### Presbyterians To Recognize "Souper" Bowl Sunday

Sunday, January 31, is Super Bowl Sunday. Sports fans are anticipating an exciting day of football. Presbyterians in Baird are planning to commemorate the day with a different kind of "Souper" Bowl celebration.

Members of the First Presbyterian Church of Baird plan to recognize Jan. 31 by collecting cans of soup to be donated to the Community Clothes Closet Food Pantry. Anyone forgetting to bring a can of soup is encouraged to make a \$1 donation.

Collection soup cans was inspired by a recent story of such an activity in South Carolina. As written about in the Abilene Reporter News earlier this month, the idea of collecting soup on Super Bowl Sunday was initiated in 1990 at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, S.C. The Rev. Brad Smith

offered up a single sentence in a prayer that proved to be the catalyst for the fund-raising drive: "Lord, as we watch the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without even a bowl of soup."

The youth of the church grabbed hold of the prayer and turned it into "Souper" Bowl of Caring the following year. The enterprise has grown steadily and last year 8,600 congregations representing 40 denominations across the United States collected \$1.7 million.

Baird joins the drive this year as a way of supporting the Community Clothes Closet Food Pantry. Church members extend an invitation to the community to join in. Greetings from Austin!

The 76th Legislative Session is in progress, and I am looking forward to a successful term. Throughout the session, I will be writing a series of columns highlighting various issues and legislation affecting District 60. The following items of legislation are only a few of the Bills I have submitted for consideration:

H.B. 424 - Capitol Murder Fund (with Rep. Turner)

This legislation will require convicted criminals to pay a court fee to the state which will be dedicated to assisting rural counties with the cost of capital murder trials. Each criminal convicted of a felony will pay \$5, and each person convicted of a misdemeanor will pay \$1 in court costs. This legislation will raise an estimated \$3.3 million a year for the rural county capital murder fund. Since most rural counties do not have the appropriate funds to pay for the extraordinary costs of prosecuting capital murder cases, this will help ensure that rural counties no longer have to let murderers plead down to a lesser offense to avoid capital murder prosecution costs.

H.B. 117 - Forfeiture of Good Conduct Time Legislation (with Rep. Keel)

Current statutes already provide for the forfeiture of good conduct time by inmates in state correctional facilities if a lawsuit they file is dismissed by the court as frivolous or malicious. This legislation would authorize the same sanction for inmates in county correctional facilities.

H.B. 341 - Truth-in-Hiring (with Reps. McCall, Junell, and Luna)

This legislation would limit liability of employers who give honest job references for past or present employees.

## 'A Bug's Life' Held Over At Majestic

Due to popular demand, the Disney/Pixar film "A Bug's Life" is being held over for another week at the Majestic Theatre in Eastland. So local people have another chance to view this film the critics are talking about.

The film can be seen Friday, Jan. 29 at 7:30 p.m., and will run the same time nightly through Monday, Feb. 1.

Admission is still \$3.50 at the box office, with balcony seats available at \$5 to persons 21 years and older. The movie is rated G.

Using the classic Aesop's fable about the carefree grasshopper who comes begging for food from a colony of industrious ants, the creative team has given the tale a new spin.

Life is no picnic for the ants on Ant Island. Each summer, those greedy grasshoppers descend upon the colony to demand a hefty portion of the food the ants have worked so hard to obtain.

Leader of the grasshoppers is a menacing fellow named Hopper, but finally a hero arises from among the ants. This hero, Flik, takes it upon himself to get outside help - a troupe of unemployed performers from a second-rate flea circus.

Working together in their new-found friendship, the ants and bugs prepare for a climatic confrontation with the grasshoppers. Then Flik's plan starts to unravel - and things get mighty exciting.

The film has what is called "The Lasseter Touch" - meaning the work of Director John Lasseter.

For over fifteen years John Lasseter has been at the front of computer animation, and has brought his own sensibilities as a filmmaker to this evolving artistic medium.

"You have to build a

foundation with the audience," observes Lasseter. "We like to show the audience something they're familiar with, but then have them look at it in a way they've never seen before."

"Computer animation has the ability to do realistic looking images very well; better than paintings or any other medium," he adds. "With our films, we are never trying to reproduce reality. We like to design our films so that the audience knows this world does not exist, and then make it look so believable that they go!"

Lasseter says that they did a lot of research into insect characters before doing this film. "We tried to tap into what people know

about bugs and find those elements that are so essential that they'll connect with them almost immediately," he said.

"Our goal is to keep the audience on the edge of their seats. They may know how the film is going to end, but we want them to be constantly guessing what is going to happen next. We like the elements of surprise humor and excitement."

"We're driven by doing things that no one else has ever seen before and doing things no one else has ever done. There's a real pioneering spirit here at Pixar," Lasseter states.

Some of the voice talents in "A Bug's Life" are Dave Foley as Flik, the charismatic, comical and eternally optimistic voice behind a brave little ant. Then there is Kevin Spacey as Hopper, the tough grasshopper leader.

Julia Louis-Dreyfus brings her comic

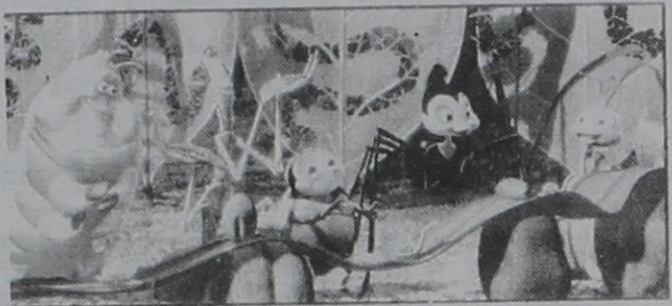
timing to her role as the voice of Princess Atta, the future Queen of Ant Island. Hayden Panettiere (Princess Dot) shines brightly as the playful young ant who is Flik's biggest - and only booster in the colony.

Phyllis Diller as the Queen lends her unmistakable voice to the role, and Richard Kind (Molt) adds bounce and humor to the role of Hopper's brother.

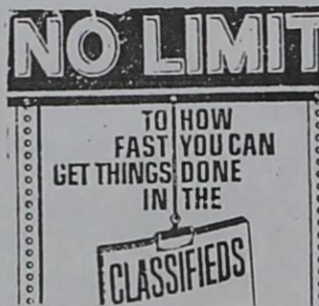
Some of the scenes have hundreds of ants and other insects. An excellent example of crowd animation takes place in the underground bunker on Ant Island when the grasshoppers dramatically burst in. The assembled ants are scared and they move away from Hopper as he walks through the scene.

A program called "auto walk" was created to keep the ants out of Hopper's way. Animating the crowd in that scene took roughly two weeks to complete.

The film opened nationwide November 25, 1998.

## TDH '99 Rabies Air War Moving To Fredericksburg

After dropping some 900,000 vaccine baits over portions of 17 West Texas counties in flights from Fort Stockton, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) is moving its airborne assault on gray fox rabies to Fredericksburg, the final stop in TDH's 1999 vaccine airdrop program. The Fort Stockton operations began Jan. 18. Officials hope to finish in Fort Stockton today (Jan. 22) or Saturday, move to Fredericksburg over the weekend and resume bait drop flights on Monday. Some 800,000 baits will be dropped over portions of 16 counties.

The West and Central Texas gray fox vaccine airdrops from Fort Stockton and Fredericksburg follow a South Texas airdrop of more than one million baits to combat a canine strain of rabies carried by coyotes. The South Texas airdrop, based in Kingsville, began Jan. 6 and was completed Jan. 15. The 1999 airdrop is part of a multi-year TDH plan to eliminate rabies carried by foxes in West and Central Texas and by coyotes in South Texas. Since the first annual airdrop in 1995, there has been a 97 per-

cent decline in animal cases of canine rabies in South Texas. Since the first annual airdrop in West and Central Texas in 1996, there has been an 88 percent decline in animal cases of gray fox rabies. There have been no human cases in either area since the airdrops began.

What: Fredericksburg phase of TDH Oral Rabies Vaccination Program - West Central Texas vaccine airdrop of rabies vaccine baits to immunize foxes

When: Begins Jan. 25; expected to last about seven days

Where: Fredericksburg/Gillespie County Airport (State Hwy. 16 South and Ranch Road 2093)

Why: Continue to contain a rabies epidemic (epidemic in animals) in gray foxes in West and Central Texas and keep the deadly disease from reaching domestic animals and humans

How: Small baits containing an oral rabies vaccine will be dropped from three bright yellow Twin Otter specially-equipped planes from the Ontario (Canada) Ministry of Natural Resources to immunize

foxes against rabies. The Texas Wildlife Damage Management Service and the Texas National Guard are assisting with the program.

Counties: Counties in the gray fox drop zone include: Bandera, Brewster, Brown, Callahan, Coke, Coleman, Comanche, Crane, Eastland, Gillespie, Glascock, Howard, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, Llano, Mason, Maverick, Medina, Midland, Mills, Mitchell, Nolan, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Real, Runnels, San Saba, Sterling, Taylor, Upton and

Uvalde. Counties in bold will be included in flights from Fredericksburg. The other counties were included in flights from Fort Stockton.

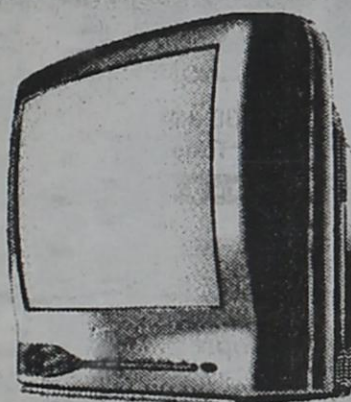

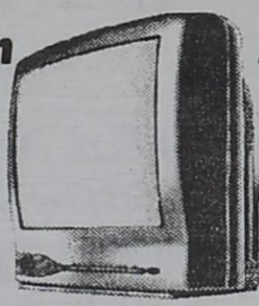

## A Day To Remember: Texas Inauguration '99

Nineteen ninety-eight was a year filled with unusual experiences, extensive motorhome travel and our 45th Wedding Anniversary spent with our daughters on an 8 day 188 mile trip down the Colorado River through the Grand Canyon. We wondered what new exciting adventures 1999 might have in store for us. Thus we were delighted to get an invitation to attend Governor Bush and Lt. Governor Perry's Inauguration activities. We thought the Inaugural Invitation was too good to pass up so we immediately accepted. We had an educational as well as entertaining trip. We arrived at the Atrium Best Western Motel on Monday about 5 p.m. We had interesting visits with Texans from around the state who were also staying there.

Tuesday, Jan. 19th, the big day arrived with fog over Austin like a blanket and a slight mist. We were able to get a place fairly close in. We enjoyed visiting with other people from Texas and the U.S. including one National Republican Committeeman from California before the

ceremonies. Pre-Inaugural entertainment was provided by the Texas A&M Aggie Band and the University of Texas Longhorn Band. As if Mother Nature smiled on Texas the sun came out just before the cannons sounded the start of the Inauguration. We were not expecting the cannons! The Texas Capitol is a beautiful building and was a splendid sight gleaming in the sun. There were Security people every few feet in the crowd as well as on top of surrounding buildings and looking out various Capitol Building windows. "TOGETHER WE CAN - JUNTOS PODEMOS" was displayed prominently and in all handouts.

The Inaugural ceremonies started with the participants passing under the arch formed by the sabers of the Ross Volunteers to get on stage for the ceremony. The Texas A&M Aggie Band played the Star Spangled Banner followed by a call to order for a joint session of the Legislature. The legislators were seated immediately in front of the podium. Following a prayer by Archbishop Patrick Flores and the Pledge of Allegiance

led by Barbara Jordan Elementary School Students, the Oath of Office was administered to Rick Perry by Thomas Phillips, Chief Justice, Supreme Court of Texas. Teel Bivins, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, then introduced now Lt. Governor Perry who gave an inspiring Inaugural Address. He said his personal heroes were his father Ray Perry and President Bush and was thankful both were present. He also paid tribute to Speaker Pete Laney and Bob Bullock, two outstanding Texas Democrats and pledged to put partisanship aside and work for what is best for Texas.

Next on the program was Justice Phillips administering the oath of office to Governor Bush followed by Speaker Laney presenting Governor Bush who addressed the joint session of the Legislature and the public with a very sincere and inspiring speech. One point he made was that we need strong moral values as much as we need a strong economy to be a great state. Governor Bush said that government cannot solve all our problems. He also talked at length about education including being educated in the moral values and that we must

teach about right and wrong choices in life and the part that families, neighbors, friends, churches and others play in this education. Governor Bush reiterated several points by speaking in Spanish. He pointed out that Texas is becoming more diverse rapidly with people coming in from over the world. He mentioned that students in Houston spoke 63 different languages. Governor Bush expressed the hope that Texans will unite around issues that are larger than race or party. The Governor's speech was interrupted many times by enthusiastic applause.

Following the Benediction by Rabbi Samuel Karff, Shawn Bailey sang "God Bless America." The finale was "Texas, Our Texas" played by the University of Texas Longhorn Band.

Over 15,000 of the 20,000 plus attendees stayed for the Bar B Que which was catered by Eddie Deen. There were about 100 serving tables set up and everyone had been served in about 45 minutes! The brisket and turkey were good but the Earl Campbell Sausage was outstanding. The slaw, potato salad, beans were very good but the rolls were some of the best we have had anywhere in the world. The

lunch finale was your choice of Chocolate or Vanilla Buttermilk Pie, 4,000 pounds beef brisket, 2000 pounds smoked turkey, 2,000 smoked sausage and 1,000 pounds of smoked ham is a lot even by Texas standards! We were also treated to live Texas style music by Tracie Lynn and her band.

The parade started at 2:30 p.m. and lasted until almost 4 p.m. The parade included 33 bands from throughout Texas as well as floats and dignitaries. President and Barbara Bush were on the reviewing stand along with the Governor and Lt. Governor and their families. We were across the street so we were able to see them quite well. The parade was very well organized and very enjoyable.

The Inaugural Ball was actually four separate balls. One was for Young Texans and attendance at the other three was by geographic area. The West Texans gathered at the Austin Civic Center. This was a black tie affair but several men sported Texas flag style bowties and cummerbunds with their tuxedos. The

entry and ballroom were beautifully decorated. Round tables were draped in white with gold lame toppers. Chairs were draped in white and gold also. Each table had a centerpiece of red roses and white stock. The serving tables had large arrangements of the same flowers. Yards and yards of red fabric was draped from the center of the room to gold star topped pillars around the room. There was food sure to please ever palate from prime rib to seafood to Mexican.

The West Texas Ball was the first stop by Governor Bush, Lt. Governor Perry, their families and other dignitaries accompanying them. They entered through the saber arch of the Ross Volunteers to appropriate music. Both Bush and Perry gave short speeches and departed for the other balls. We enjoyed visiting with people we knew from El Paso, Abilene and Breckenridge. We had not talked with Representative Bob Hunter from Abilene since we were both in ACU in the early 50's. We also enjoyed meeting many new people. It was especially good hearing

people from Midland-Odessa who have known George and Laura for a long time reiterate that they are both very solid citizens. Long time acquaintances of the Perrys say the same of them. Even though the Republicans now hold every statewide office in Texas and it would be easy to use this to political advantage, the consensus seemed to be that Governor Bush and Lt. Governor Perry will run their offices for all Texans. In talking with one of the Texas State Trooper Officers, we asked if there was much difference or effect on them by who was Governor. He said there was usually not much difference budget wise but morale wise Governor Bush's first term has been one of the best. He said some Governors and their staff did not speak to them in the hallways and around the Capitol which hurt the morale of the Troopers. The variety of entertainment included Grammy nominated Rick Trevino.

Since we had missed Representative Keffer and Senator Sibley at the Inaugural activities, we went by the Capitol Wednesday

morning. We said hello to Representative Keffer in the hall as he was headed to his desk in the House and then met his friendly office staff. When we told Keffer's staff we were from Eastland County, they took us in his office to see their memorial to Old Rip in Jim's office. The large stuffed "Rip" had been signed by Governor Bush and others and was part of the decorations under the Capitol Christmas tree.

Senator Sibley was in a meeting but his staff was very nice and helpful.

After watching the House of Representatives in action for awhile we decided to head back to Eastland County. In summary it was quite a treat for those two West Texans to attend the Inaugural Activities.

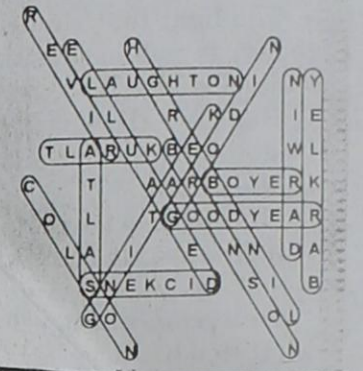
