## **Texas Transportation Commission Approves Callahan County Projects**

Representative John Cook announced that three construction projects in Callahan County have been included in the 1997 Unified Transportation Program (UTP) by the Texas Department of Transportation. All of the projects are for bridge replacement or rehabilitation. "The approval of these projects will allow repairs to facilities that were classified as functionally obsolete or structurally deficient", said Cook.

The UTP is a ten year planning document that guides transportation project development. It has two elements: Priority One projects and Priority Two distinctions. Priority One projects are the highest and best ranked projects that are scheduled within the next four fiscal years. Priority Two gives authority for the preparation of plans, specifications, estimates and right-of-way acquisitions.

Two of the three projects are classified with Priority One status: 1) the Texas & Pacific railroad overpass at IH20, east of Putnam, east bound lane, has been scheduled for construction to begin in 1998 for an estimated cost of \$1,250,000. The project calls for th rehabilitation of the bridge.

Austin, Tx - State and approaches for 1.9 miles. 2) bridge and approaches replacement from County Road 129 at Sheep Creek to 3.2 miles west of County Road 131 for the estimated cost of \$147,000 with construction to begin in the year 2000. The rehabilitation of the bridge and approaches at Mexia Creek and IH 20 just west of Deep Creek is the Priority Two project for an estimated cost of \$221,250.

The Intermodel Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) of 1991 restructured the availability of funds

for transportation projects, specified the systems on which certain funds can be used, and required the states to develop a Statewide Transportation Improvement Program as a condition to securing federal funds for transportation projects. The three projects in Callahan County will be 80% federally funded and total \$1,618,250.

Unified The Transportation Program considers transportation needs form a statewide perspective. "The approved county projects were in heavy competition with projects from all over the state", said Cook, "and with the urban demands area residents are fortunate to have had these transportation projects submitted and approved. It takes public input and participation to get these projects in rural Texas." said Cook.





Callahan Countians and fellow citizens throughout the 60th District have the opportunity to help elect the man who is "for jobs, not lawsuits."




## TOOTH KNOCKED OUT BY INJURY

Tommy was riding his skateboard down the driveway. He lost his balance and fell to the pavement. He wiped the blood from his mouth and found his upper front tooth in his hand. What do you do? Luckily, your dentist can deal effectively with this kind of dental emergency. But he'll need your help.





The trend is down state-wide in both crude oil and gas production. The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for June, 1996 is 39,687,493 barrels, a decrease from the 41,542,117 barrels reported during June,

In gas production, Texas oil and gas wells produced 451,955,099 mcf of gas - based upon preliminary figures for June, 1996. This is down from the June 1995 preliminary gas production total of 458,213,102 mcf.

There's a slightly brighter picture in the amount of exploration and drilling going on in various parts of the state. The price of oil is up, and apparently more companies are willing to risk the cost

of finding it. In August, 1996 there were 195 permits issued in the Midland area, 126 in the Lubbock area, 119 in Southeast Texas, 111 around San Angelo, 109 in Deep South Texas, and 91 in East Texas.

West Central Texas was issued 86 permits, with 65 for the Refugio area, 55 for North Texas, 50 for the Panhandle, and 31 for the San Antonio area.

The top ten crude oil producing counties were listed (in order) as Gaines, Andrews, Yoakum, Hockley, Ector, Pecos, Gregg, Crane, Midland, and Upton.

Tops in gas production were Webb, Pecos, Zapata, Panola, Hidalgo, Starr, Crockett, Grimes, Hemphill and Washington.

WILL THE TAX RULES FOR HOME SALES CHANGE SOON?

Both presidental candidates are proposing big changes in the rules governing the taxation of home sales. Under current law, home sales are subject to capital gains tax, but you can defer the tax if within two years of the sale, you purchase and occupy a new home of equal or greater value. Then, once you reach 55, you may be eligible for a once-in-a-lifetime exclusion of up to \$125,000 of gain from a home sale.

The Clinton and Dole proposals would replace both the deferral provision and the

\$125,000 exclusion with new rules. The propos-

als, though similar, have significant differences.

Under the Clinton proposal, singles could exclude from tax up to \$250,000 of gain in a home sale; couples could exclude \$500,000. You'd have to live in the house two of the five years preceding the sale in order to qualify. There would be no limit on the number of times

the exclusion could be used. Under the Dole proposal, singles could exclude from tax up to \$125,000 of gain, and couples could exclude up to \$250,000. To qualify for the full exclusion, you'd have to live in the house for three of the five years preceding the sale; otherwise, the exclusion would be prorated. The exclusion would increase by \$12,500 a year, up to a maximum of \$250,000, for each year a single taxpayer lived in the house beyond ten years. For couples, the increase would be \$25,000 a year, up to a maximum of \$500,000. There would be no limit on the number of times the exclusion could be used.

Most people would benefit under both the Clinton and Dole proposals, but there would be some who might not. For example, homeowners with massive gains could end up paying tax under the new rules that they'd be able to defer under the current law. Neither proposal offers relief for people who sell their homes at a loss. Home sale losses under current law aren't deductible and the proposals, as they currently stand, do not change this rule.


