## Rogers Holds On To Win Contest

Koby Rogers turned out to be a good pace-setter in the 1989 Friona Star football contest.

Rogers, a sophomore student at Friona High School, worked his way to the top of the standings in week number four of the contest, and either shared or held the lead outright for the rest of the way.

After being tied for the lead in weeks four and five, Rogers held a one-point lead two weeks, stretched that to two, later to three, and never faltered.

He won the grand prize event with a score of 183, to 180 for runnerup Clint Mears. Rogers received a check for \$100 and the title "football expert for 1989" for winning the event.

Don Max Vars of Canyon and Randy Weatherley tied for third with scores of 179. Charlie Morgan, Larry Rogers and Jimmy Walker were fourth with scores of 177.

Mears was the only contender to

make much of a gain in the contest's final week, scoring a 17 to Rogers' 14. But Mears had been six points behind prior to the final week.

In the final weekly contest, Dianne Morgan took first place and \$10 with a score of 18. Mrs. Morgan missed only Cleveland-Cincinnati and Indianapolis-New England on the contest slate.

Six contestants had scores of 17. They were Scott Brown of Lazbuddie, Jack Clark, Myrtle Melton, Don M. Vars, Mears and Jerry Hinkle.

From this list, the tie-breaker system was invoked, and Brown was awarded second place after missing the Dallas-Los Angeles score by 17 points.

Clark, who had a quiet (for him) year in the contest, claimed third place after missing the tie-breaker by 19 points.

The promotion is co-sponsored with the Star by 24 area businesses and industries.

## First Snowfall Yields 4 Inches

Friona residents awoke to a beautiful, 3½-inch snowfall Thursday morning, the first snowfall of the season.

The snow fell perfectly, with virtually no wind to blow it around, and left intricate designs on trees, shrubbery and other outside fixtures.

It was a wet snow, as .34 inches of moisture was the official measurement in Friona's official gauge.

The snow came almost a year to the day following the first major snowfall of 1988, which came on December 8. However, last year's snow had drifted badly, and did not yield as much economic benefit as this one should to farmland.

The week's moisture should benefit the area's wheat crop.

## U.S. "60" Contract Delayed

Bid-letting on the Highway 60 widening project has been delayed from February to May of 1990, according to Rhea Bradley, resident engineer with the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation.

Bradley said that most of the right-of-way has been acquired from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line as regards the project, except for eight parcels of land which are in condemnation suits. These are expected to be completed in early 1990.

"The REC (Deaf Smith REC) is needing to relocate some poles, and they can't get started until all of the right-of-way has been secured. In order to give them ample time to do this work, we put off the bid date three months. We hated to delay it, but saw no way around it," Bradley said.

The project will be divided into three sections. The first section to be started will be that portion of the road from Friona eastward to the Deaf Smith County line.

The second stage will be from Friona to Bovina, and the third stage will be from Bovina to Farwell.

Bradley was in Friona this week doing investigation preparatory to making plans for an expanded bridge over Frio Draw just west of Friona.

According to area residents, the bird population is down quite a bit this year.

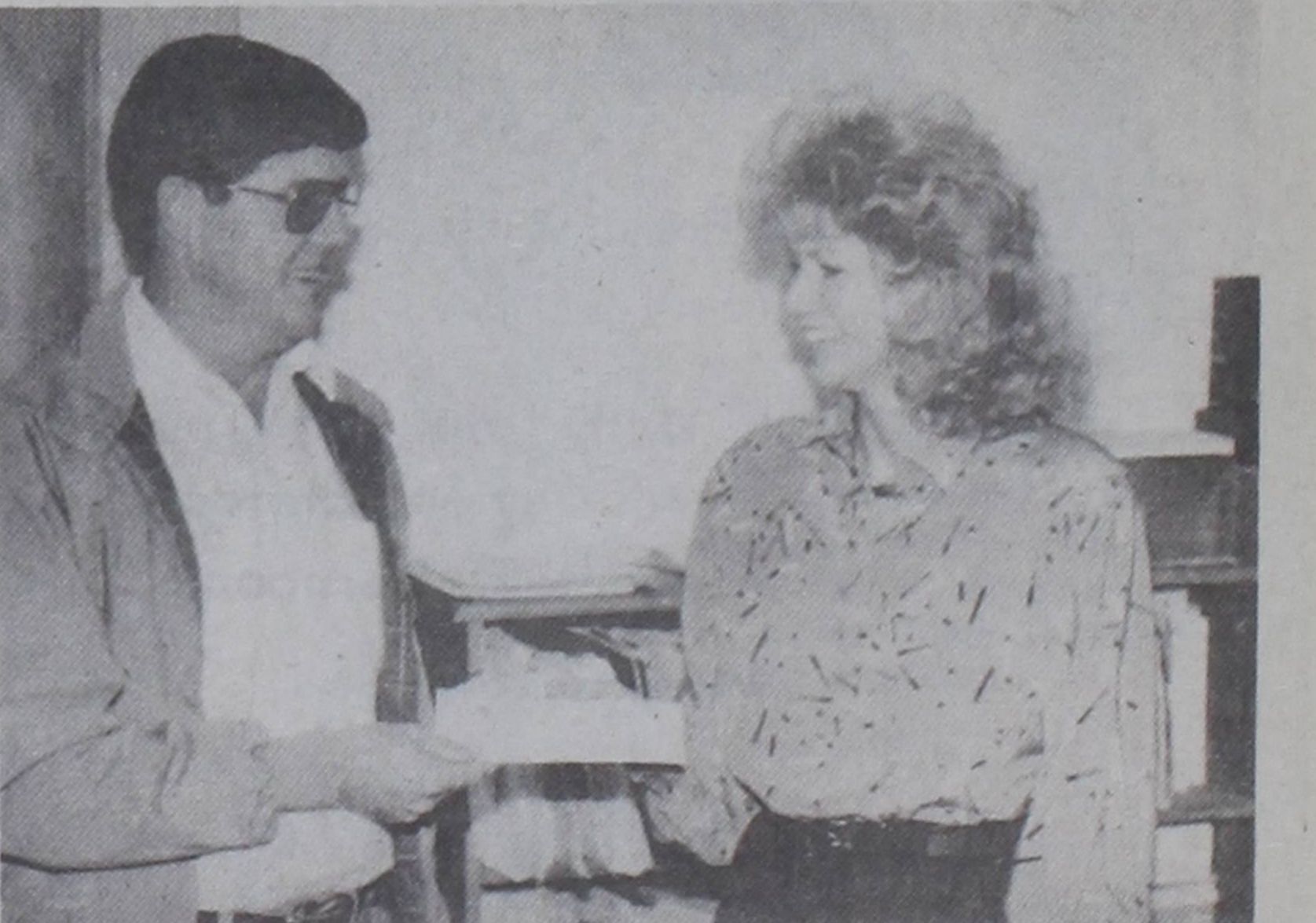
It is illegal to hunt on privately owned land without the consent of the owner. The trespass laws are very explicit and you may be charged with a misdemeanor.

**Chariots Of Fire**

On Thanksgiving Day, after the table was cleared and the football tossed around the back yard, I suggested the family watch *Chariots of Fire* for its inspirational message of hope and sacrifice. The Best Motion Picture of 1981 tells the story of Olympic sprinter, Eric Liddle. Liddle, from Great Britain, wanted to run for God's glory; he also believed in one Absolute Law, God's law. According to Liddle's convictions, the Bible prohibited running on Sundays. ("Remember the sabbath day by keeping it holy." Exodus 20: 8). Upon discovering that the Olympic qualifying heat for his race--the 100 meters--was scheduled on Sunday, he faced a major decision: should he run and lower his convictions, or maintain his convictions and lose the opportunity to run in the Olympics? He decided not to run.

When a member of the English Olympic Committee asked "Just how far does your arrogance extend?" Liddle replied, "My arrogance extends just as far as my conscience demands." Liddle understood that his athletic ability irrevocably depended upon his moral strength. If he compromised one, he would lose the other.

Although Liddle missed his chance to compete in the 100 meters, another British runner, having already won a silver medal, allowed Liddle to take his place in the 400 meters. In the movie's climax, just prior to the final race, an American runner handed Liddle words from the Old Testament, "Those who honor me, I will honor." Clutching the paper on which those words were written, Liddle won the 1924 400 meter dash in a record time of 47.6 seconds.

That special movie is good for watching on special days because it reminds us of the value of sacrifice--of giving up something of value to gain something of greater value. Each day we are faced with moral and ethical choices. During the holiday season we become more mindful, perhaps, of how these choices determine the life we will live.

Fred Hartley, in his book, *What's Right, What's Wrong In An Upside-Down World*, discusses four major value systems that determine the life we lead.

According to the Humanistic Value System, man is of ultimate value--whatever is good for man is the highest good. The Materialistic Value System places money and possessions at the zenith--whatever enables us to accumulate material wealth is the highest good. The Hedonistic Value System puts pleasure as the highest good--whatever gives us pleasure is the aim of life. To Christians, the highest value is a life in Christ. Christianity, an ethic of self-abnegation, differs from the self-centered value systems. "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel, will save it." (Mark 8: 34-35)

Former all-pro football player Bubba Smith, had the courage to forfeit material gain for integrity. After retiring from professional football, Smith became chief spokesman for a brewery. Soon, Smith began to notice that elementary school kids, when asking for his autograph, could recite lines from his beer commercials verbatim. On his public appearances he noticed how his presence gave tacit approval to public drunkenness. Smith, realizing that he was becoming wealthy supporting a way of life of which he disapproved, decided to withdraw from beer commercials. Although the beer company quickly replaced him with another awesome former athlete and beer sales continued to soar, Smith's decision to sacrifice some significant financial rewards enabled him to gain something of far greater value--integrity. Bubba Smith demonstrated that maintaining the courage of our convictions enables us to cultivate authenticity and honesty.

Films like *Chariots of Fire* and people like Bubba Smith remind us of the importance of a non-self-centered value system. Just as our Pilgrim fathers and mothers sacrificed for their religious beliefs, we too, can choose an uncompromising ethic to give our lives meaning and purpose.

The score was held at that point until two minutes before the end of the game, when their opponents rushed in for a touchdown and took the win, 14-13.

The Friona Police Department received 225 calls during the month of November.

**30 YEARS AGO--DEC. 3, 1959**

Martell LeVeque was awarded the grand prize of an all-expense paid trip to the Cotton Bowl this coming New Year's following the last weekly contest in the Star. This contest, first of its kind held locally, drew interest all over the local area, and over 100 persons took part in the contest during the past 12 weeks.

## B.K. Buske Announces For Judge

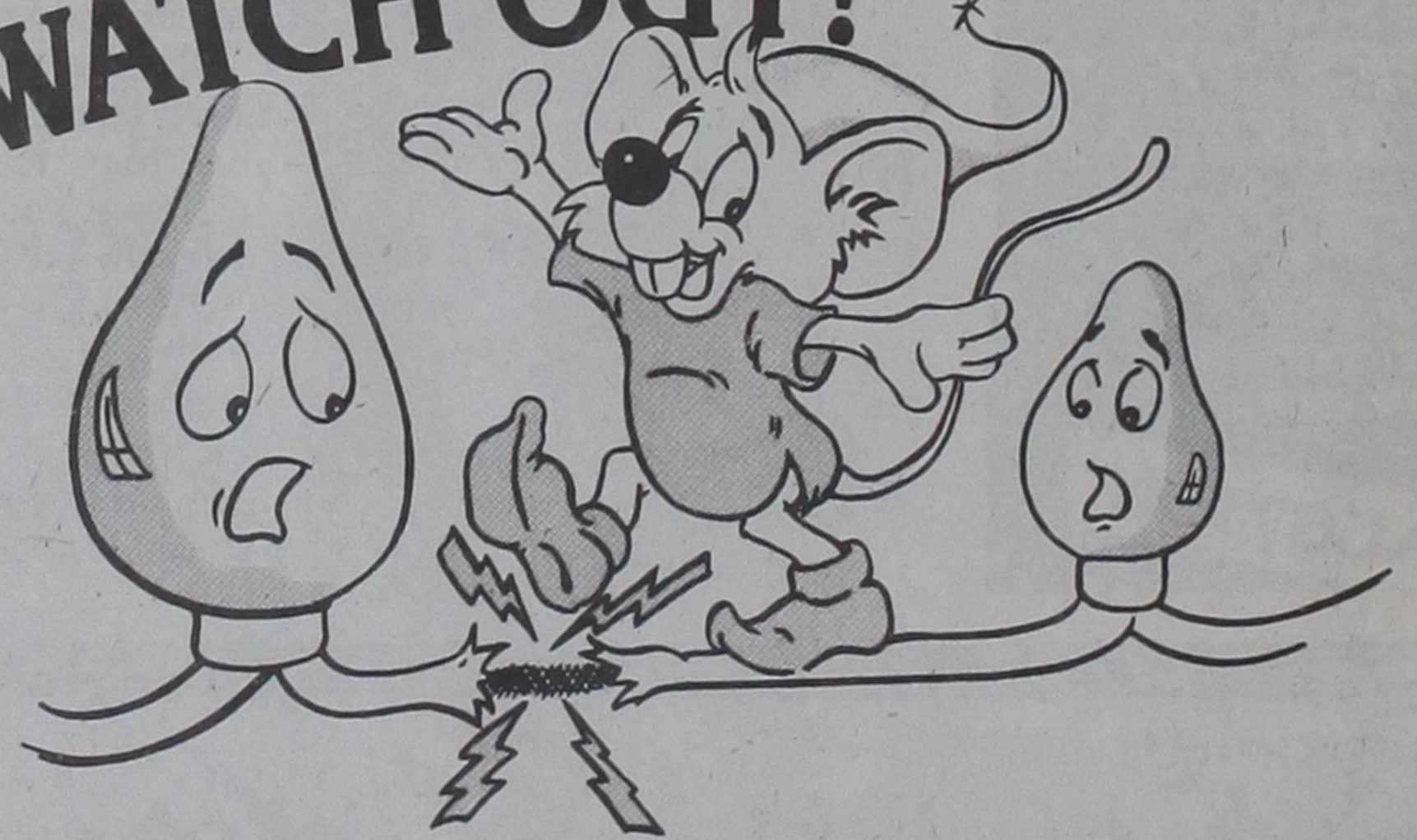

**A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK**

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

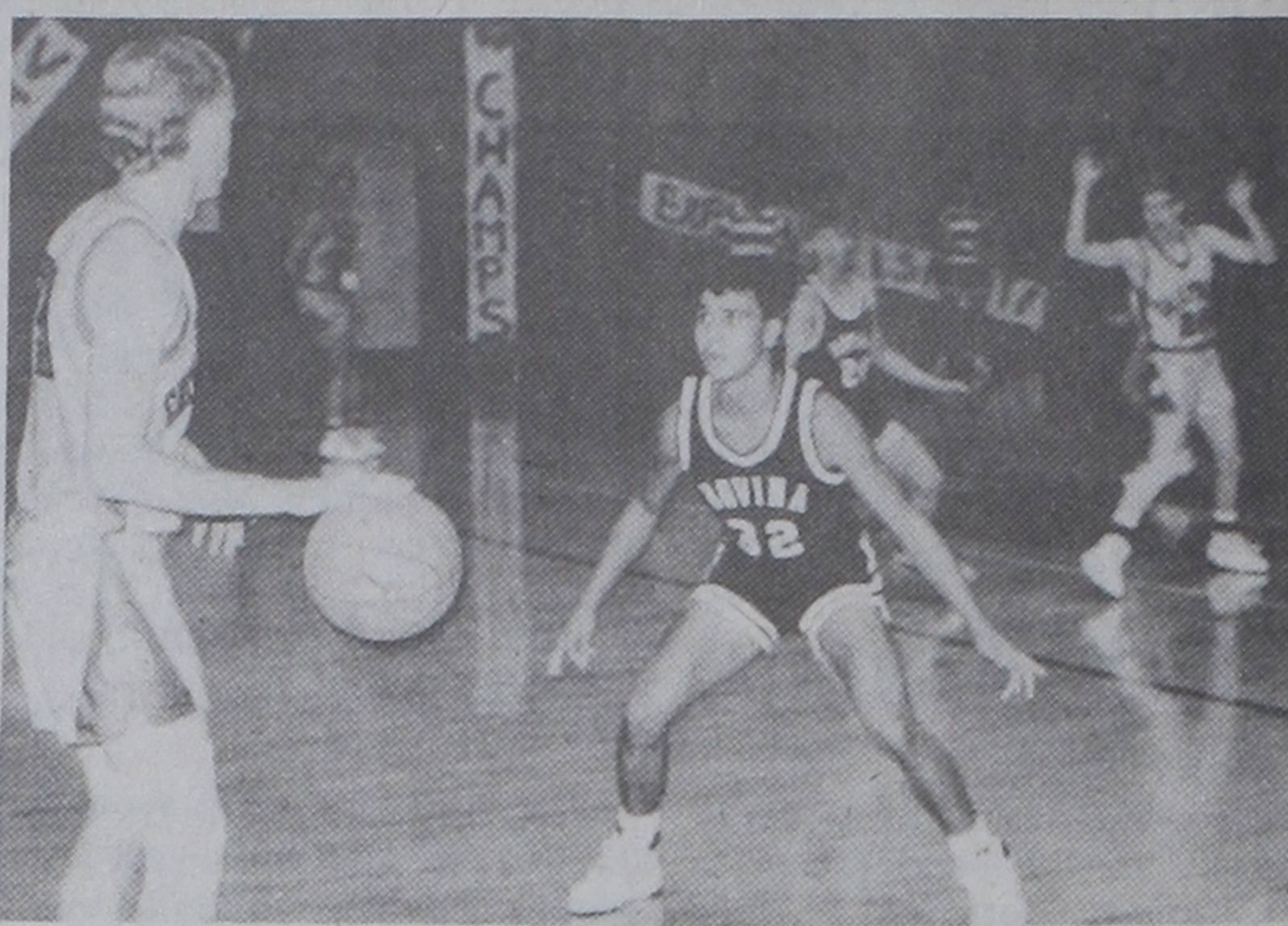

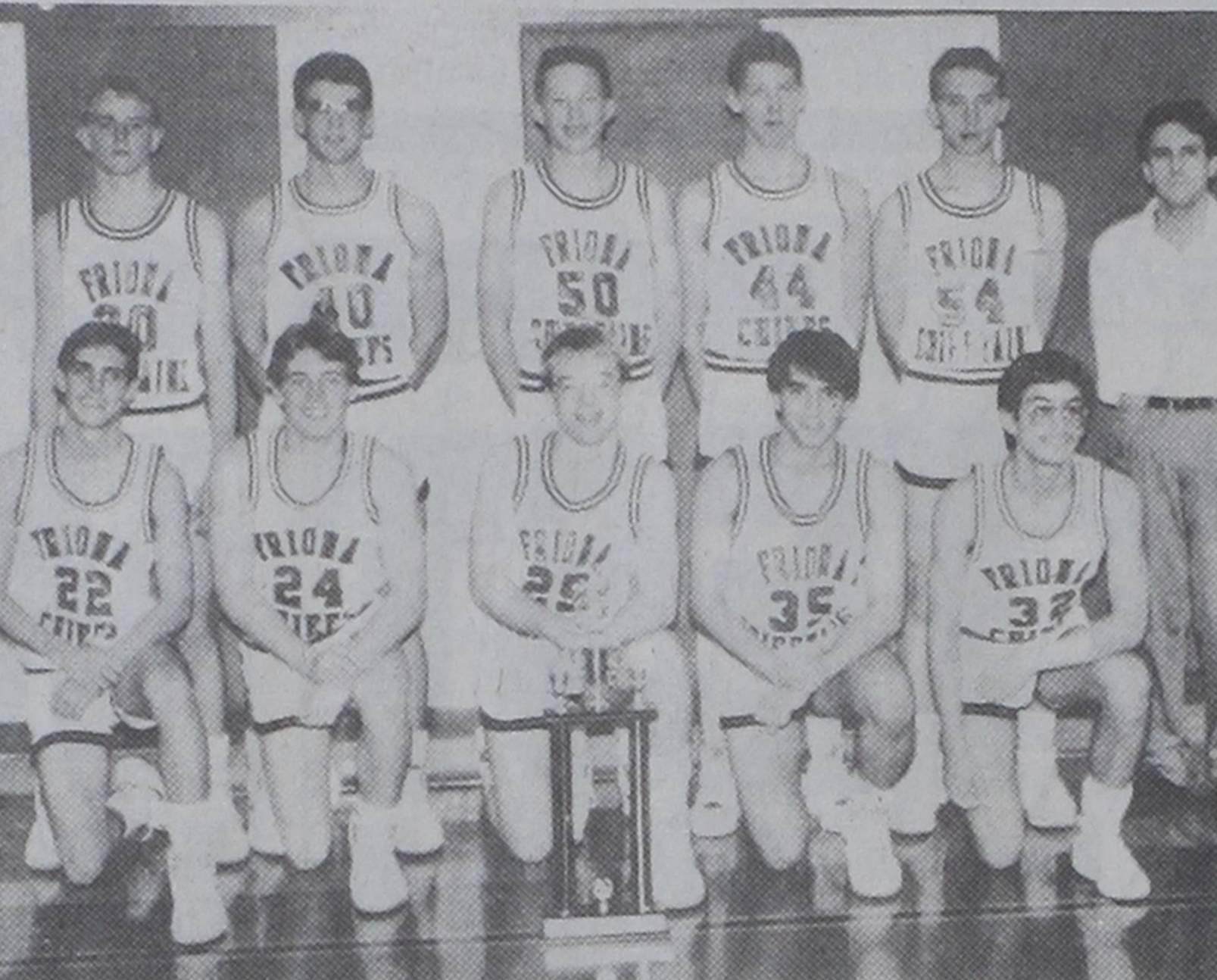

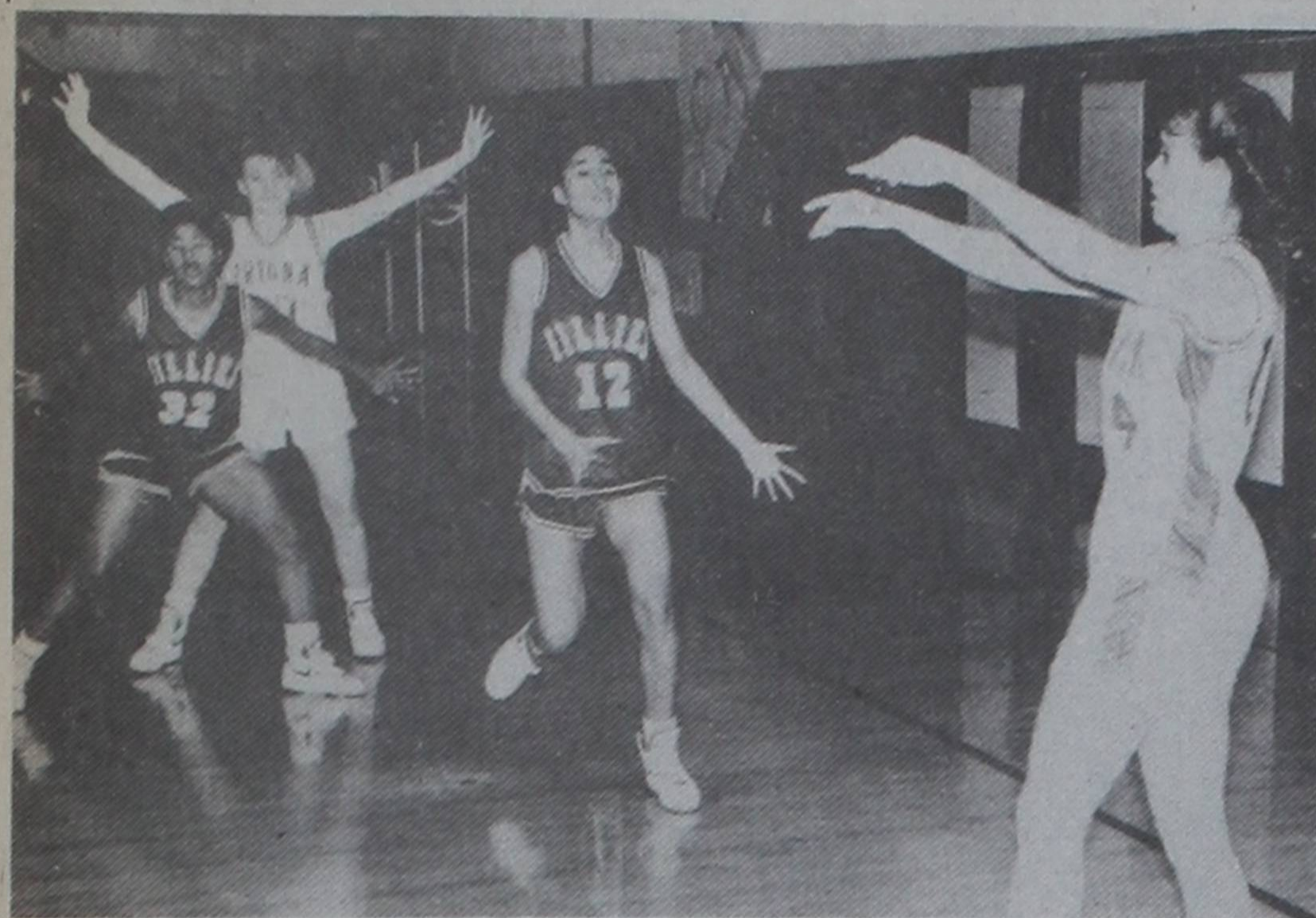

## Dr. Alexander Has Part In Study

Robert S. Alexander, M.D., a local physician, is participating in a unique nationwide medical study to evaluate the effects of a new antihypertensive treatment. Dr. Alexander is one of 900 doctors who have been selected to participate in the antihypertension program.

This study, sponsored by Tulane University School of Medicine through an educational grant from Abbott Laboratories, is the first known study involving community physicians in which all results are recorded and submitted by computer to a prominent medical institution. The program will involve up to 25,000 patients.

The new antihypertensive has already been cleared for use by physicians in the United States. The study is designed to measure long-term hypertension control and patient compliance. Updates

and final results of the program will be available to the medical community throughout the country via Tulane's database.

Dr. Alexander, a graduate of the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, has been practicing in Friona for 24 years.

## Lambert Is Found Guilty

Travis Gene Lambert was found guilty by a Parmer County jury on Wednesday of last week in the shooting of Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman. The shooting took place last July.

He received the maximum sentence of 99 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. Lambert is expected to appeal the verdict.

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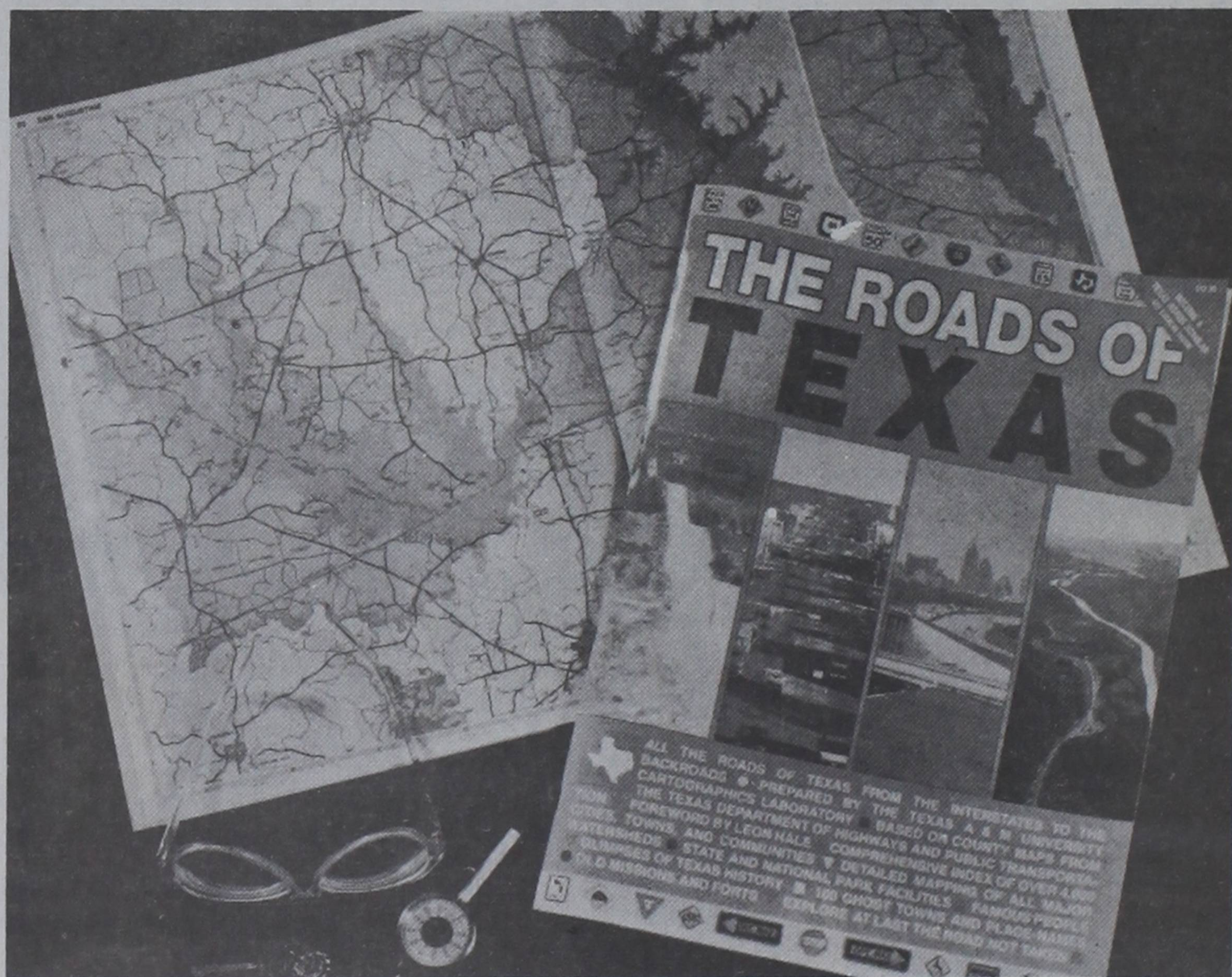
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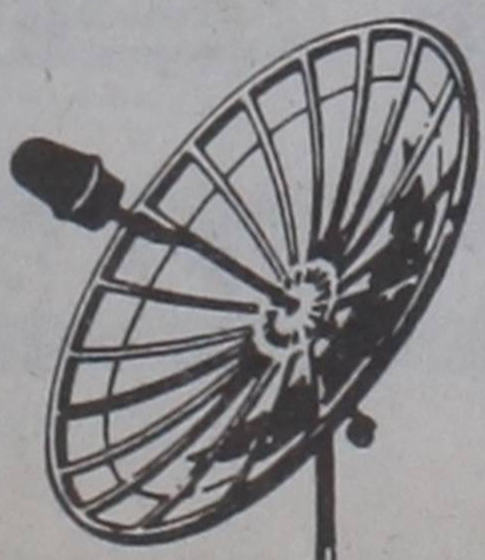
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# Tracy Horton, Barry Bowden United In Church Ceremony

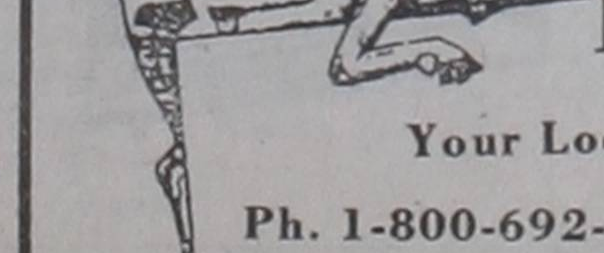
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# County Food Show Winners Are Given

### Module XV: Understand Preferred Stocks Before You Invest

Some investors incorrectly identify preferred stocks with fixed-income debt investments such as bonds. Although preferred stocks carry more income predictability, they're still equity investments whose worth, and often dividends, rise and fall with the success of the company.

Generally, preferred stock pays a fixed dividend. For example, unless there's a written provision to the contrary, a \$3.50 preferred stock pays a \$3.50 dividend each year and cannot be increased regardless of the company's earnings.

On the other hand, if economics dictate, the board of directors can choose to pay no dividends to preferred holders. Whether or not the shareholder eventually receives these passed dividends depends upon the type of preferred stock. With a cumulative preferred stock, passed dividends are accumulated and must be paid to preferred stockholders before dividends are paid to the holders of common stock. On the other hand, a passed dividend on noncumulative preferred stock is generally gone forever. As you can see, if income is important in your investment plan, complete understanding of the type of preferred stock you own is essential.

For investors who like the equity benefits of stocks, there's participating preferred stock. Participating preferred stock entitles its holders, like the holders of common stock, to share in profits above and beyond the regular declared dividend.

Nonparticipating preferred stock is limited to the stipulated dividend.

Another, but not as common, preferred stock is adjustable-rate preferred stock. This unique preferred stock pays a dividend that's adjusted, usually quarterly, to the Treasury-bill rate or other money-market rates.

Finally, there's a convertible preferred stock that's exchangeable into a given number of common-stock shares, usually at a predetermined price. Since this preferred stock is directly associated with common stock, it's more volatile in market price than the nonconvertible preferred stock, which behaves more like a fixed-income bond.

To receive the higher dividends preferred stocks offer, you may have to sacrifice some benefits of ownership. Each holder of common stock has the right to vote on company policy and is allowed one vote for every stock share owned. A stockholder may exercise this vote in person, at the annual stockholders meeting, or by proxy. Although preferred stockholders are welcome at this meeting, they often have no voting rights. While this may be of little importance to you, it's a restrictive feature you should know about.

The important thing to remember about preferred stock is that it's an equity investment and there are risks associated. Corporations are the usual buyers of preferred stock primarily because the dividends are 70 percent tax exempt for a corporate holder. If your only reason for owning preferred stock is safety of principal and current income, perhaps you should consider alternative investments.

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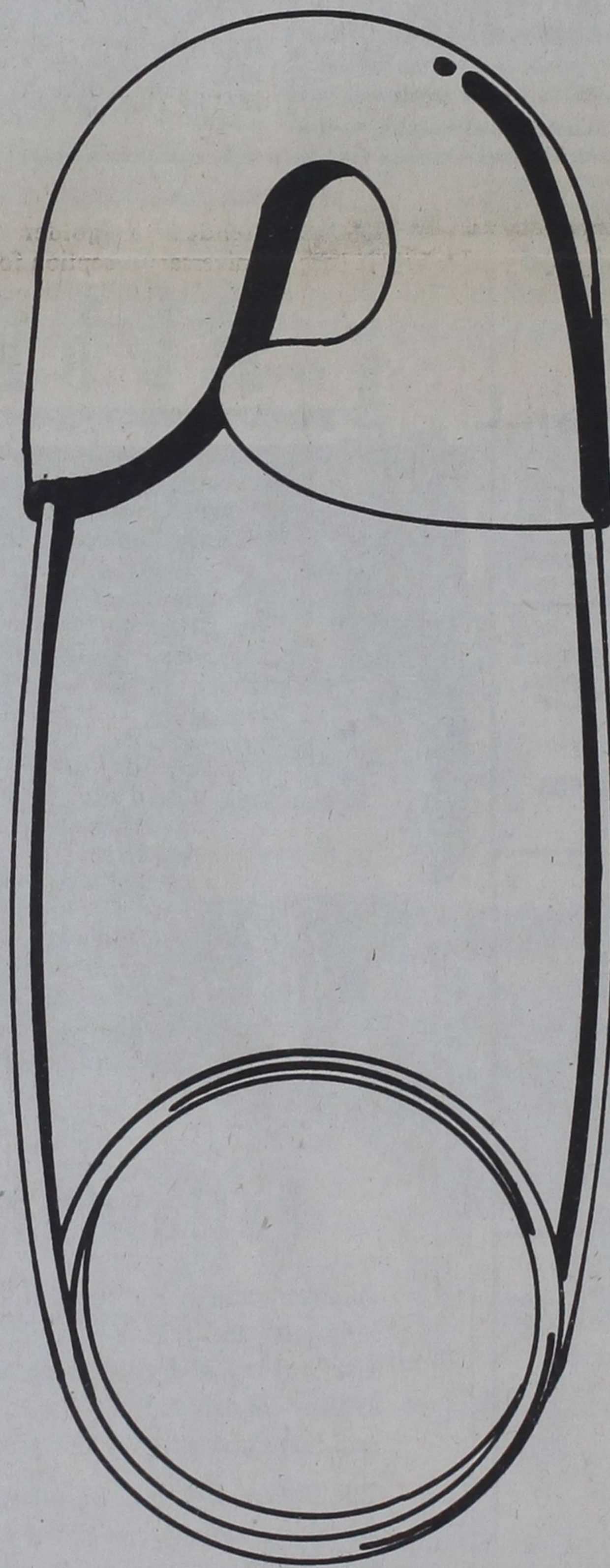
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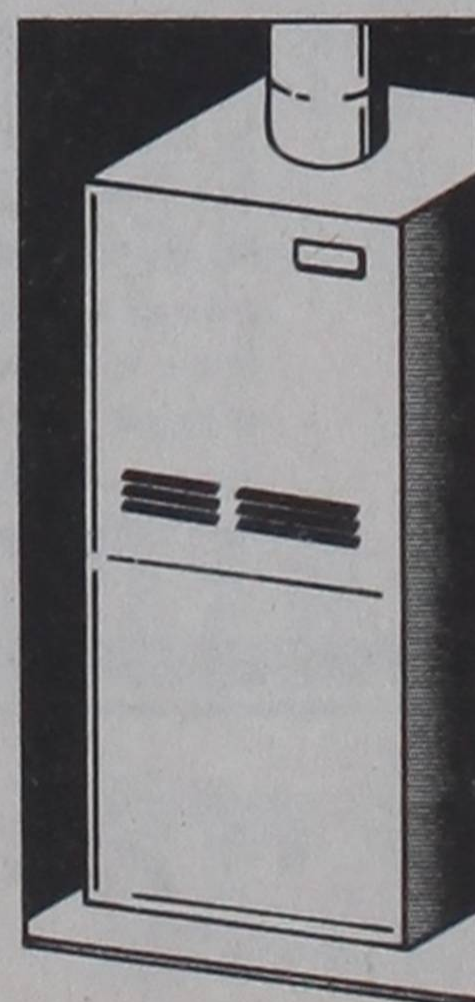
