Chiefs win 24 zip, head to playoffs

The Friona Chieftains shutout Floydada's Whirlwind 24-0 Friday night at Floydada, unofficially assuring a spot in the playoffs.

Preseason prognosticators had the Chieftains finishing 5th in the 6-team District 2-2A standings. Muleshoe, Childress, Floydada, Tulia, Friona Dimmitt.

With two games left in district play, the Chieftains and Muleshoe Mules are tied for the district lead with 3-0 records. The vaunted Childress Bobcats have not lived up to their pre-season predictions and are in third place at 2-1. They visit Friona this week in a key game to determine final district stand-

ings. A win could clinch second place in the district standings for Friona. Floydada (0-3) plays at Tulia (1-2) and Muleshoe (3-0) visits Dimmitt (0-3) this week before the showdown battle between the Chiefs and Muleshoe Friday November 7 at Muleshoe.

At Floydada, Zack Fair continued his team leading statistics, scoring two touchdowns. Fair carried 14 times for 82 yards and caught two Joey Dickson passes to tack on another 34 yards of offense.

Joey Mendoza scored the other Friona TD and racked up 55 yards on 11 carries. Kicker Rodrigo Vasquez continued his successful streak with a 27-yard field goal and 3 for 3 on extra points.

Raul Licerio added 39 yards on 9 carries and teammate Noe Saenz was good for 9 carries and 51

yards. The Chieftain running attack totaled 237 yards plus 73 passing yards as Dickson was good on 4 of 11 passing attempts and tossed two interceptions. Matthew Stanberry caught two passes for 39 yards.

Last week Alex Vega returned to the lineup coming off a knee injury. Alex Dunnam is still on the sideline after knee surgery. Jonathan Licerio is out for the season as the result of a concussion in the Dimmitt game. Lineman Stephano Orozco was also sidelined last week after injuring a knee in practice and will probably not play this week.

Fair is the leading rusher for the Chiefs with 407 yards on 59 carries and 7 touchdowns. Mendoza has 352 tough up-the-middle yards on 68 carries and three TDs, and Noe Saenz

has scored 5 TDs and has 279 yards on 47 carries.

In the playoffs the Chiefs would play an opponent out of District 1-2A. Leaders in that district are Bushland (8-0, 3-0) and Panhandle (7-1, 2-1). River Road, Spearman, and Sanford-Fritch are all still in the running for the third place playoff spot. River Road is the big school in the district. If they earn the third place playoff spot, the Chiefs would likely meet either Bushland or Panhandle in the first round of playoffs.

Friday night at Chieftain Field the Chiefs host the Childress Bobcats. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m. The Friona high school choir will serve a spaghetti supper prior to the game from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. Come out and support the choir and cheer for the Chiefs.

This meeting will be on November 6, 2008 at 9 a.m.

The purpose of this meeting is to receive input from a broad range of local agencies, organizations, businesses, and individuals that have an interest in natural resource conditions and needs in Parmer County. Input received will allow the Local Work Group to make recommendations on resource concerns to be addressed, eligible practices, and ranking for county based funding. These recommendations will be used in implementing the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and other conservation programs offered by NRCS.

The 2008 Farm Bill stipulates that conservation programs must continue to be locally led. Through stake holder meetings, the public is given an opportunity to help local conservation leaders set program priorities. These meetings are open to the public.

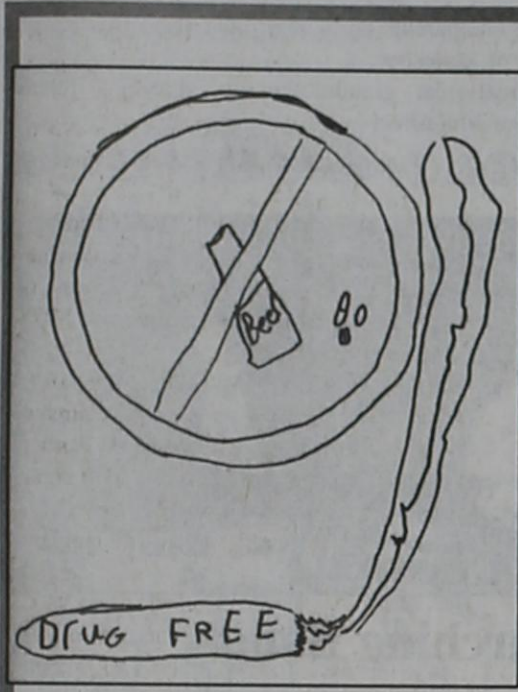
At the district cross-country meet in Lubbock last week, three Friona runners qualified to advance to the regional meet in Lubbock on November 8.

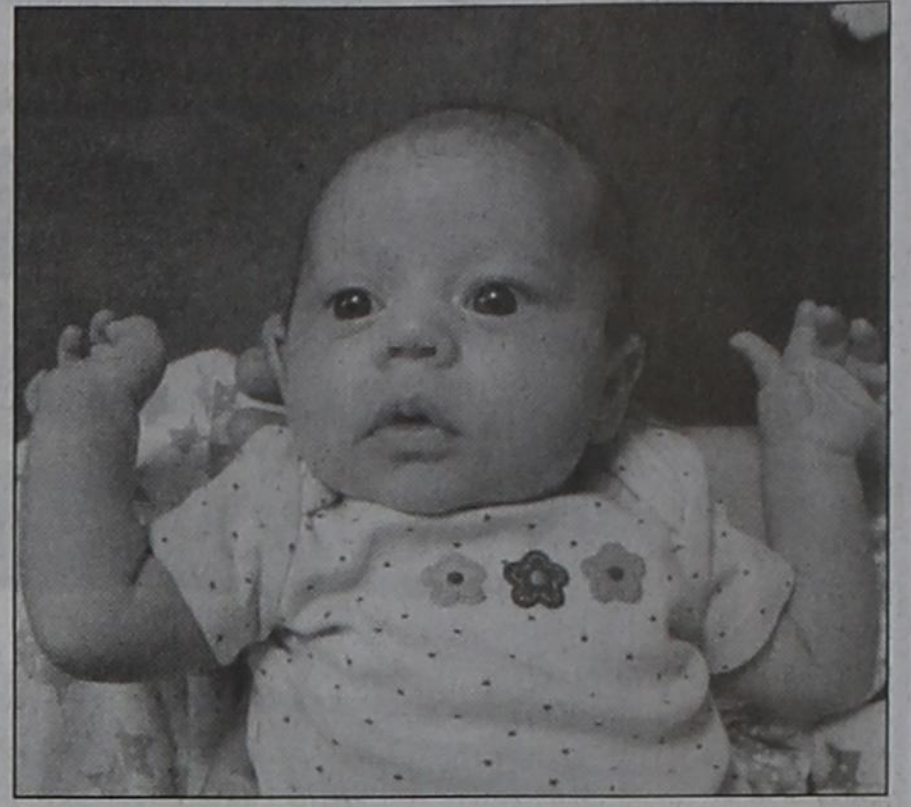
"Poor in spirit" literally means to "pour out self". We have to be emptied before we can be filled.

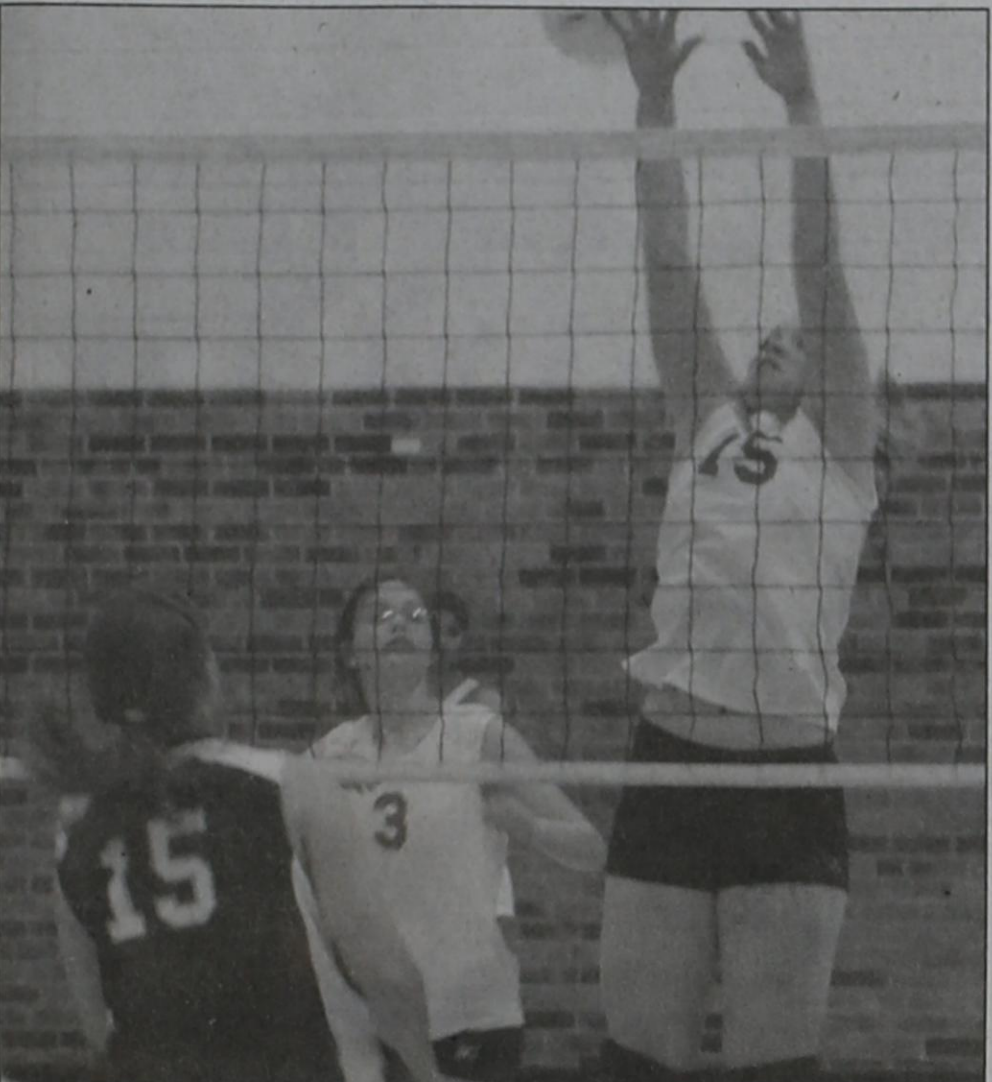

Voting – an American right and an individual responsibility

In just a few short days, the historic 2008 Presidential campaign will reach its conclusion as Americans cast their ballots to help elect the next Commander-in-Chief. This is one of the most consequential elections in a generation. Our nation is at a critical turning point on many issues that will directly impact every American citizen. Yet, voting is a right that too many in our nation take for granted.

One of the most important instruments of our democracy is the right to vote. In the early years of our republic, voting was restricted to a small, select group of people – predominantly, males who owned property – but over a period of many generations that right was extended across the barriers of race, sex, and class. Following a brutal Civil War, African-American and other non-white males were granted the right to vote in 1870, with the 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Fifty years later, after the tireless and courageous efforts of suffragists like Susan B. Anthony, Lucretia Mott, and Elizabeth Cady Stanton,

voting rights were also extended to all women. In 1964, the 24th Amendment banned poll taxes in federal elections, thereby extending the vote to all Americans, regardless of property ownership. And in 1971, all citizens 18 or older were granted suffrage.

So many Americans in our nation's history did not have the opportunity to vote, and so many others fiercely struggled to ensure that no American adult today would be denied that right.
