





### Juvenile Delinquency

Statistics show that juvenile delinguency is more prevalent in the larger cities than in smaller ones, such as ours. Most of us do not give this subject too much thought, but perhaps we should think more seriously about it.

In the city of Houston, the police department gives a set of twelve rules to parents of each juvenile who runs afoul of the law. These rules, if followed, are guaranteed to make a delinquent of a boy or girl.

ready read them, but those who haven't will probably benefit from reading them and giving some thought to each of them.

1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up believing the world owes him a living.

2. When he picks up "bad" words or "dirty" words, laugh at him. That will make him think he is "cute." He will run off and pick up some others that will blow the top off your head.

3. Never give him any spiritual training until he is 21 and then let him decide for himself. By the same logic, never teach him the English language. Maybe when he is old enough he may want to speak Bantu.

4. Praise him in his presence to all the neighbors; show how much smarter he is than the neighbors' children.

5. Avoid the use of the word sire. "wrong." It may develop in the child a "guilt complex." This will prepare him to believe that when he is punished later on for stealing cars or assaulting women, society is "against him" and that he is being "persecuted."

6. Pick up everything after him: always defend yourself and say: "I never could do anything with him."

Other sections are Lower Rio Grande Valley, Upper Rio Grande and Trans Pecos, Gulf Coast Prairie, Blackland and Grand Praires, High Plains, Rio Grande Plain, and East Texas Timbers.

Included in each of these leaflets is a chart that gives the recommendations for each individual crop for that parti-cular section. The crops discussed include forage, grain, fiber, and oil crops as well as fruit trees and truck crops.


