
anticipating an exciting day of football. Presbyterians in Baird are planning to commemorate the day with a different kind of Bowl "Souper" celebration.

Collection soup cans was inspired by a recent story of such an activity in South Carolina. As written about in the Abilene Reporter News earlier this month, the idea of collecting soup on Super Bowl Sunday was initiated in 1990 at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, S.C. The youth of the church grabbed hold of the prayer and turned it into "Souper" Bowl of Caring the following year. The enterprise has grown steadily and last year 8,600 congregations representing 40 denominations across the United States collected \$1.7 million.

Texas. The program gives young men and women the opportunity to delay entering active duty for up to one year.


The enlistment gives the new soldier the option to learn a new skill, travel and become eligible to receive as much as



'A Bug's Life' Held **Over At Majestic**

Due to popular demand, the Disney/ Pixar film "A Bug's Life" is being held over for another week at the Majestic Theatre in Eastland. So local people have another chance to view this film the critics are talking about.

The film can be seen Friday, Jan. 29 at 7:30 p.m., and will run the same time nightly through Monday, Feb.

Admission is still \$3.50 at the box office, with balcony seats available at \$5 to persons 21 years and older. The movie is rated G.

Using the classic Aesop's fable about the carefree grasshopper who comes begging for food from a colony of industrious ants, the creative team has given the tale a new spin.

Life is no picnic for the ants on Ant Island. Each summer, those greedy grasshoppers descend upon the colony to demand a hefty portion of the food the ants have worked so hard to obtain.

Leader of the grasshoppers is a menacing fellow named Hopper, but finally a hero arises from along the ants. This hero, Flik, takes it upon himself to get outside help a troupe of unemployed performers from a second-rate flea circus.

Working together in their new-found friendship, the ants and bugs prepare for a climatic confrontation

foundation with the audience," observes Lasseter. "We like to show the audience something they're familiar with, but then have them look at it in a way they've never seen before.

"Computer animation has the ability to do realistic looking images very well; better than paintings or any other medium," he adds. " With our films, we are never trying to reproduce reality. We like to design our films so that the audience

knows this world does not exist, and then make it look so believable that they go!" Lasseter says that they did a lot of re-

search into insect characters before doing this film. "We tried to tap into what people know

about bugs and find those elements that are so essential that they'll connect with them almost immediately," he said.

"Our goal is to keep the audience on the edge of their seats. They may know how the film is going to end, but we want them to be constantly guessing what is going to happen next. We like the elements of surprise

humor and excitement. "We're driven by doing things that no one else has ever seen before and doing things no one else has ever done. There's a real pioneering spirit here at Pixar." Lasseter states.

Some of the voice talents in "A Bug's Life" are Dave Foley as Flik, the charismatic, comical and eternally optomistic voice behind a brave little ant. Then there is Kevin Spacey as Hopper, the tough

grasshopper leader. Julia Louis-Dreyfuss brings her comic timing to her role as the voice of Princess Atta. the future Queen of Ant Island. Hayden Panettiere (Princess Dot) shines brightly as the playful young ant who is Flik's biggest - and only booster in the colony.


Phyllis Diller as the Queen lends her unmistakable voice to the role, and Richard Kind (Molt) adds bounce and humor to the role of Hopper's brother.

Some of the scenes have hundreds of ants and other insects. An excellent example of crowd animation takes place in the underground bunker on Ant Island when the grasshoppers dramatically burst in. The assembled ants are scared and they move away from Hopper as he walks through the scene.

A program called "auto walk" was created to keep the ants out of Hopper's way. Animating the crowd in that scene took roughly two weeks to complete.

The film opened nationwide November 25, 1998.







Teel Bivins, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, then introduced now Lt. Governor Perry who gave an inspiring Inaugural Address. He said his personal heroes were his father Ray Perry and President Bush and was thankful both were present. He also paid tribute to Speaker Pete Laney and Bob Bullock, two outstanding Texas Democrats and pledged to put partisanship aside and work for what is best for Texas.

Next on the program was Justice Phillips administering the oath of office to Governor Bush followed by Speaker Laney presenting Governor Bush who addressed the joint ses-

sion of the Legislature and the public with a very sincere and inspiring speech. One point he made was that we need strong moral values as much as we need a strong economy to be a great state. Governor Bush said that government cannot solve all our problems. He also talked at length about education including being educated in the moral values and that we must

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
