

GET RID OF THE ACORNS

In the old days when pork was not so much of a commercial product, it was alright to let a few hogs get half-fat in the woods, wherewith to furnish the years bacon supply, and it was good meat, too.

But growing for the market, acorns are not so much. While hogs will get half fat on acorns when the "mast" is good, which is only about three years in five, if the mast is heavy, the hogs will destroy more grass than they are worth half-fat.

Getting about half-fat in the late fall and early winter, stockhogs will lose it all in the late winter and early spring, and you know how worms take to a "pore shoat". When there was a "dieup" of hogs in the woods in the old days, they called it cholera, which it was not, but worms.

Of late years it is true, there have been a few centers of cholera infection in our woods sections, brought in by fine hogs from the north; but way back I, am sure that starvation and its usual attendant - worms, ac- and give good service. counted mainly for the "die ups."

(e) To require reports and statements of condition and to make examinations of all banks or associations doing business under the provisions of this act.

(f) To prescribe the form and terms of farm loan bonds, and the form, terms and penal sums of all surety bonds required under this act and of such other surety bonds as they shall deem necessary, such surety bonds to cover financial loss as well as faithful performance of duty.

(g) To require Federal Land Banks. to pay forthwith to any Federal Land Bank their equitable proportion of any sums advanced by said land bank to pay the coupons of any other land bank, basing said required payments on the amount of farm loan bonds issued by each land bank and actually outstanding at the time of such requirement.

(h) To suspend or to remove for cause any district director or any re istrar, appraiser, examiner, or other official appointed by said board under authority of section three of the act, the cause of such suspension o removal to be communicated forthwith in writing by the Federal Farm ous sparkling panoply of color. But Loan Board to the person suspended or removed, and in case of a district. director to the proper Federal Land Bank.

(i) To exercise general supervisory authority over the Federal Land Banks, the National Farm Loan Associations, and the joint stock land banks herein provided for.

(j) To exercise such incidental powers as shall be necessary or requisite to fulfill its duties and carry out the purposes of this act.





"Climb on your horses and get a start," panted the burly trainer; "he's goin' to race you ten miles."



(a) To organize and charter Federal Land Banks, and to charter National & Ranch. Farm Loan Associations and joint stock land banks subject to the provisions of this act, and in its discretion to authorize them to increase their capital stock.

(b) To review and alter at its disloans made by them under the provisform so far as practicable.

(c) To grant or refuse to Federal Land Banks, or joint stock land banks, authority to make any specific issue of farm loan bonds.

With the farm loan bank for the Texas district located in Houston, there would be an immediate incentive for the farmers of South, East-Central Texas to organize; and as those sections of the State are the ones where the act would apply most directly-because those are the sections which are in greatest need of the cheap money obtainable under this act-the organization of local associations and the investigations to be made could be carried on more promptly and the money secured with least delay.

each year. The security is always a first mortgage upon the land owned by those who borrow the money. Membership in these local associations is restricted by the act to borrowers on farm land mortgages, thus assuring that the farmers directly interested shall be wholly in control of all the affairs of the organization.

In making application for a loan under this section of the act, the members of the "local" must subscribe for the stock thereof in an amount equal to 5 per cent of the amount they desire to borrow. The application made, the Federal Land Bank investigates the solvency and character of the applicants, the value of the land offered as security, and if these be satisfactory, a charter is granted; but if it be unsatisfactory then the charter is refused. In event that it is granted, the federal board will designate the territory in which that association may make loans.

Upon receipt of its charter such local association "shall be authorized and empowered to receive from the Federal Land Bank of the district sums to be loaned to its members under the terms and conditions of this act.'

In the election of officers of the local association each member shall have a vote for each \$5 share he may hold in the association; but this is restricted by a provision that no member may have more than twenty votes, no matter what his loan may be; that is, if a man borrows \$1,000 he has twenty votes and no more, even if he borrowed \$10,-000. Those who borrow less than \$1,000 have one vote for each \$100 of their loan.

Lewis Shaw, Jr., the inventor, says:


