Board Eyes \$41,000 Savings

The Friona Independent School District's board of trustees met on November 9 for their regular meeting.

Highlight of the meeting was the authorization for Southwest Securities to proceed with underwriting a current refunding of the district's outstanding Series 1980 unlimited tax school building bonds.

This action is expected to save the school district over \$41,000 over the next six years.

In other business, the board heard a report from Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff that the school's average daily attendance (ADA) during the month of October was 97.78 per cent, which was approximately one per cent above last year's attendance.

School enrollment stood at 1,283 on October 31, 1989, compared to 1,295 on October 31, 1988.

Attendance committees for the various school campuses were appointed. The committees will hear petitions for class credit by students who are in attendance fewer than 80 days during a semester.

The board also established guidelines to determine what constitutes extenuating circumstances, and adopt policies establishing alternative ways for students to make up work or regain credit lost because of absences.

Koby Rogers Holds Grid Contest Lead

Schoolboy Koby Rogers continues to "hang tough" in the Friona Star's football contest. With two weeks remaining in the contest (including the current weekend), Rogers has a four-point lead in the overall standings.

The FHS student had 155 points going into the 12th week of the promotion, to 151 for Randy Weatherley.

Jimmy Walker is in third place with 150 points. Four contestants are tied at 149 points: Clint Mears, Charlie Morgan, Mike Schueler and Don Max Vars.

Contestants are competing for a grand prize of \$100 at the conclusion of the annual event.

In the weekly contest, Vicky Moss had an outstanding entry.

In a weekend marred by two of the contest games ending in ties, Mrs. Moss had a score of 16, to easily capture the weekly first prize of \$10.00 cash. Her entry was not only the only one with 16 correct games, but no one else managed as many as 15 correct.

The two games ending in a tie, UCLA-Southern Cal and Cleveland-Kansas City, were counted "wrong" on the contest forms, since it technically is possible to pick a tie.

Mrs. Moss' only misses besides the tie game were Baylor-Rice and Chicago-Tampa Bay.

Twelve contestants correctly picked 14 contest games, and from this list the second and third place weekly winners were chosen. Young Wade Hinkle made off with second place, on the basis of his Dallas-Miami tie-breaker score. He picked Miami to beat the Cowboys, 20-17, missing each team's score by only three points, or six in all.

Third place went to Edwinston Gonzales of Bovina, whose tie-breaker prediction was nine points of the real score. He picked Dallas to win the game, 23-17.

In addition to the tie games, Hinkle's misses were Baylor-Rice, Minnesota-Philadelphia, Chicago-

Tampa Bay and Floydada-Canyon. Gonzales missed Floydada-Canyon, Georgia-Auburn, Baylor-Rice and Chicago-Tampa Bay.

Also picking 14 games correctly were Mark Zachary of Lubbock, Randy Weatherley, Donnie McDonald of Lazbuddie, Richard Dickson, Clint Mears, Ruben Villanueva and Patricia Carr.

Twenty-three other contestants correctly picked 13 games, sixteen had scores of 12, and ten correctly picked eleven games.

Promotion Underway

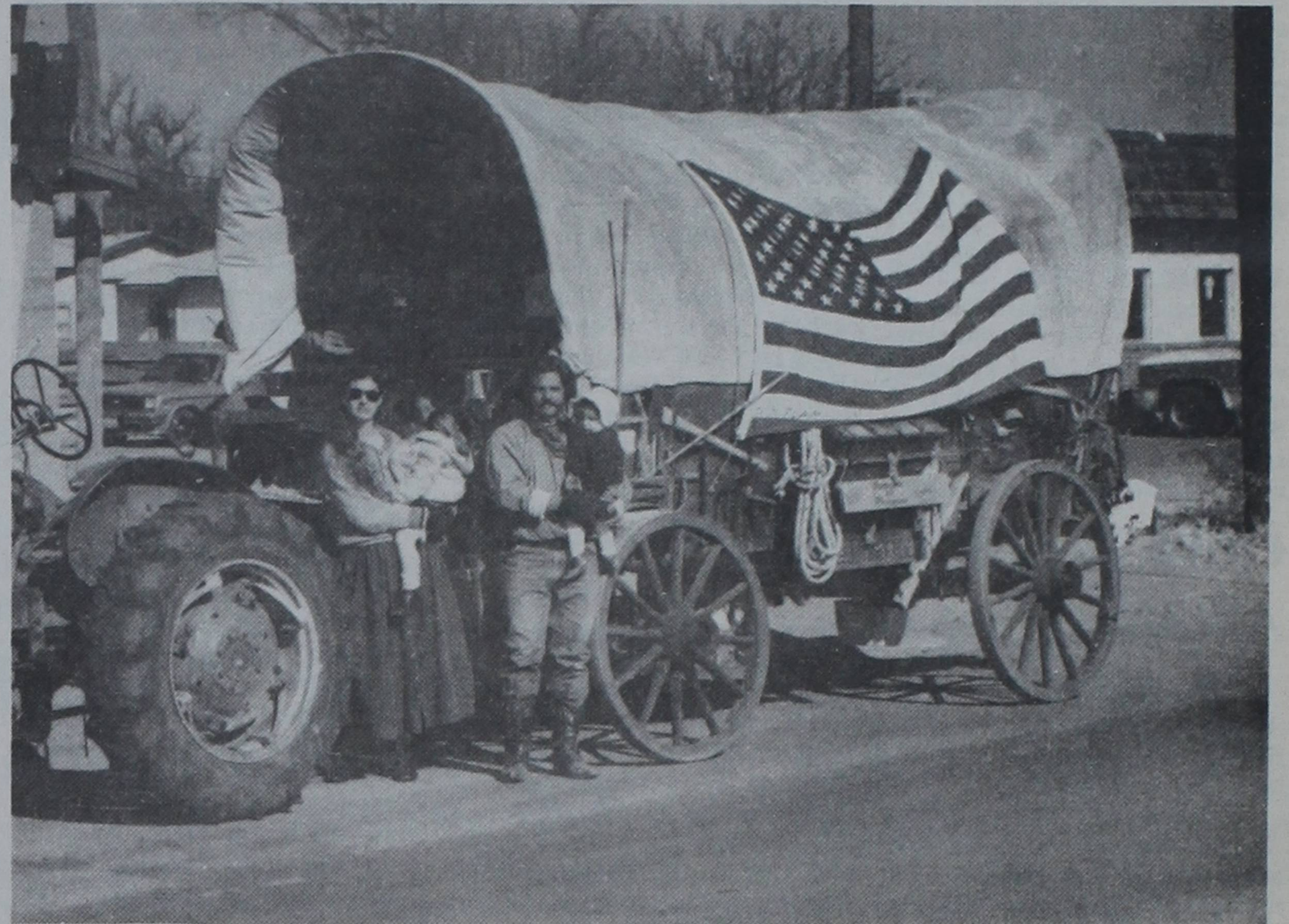

Chieftains Ohio Family Stops Amidst Wagon Trip

Two members of the Friona Chieftain football team for 1989 were named to first-team All-District teams announced this week by district coaches.

In addition, four other Friona players were selected to the second teams and four were named "honorable mention" all-district.

Sophomore runningback Ismael Rocha, 170-pounder who played only four games (missing only the Littlefield game on the district schedule), was selected first team all-district, receiving every coach's vote except Littlefield, the game he missed.

Senior Jeff Stowers, 160-pounder, was selected to the first team defense at a cornerback position. Besides his cornerback play, Stowers also was the team's leading kickoff returner, and a leading receiver on offense.

Selected to the second team offense were runningback Andre Duran, 185-pound senior, and place-kicker Mike Scott, a 140-pound junior. Scott was selected to the second team along with Floydada's Frank Suarez.

Second team defense honors were given to lineman Mike Sutter, 185-pound senior, and linebacker Bennie Trevino, 150-pound senior.

Honorable mention status for all-district went to three Friona players on defense, end Darran Procter, safety Shannon Cochran and lineman Wayne Jackson. Procter and Cochran are seniors, and Jackson is a sophomore.

Wes Drake was an honorable mention selection on the offensive team as a lineman. Drake is a junior.

Floydada and Tulia, the district's two playoff representatives, dominated the all-district selections. Friona's six spots on the top two teams equalled that of Littlefield, which won one more district game than did the Chieftains.

Friona Flashbacks

60 YEARS AGO--NOV. 22, 1929

Street commissioner F.W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places. It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter. If this can be done, Friona's Main Street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years.

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 23, 1934

The annual Thanksgiving service in which all our Friona churches unite, will be held next Thursday night at seven o'clock in the First Baptist Church building. The address will be given by the Rev. H.L. Thurston, pastor of the local

they may have to consider hiring a flatbed trailer to haul their rig for a spell.

But finances are also a problem "I rejected a corporate sponsor to begin with, as we wanted to be in touch with the people, and the people have been great," DeMarco said.

He said they had been especially impressed with the people in Texas. Their hospitality is amazing, he said.

DeMarco said his wife Pam was the "strength" behind the effort, and it was her suggestion last Christmas that led to the trip.

"The kids' welfare is our first concern, and if their health becomes threatened, we would have to end the venture," he said.

The family intended to be in Friona Tuesday, but encountered some difficulty when the tractor lost power upon reaching Black. They pulled behind the elevator and spent the night Tuesday, and were to spend Wednesday and Thursday at the Budget Motel in Friona, expecting to get back on the road by Friday.

They have been averaging about 25 miles per day.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1939

The nicest parade, perhaps, to have ever traversed Friona's streets, was the Armistice Day parade, that was given last Saturday afternoon. The parade was under the auspices of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary and sponsored and arranged by these organizations and the entertainment committee of the local Chamber of Commerce.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1944

Just as the Chiefs were getting ready to play their last game of the season and pack their suits away, they found themselves in a tie for the district championship. The Chiefs defeated the Tulia Hornets earlier in the season, and then fell to the Hereford Whitefaces. Tulia, then, stinging from the defeat handed them by the Chiefs, ran roughshod over the Hereford eleven. This makes Hereford and Friona all even, and Tulia still has a game to play with Dalhart, and could make it a three-way tie.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1949

Don Edwin Lewis, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona, will be the featured soloist on the Co-op round-up radio program over Station KFDA, Amarillo, on Saturday. Young Lewis will sing two songs, "The Old Refrain" and "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling."

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 19, 1954

Organization of a local credit association Tuesday evening became a reality for Parmer County. The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union now chartered, completed organization at an open meeting in the Friona Legion Hall, with all supervisory personnel elected.

Investigating officers said the right front tire on the 1967 Ford LTD blew out, causing the car to turn over. The vehicle skidded some 250 feet. Both occupants were thrown out of the car.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1974

The cotton harvest season was kicked off here Friday when Jean K. Anthony brought a bale in to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, the gin's first bale of 1974 cotton. The first bale weighed an even 500 pounds, and yielded 760 pounds of seed. The turnout averaged 26.1 per cent.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1979

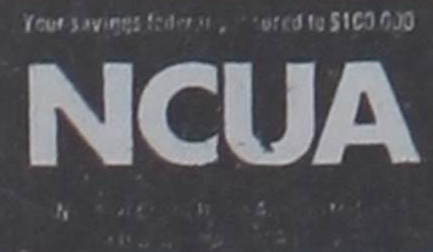

In order to control the local school superintendent the state appoints a state superintendent of schools to control the local superintendent of each school district. 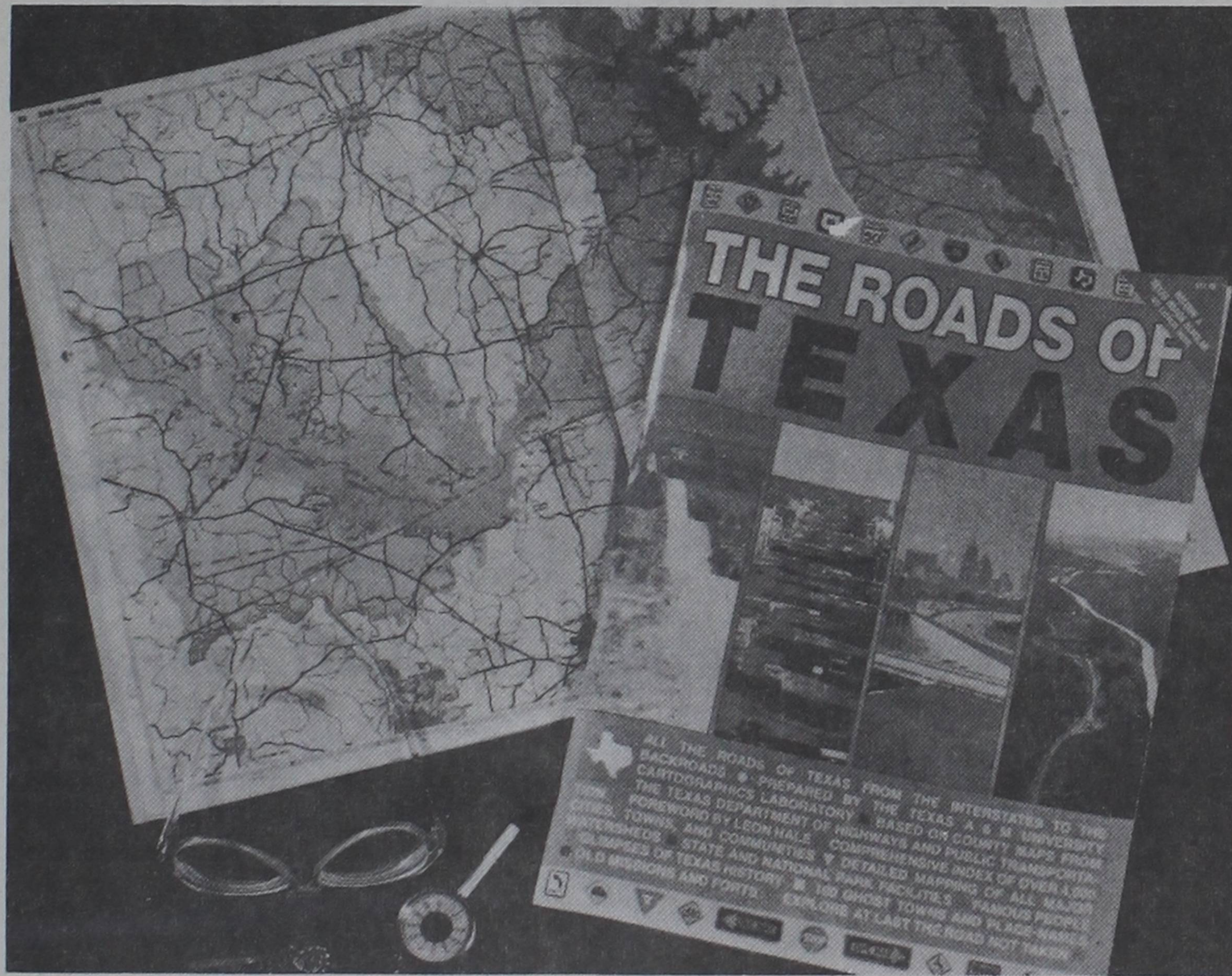

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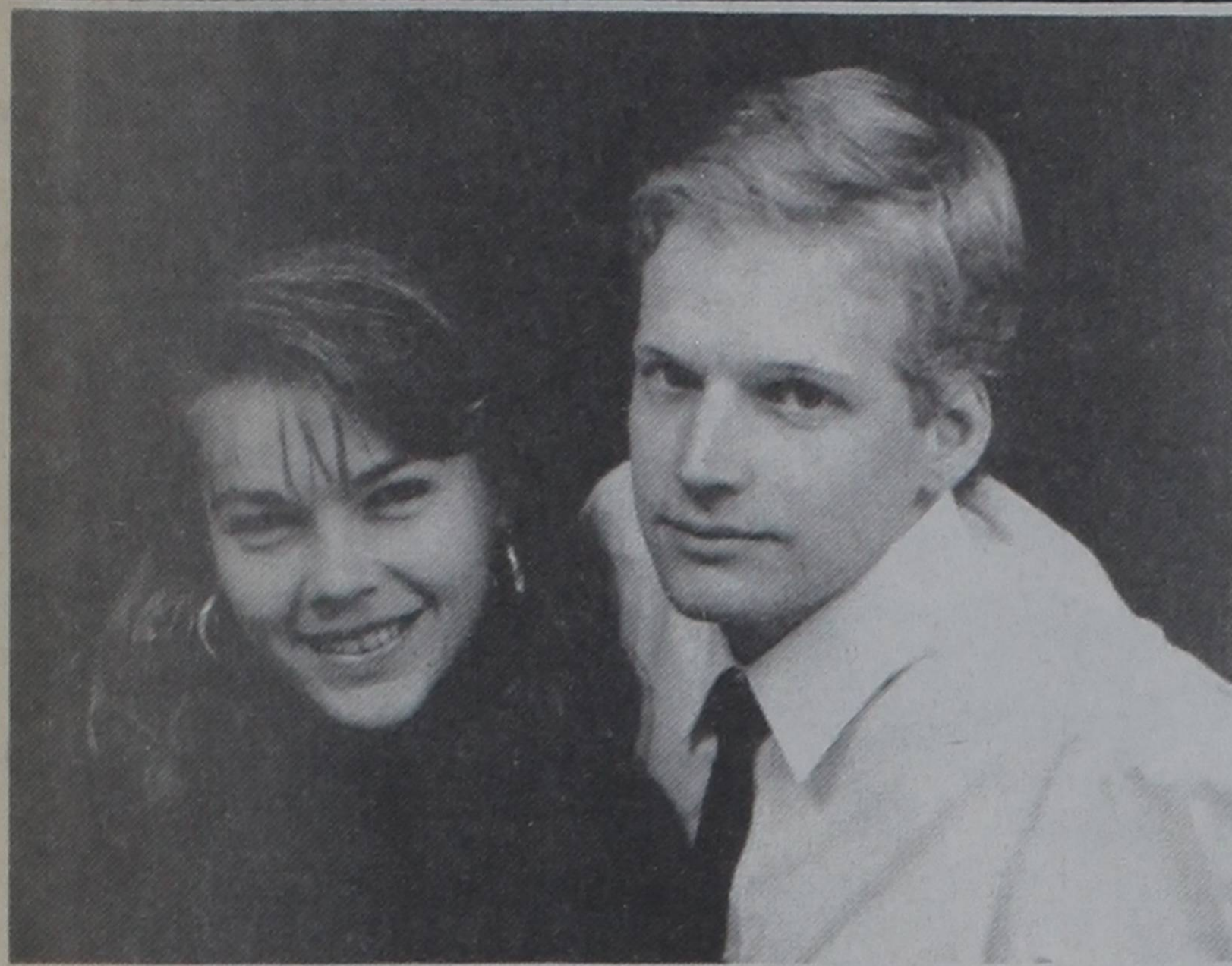

DPS Gives Accident Summary

Capt. Rusty Davis, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of October, our troopers investigated five fatal accidents, 78 personal injury accidents, and 110 property damage accidents. There were five persons killed and 132 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Marshall Henderson of Hereford stated, "In Parmer County, our troopers investigated no fatal accidents, seven personal injury accidents, and two property damage accidents in the month of October. No one was killed, but 17 persons were injured in these accidents."

Module XIV: Mutual Funds Help Spread Risk

If you're looking for the most important rule of investing, diversification is high on the list. Whether you call it spreading your risk or not putting all your eggs in one basket, it means one thing--adding safety to your investment program.

Mutual funds have traditionally offered a simple way to diversify and guard against major setbacks without giving up the potential of future gains. Yet to pull all your money into one mutual fund might not offer enough diversification to satisfy you.

If this is the case, consider three basic ways to use mutual funds with other investments for more diversification.

1. Buy a balanced fund. These funds, also called total-return funds, divide their portfolios between stocks and bonds. Generally the percentages are flexible enough to allow the fund managers the discretion of being top heavy in either stocks or bonds yet not so liberal as to allow them to chase after trends.

2. Buy certificates of deposit for guarantee of principal, and invest the interest in a common-stock mutual fund. Now, your only risk is the income because your original investment is returned to you when the CD matures. Plan this strategy

on a five- or ten-year program. This lets you select a mutual fund that has a consistent record of gains during that particular time frame.

One recent study hypothetically invested the 8 percent interest paid quarterly from a \$100,000, 10-year CD into a conservative growth-and-income fund. That reinvested interest grew to \$174,000 with the original \$100,000 still intact.

3. Split your investment between U.S. Treasury zero-coupon bonds and a mutual fund. Again, none of your original principal is at risk. For example, in today's market with \$100,000 to invest, you could purchase U.S. Treasury zeros for about \$45,000 and place the remaining \$55,000 in a high-quality mutual fund.

In 10 years, the zero-coupon bonds would mature at \$100,000, your original total investment, and your mutual fund, compounding at a reasonable 12 percent, would be worth more than \$170,000.

By using either U.S. Treasury zeros or certificates of deposit and holding the investment until maturity, your original principal is not at risk. You could lose everything in the mutual fund and still have your original investment.

There are numerous variations of these three risk-spreading techniques. The idea is to invest in such a way that over a period of time your original principal will be returned to you. Diversification can do this.

Notice Of Public Hearing On The Taxation Of Tangible Personal Property

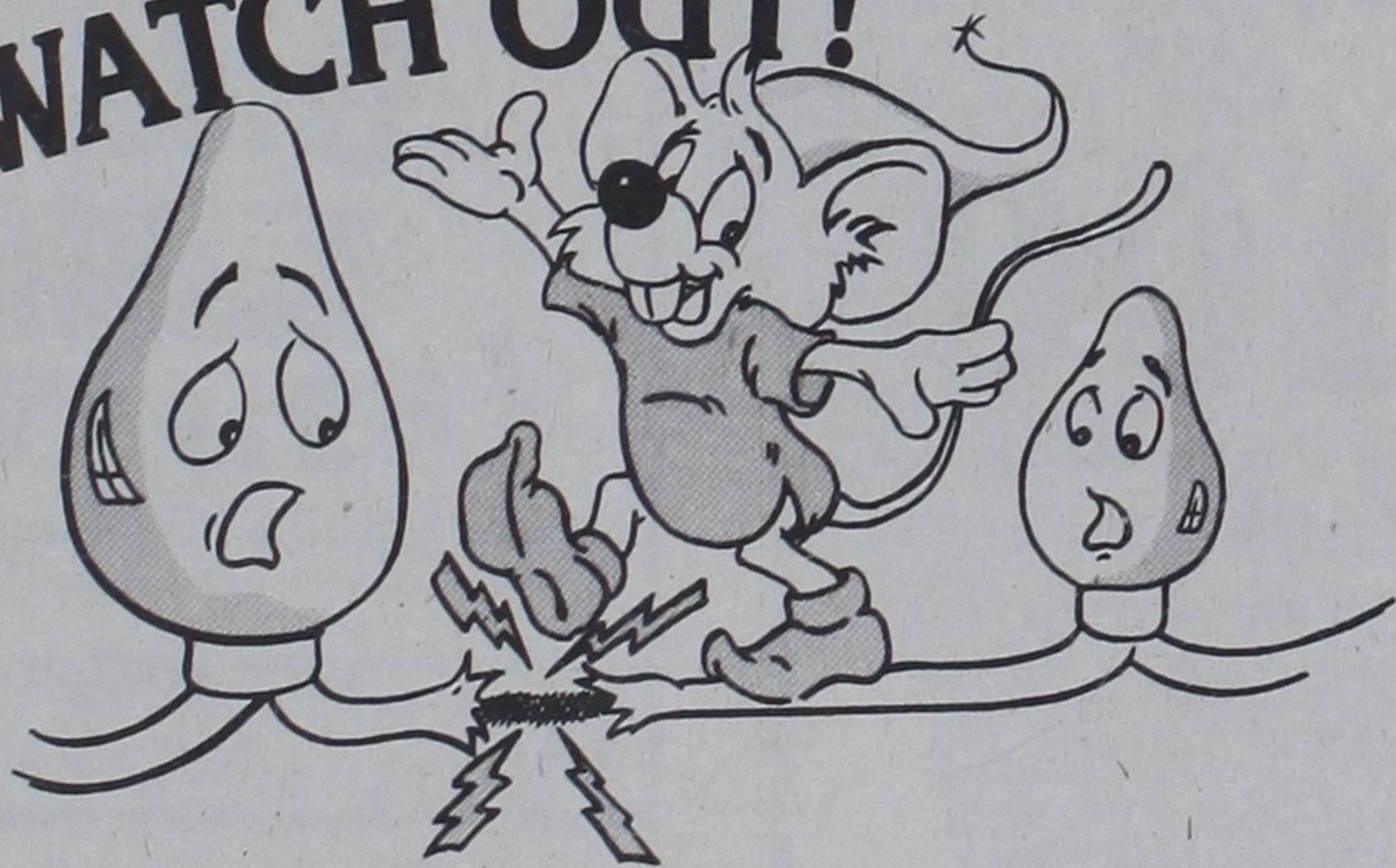
House Bill 82, passed by the 71st Legislature, amends Section 11.14 of the Tax Code and provides that all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, that is not held or used for the production of income is exempt from property taxes. House Bill 82 further provides that the governing body of a taxing unit may, by official action, continue the taxation of tangible personal property.

The Board of Trustees of the Lazbuddie Independent School District will conduct a PUBLIC HEARING to continue the policy of taxing all tangible personal property on November 27, 1989 at 8:15 a.m. in the Board Room of the Administrative Offices, Lazbuddie Schools.

- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

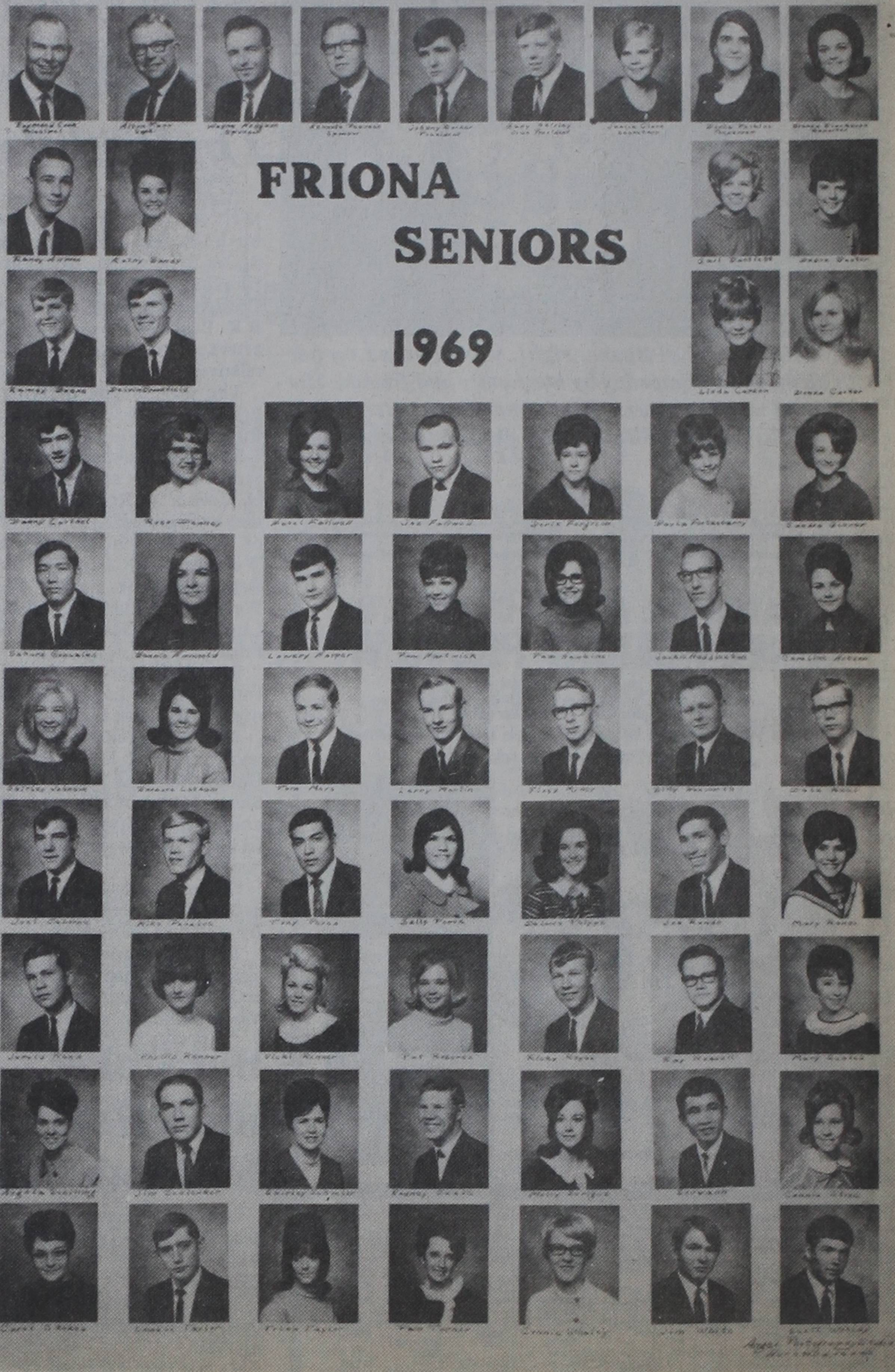

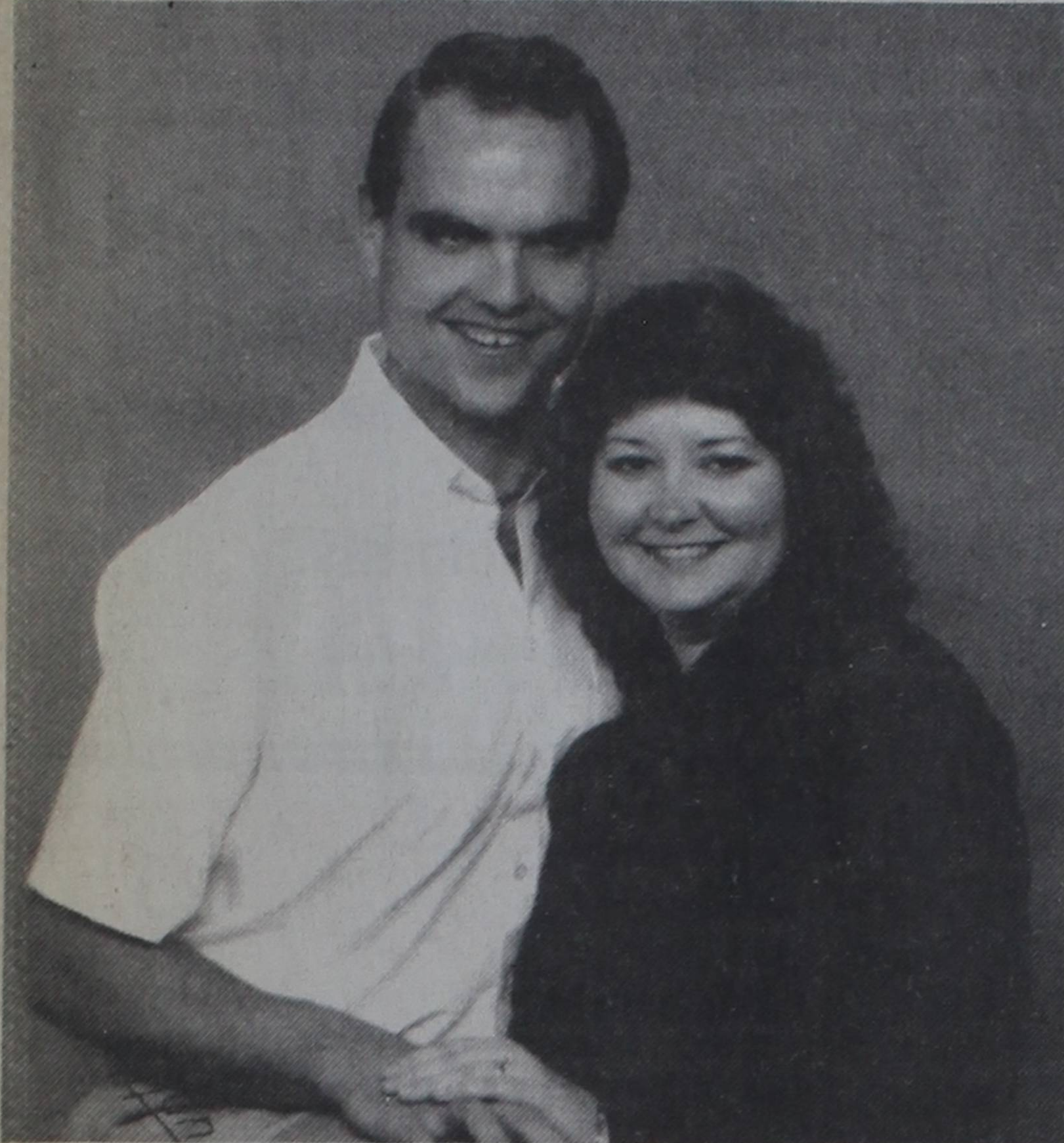

About a year ago, Glen Shot of Clovis wasn't sure if he would be able to keep his "Winter Wonderland" open.

Each year the gala display of light had gotten bigger and each year the bills for his favorite hobby had grown.

The work of putting up the display began the first of October and it kept Shot and his family busy all through the Christmas season. The only reward they had was the joy of Clovis area residents who enjoyed the lights.

Insects Are Seeking Homes For Winter

Insects are beginning to look for a place to spend the winter, said Mike D. Blanton, a county entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most of the insects are just looking for a place to overwinter and are not establishing permanent residences.

These insects will be a nuisance and most of them do not present a great danger to the homeowner.

It is not uncommon for insects to enter attics or garages through cracks in the foundation, open windows or spaces around doors.

The agent said mechanical control is possible by caulking all

cracks to prevent insect entry. Caulking also makes the structure more air-tight and should help lower heating costs.

Store firewood away from the house to help eliminate hiding places for pests.

Homeowners should store firewood as far from the house as possible and take only the amount needed for immediate use into the house.

"Firewood stacked beside the house may be handy but as the wood warms, spiders, scorpions, and other pests may leave the wood and escape to other areas of the house," Blanton said.

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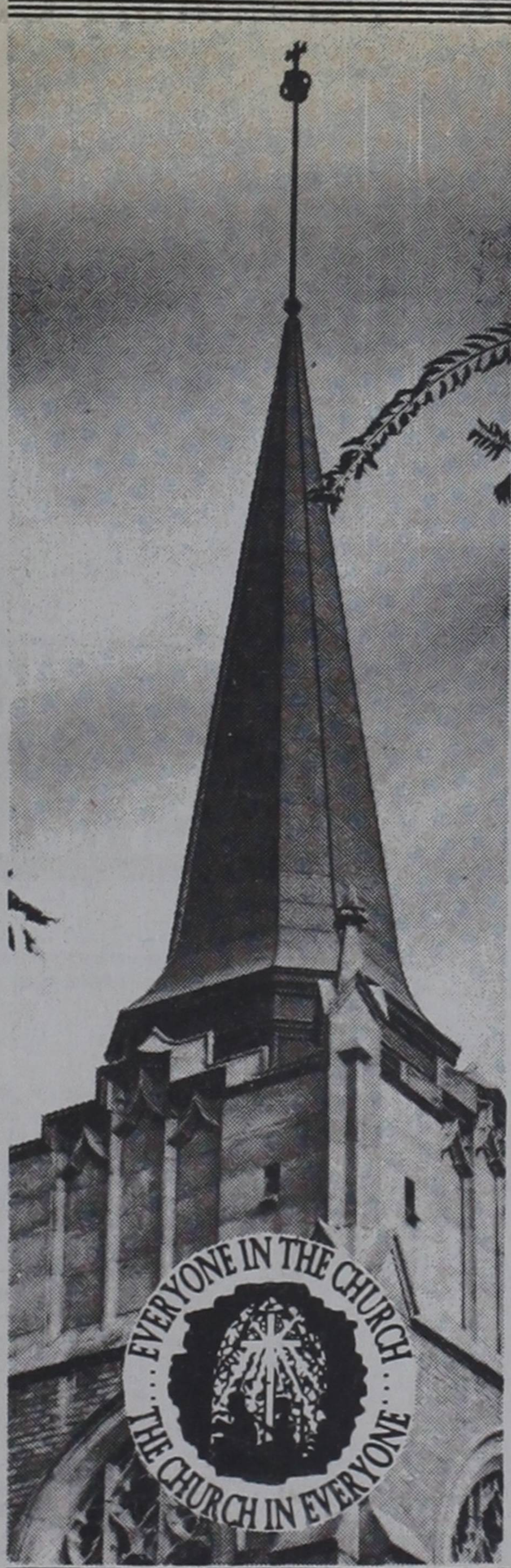
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A PLACE TO PRAY

Cattle Insecticide Tags Need Removed

Ranchers who used insecticide ear tags for horn fly and ear tick control this past spring and summer should remove the old tags this fall.

"Tags that have been used four to five months on an animal will not emit sufficient insecticide to adequately control fly populations," said Mike D. Blanton, county entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past three fly seasons, use of pyrethroid-impreg-

nated ear tags has created a statewide problem with horn fly resistance to the insecticide.

As ranchers work with their cattle this fall, they should remove the old tags.

The ear tag system for fly control exerts a constant selection pressure on the pest population and results in killing the weakest and most susceptible pests. Other pests that have the genetic ability to survive a sub-lethal dose of insecticide become parents for the next generation. Within a two-year

period, this selection process can develop a pest population highly resistant to all labeled chemicals of the pyrethroid type.

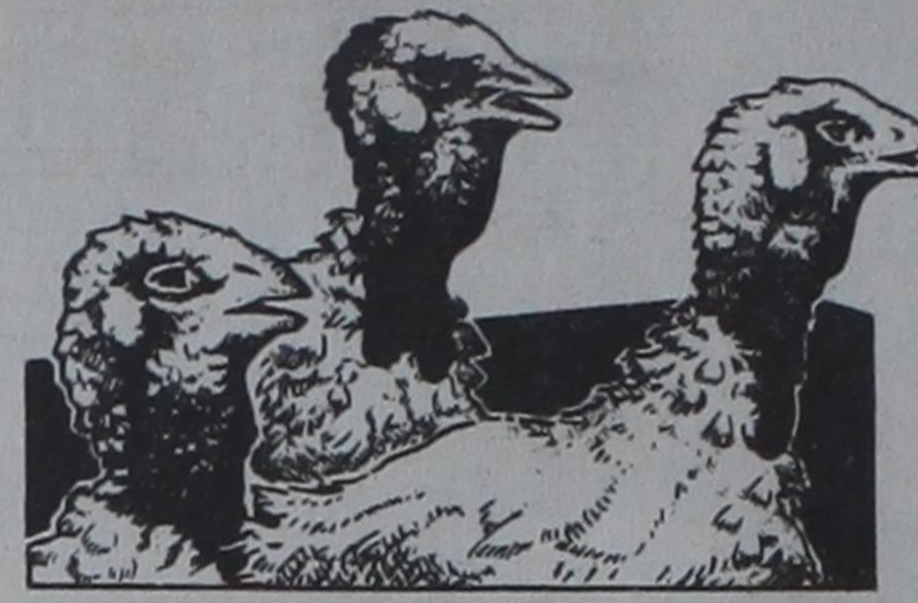
Producers may get a false impression that the old ear tags are still killing flies, since populations naturally decrease in the fall as flies enter overwintering quarters.

"The old ear tag is not helping with control but is silently adding to selection pressure, thus making the surviving population more resistant to the target insecticide," said Blanton.

Fewer hours of daylight in the fall and cooler weather are environmental factors that induce pest diapause. Horn flies spend the winter months in the soil as a diapause pupa.

Fall fly tag removal is just a good management practice to reduce additional resistance to the list of insecticides.

"When insect pests become resistant to an insecticide class, the economic incentive for future use of that compound is greatly reduced," said Blanton.
