Cargill to boost donations

United Way gives \$25K to Prairie Acres fund

The Friona United Way board of directors met Wednesday morning to officially set the 2008-09 budget and kickoff the annual donation campaign. This year's budget goal is \$43,000.

Board president Rick White, training manager at Cargill, said the board voted a one-time donation of \$25,000 to the benefit fund set up to assist Prai-

rie Acres meet a \$149,500 bond payment in February 2009. An anonymous local donor has agreed to match any funds raised for Prairie Acres between now and the February deadline.

A brisket dinner on November 2 at the junior high cafeteria is the first fundraiser organized by a local committee to assist the city and Prairie Acres.

The 2008-09 budget shows three organizations as -0- funds requested. Rick White said they are on the budget list even though they have not requested funds this year. "The Boy Scouts, Kids Inc., and Meals on Wheels told us they did not need funds this year but want to remain on the list in the event they need to re-

quest funds next year," White said.

Two of the recipients, Parmer County Child Welfare and the Empty Stocking Fund, were projects headed by the late Jo Blackwell. White said Peggy Monroe has agreed to head up the Empty Stocking Fund which collects donations to provide toys and food to needy

children at Christmas.

Cargill in Friona has increased its 2008 United Way campaign goal by 15 percent, making it the largest employee giving campaign in the Panhandle. This year Cargill employee campaign leaders have set an aggressive goal of \$80,000 to assist families in Friona, Hereford, and Clovis. Last year Cargill raised \$68,500.

"There was concern that contributions might erode due to current economic conditions," White said, "but our employees have stepped up their United Way campaign goal this year and we look forward to reaching it." Cargill employees contribute weekly through payroll deduction.

White said Cargill will promote the United Way donation drive beginning November 3 through em-

ployee reminders such as giving apples (from the Apple Shack in Farwell) and popcorn to employees as they leave work and giving T-shirts to employees that currently contribute.

White said new United Way board members this year are Roger Nelson, Deann Hutson, and Sherri Alger. Mrs. Alger is co-owner of A-Tex Dairy and will coordinate donation programs among the local dairies.

White said Deann Hutson will solicit business contributions through a mailing. "A phone-a-thon is not planned this year. Instead, local residents are encouraged to make donations at Friona State Bank or mail contributions, payable to Friona United Way, to Marca Herring, Friona State Bank, P.O. Box 549, Friona, TX 79035.

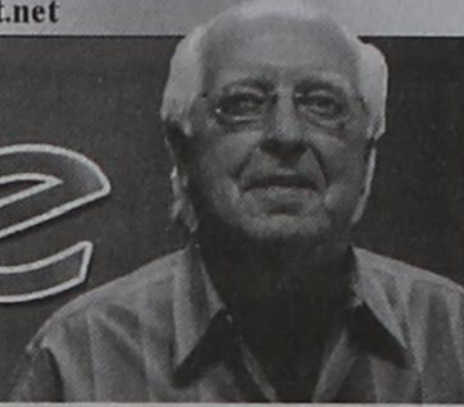

"Government is not the solution to the problem, government is the problem."
President Ronald Reagan

I voted Tuesday morning. No more politics for me until after November 4. All I want to do now is tune in late on election night to see who won. I don't care what they say or do between now and then.

There were some heated opinions about the election at Monday's senior citizen lunch. I'm pretty sure I know how the senior citizens out here will vote. Most were not too keen on Colin Powell's endorsement of Senator Obama. According to what I heard, America could become a socialist country by the end of the year. Maybe even communist.

I'm not sure the situation is that severe but the government does own preferred stock in all the big banks. They assure us it is the only way to save America. I think Hugo Chavez told the Venezuelan people the same thing.

If I had to start over I would be a professor. I think it would be cool to be paid for telling young people what I know, or think I know. English and economics professors have always impressed me.

My daughter Kirsten sent me an email article. It was written by David R. Kamerschen, Ph.D., Professor of Economics at the University of Georgia. It is a simplistic explanation of how our tax system works. I hope you

will read and understand it. Pardon the beer reference but that is the way the professor wrote it. Here goes.

Suppose that every day ten men go out for beer and the bill for all ten comes to \$100. If they paid their bill the way we pay our taxes, it would go something like this:

The first four men (the poorest) would pay nothing.

The fifth would pay \$1. The sixth would pay \$3. The seventh would pay \$7. The eighth would pay \$12. The ninth would pay \$18.

The tenth man (the richest) would pay \$59.

So that's what they decided to do. The ten men drank in the bar every day and seemed quite happy with the arrangements until one day the owner threw them a curve. "Since you are all such good customers," he said, "I'm going to reduce the cost of your daily beer by \$20.

Drinks for the ten now cost just \$80.

The group still wanted to pay their bill the way we pay our taxes so the first four men were unaffected. They would still drink for free. But what about the other six men—the paying customers? How could they divide the \$20 windfall so that every-

one would get his 'fair share'?"

They realized that \$20 divided by six is \$3.33. But if they subtracted that from everybody's share, then the fifth man and the sixth man would each end up being paid to drink his beer. So the bar owner suggested that it would be fair to reduce each man's bill by roughly the same amount, and he proceeded to work out the amounts each should pay.

And so the fifth man, like the first four, now paid nothing (100% savings). The sixth now paid \$2 instead of \$3 (33% savings). The seventh now paid \$5 instead of \$7 (28% savings). The eighth now paid \$9 instead of \$12 (25% savings). The ninth now paid \$14 instead of \$18 (22% savings).

The tenth now paid \$49 instead of \$59 (16% savings).

Each of the six was better off than before and the first four continued to drink for free. But once outside the restaurant the men began to compare their savings.

"I only got a dollar out of the \$20," declared the sixth man. He pointed to the tenth man, "but he got \$10."

"Yeah, that's right," exclaimed the fifth man. "I only saved a dollar too. It's unfair that he got ten times more than me."

"That's true!!", shouted the seventh man. "Why should he get \$10 back when I got only two? The wealthy get all the breaks."

"Wait a minute," yelled the first four men in unison. "We didn't get anything at all. The system exploits the poor."

The nine men surrounded the tenth man and beat him up.

The next night the tenth man didn't show up for drinks so the nine sat down and had beers without him. But when it came time to pay the bill, they discovered something important. They didn't have enough money between them for even half of the bill.

And that, boys and girls, journalists and college professors, is how our tax system works. The people who pay the highest taxes get the most benefit from a tax reduction.

Tax them too much, attack them for being wealthy, and they just may not show up anymore. In fact, they might start drinking overseas where the atmosphere is somewhat friendlier.

For those who understand, no explanation is needed. For those who do not understand, no explanation is possible.

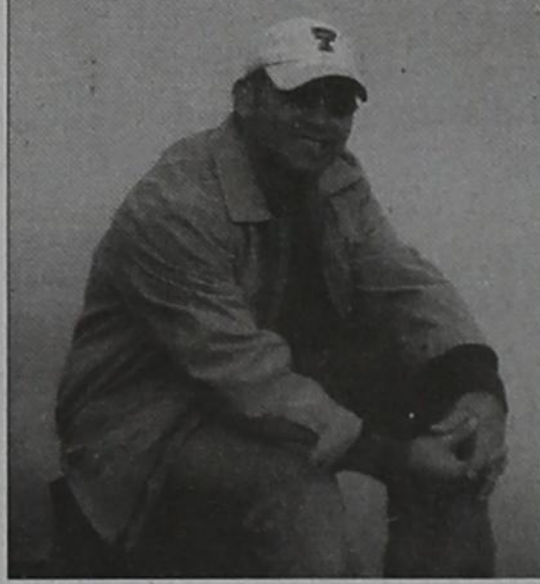

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Chiefs step up, down Dimmitt 56-19

Stay on the ground and keep moving. That may not have been the Friona Chieftain game plan Friday night but it worked out that way.

The Chiefs scored 8 rushing touchdowns and only attempted 12 passes in a 56-19 rout of the Dimmitt Bobcats Friday night at Chieftain Field. The Chiefs racked up 405 rushing yards spread among 9 players. Seven different Chieftains scored touchdowns in the game.

The win gives the Chiefs a 4-

3 season record and 2-0 in District 2-2A. They have scored 98 points in the last two games, more than they scored in the first 5 games combined.

"The boys are gaining confidence as the season goes on," Coach Mike Herbert said. "Their skills improve as they gain experience and right now, other than a few mistakes, they are playing well."

Those skills will be tested over the next three games as the Chiefs travel to Floydada this

week, then host Childress next week, and end district play over at Muleshoe November 7. A win at Floydada will almost assure Friona reaches the playoffs. As it looks now they would most likely match up with Panther or Spearman out of District 1-2A.

Senior Raul Licerio led Chieftain rushers vs. Dimmitt with 117 yards on 8 carries and one TD. Rushing leader Zack Fair had 68 yards on 8 carries.

Steven Mendoza carried only 2 times for 61 yards but one of those carries was good for a 60-yard touchdown run. Joey Mendoza carried 9 times for 38 yards, Noe Saenz 8 for 53, and Jonathan Licerio 4 for 33. Jonathan suffered a concussion in the game and is likely to miss the next two games.

Joey Dickson passed for 87 yards on 6 of 12 attempts and no touchdowns. Fair scored two TD's and R. Licerio, J. Licerio, Noe Saenz, Joey Mendoza, Justin Dominguez, and Stephen Mendoza each scored a touchdown. Rodrigo Vasquez continued his kicking accuracy with 6 of 8 extra points (one was blocked) and a field goal.

Matthew Stanberry had two pass receptions for 54 yards to lead receivers. Noe Saenz, Kirby Frye, R. Licerio, and Fair each had one reception.

Credited with assisted tackles, Jordan Kelley (9), Ricardo Monreal (8), and Stanberry (7) led the Chiefs defensive effort.

Season rushing totals have Fair as the leading rusher with 325 yards on 45 carries. Next is Joey Mendoza with 297 yards on 57 carries, R. Licerio 33 for 235, and N. Saenz 38 for 228. Fair is also the leading receiver with 15 catches for 184 yards and Stanberry has 6 catches for 104 yards.

In this week's Friday night district action, Friona is at Floydada, Childress at Muleshoe, and Tulia is at Dimmitt.

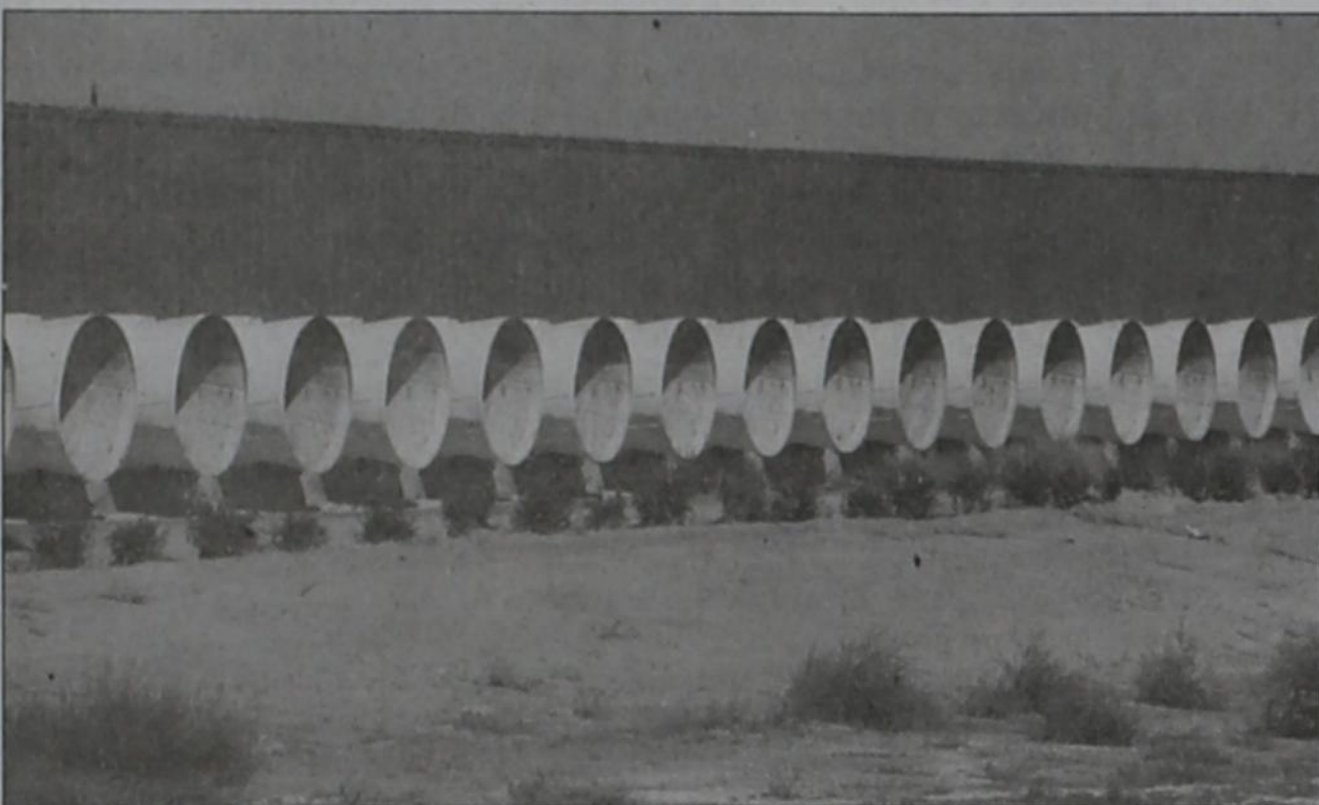

Harry and Margret DeWit have an enclosed dairy barn that covers 10 acres and houses 4,000 dairy cattle.

The state-of-the-art facility was the highlight of a tour Tuesday for board members of the Texas Dairymen Association. The TAD board met for their business meeting at the Caviness Packers plant in Hereford, then convened to the High Plains Dairy on Highway 86 east of Hub.

Dairymen and women from as far away as Jacksonville in East Texas were present. Also present were a representative from state representative Swinford's office and a representative from the Hilmar Cheese plant in Dalhart. Former Friona resident and 1984 graduate Shayne Woodard attended also. He is a state lobbyist for the TAD in Austin.

The cross ventilation barn at High Plains was the focal point of the tour. It was said to be only one of two cross ventilation dairy barns for milking cows in Texas. The 10-acre barn was described by Harry DeWit as a giant swamp cooler. One side of the barn is cooler pads with a trickle down water system. The other side has 166 ventilation fans that pull air through the barn.

Temperature in the barn ranges from 35 to 76 degrees and provides more consistency for both the cows and

people. "With the inclement and variable weather of rain, snow, wind, heat, and cold in this area cross ventilation minimizes the effects of these changes," DeWit said.

Air exchanges in the barn every 80 seconds in the summer at a wind speed of 2-6 mph. There are 3.1 square feet of cool pad per cow. Lighting is measured as 25 foot candles which provides 16 hours of daylight to imitate springtime. Sand bedding is provided for the cows and recycled water is used to flush the barns and irrigate the dairy's farm crops.

The DeWits farm' 4,900 acres of land to supply silage for the entire herd, including alfalfa, corn, sor-

ghum, and wheat. They have 9,000 total head, with 4,400 milking cows that produce 118,844,000 pounds of milk per year. The dairy has 53 employees with an annual payroll of \$1,600,000.

The 72 cow rotary parlor can milk 430 cows per hour. Bull calves are sold, DeWit said, and the buyer picks up bull calves every day. Heifer calves are maintained at the dairy and it takes about 23 months for them to grow, get pregnant, have a calf, and become a milking cow. Cows can produce milk for about three years, DeWit said and each cow produces about 74 pounds (8.6 gallons) of milk per day.

High Plains Dairy ships milk daily to Arkansas and New Mexico buyers. The DeWits have operated High Plains Dairy for the past six years. They moved their dairy here from the Stephenville area where they had operated a dairy for 10 years.

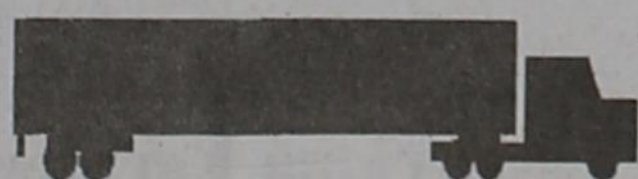

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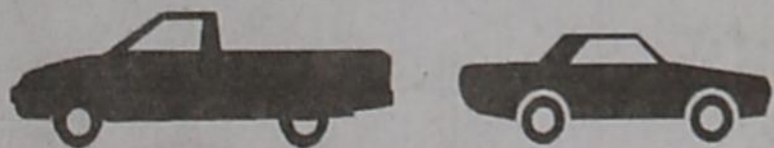
