YOU MAY NOT fully realize it, but the 1980s decade is just about a "goner." At the time you read this, only about two weeks remain in the year 1989, and in the 1980s decade.

If you had hoped to accomplish something in this decade, then you'd better get a move on.

Earlier this month, we noticed a company advertising "The last really big sale of the 1980s," and for some reason, it was hard to believe that, like sands of an hour glass, the 1980s decade is slowly slipping away.

What will the 1980s be remembered for?

A lot of things have come to pass during the last ten years. We have had some good developments, but at the same time we have seen the emergence of the biggest health threat in decades, with the AIDS virus.

It may turn out that events happening as the year 1989 winds down may be the most significant, at least from a political standpoint.

Events in Eastern Europe in the past few weeks and months are causing a new day to dawn in some of those countries. In recent weeks, with the fall of the Berlin Wall, we have been able to see history as it was being made.

Residents of such places as Eastern Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia are demanding a change in their governments, to the point that Russian leaders are shaking in their boots.

The "Old Line" communism appears to be on the way out, and this will mark a historic change.

With the emergence of Mikhail Gorbachev, we have seen the leaders of the Soviet Union and the Deadline United States come together with a lot more hope, trust and expectation.

This has raised more hopes for an end to the Cold War between the two super-powers, although some longtime political observers are warning us that we don't want to get too chummy with the Russian Bear.

But even though we have to keep our guard up, it gives you a lot to think about, and to hope for, especially at this time of the year, when Peace on Earth is spotlighted.

What a blessing it would be if, indeed, we could begin cutting back millions (or billions) of dollars which have been spent for defense each year, and use this money for more humanitarian purposes.

If, as the new 1990s decade dawns, we really could consider turning our swords into plowshares, what an improved world it could be, if mothers would not have to worry about their sons having to march off to war, as they have had to do in World Wars I and II, the Korean Conflict and in Vietnam during this century, just to name a few.

EVERY YEAR when you turn over the calendar year, you have to get used to writing the new year's number. Most years, you just have to remember to change one number (a five to a six, an eight to a nine, etc.)

This January 1, however, we'll have to remember to change two numbers, since '89 changes to '90.

And consider this: in ten more years, the 20th century will come to a close with the end of 1999, and like your old car's odometer passing a milestone, the year 2000 will dawn.

On that January 1, for the first time in 1,000 years, people will have to remember to change not eq one, not two or even three of the past, he FOUR. As our friend Ar Echols would say, exciting." Arctic Air **Blasts Area**

The Friona area has been reeling under the onslaught of Arctic cold this week, which brought the season's coldest temperatures, but very little moisture.

The first cold spell, which blew in last Sunday, brought a low temperature of seven degrees and wind chill of -20 by Tuesday morning, and a frigid "high" temperature on Monday of only 19 degrees.

Just under an inch of blowing snow was measured in the official Friona guage, and the "melt" necessary and the commission was very dry as well as light.

Moss Resigns Grid Position

The Friona School board accepted the resignation of head football coach and athletic director Tommy Moss at its regular meeting on Monday, December 11.

Moss' contract was slated to be reviewed by the board in early 1990. He was on the second year of a two-year contract with the school.

He will leave after posing a 47-44-2 record as Chieftain coach, making him the winningest grid coach in FHS history, as well as the one with the longest tenure (nine seasons). The team's 3-17 record of the past two years pulled his overall record down considerably.

"I felt it was time to move on," commented Moss.

Moss became head football coach in 1981-82, and stopped a losing trend. He guided the Chieftains into the playoffs on two different occasions, and had them challenging in other years.

Moss coached Friona's first-ever football win in post-season play, a property. 14-10 win over Perryton in 1986. That year the team also compiled its best season record ever, of 9-3, dropping a last-minute 15-13 game to Kermit in the area finals.

The credits allowed companies like SPS to reduce their federal income tax payments by a percentage of their Gora investment in new plants and equipment.

way in which SPS could record the credits to its earnings. It also Sunday ordered the company to retroactively restate its financial results as if the FERC-preferred method had been in place since 1972. The appeals court said the retroactive portion of the FERC's order was improper.

On November 22, 1989, the FERC issued its final order, in compliance with the court's ruling. SPS last week completed its analysis of the FERC's order.

The FERC's decision preserves the rate-making treatment used by SPS prior to 1983. The decision also established the guidelines for future rate-making practices.

"Both SPS and the wholesale customers it serves have been involved in this legal entanglement for the past few years," Gibson said. "With this final decision by FERC, we hope to put this matter behind us and continue our efforts to provide competitive electric service to the cooperatives and other wholesale customers.

A total of twenty-one students from Friona and two from Lazbuddie have been included in the 23rd annual edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1988-89.

Who's Who, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are nominated by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99 per cent of Who's Who students have a grade point average of "B" or better and 97 per cent are college bound.

Who's Who students also compete for over \$65,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The book is distributed to 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities, and public libraries throughout the country.
