THE BAD THING about the current Democratic vs Republican blood-letting in Washington, as far as the state of Texas is concerned, is that our state has lost a pair of national spots that carried a tremendous amount of clout, and could have benefitted the state.

Most people figure that the congressional Ethics Committee's Investigation, which led to the resignation this week of Speaker of the House Jim Wright, was pure and simple retaliation by the Republicans over the refusal of congress to approve the nomination of John Tower as Secretary of the Defense.

No doubt this theory is correct, but as the blood-letting process continues, we need to find some national leaders with roots other than Texas, and spread the "honors" out a little more.

Most observers also agree that while Tower and Wright were neither in the "lily white" category, they still were probably not far from the norm as far as longtime politicians go. They nevertheless happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time, and it fell their lots to become the sacrificial lambs for the purging movement.

Is the congressional in-fighting over? Apparently not, since investigations have been launched against two or three other congressmen, and the House's number three Democrat beat Wright to the punch in the resignation business.

The other bad thing about all of the investigations is that they have virtually caused a halt to legislation in the early months of President Bush's administration.

Up until now, the House of Representatives has been slow to act on meaningful legislation, due to the fact that the investigation into the Speaker's background had left Wright in a diminished power position.

Any bill that required a strong push by the Speaker of the House would have been hindered as long as the investigation was going on as has been simply held back.

We feel sure that there is important legislation that segments of the population have been awaiting, to cure some problem or other, that needs to be acted upon.

Perhaps now, or very soon, we can put this ugly affair behind us, and allow Congress to go on with its business.

RUMORS are a very serious business, and are a practice in which people should exercise much caution before taking part.

Rumors can be extremely vicious, and damaging, and are often circulated about individuals, businesses, or whatever.

The bad thing about rumors is the fact that they don't have to be true in order to damage a person's reputation that he has spent a lifetime developing. Once a particular rumor has "made the rounds," in some regards, it might as well have been true, as far as the damage that is done.

In our case, we hear a number of rumors, but we take extreme care not to print anything unless it comes from the person involved, or the closest source.

We have always cautioned our children not to pass on a story that they can't verify as the truth.

If we would spend the time calling someone who is in sorrow, or finding out how we can be of help to someone who is ill, as we might spend in the business of rumors, what a better world it would be.

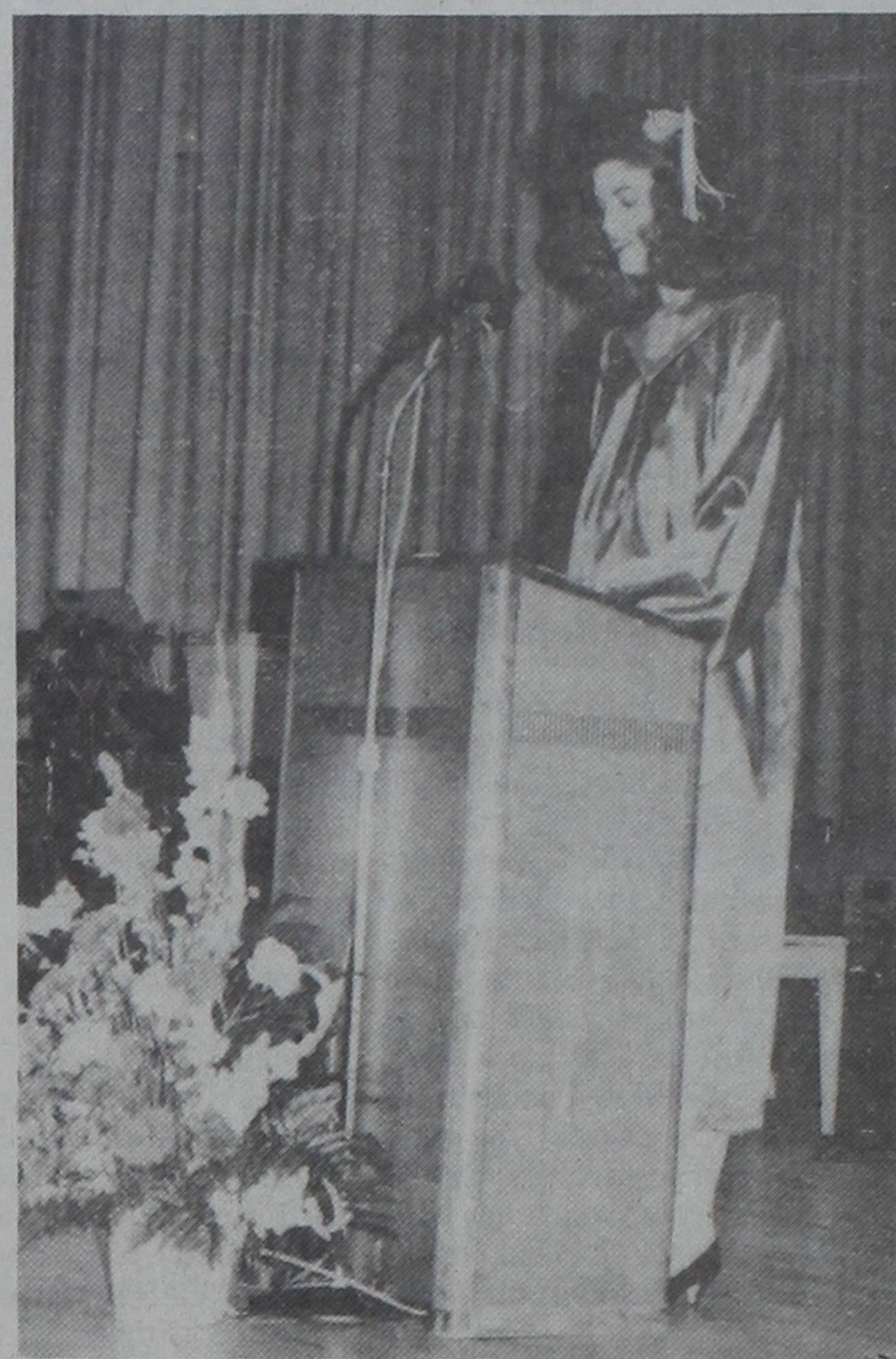

Country Caravan Coming On June 9

Take all the best ingredients that country music has to offer and mix it well with tremendous vocal talent, dress it in colorful costumes, and add a dash of topflight musicianship and precision dancing.

This is the entertaining recipe for the 13th season of *Country Caravan* scheduled for a performance Friday, June 9 in Friona.

Sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce, the 90-minute revue of hand-clapping and toe-tapping country music hits begins at 8:30 p.m. in the Friona City Park. Admission is free.

Featuring a cast of 16 talented vocalists and musicians, *Country Caravan* dishes up a musical menu that will satisfy the most discriminating country music palate. Produced annually by South Plains College in Levelland, Texas, this musical program features more than 30 country music hits that run the gamut of contemporary country and golden classics.

"Our goal for *Caravan* goes beyond mere entertainment," says John Hartin, the general director for the show. "Like any good cook, we look for those magical ingredients in country music that

enable us to touch a person's soul."

To achieve just that Hartin and crew rely heavily on the lyrical qualities of country music, performing powerful country tunes which have deep roots in the music industry and which in many instances have withstood the test of time. The result, Hartin says, is an inspiring show which simply makes its audiences feel good.

"We know our customers. They're regulars with us," says Joe Carr, the show's musical director and master of ceremonies. "We know how to cook up a meal they will like." After 13 seasons, that intuitive knowledge of what keeps audiences flocking to see performances of *Country Caravan* each summer helps to mold the show's musical menu.

More than anything else, *Caravan* serves up a smattering of many different country music entrees as it tells its story in song and dance. So the program of songs includes contemporary chart-busters like Barbara Mandrell's "I Wish I Could Fall In Love," which emulates the traditional country style of the 50s and 60s, and George Strait's "If You Ain't Lovin'," which revives Texas western swing. Vocal harmonies sing in Highway 101's, "Cry, Cry, Cry," and in the female duet, "Since I Found You," by the Sweethearts of the Rodeo. The vocal qualities of the entire cast create a smash with Alabama's "Forty Hour Week."

But the show would be missing a key element to the country music

story if it didn't touch on the country classics. So take a walk down memory lane with songs made famous by country music greats, Patti Paige, Loretta Lynn and Hank Williams. The styles of Tammy Wynette, Johnny Cash, Lynn Anderson and the Everly Brothers are represented in tunes like "Divorce," "I Walk the Line," "Rocky Top," and "Bye, Bye Love." Who could forget the immortal Patsy Cline's "Crazy" or the rock-a-billy style of Jerry Lee Lewis', "Whole Lot of Shakin' Goin' On."

Authentic Appalachian-style clogging takes a western swing twist in two instrumental numbers, while hot saxophone licks sing in "Tequila." Some great country fiddling, a medley of inspiring country gospels, headlined by "A Light at the End of the Darkness," and the patriotism of Lee Greenwood's "God Bless the U.S.A." round out the show.

For the past 12 years, *Caravan* audiences have come to expect the vocal and instrumental talent in the show to shine. Both Hartin and Carr agree that the show's musical talent exhibits a high degree of experience and enthusiasm. The cast consists of 13 multi-talented students from South Plains College's Creative Arts Department and country and bluegrass music program and three faculty members.

Backing up the vocalists is the Caravan Band which is featured on several solo acts. Student members of the band include two veterans from previous seasons. Toby McWilliams and Jacky Howard, both from Levelland, return for

another season. McWilliams plays guitar and pedal steel, while Howard is featured on saxophone.

Newcomers include Becky Ellis of Plains, Texas, who plays the fiddle and Paul Goad of Fort Worth, Texas, who brings to the show expertise on the keyboards and is a featured vocalist. Kendall Mesneak of Pampa, Texas, is the band's percussionist.

Faculty members in the band include Hartin, who plays the electric guitar with a passion and sings the classic country style. Carr, bluegrass music specialist at SPC, serves as the show's host and picks the mandolin, guitar and fiddle. Lance Martin, commercial music instructor, makes his debut as bass guitarist.

The vocal talent for this season's edition has been perfectly matched to the show's material. At the head of the list are three young ladies who thrilled audiences last season. Paula Horton of Perrin, Texas, enters her third season with the show, and her yodeling abilities are featured in "Lovesick Blues."

Area Gets Light Rainfall

The Friona area, which is desperately needing a good general rain, got a .3 inch shower late Thursday and early Friday, and residents were hoping for more before the current system leaves the area.

While some parts of the region got an inch or more of moisture on Wednesday evening, Friona was left high and dry, as has been the case so often this year.

But the clouds finally opened up just before 10 p.m. Thursday with a light shower that measured .12 inch. Then, in the early-morning hours on Friday, another .18 inch fell, accompanied by thunder and lightning.

Forecasters were saying that Friday would be the area's best chance, so here's hoping.

Thursday's high temperature of 72 was the lowest maximum reading since May 13, and was quite a change after an almost steady diet of readings in the 90s.

60 YEARS AGO--MAY 23, 1929

At the present rate, the building will soon be ready for occupancy. So far, it is only conjecture as to what line of business will occupy the building.

50 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1939

E.W. Boedecker, principal of Friona High School, announces that the coveted Reader's Digest Award for scholastic achievement has been won by the valedictorian of the class of 1939, Martin Todd.

Dan Ethridge has had the north half of the office which he has occupied for the past two years handsomely decorated and has his office arranged there. The other half has been leased by Smiley Fulks for his cafe, which has been for several years, located in the O.G. Turner building on Main

Street, two doors north of Friona State Bank.

10 YEARS AGO--MAY 20, 1979

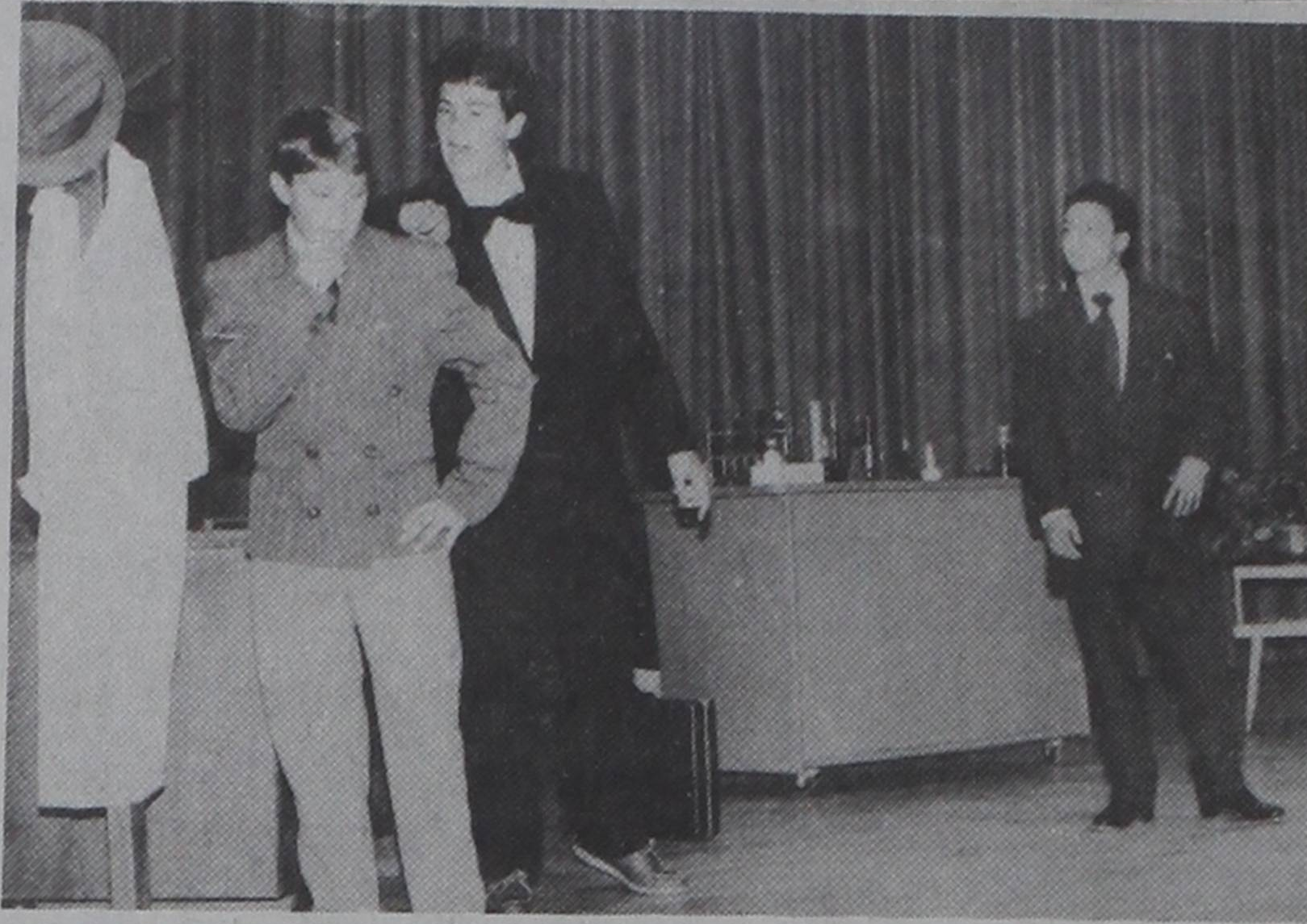

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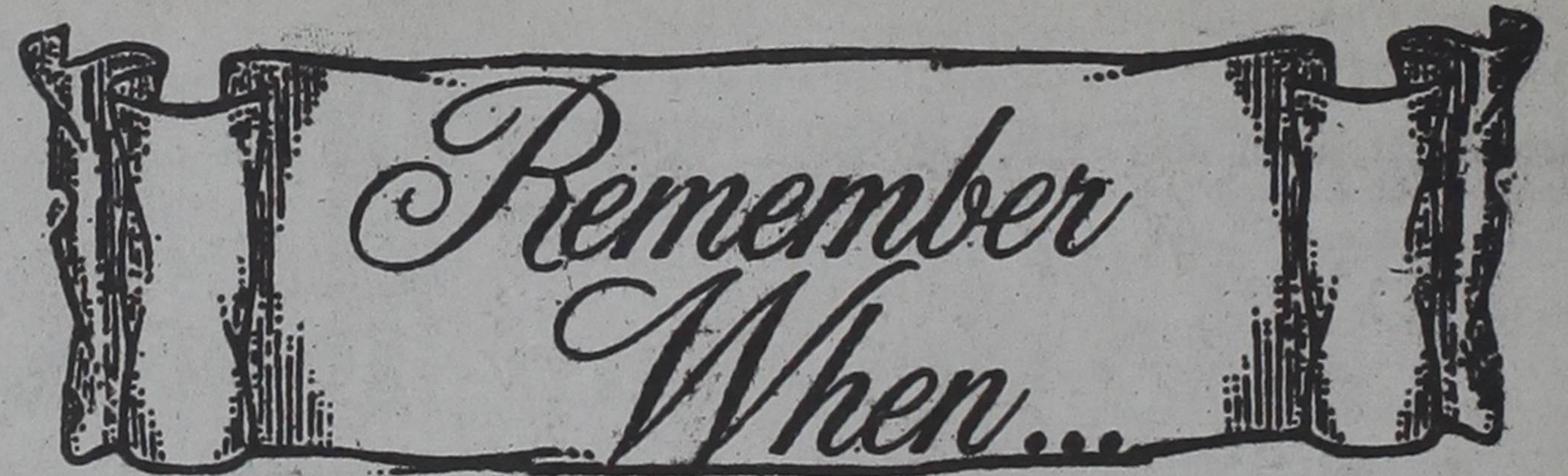

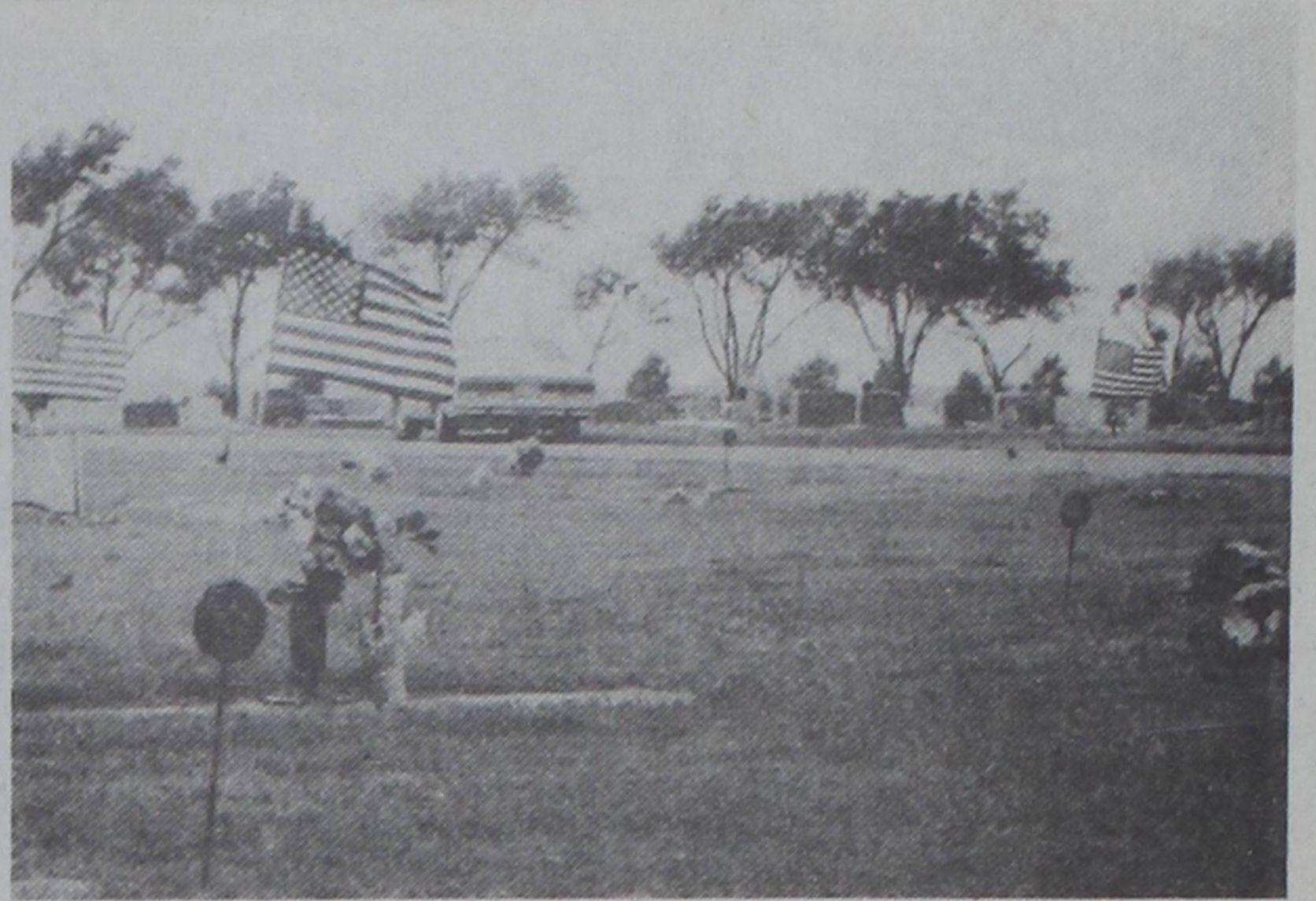
Student of the Year.

For hobbies, Miss Willard enjoys sign language, singing and drama. She attends First Baptist Church.

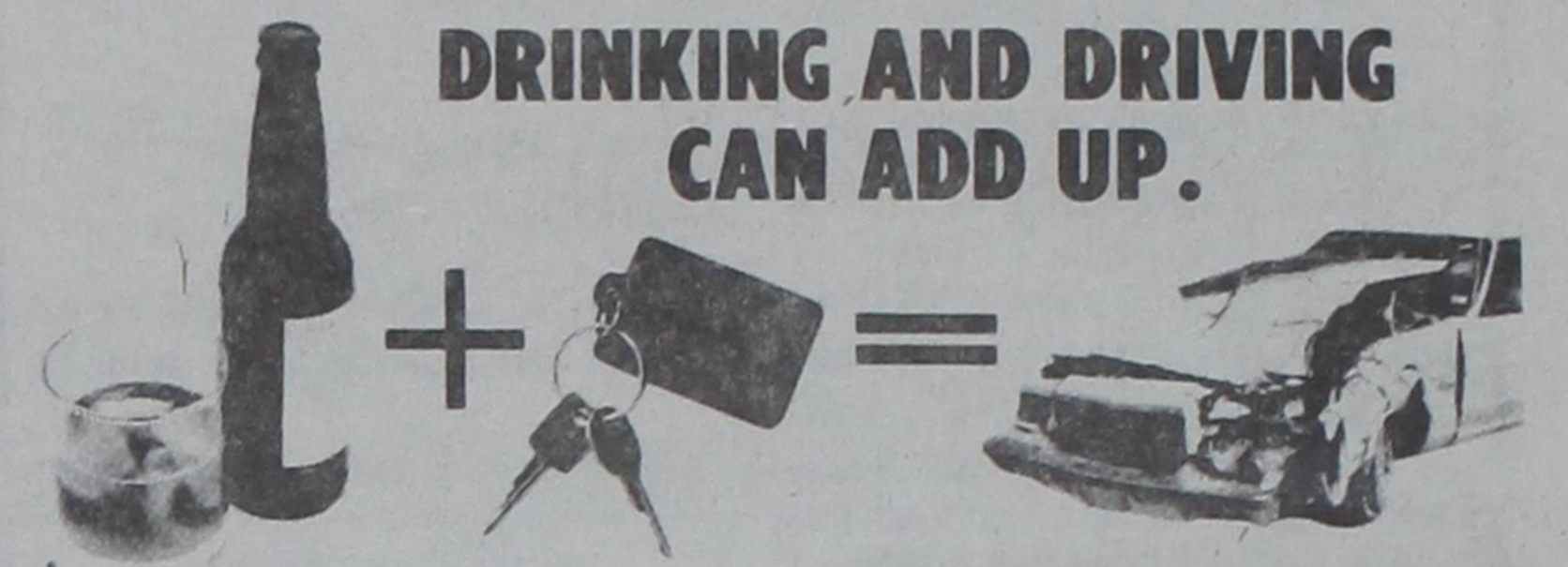
Her favorite book is "Sandy." Her favorite sports are basketball and volleyball. Favorite movie is "The Princess Bride." Favorite subject is English.

Miss Willard plans to attend Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas next fall.

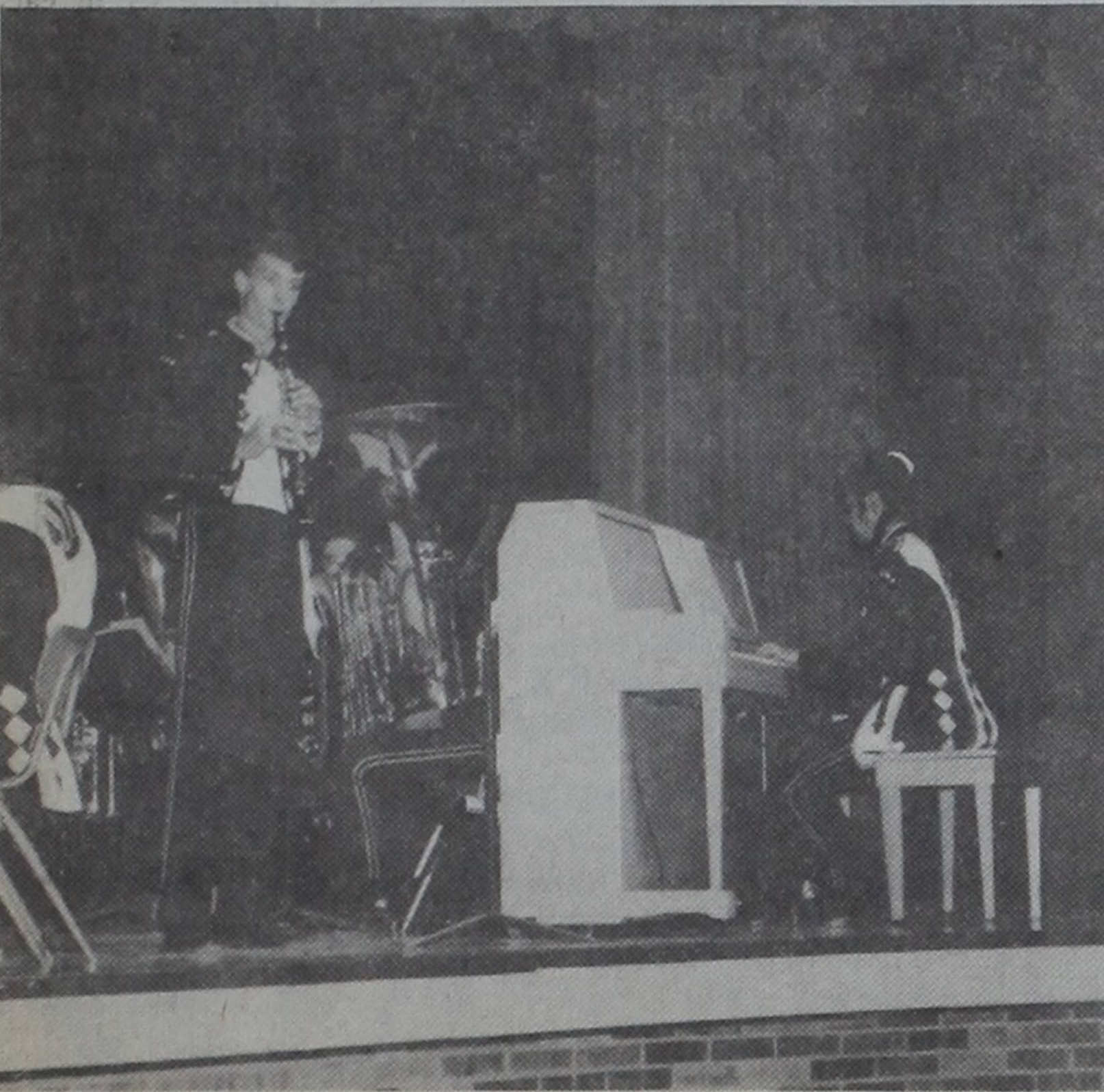

SPS, IBEW Sponsor Kid Care Program

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) Local 602 have implemented a community-watch program designed to assist children who are lost, hurt or feeling threatened.

Through the "Kid Care" program, a child needing assistance can go to any utility truck bearing the distinctive SPS logo. These vehicles are equipped with radios allowing SPS employees to contact a company dispatcher with a request for help.

The dispatcher, in turn, notifies the appropriate medical or law-enforcement agency, and the SPS employee remains at the site until help arrives.

The police or other authorities will handle the situation reported by the child. SPS employees have been instructed only to relay requests for help.

"I think there's a natural inclination to try to help a kid in trouble," said Clayton White, business manager for IBEW Local 602. "We're just asking our people to remember that they're utility workers, not policemen or paramedics, and they should let the authorities handle any Kid Care situation that comes up."

Posters featuring large white trucks with SPS's orange and black logo have been placed in elementary and middle schools throughout the company's 52,000-square-mile service area. Principals and teachers at these schools will help educate students about the program, and parents will be encouraged through flyers and other materials to discuss the Kid Care program with their children.

"Kid Care is a natural addition

to SPS's existing community service programs," said Laura Dudley, SPS communication specialist for community programs. "SPS employees already act as 'Partners on Patrol,' watching for suspicious activities or fires. Through the company's 'Gatekeeper' program, our employees also keep an eye out for elderly persons who might need medical, financial or some other type of assistance. The Kid Care program offers SPS employees yet another way to serve the communities in which they live and raise their families."

Cooperatives Plan New Power Line

James Hull, president and general manager of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative and chairman of Golden Spread Electric Cooperative's board of directors, has announced the signing of a memorandum with Sunflower Electric Cooperative, a generation and transmission utility located in Hays, Kansas, and the Western Area Power Administration, a federal hydro-power marketing agency headquartered in Golden, Colorado, for peaking capacity and a new high-voltage power line.

The memorandum is the first step in consummating an agreement between Golden Spread and Sunflower for the sale, by Sunflower, of excess capacity to Golden Spread. The memorandum also provides for the construction of a transmission line from Sunflower's Holcomb Station, near Garden City, Kansas, to Guymon, Oklahoma.

Under the agreement with Sunflower, Golden Spread will obtain 110,000 kilowatts of capacity from two gas-fired turbine generators located at Sunflower's Garden City power plant. The power will be used to meet the peak-load needs of Golden Spread's member systems.

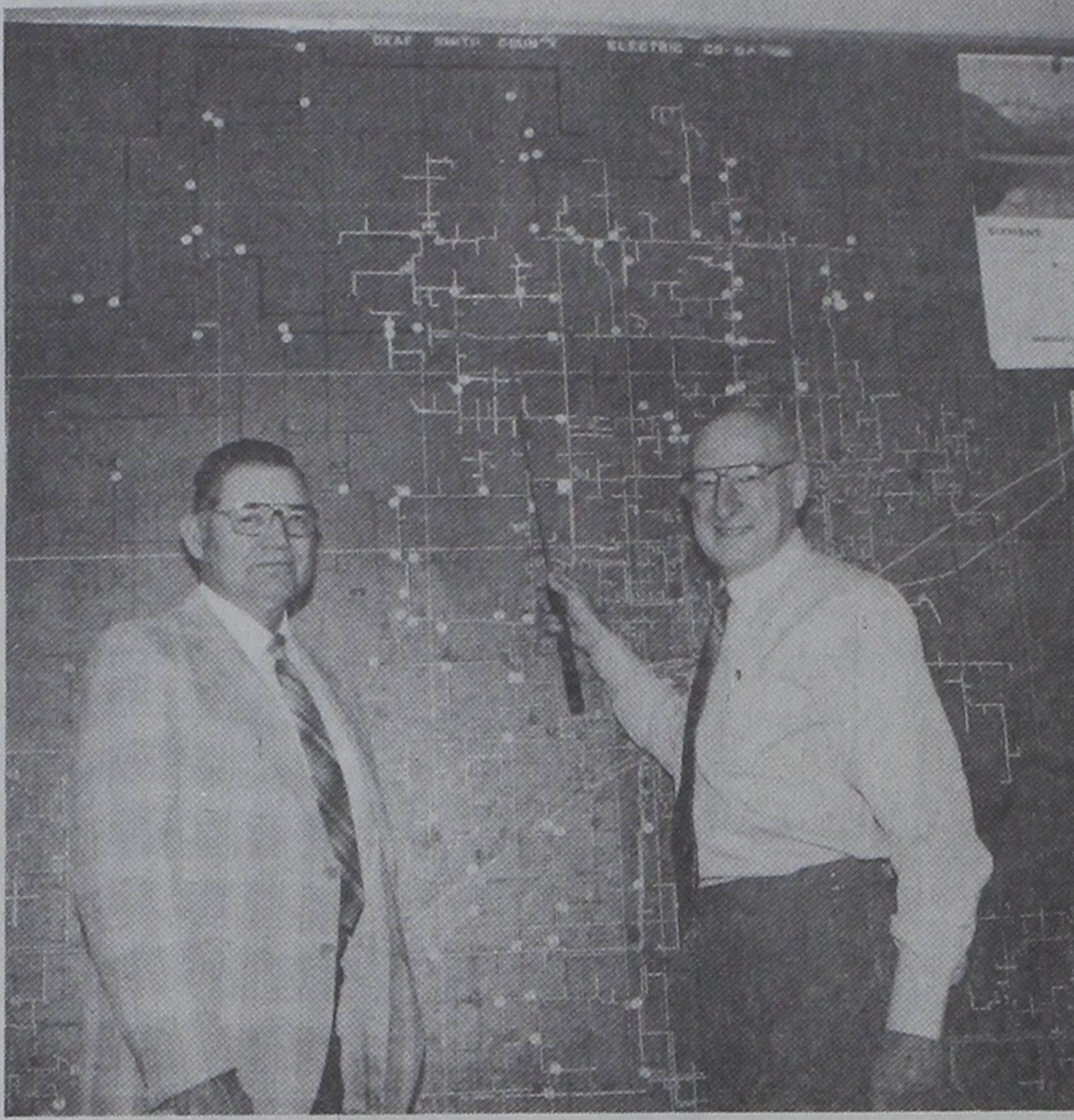
The transmission line from Holcomb Station to Guymon, Oklahoma, will be financed by Western, Golden Spread and Sunflower. Sunflower and

Western will be responsible for the construction costs of substation and transmission improvements in Kansas. Golden Spread will be responsible for the costs of such improvements in Oklahoma.

The proposed transmission line is expected to be either a 230 kV or a 345 kV line, depending upon the final engineering analysis. The projected cost of the new line will be between \$23 million and \$36 million. The power line will be about 90 miles in length and will take about three and one-half years to complete.

Golden Spread President Robert W. Bryant said, "This new power supply arrangement will benefit all of Golden Spread's member systems and their consumers. Golden Spread's members will obtain low cost peaking power to assure that electric rates will continue to be affordable for their irrigation consumers. The new transmission line will strengthen the electrical interconnections to the north and increase our opportunities for future access to low cost electrical power."

Golden Spread provides electric service to ten member cooperatives in Texas: Deaf Smith, Bailey, Greenbelt, Lamb, Lighthouse, Midwest, North Plains, Rio Grande, Rita Blanca, South Plains, Swisher and one Oklahoma electric cooperative, Tri-County.

Specialist Discusses Bagworm Control

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says Extension Agent-Entomologist Mike Blanton.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long, Blanton adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then over-winter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each over-winter female bag on a

tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year, and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Blanton. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid or soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.

Salesman Confesses

Claims newspaper is best salesman

On Monday, Jules Wintner, owner of a local retail establishment, confessed his job as a salesman was obsolete due to the impact of newspaper advertising. Wintner, in an exclusive interview, said sales were made in the local paper instead of in the store.

"Sure, we get a chance for additional sales," Wintner commented, "but the newspaper has become our best salesman." Wintner reported that consumers name the local newspaper as their usual source of "Best Buy" information, 10 times more than radio or television. This conforms with a recent Consumer Data Service report that indicated 60% of the consumers seek "Best Buy" information from the newspaper versus only 6% for radio and 7% for television.

Wintner later remarked that because the newspaper is read by all Texans, regardless of income, his business was able to sell both upper end products as well as value priced items. "No matter what we're selling, we get good response in the newspaper," he said. "In fact, the more expensive the product, the better our response seems to be." This fact is substantiated in a survey by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau that documented readership of the newspaper increases as income increases. In the survey, almost 75% of Texans with incomes exceeding \$50,000 a year read

the newspaper.

"My job has become redundant," Wintner admitted. "Used to be I had to really sell each customer, but now I'm just an order taker." Asked what he intended to do now that the newspaper was doing most of the selling, he replied, "Spend more in newspaper advertising than last year."

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

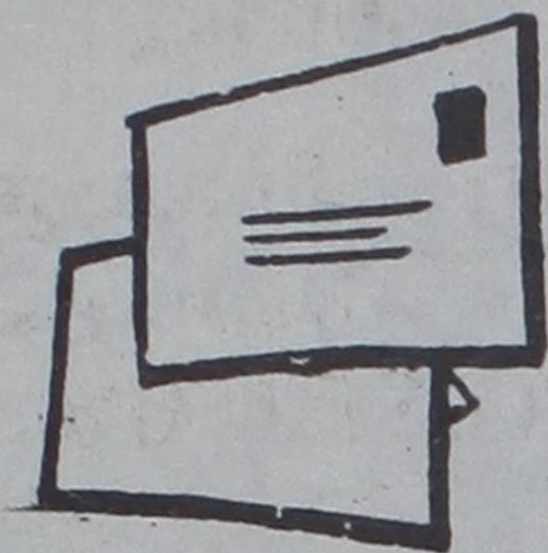
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Letter To The Editor

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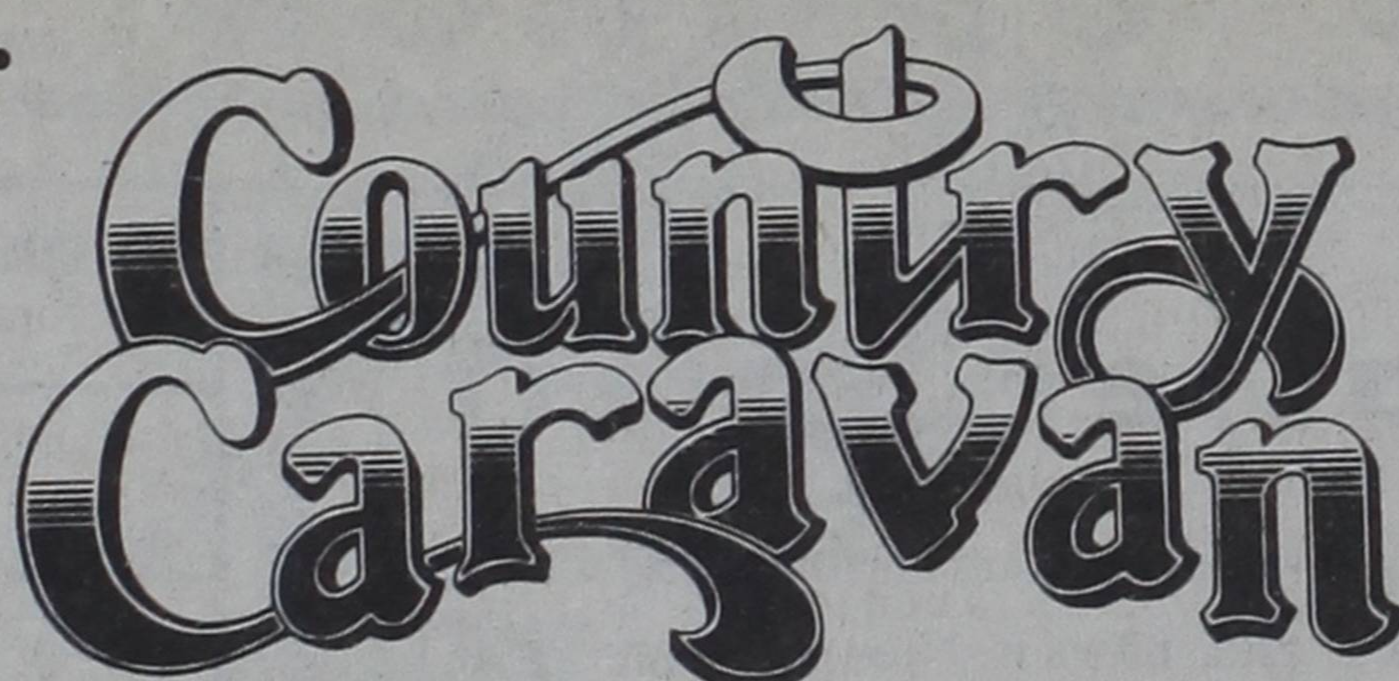
