Holmes of Clyde to make application for a marker to be placed at the home of Mrs. Ethel Anderson at Cottonwood known as the Griffin home, built in 1909 and later occupied by the late H. S. Varner, a well known pioneer school teacher of the area.

Also, application will be made for a marker to be placed at the Admiral Baptist Church, organized in 1881 with the present structure built in 1898.

It was decided that a dedication ceremony would be held when the markers have been erected, in the spring or early summer of 1974.

In response to a request from the Sam Rayburn Library at Bonham for a copy of the book, Early Days in Callahan County, by B. C. Chrisman members voted to donate one.

Mrs. Tom Windham Jr., of Oplin, read excerpts from the history she has prepared on the work done by the Historical Survey Committee. A copy will be placed in the Clyde Public Library, as has been done in the Callahan County Library.

## New Cattle Feeders Handbook Available for Commercial Feeders

A comprehensive new reference book, The Texas Cattle Feeders Handbook, has just been published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with Extension Services of nine other Great Plains States, and provides timely information on all aspects of commercial cattle feeding, notes Co. Extension Agent Greg Gerngross.

The new publication is composed of 50 bulletins or fact sheets 25 of which are Texas publications and 25 from other states, announces L. A. Maddox, Extension beef and cattle specialist.

"The whole endeavor is a part of the Great Plains Cattle Feeders Committee Project. We plan to make available a wide range of technical material of higher quality than ever before. New and revised information will be mailed to subscribers from now through Sept. 1, 1975, Maddox added.

Co-authoring the handbook with Maddox are Dr. John Sweeten, Extension agricultural engineer in animal waste management, and Dr. Dennis B. Hard, Extension beef cattle specialist - nutrition.

The handbook includes broad segments of information on nutrition, feed preparation and storage, animal health, feedlot management, feedlot planning and equipment, figures for feeders, waste management and a section for miscellaneous publications and information, explains the county Extension agent.

This publication, numbered B-1133, sells for \$10, which includes a subscription to any new fact sheets developed between now and September, 1975. It can be ordered through the Department of Agricultural Communications, Texas A&M University.

### RETURN FROM 10-DAY VACATION TRIP


