### Houston County in Line

Along with other progressive counties of Texas and of other states, Houston county has fallen in line to secure 15c per pound for cotton. The plan is that of the Southern States Corporation, with which most of our readers are familiar. A representative of that concern spent several days in the county perfecting the organization, and finished up last week. The committee for Houston county is as follows: R. H. Wooters, Crockett, Secretary; U. M. Brock, Grapeland; Wm. Driskell, Lovelady; Will Brown, Kennard; M. Brailsford and C. E. Updegraff, Latexo, Vice Chairmen.

Farmers can certificate their cotton and get a guarantee of 15c per pound, basis middling. Eleven cents is paid in cash and the remaining four cents in 90 day script bearing six per cent interest.

### The First Bale

To Frank Taylor, who owns a large farm on the Trinity river, belongs the honor of bringing the first bale of "new" cotton to Grapeland.

The bale was brought in last Thursday morning, August 8, ginned by Spence Bros., weighed 496 pounds and was sold to Mistrot Bros. for 13c. A premium of \$10.00 was made up for Mr. Taylor among the other cotton buyers.

## THE MESSENGER'S MARKET REVIEW

Houston, Texas, August 12.—The interest of the cotton trade, both producing and speculative, was centered this week on the government report on the condition of the growing crop, which is given as 76.5 per cent of the normal on July 25, as compared with 80.4 per cent on June 24 this year and 89.1 on July 25 last year.

The area planted to cotton this year as previously reported by the Department of Agriculture in its preliminary estimate, is about 34,097,000 acres, or about 93 per cent of the acreage planted last year.

Altogether the government report is considered bullish and higher prices are inevitable.

For the general good of the growing crop in Texas a general rain is needed. In the main the weather throughout the State has been favorable, but more moisture is needed. Improvement in the condition of the crop is noted in the reports of correspondents.

The influx of California fruit combined with the great volume of Texas fruit is producing low prices in the Houston produce market. Peaches are in greatest supply and the bottom has dropped out of that market, even on choice stock. Southwest Texas onions are in liberal supply. The potato market is steady—Texas potatoes 90 cents to the trade and California potatoes \$1. The presence of so much green stuff on the market keeps potatoes at a slow sale.

## THE ONE-TERM SENTIMENT

There is no doubt whatever that the election which has just been held, or rather the campaign that preceded it, has developed a widespread sentiment in favor of one term for all officers, except perhaps, legislators and congressmen.

The fact that efficiency of service in parliamentary bodies depends so largely on experience makes such exception reasonable and indeed necessary.

The same reason does not apply to governors and ministerial officers, such as clerks, assessors, collectors, treasurers, or even sheriffs, who are in a literal, if not constitutional, sense executive officers.

Two years is not long enough for any man to formulate and carry into effect any well designed and worked out policy of administration; hence the unwritten law has given him two terms. Then why not make a statutory, or rather constitutional, declaration which will provide for one term of four years? Such is the law in Missouri, Mississippi and Alabama, and it should be the law in Texas.

No officer gets well seated in any office before he begins to lay plans and pull strings for re-election. The county officers of Harris county went into office just before January, 1911, and before the end of that year they were beginning to electioneer to succeed themselves.

The same is true of every governor, and the result is harmful alike to the state and to the candidate. If a governor could not succeed himself he would not be tempted to give any consideration to action upon any question except what would best subserve the public good, and would need no machine or clique to boost him for another term. Any capable county officer in Harris county can in four years save enough out of his office to make it worth his while to try to get it and he need give no thought to how to get back into it.

Texas has been torn and rent for six months as she has rarely a good time before, and thousands and tens of thousands of dollars have been spent, which might have been saved if the length of office tenure had been limited to one term.

What is said here applies with just as much force to the presidential office. No president should be eligible to succeed himself. Four years is enough for any man to hold the great office of president, and the occupant of that office would be far more independent of the machine, and immune against temptation,

if he knew he could hold only one term.

An amendment providing for one term of four years should be submitted to the people and be by them adopted. The question of its application to the judiciary will likely afford ground for differences of opinion, and much can be said on both sides.

If the present salaries are to be continued without increase, it will be very difficult to get competent men for only a four-year or even a six-year term; but if the salary is raised to \$5000, as it should be, and the term fixed at six years, the situation will be helped. Much can be said in favor of keeping a man of proved capacity and fitness on the bench indefinitely. The judicial faculty is a distinct faculty, a kind of intellectual specialty, and all men know many very fine lawyers do not make the best judges, and when a man proves he possesses integrity, executive and legal ability—a rare trio of qualifications—it is best not to change him.

At the same time, men can go on the bench who can be influenced by the thought of re-election, and who electioneer from the time they go on until election day, and a judicial demagogue is the worst of the demagogue kind.

However, within certain limitations the one-term idea is going to become a part of the constitution as it should be.—Houston Chronicle.

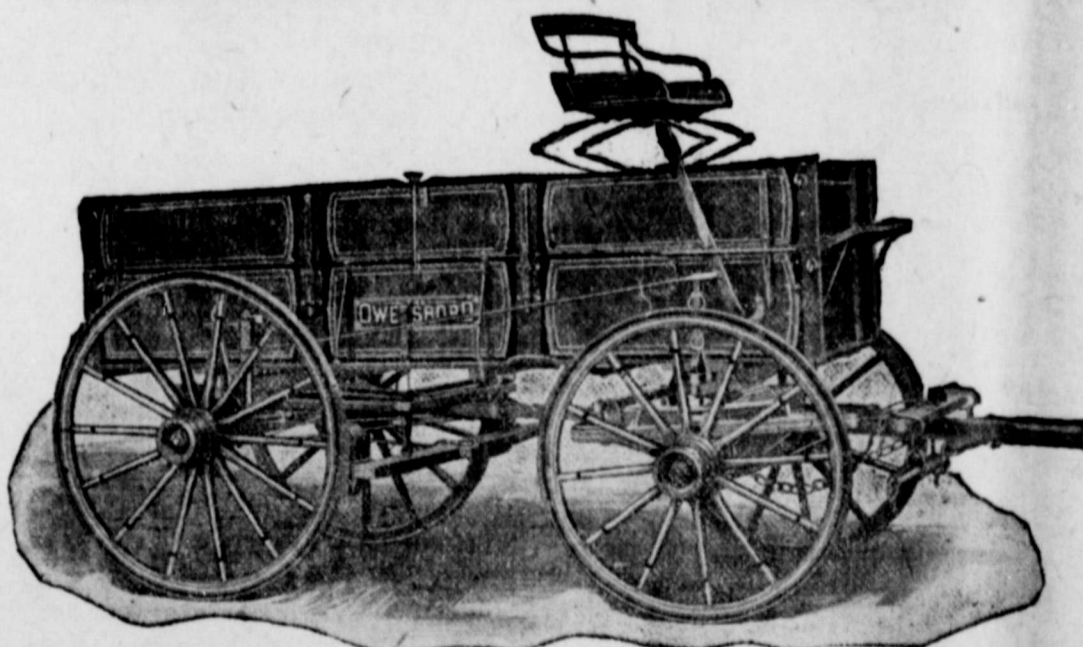

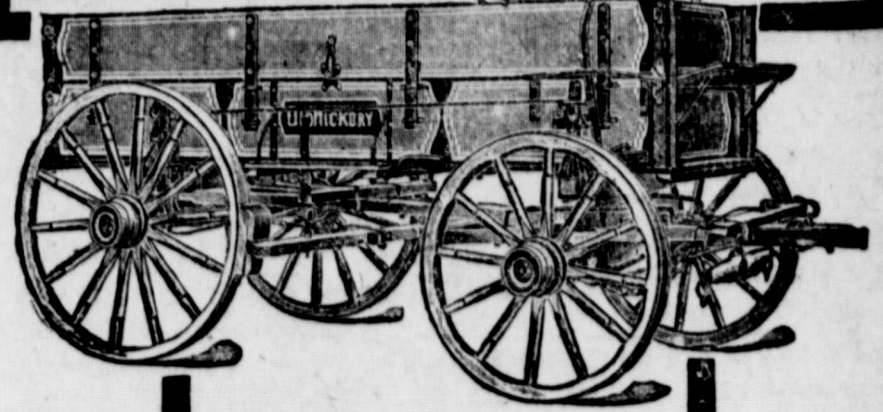

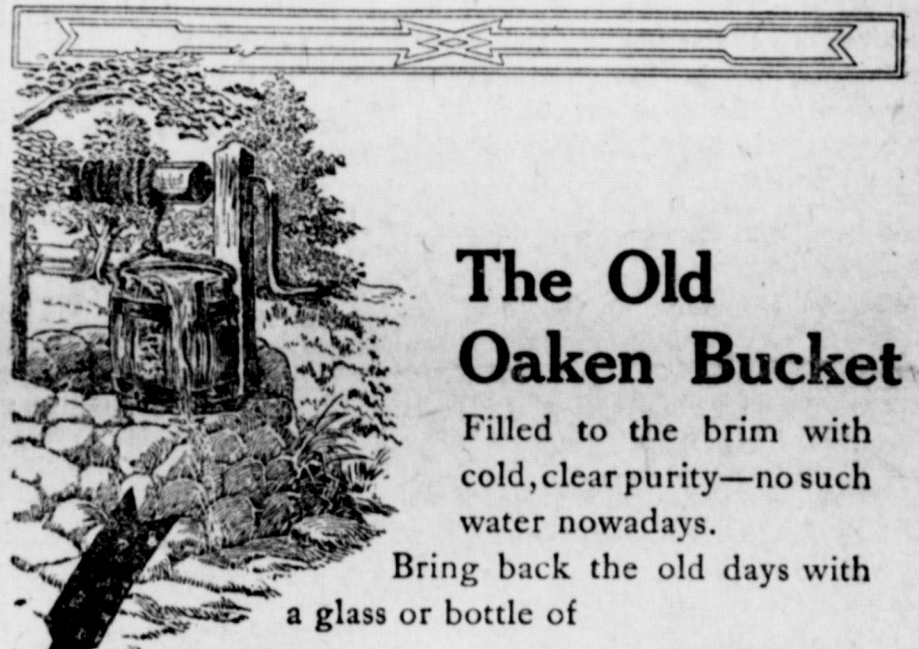
