# Pickup puts hole in high school wall

Around noon on Sunday, June 15, a 2006 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Jesus Gonzalez, 20, of Friona, slammed into the west wall of the high school building.

The accident happened at 8th and Etta as the pickup was eastbound on 8th, crossed Etta, jumped a curb, narrowly missed a gas meter and a tree, then hit the building wall. Bricks, mortar, and dust were piled across the interior hall of the school.

When police arrived Gonzalez had left the accident scene. He was located in the trailer park on West 5th. A passerby had picked him up after the accident. Gonzalez told police he fell asleep. After being treated for minor cuts and bruises, Gonzalez was booked into the Parmer County Detention Center in Farwell charged with DWI, leaving the scene of an accident, and driving with a suspended license.

Friona police officers Rachel Cummings and Lt. Andy Stormes investigated the accident. The Friona fire department was also dispatched to the accident scene.



#### Seafood cheesecake? Not really business for 20 years or so that shows minimal numbers

American Profile Magazine has a reader recipes section. Each week they include a couple of recipes submitted by mostly women who whip up batches of food for family gatherings. This one caught my eye because of its title: Seafood Cheesecake Appetizer. It was submitted by Pamela Shank of Parkersburg, West Virginia, who said, "We have a very large family and have many get-togethers. I like to try new things and make dishes that look elegant for special occasions."

Seafood cheesecake sounds stinky. It doesn't sound elegant either but maybe in West Virginia it is. The closest item in the recipe to cheesecake is cream cheese I think. You be the judge. Good luck at that next very large family gathering. (What does 1 cup sour cream, divided mean? Divided into what?)

#### Seafood Cheesecake Appetizer

Serves 24 1 sleeve butter crackers, like Ritz, crushed

½ cup butter, melted

2 8oz pkgs cream cheese, softened 1 cup sour cream, divided

1 tsp lemon juice ½ tsp salt

1/8 tsp black pepper

8 ozs fresh crabmeat

4 green onions, chopped

( white and green parts separately)

1. Preheat oven to 350. Lightly coat a 9-inch springform pan with nonstick cooking spray. 2. Combine cracker crumbs and butter in a medium bowl;

3. Beat cream cheese and ¾ cup sour cream with a mixer until smooth. Add eggs, lemon juice, salt & pepper; beat The junior high cast will rehearse from 1:30-4:30 p.m. until smooth. Stir in crabmeat and white part of green onions. Spoon into crust.

4. Bake on a foil-lined baking sheet 50-60 minutes until top is lightly browned and center is set. Cover with foil The cost is \$25 per person or \$50 for three or more during last 20 minutes to prevent over browning. Cool 20 minutes. Loosen sides of pan, but do not remove until completely cooled.

5. Transfer to a serving plate, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate until serving time. Remove plastic wrap, spread remaining 1/4 cup sour cream on top and garnish with green part of onions. Serve with assorted crackers or breads.






I was promoted to vice-president in 1984 and continued to work in the CD department until my retirement in December, 1994, after 25 years of employment.







She was born August 31, 1916 in Giddings, Texas to Edwin and Clara (Rothmann) Durrenberger.


