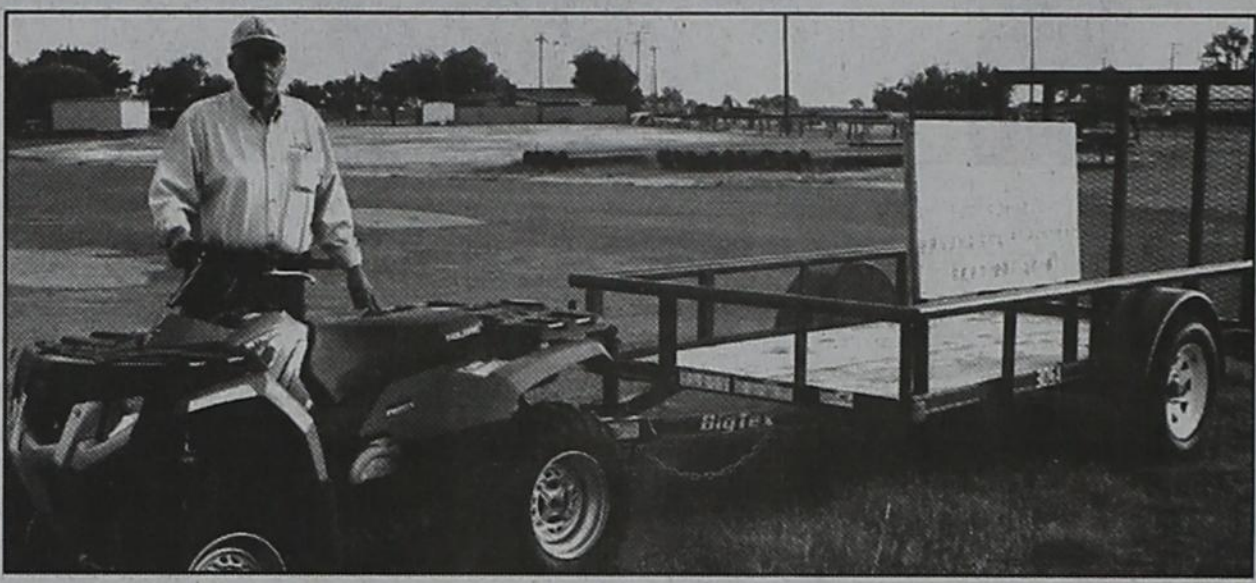
Old Man Stevens, and others like him that misappropriate and steal taxpayer money for their personal benefit should be kicked out, made to resign, booted, bye-bye.

Good morning,

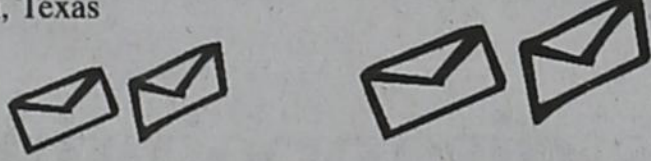

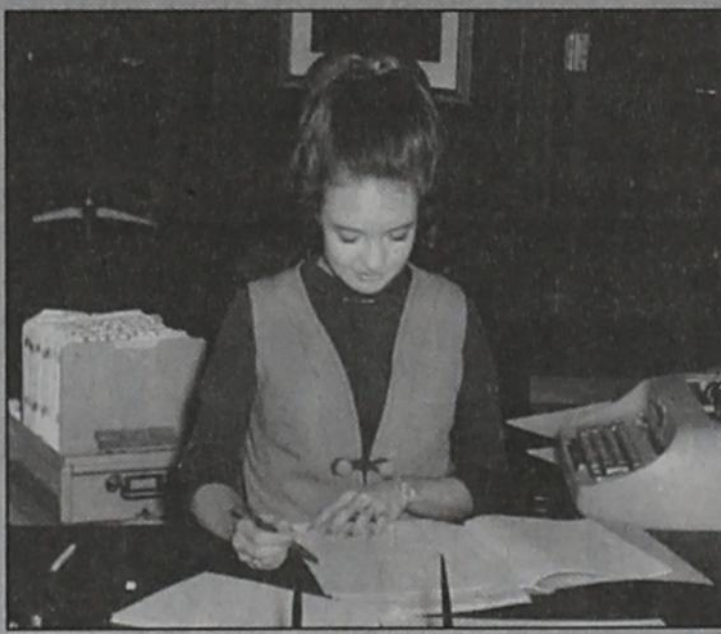

I started working at Friona State Bank in the summer of 1970. The bank was still located on the corner of 7th and Main. I worked in bookkeeping for a short time until we moved into the new building at the present location.

After the move I joined Iola Nelson as a secretary to the officers. We worked for Frank Spring, president at that time, along with Charles Allen, Gary Brown, and Jerry Hinkle. Iola and I became very close friends. She was my teacher, mentor, and friend.

I remember that the hardest part of my job was taking shorthand from Charles Allen. He could talk faster than anyone I knew when he was dictating a letter. Iola and I got many laughs when we would try to keep up with him. He probably laughed too when we walked out of the office.

I also remember that Charles always loved to go duck hunting. One day he gave me a recipe for cooking duck. Shortly after that Gary killed a duck and I tried Charles' recipe. I don't know what I did wrong but our kitchen smelled really bad for a very long time. I finally admitted that we would leave the pleasure of duck hunting and cooking to him.

I really enjoyed working with everyone at the bank. I still have several close friendships that were started during that period of time. I especially remember Tennie Henderson spoiling us. During the summer she would bring us a fresh cut rose from the garden along with a smile and a hug every morning.

I worked at the bank until the fall of 1973. Our first daughter was born in December 1973 when I was fortunate to become a stay-at-home mom. Gary and I have been married 40 years this August. We have three daughters: Tamara, Trista, and Tania, along with 5 grandchildren.

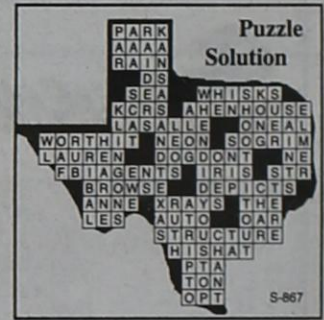

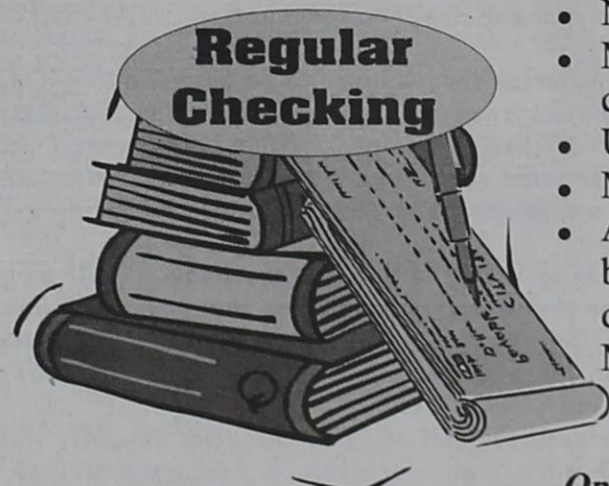

Duane Wyly said, "We all enjoyed a day of catching up on the last 60 years and solving the world's problems, if only the politicians would listen."



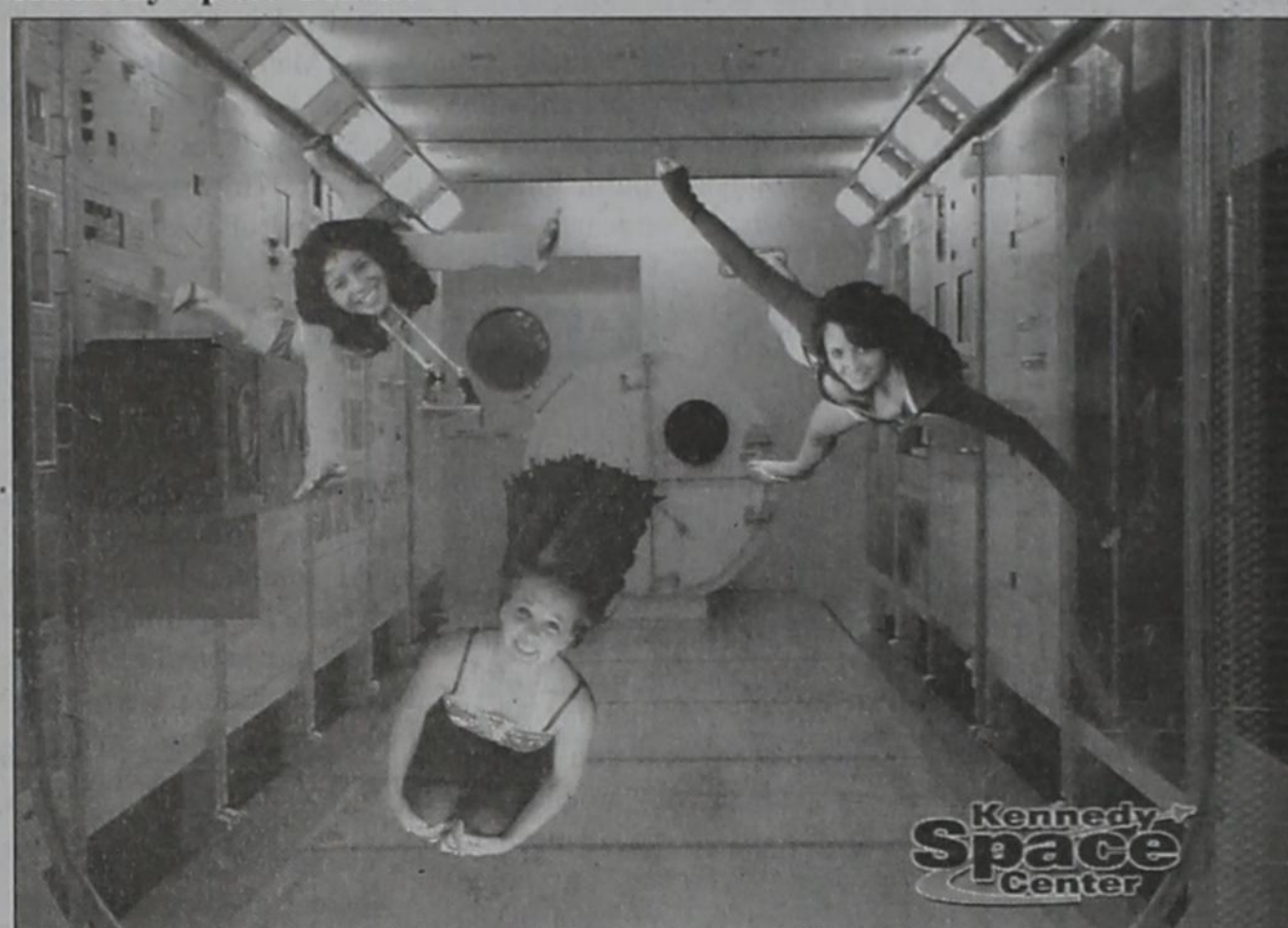

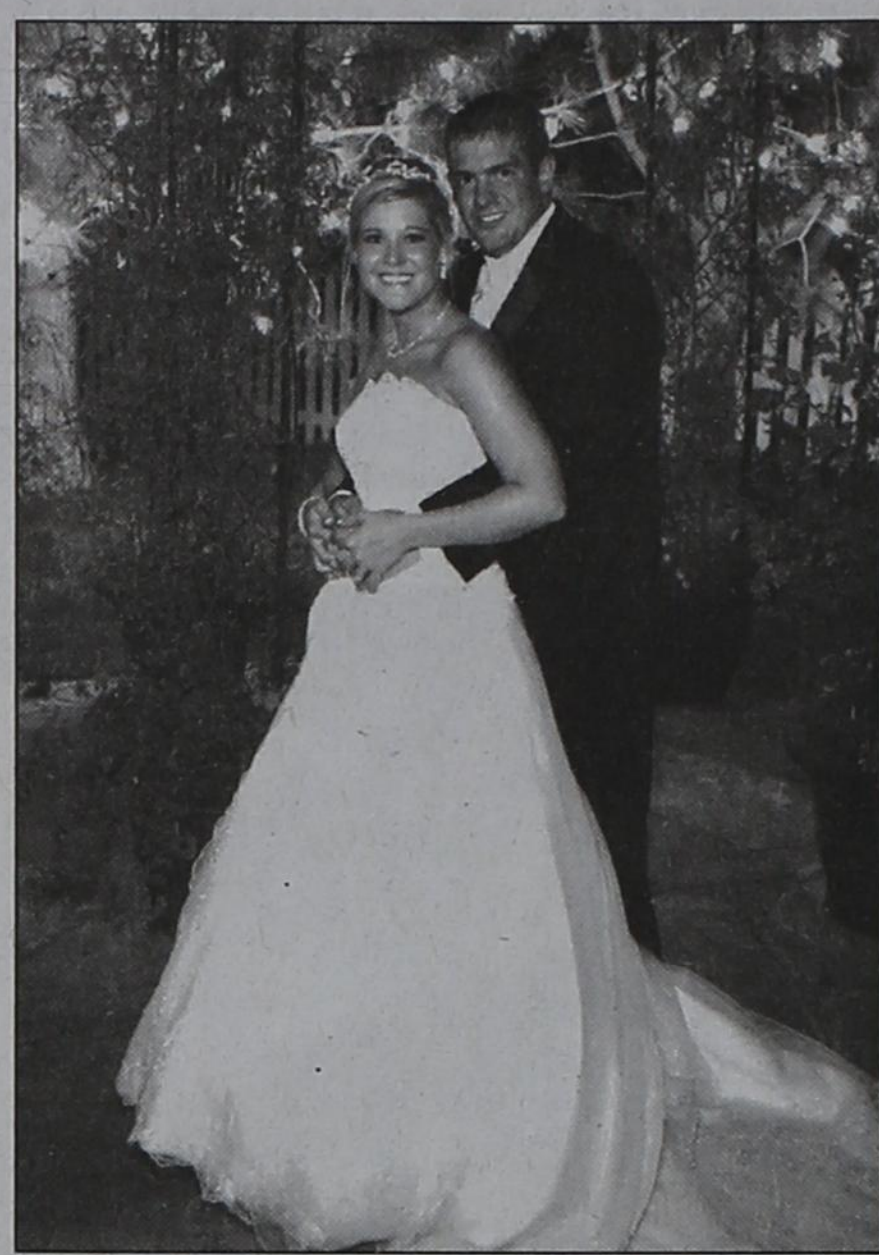

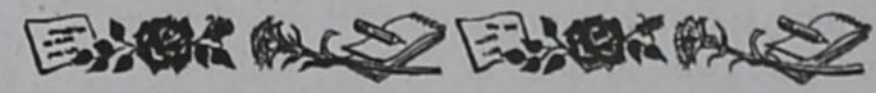

Friona Schools Centennial Review

My Memories of Friona School Days During the 1930s and 1940s

In 1929 my parents, Homer and Mae Hyde, moved their family of four children from Walters, Oklahoma, to a farm on the Texas Plains. We lived 7 miles southeast of Friona.

That fall Omer and Maxine began their education in the Friona schools. Maxine was in first grade and Omer was in fourth grade. We were fortunate to be on the bus route, as well as to have buses, thanks to the foresight of Mr. Glenn Reeve, who along with others, purchased the buses.

The first day of school as I was waiting to be assigned to a teacher and a homeroom I suddenly became aware that my friend was crying. She wanted to be in Mrs. Harry Whitley's first grade class. So did I, as Maxine had been in her class. The crying worked for my friend, but I didn't dare try that tactic. I did learn to love my teacher that year.

Not long after this event, Mrs. Whitley invited Maxine and me to spend the night with her. I felt so honored! The next morning at breakfast, Mr. Whitley asked us if we knew we were eating brain with the scrambled eggs. He was teasing...I hope.

During recess one day I was informed Maxine was hurt. A friend was pushing her on the giant strides when she fell. Her right wrist had compound fractures causing pain, suffering and infection. My parents' prayers, along with others prayers miraculously healed her arm. She achieved many things, i.e. playing the piano and the snare drums, as well as doing secretarial work, even though the arm was badly scarred and was often painful. The giant strides were suddenly removed from the school playground.

Mrs. Lewis was penmanship and art teacher for grade school. One day she asked Duke Baker to model for the class to sketch him. Mrs. Lewis commented

that I had even "drawn the toes of Dukes' shoe turned up on the toes." I enjoyed art class and was disappointed to hear that neither music nor art would be offered in high school.

During the 30's everyone suffered from the dust storms. Great black clouds rolled in from the north or northwest. They were frightening to see. Some people thought the end of the world was coming. When the storm struck there was total darkness. Even with lights on we could hardly see our hands in front of our faces. There was so much electricity in the air, touching someone or our desks constantly shocked us. I often slept with a sheet over my face to keep from breathing the dust that sifted into the house.

One day when our bus reached the Frio Draw, Sam Williams, our bus driver, decided the water was too deep and running too swiftly to risk crossing in the bus. There were no cell phones to get help. But somehow Tom Jasper showed up with his pair of long horned oxen and a flat bed trailer. He drove the oxen across the draw and everyone crawled onto the trailer and was taken safely to school. That was a memorable occasion, but would probably not be allowed today.

Omer graduated as Salutatorian of FHS in 1937, and enrolled in Hardin Simmons Uni-

versity in Abilene that fall.

Mr. Harley Bulls was the band director of FHS. Maxine played the snare drums in the band. I was in the pep squad and later served as a cheerleader. Truell played the tuba when he got to high school in 1941.

Maxine was FHS Valedictorian of her class in 1940 and followed Omer to Hardin Simmons. By the following spring of 1941, Friona had over 41 inches of rain. The lakes overflowed! Dad had to detour around flooded roads as we traveled to Abilene to Omer's graduation from HSU. We were proud to see him graduate as Valedictorian, Magna Cum Laude, and also to receive the Julian Olsen Award. Omer went on to pastor several churches in Texas and Oklahoma. He married Neva Hayes. They have three children, four grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Omer and Neva moved their family to the Pacific Northwest where the Southern Baptist Convention Home Mission Board and the North West Baptist State Convention appointed him Area Missionary. He served in that capacity thirty years until his retirement.

In 1941, Superintendent Edlemon announced his intention of dividing the senior class, pulling fifteen students out to go another year, thus creating a twelve-year school system in

Friona High School. He had great foresight in doing this, but I have to admit I was not a happy camper as I had anticipated graduating in 1942.

By the next fall three of the older boys had joined the military forces, leaving 12 students in my graduating class of 1943. It was one of the smallest classes ever to graduate from FHS. Some of the teachers also resigned their positions to volunteer for military service; Mr. Edlemon was one of these.

Wartime rationing brought many changes; tires, gas, and sugar were among the many products rationed. Although I was awarded the DAR good citizenship certificate, I could not attend the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution meeting, which was held in Cincinnati, Ohio in March 1943.

Romans 8:28 KJV says, "For we know that all things work together for good for those who love the Lord, to those who are called according to His purpose." It was during this time my friend, Margie Mars, came by our house to see if I would go on a blind date with Leroy Kimbrough who was visiting his cousin, Donald Kimbrough from Lazbuddie.

We had no rural phone, so the two couples and Leroy came by our house to see if I would go with Leroy, who was from Clovis. I did. The next week Donald came to see me and we've been together sixty-four years now. I'm glad I was still around in 1943 to meet him.

Mrs. Carmaleet Truitt greatly influenced my life. She taught English and Literature, which prepared me for college English. It was during her class we memorized, "The Lord's Prayer" and "The 23rd Psalm". She also asked us to select a poem from our literature book, memorize it and recite it in class the next day. I chose, "Just 'Fore Christmas," by Eugene Field. I have recited this poem for many years now before our family opens their Christmas gifts. It's a family tradition.

Miss Lora Mae McFarland was also a favorite teacher. She taught Spanish songs, ordered each of us a sombrero and serape and took us to the Canyon radio station to perform. Fun! A highlight my senior year was being in the drama, "Demon In The Dark." I stayed in town with Mr. & Mrs. R.L. Dilger in order to walk to the practices. The drama was presented by juniors and seniors and directed by Mr. & Mrs. Gee. Another highlight was attending the Jr./Sr. Banquet. I wore the blue dotted-swiss evening dress (as we called it then) I had made in Home Economics Class. I still remember my place card; it read, "Miss Ova Worked Unda Paid". Some Prophecy!

Don joined the army and I entered Hardin Simmons after my graduation in 1943. We were married April 20, 1944 and were together a week before he left to go through paratrooper training, then on to Europe arriving in England on D-Day, June 6, 1944. I returned to school.

He came home January 1946 and immediately enrolled in Hardin Simmons. We both received our BA's in May 1949, by then I had my Mrs. And two MA's (mommas) and later four boys.

My parents moved to Lubbock so Maxine and Truell graduated from Texas Tech. I attended my sophomore year there but went back to Hardin Simmons.

Maxine married Haskell Bolding. They have two children, Jan and Mark. Mike is married to Julia and they have a son Jason.

Truell married Erdeen Clegg. They were professors at Texas Central College in Killeen until retiring. They have two sons, Truell Hyde II, married to Carliss, daughter Callie. Truell and Carliss are professors. He is Provost at Baylor, a Physics Professor and head of CASPER (the Center for Astrophysics Space Physics and Engineering Research).

Brad is married to Lisa, son Brad Jr. They both work in the Killeen school system. She is a teacher and he's a school counselor.

Don and I have six children, Sharolyn, who lives with us, Phyllis, Max, Kip, Tip, and Cris. All are or have been teachers or are in the ministry. Don pastored several churches in Washington before retiring and moving back to Friona. There are 16 teachers in Truell and my family combined. I'd say the Friona School system has had a far-reaching influence upon our lives.
