

#### Germany Schemes to Have American Partnership Next

Fort Worth, Texas, June 16.—
"Germany is not dead; she will rise again' stronger than ever. She will be a mighty factor in the 'next war.'"

This is the propaganda that was spread among the Texas and Oklahoma soldiers of the 90th division while they were in the army of occupation.

Pinned to a shirt in the trunk of Lieutenant Frank W. Judd of Ft. Worth, when the 90th division units began arriving in New York, was found a piece of German propaganda, written in good English, saying that Germany was by no means dead, that she would rise up again and strike, that she would be a mighty factor in the "next war." The "advice" was addressed to the "American people."

The note was written, Lieutenant Judd said Monday, by the daughter of a German family with whom he was billeted while in the Rhineland. The girl, he said, spoke good English and seemed to be well educated.

The German people, the note advised, regarded America's entrance into the war as the outcome of a tactical blunder on the part of certain German politicians. America is wanted as an ally in the "next war," the note says.

"American money has appealed to the Hun," Lieutenant Judd said. "I sincerely believe that a majority of the people in Germany look forward to world dominion as the outcome of the "next war" alluded to in their conversations. They figure the United States as an ally, because this country has a big bank roll."

Austin, June 16.—Returns from seventeen counties in the constitutional amendment election of May 24 have not been received by the Secretary of State.

The missing counties are: Anderson, Baylor, Cameron, Cass, Coke, Eastland, El Paso, Gregg, Jack, Kimble, Lampasas, Medina, Orange, Parmer, Smith, Uvalde and Wood.

The attorney General is contemplating the issuance of mandamus proceedings to force. County Judges of the counties to send in returns.

This spoilage of eggs can be entirely infertile eggs has been waged several years by United States Department of Agriculture poultry specialists, and is being taken up with renewed vigor in States where summer temperatures are highest and loses are greatest. Weeks have been designated "Swat the Rooster" for the sale of surplus male birds. Enormous quanities of roosters, not needed and being fed needlessly, have been marketed during such weeks. It is much more generally understood that hens will lay just as well without a male in the flock.

### If Germany Should Refuse

Although the Ebert government and the German envoys positively declared that they would not sign the peace terms the Allies did not seem to be worried. Germany was thought to be "bluffing" in the hope of getting better terms. Marshal Foch however, was represented as ready to renew the war if Germany should finally refuse. Lloyd George said: "Gentlemen, you will sign at Versailles or you will sign at Berlin"-meaning that the Allies would march on Berlin and dictate a peace there.



Of the 20,000 motor vehicles to be acquired practically free by the states, 11,000 are new and ed to be in serviceable condition. The motors will be apportioned to states only upon request of the State highway departments on the basis of the requests received from the respective States, and in accordance with the apportionment provided in the Federal aid law approved in 1916. The requirements of the law are such that the Bureau of Public Roads cannot distribute any trucks to counties or individuals.

### NC-4 To Rest on Laurels
