Bovina sets 4th of July activities

Bovina Chamber of Commerce officials have planned a bunch of activities for their 4th of July Bull Town Days celebration, including a fireworks display at dusk at the football field.

The day will start with the annual 4th of July parade at 10:30 a.m. Participants can start lining up about 9:45 a.m. The parade will start at North and 3rd streets and end at the city park. Anyone can enter a ride in the parade.

Games, rides, vendor booths, and food booths will be available in the city park. The Chamber will sell water, T-shirts, and novelties. A volleyball tournament will begin at noon. Sign-up begins at 11 a.m. A horse-

shoe tournament is also planned.

The Bovina Volunteer Fire Department will grill free hot dogs and hamburgers beginning at 6 p.m. at the football field. Free watermelon will also be available.

A program honoring veterans will begin with the National Anthem at 7 p.m. Recognition of veterans will be at 7:30 p.m. Local veterans are urged to register and be present. The Bovina fire department will be selling tickets throughout the day for a drawing to give away a 42" flat screen TV, a game console, and gift cards. Tickets are \$3 each or two for \$5. The drawing will be held before the fireworks begin at dusk.

June brought variety of weather activity

Local weather guy John Gurley finally had something to report besides hot, dry, and windy. In fact, during the last half of June, there was wet weather activity almost every day.

After 2.54" of rain soaked the area on June 29, the total rainfall for the month was recorded as 5.81". The second largest rain day was June 21 when he recorded 1.18". The official rain gauge is inside the Friona city limits. Some farmers reported more than 3" of rain on June 29.

The baseball size hail,

which has caused roofer signs to sprout all over town, fell on June 18. Claims adjusters for roof and automobile damage have been a common sight here. During the big hailstorm, tornado sirens were activated, sending many local folks to basements and shelters. Cloud rotation was spotted north-west of Friona but no tornadoes touched down.

The high temperature for June was 101 on June 12. The low was 50 back on June 6-7. The June average high temperature was 91 and the average low was 59.

Residents are reminded that shooting fireworks anywhere within the city limits of Friona is illegal. The Friona police department will enforce the fireworks ban. Offenders are subject to fines. Be responsible. Don't let your kids shoot fireworks in the city. It is against the law.

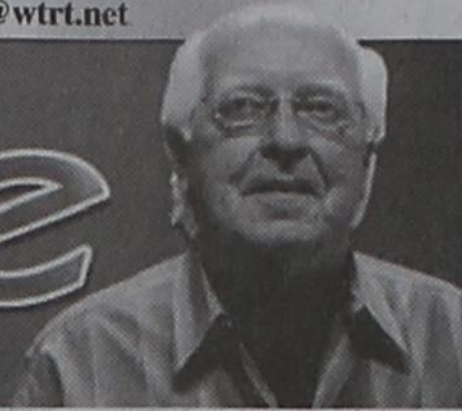

A retired Methodist preacher from Missouri doesn't want the President Bush Library on the SMU campus.

Like most situations that include politics and religion, this is complicated. That is why most folks are not paying much attention. The more complicated an issue the more likely the general public will accept it without questions. Politicians and preachers often count on that.

Rev. Tex Sample is the retired but vocal Missouri preacher opposing the library. He is said to be one of the United Methodist Church's most prominent and respected ethicists. An ethicist is an ethical person that believes in moral principles and espouses those beliefs and principles to others.

The United Methodist Church is an 11-million-member global denomination. Rev. Sample and others have been circulating a petition since 2007 protesting the SMU-Bush Library relationship. They have nearly 12,000 signatures.

Actually Rev. Sample does not object to the Bush Library and Museum being on the SMU campus. He objects to the Bush Institute being there. The Bush Institute would be under the control of the Bush Presidential

Foundation, not SMU. Rev. Sample says, "The purpose of this Institute is to promote the politically partisan and ethically questionable ideas and policies of George W. Bush." He is afraid SMU might be guilty by association.

Rev. Sample reminds that President George W. Bush signed Executive order 13233 which denies public access to presidential documents for 25-years after their death. The reverend argues, and rightfully so, that this executive order places unjustifiable limitations on scholarship and research.

Evidently the Methodist Council of Bishops approved a lease with the Bush people for the presidential library, museum, and institute. The terms were quite generous. The Bush complex will pay a single dollar for a 99-year lease for the SMU property with a 249-year option to renew.

Rev. Sample: "This constitutes a direct endowment of the Bush Institute through a 348-year give-away 'lease' of land which the South Central Jurisdiction (SCJ) owns."

I told you this was complicated. The South Central Jurisdiction will meet July 15-19 in Dallas. The SCJ is an eight state region of the United Methodist Church composed of 15 church units

known as annual conferences. The SCJ owns the land on which Southern Methodist University sits.

Rev. Sample, who is retired and now lives in Arizona, points out that the Mission Council (composed of SCJ representatives) and the College of Bishops does not have the authority to enter into the agreement with Bush. The College of Bishops closed the door to a Jurisdictional Conference vote.

He says that the Bush administration has violated many articles of the United Methodist Church's constitution. Since SMU does not control the Bush Institute, Rev. Sample says their viewpoints will be identified with SMU by virtue of being located on campus.

Here are some of the failures of the Bush regime which, according to Rev. Sample, are contrary to the Methodist constitution: a growing inequality in income and wealth, a tax system that serves the rich, increasing insecurity for middle-class families, the flattening of wages for workers while productivity increases, growing concentration of power in corporate America and in the media, and the loss of regulation of corporate activity resulting in devastating dis-

ruptions of our national life such as Enron and the subprime loan housing crisis.

He says this list names only a few of the problems between the Methodist Church doctrine and the Bush presidency. "What we have in neoconservative politics and supply-side economics is what someone has called 'feeding the horses so the birds can eat.'"

The Methodist Social Principles believe war is incompatible with the teachings of Christ, torture for any purpose violates Christian teaching, and strongly rejects domestic surveillance (spying). Five other violations of the Methodist Principles by the Bush gang include environmental abuse, the health of children, the death penalty, social services and poverty, and the freedom of information.

"Our College of Bishops made a mistake that needs to be reversed," Rev. Sample asserts in a letter sent to church leaders. The full text of his letter is posted on a new website, "What Would John Wesley Do?" (www.whatwouldjwdo.com).

The posting is in a blog format so you can put in your two-cents worth too. But you probably won't. Who cares anyway?

It's too complicated.

A Lebanese summer salad

The photo of this salad in American Profile magazine looked good enough to eat. It was submitted by Vicki Wilder of Englewood, Florida, but I'm sure there are millions of folks who know how to prepare a Lebanese salad.

I'm a big salad fan, mainly because nothing has to be cooked. I especially like salad with a little tart to it and this one seems to have a nice bite.

You will need a "chopper" since every ingredient needs to be finely chopped but then you just dump it all together in a bowl, let it simmer in the fridge overnight and have at it.

For bulgur wheat you might find it at United. It is a specialty and Sylvia Ingram told me about an International Food Store on the east corner of 34th & Georgia in Amarillo. Sylvia said this recipe sounds like Lebanese tabouli. Maybe so. I like that too.

Lebanese Summer Salad

Serves 6

- 1/2 cup bulgur wheat
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 6 medium tomatoes, seeded and finely chopped (1 1/2 pounds)
- 6 green onions finely chopped (white and green parts)
- 1 bunch parsley finely chopped
- 2 tsp finely chopped mint leaves
- 1/3 cup vegetable, canola or extra virgin olive oil
- juice of two lemons (1/4 cup)
- 1 tsp salt or to taste

1. Combine bulgur wheat and cold water in a medium bowl. Let stand 40 minutes or until liquid is absorbed.
2. Add remaining ingredients, stir to blend, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight.

Tip: It's very important to allow the mixture to chill overnight so the bulgur softens and absorbs the other flavors.

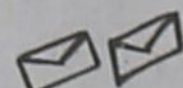

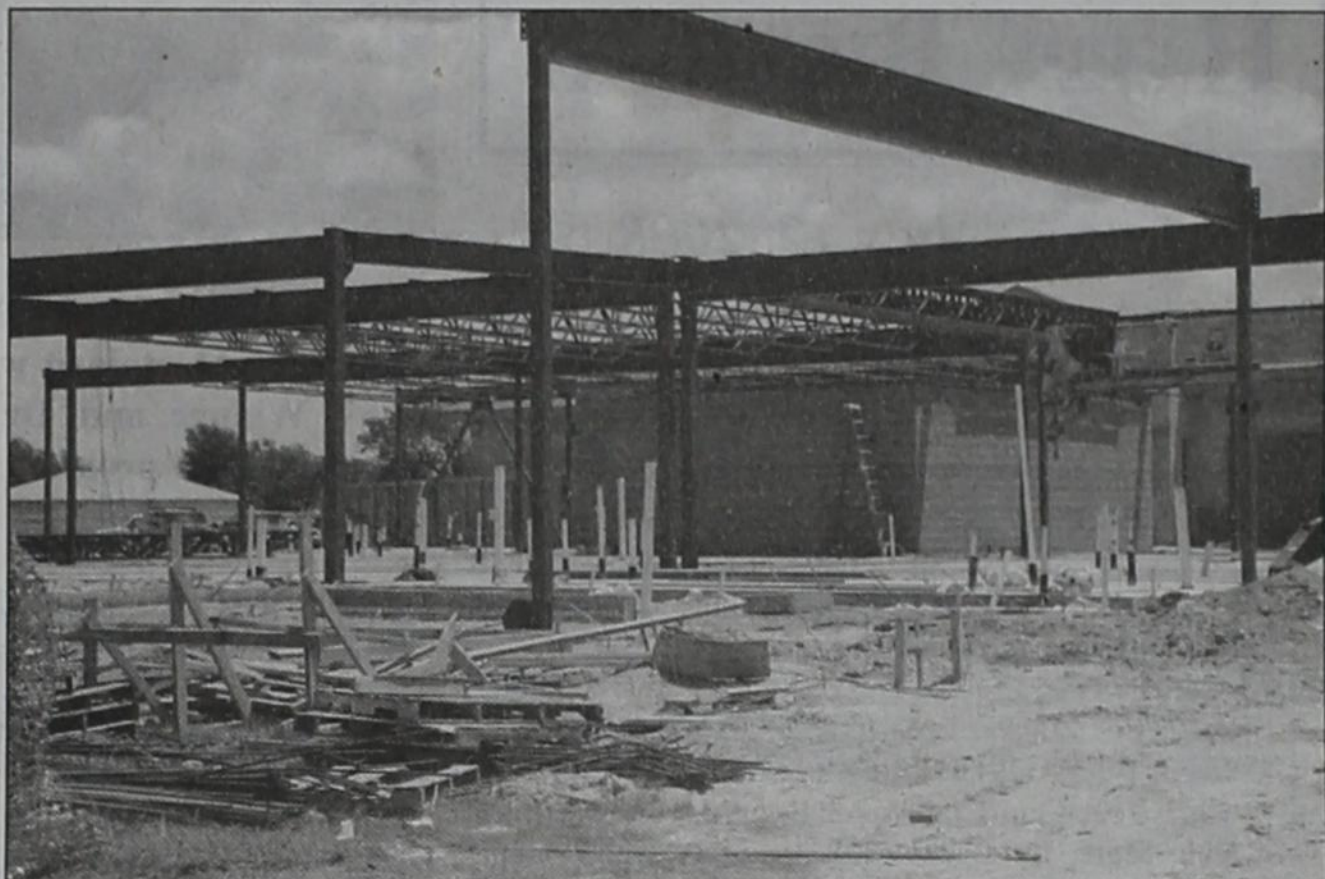

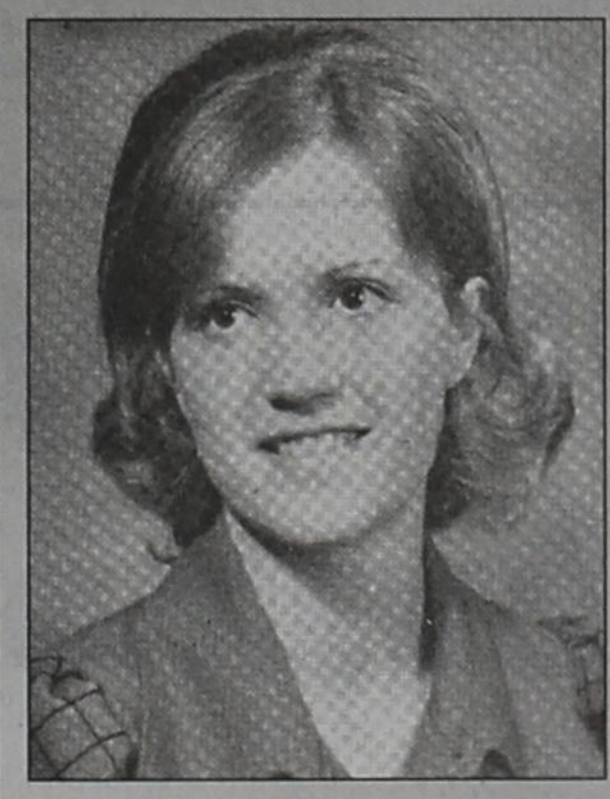
photos to publish in the Star after the reunion. If you are attending from out of town, welcome back to Friona and thanks for coming.

The Texas Highway Patrol wants drivers and passengers to have a safe July 4 holiday weekend, so they are increasing patrols to reduce traffic fatalities and crashes. Troopers will be looking for people who are driving drunk, speeding or not wearing safety belts.

"If the thought of killing or injuring others on the road while you're driving drunk is not enough to make you drive sober, just remember that our troopers will be looking to arrest you," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS. "Many drunk drivers think that they are sober enough to drive and discover that they are wrong when they're arrested and taken to jail."

Texans can avoid jail by driving sober. They should designate a sober driver before the drinking starts and make sure the driver stays sober. Instead of risking drinking too much, the sober driver should stick to all nonalcoholic drinks before getting behind the wheel.

Last year during the extended holiday weekend (July 3-8), DPS troopers made 689 driving while intoxicated arrests and issued 10,445 speeding citations. During that same weekend, they issued 2,167 tickets for safety belt violations and 577 for child safety seat and booster seat violations.

This year, beginning at midnight on Friday, July 4 and running through midnight Sunday, July 6, the Texas Highway patrol will have all available troopers patrolling highways throughout the state. Troopers are participating in Operation CARE (Combined Accident Reduction Effort), a nationwide campaign by state police agencies to reduce fatalities during holiday periods. They are also participating in Operation Holiday, a statewide effort by law

enforcement to reduce fatalities during holiday weekends. Here are some driving tips the DPS recommends for travelers:

- Slow down, especially if weather and road conditions do not allow for the designated speed.
- Secure everyone in the vehicle properly, either with a safety belt or in the appropriate car seat or booster.
- Save phone calls for home or find a safe place to pull over to make your calls.
- Make sure you have enough gas in the fuel tank to make it to your destination.
- Drive with courtesy - do not participate in road rage behavior.

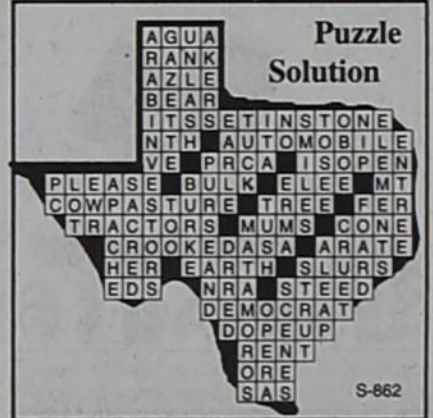
TDH immunization July schedules

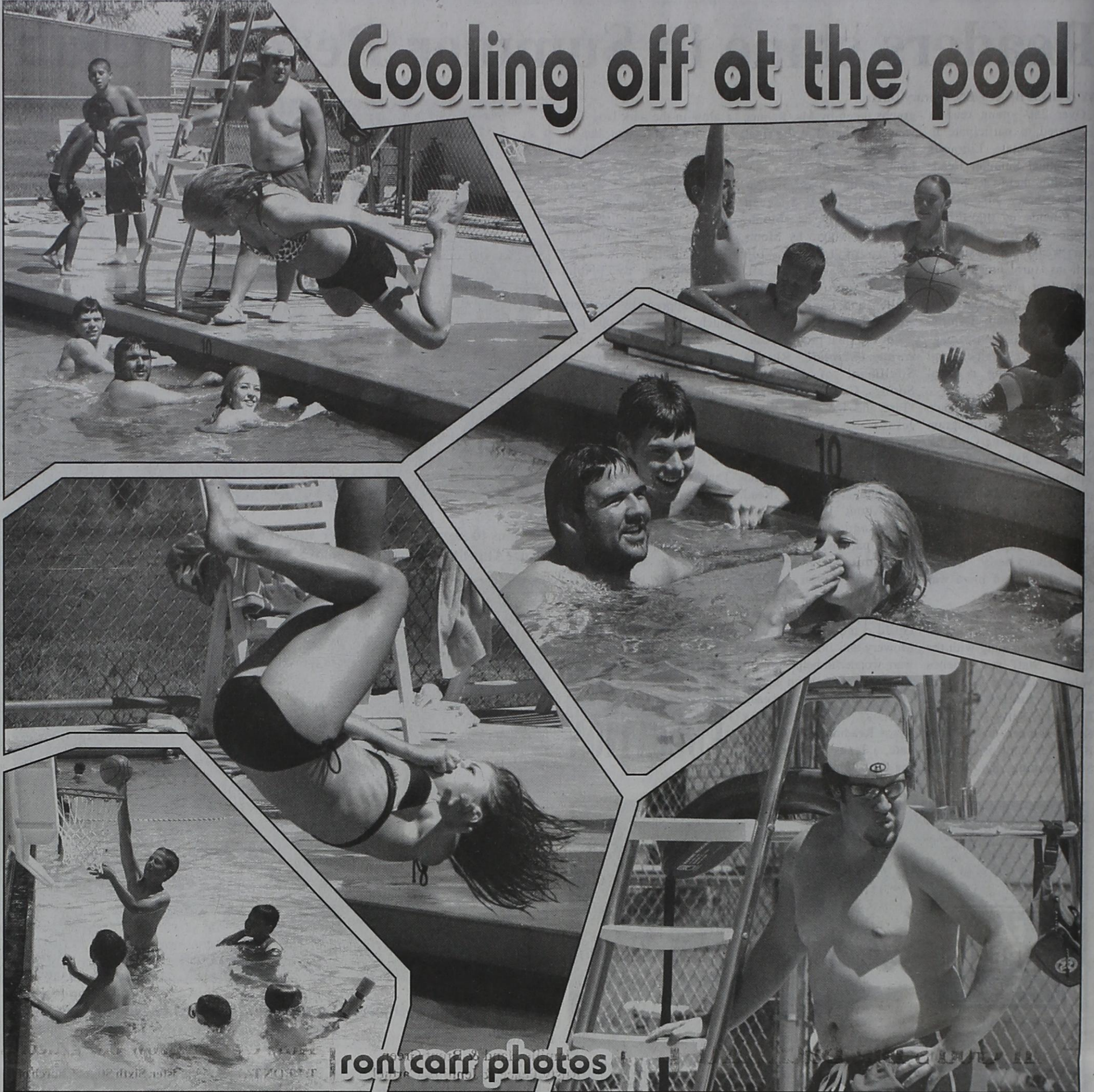



Your family can't be much smaller than mine.

School memories of Mal Manchee

Dear Ron,

I thought I would respond to your request for historical articles from the past. I taught in Friona from 1963 to 1968 when I moved to Hereford.

I graduated from Texas Tech (it was called Texas Technological College at the time) and was looking for my first teaching job when I spotted a possible teaching job on the Tech education department bulletin board. Friona High School was looking for a history teacher.

I really wanted a job near Lubbock but since history teaching jobs were not the easiest to find I decided to take a chance and drive to Friona to interview. After using a map to find Friona, I came up and the first person I met was Virginia Jennings, Superintendent Farr's secretary. She was a really positive spokesperson for a young teacher-to-be like me.

Mr. Farr visited with

me and said the job was mine if I wanted it. He had a board meeting that night and wanted to get his last hire finished. A week later we came up and met with Raymond Cook, the high school principal.

We made the move and ended up in a house right in front of where Willis Giddens, the new band director, lived. We decided to build a house since it was hard to find what we wanted.

We moved into our new home on Columbia on Halloween Day, 1963. The house cost \$10,000. That was OK as my first contract was for \$4,000 a year. My wife Pat was hired to be secretary to Mr. Gee's elementary principal and junior high principal Tom Jarboe for \$225 a month.

One other financial footnote. When I first started taking students to various events, it was the norm that we use our own car.

The first two years I did not receive any car mileage. The third year Mr. Cook and Mr. Farr decided they would give me mileage of three cents a mile. I was really impressed with the \$6 check I got for driving to Lubbock.

The first day of the 1963 school year I was walking down the hall and Carmaleet Truitt stepped out and told me to get into the library as that was where the sophomore students were to meet. I had to tell her I was a teacher. Great start.

The first year in Friona was quite an experience. After the first period I remember going into the principal's office and telling Mr. Cook I felt I might not know enough to teach the kids. He said I was doing okay and that Vernon Scott, the teacher before me, said after his first class he had been in college four years and had taught the kids everything that he knew about the subject. At least I had enough for the first week.

The highlight of that year was when Gary Shackelford and Dwight Whitaker came to me and asked if I would work with them on a debate program. I had seen one in college which made me a real expert! I recruited Nan Lillard and Jeannie Taylor and with Gary and Dwight we began a program that continues to this day.

We all went to Muleshoe to visit with Kerry Moore and his debate team and had a crash course in debate. I guess it worked as we beat his team later in the year. Over the next five years there were a number of great kids who took part. These included Ann Ayers, Jim Bob Jones, Susie Carmichael, Linda Reeve, Ann Pruitt, David Reeve, Terri Sue Cummings, Becky Coffey, Donna Patterson, Kelly Barber, Karen Armstrong, Mike Pavalus, Gary Shirley, Mac Hancock, Kathy Renner, David Smith, Becky Turner, Kara Sides, Karen Birkelbach, John Bill McFarland, Linda

Rector, and Jan Hanson.

If I have left off any names blame it on old age. Joy Morton and I later worked together in building one of the best overall forensics teams in the state.

Another honor I had was serving as senior sponsor for the classes of 1965-66-67-68. Lots of floats for Maize Days, senior rings, invitations, caps, gowns, and so on. The only break for me was that they had stopped the senior trip the year before I came to work. Coming back to class reunions has been a high light for me. I guess that all of us have aged a bit.

There were so many fine people that we dealt with in the school system that it is impossible to mention them all. Many of the students I had the honor of working with have done so well. Some such as John Taylor, Jim Bob Jones, Roger and Lynn Nelson, Danny Kendrick, Danny Black, Karen Osborn, Johnny Mars, and Jimmy Grimsley have stayed at home and made positive contributions to the community.

Others who come to mind such as Mike Wooley, Joel Osborn, Randy Farr, Larry Truitt, Julia Dennis, David Smith, Philip Johnson, Becky Elliott, Danny Murphree, Ray Murphree, Frieda Floyd, and B.K. Buske have gone into the world and made such positive contributions.

And who can forget Gus (Negris Yagan). I know that I have missed so many names but perhaps they will forgive me. Two special young people that I will remember were Freddie Williams and Mike Baronowski. These two gave their lives in the Viet Nam War and their names are engraved on the memorial in Washington, D.C.

Ron, I believe I have gone on too long. Really enjoy the Friona Star. Enjoy reading about old friends and trying to win the annual football contest.

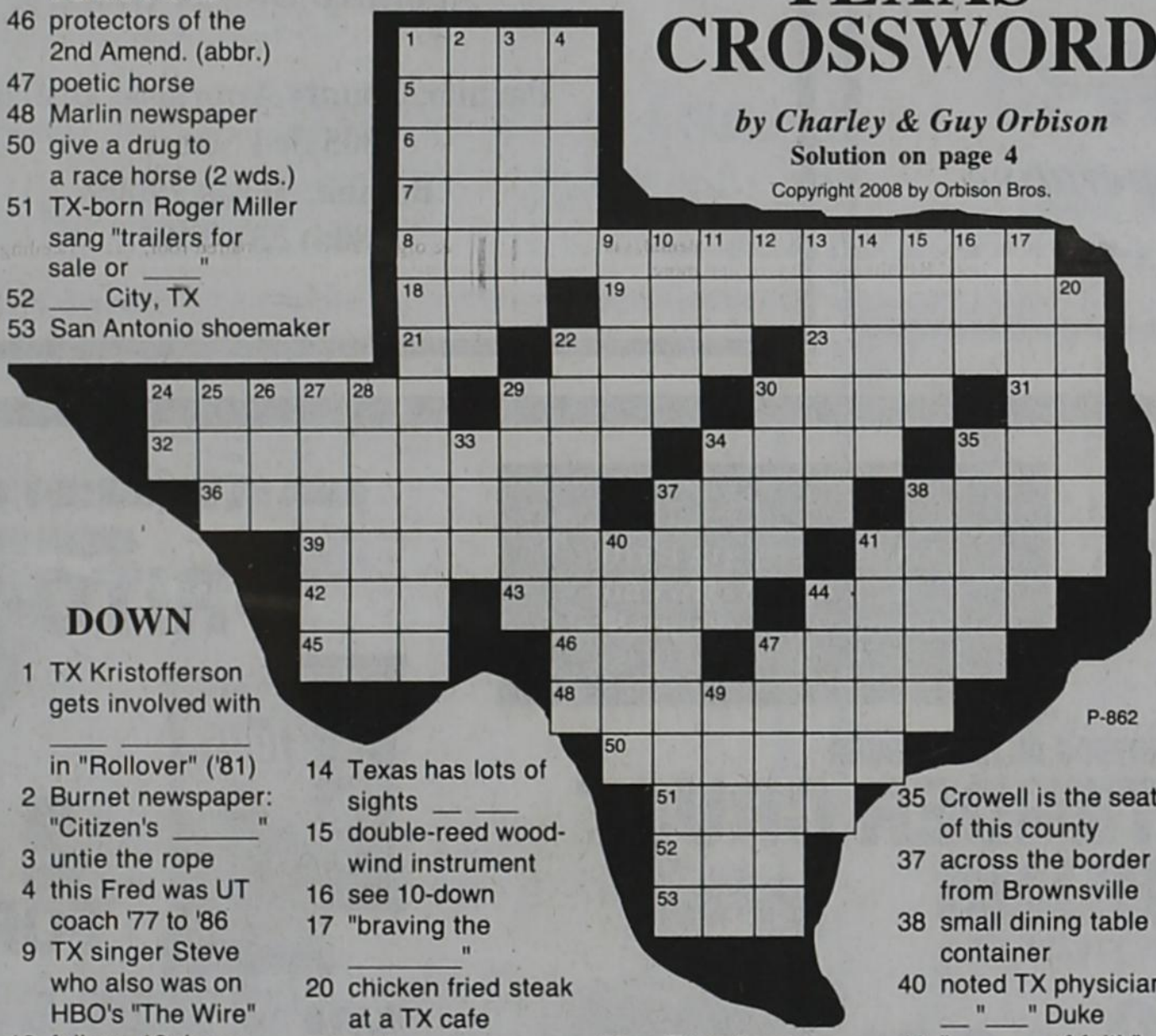

If approved by the Parmer County Appraisal District Board of Directors at the public hearing, this proposed budget will take effect automatically unless disapproved by the governing bodies of the county, school districts, cities, and towns served by the appraisal district.
