

CLYDE FIREMEN PUT FIRST NEW TRUCK INTO SERVICE

CLYDE — The first new fire truck, of three planned for the Volunteer Fire Dept., was placed in service May 25, 1974. The truck was designed for grass and structure fires by members of the Department. The unit was built by W. D. (Nig) Warren, a longtime member of the Fire Department.

Heading the design committee was Mike Moran, an engineer with WTU and a two-year member of the Fire Department. All firemen helped with labor on the truck, as well as other equipment being rebuilt. The new truck replaces the one lost in the Feb. 11 explosion north of Clyde.

Another new truck has been received and is being built to carry emergency equipment and protective gear. The truck will also be designed to handle small fires, and will have several combined uses, serving the purpose of rescue, fire, equipment and protective gear, and will be radio equipped to assist in weather warning, in cooperation with Area Civil Defense.

A third truck has been ordered, and will be designed for rural, as well as city structure fires and will serve as a grass fire unit. These trucks are replacing the one destroyed and two military trucks which are worn out. These trucks have failed several times to reach a fire, due to poor condition, and replacement of some kind would be with one in about the same condition.

The Fire Department is very grateful to area people who got

behind them and helped raise the money to make these improvements.

The Memorial Fund and total efforts of all the Firemen and Ladies Auxillary has reached \$17,000.00. A utility bed donated by West Texas Utilities is being used in building the rescue equipment truck.

The Department has also purchased a new pump and motor, two new air packs, new hose, battery booster and protective equipment.

The Auxillary has repainted the meeting hall and paced new curtains, and furnished the hall with five new folding chairs.

The Department is presently making plans to send members to the Fire Fighters School at A&M in July. The Department holds three meetings each month - one to take care of business and make plans and develop fire prevention program; one to test plugs, hose, repair equipment and maintain the station; the third to train new and old members in fire fighting, use of emergency equipment and protective gear. Other meetings are called when necessary.

Here are signals used by the Fire Department. Everyone should be aware of them as they are for your protection:

- 1 signal - minor grass fire.
- 2 signals - structure fire.
- 3 signals - major fire.
- 5 signals - emergency.

A 3 to 5 minute steady is the warning of the possible approach of a tornado.

A wavering (up and down) for 3 to 5 minutes is the signal to take cover from an approaching tornado.

The Firemen and Auxillary have worked hard to repair and replace needed equipment, and the community can be proud of their efforts. We are a modern community and must have modern equipment and trained personnel.

Oldham said the girl apparently died at the scene but was revived when a passerby applied mouth to mouth resuscitation. The child was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital by Bailey ambulance where she died at 2:30 p. m., Oldham said.

The mother was treated for minor injuries and later released from the hospital.

REDDY'S VACATION TIPS



Clip and save this vacation checklist.

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

There is a good possibility that residents of Putnam will join this corporation, and will have water piped from Estland or Cisco. Applications for service and a deposit of \$100.00 are required by July 15th, in order for the corporation membership to be determined and the engineering work to begin as soon as possible. If we do not get the water, this deposit will be refunded.

Even though this line will take from 18 to 36 months to complete, this is the best possibility Putnam will have for a permanent, adequate water supply. At the present time, there are no boundaries for the water line, and anyone wishing to sign up may sign an agreement. The details will be worked out after July 15th after the location of all possible meters are determined. Applications are being taken by Mr. John D. Isenhower. You can contact him at 915-662-3561 for further information.

Those who do not choose to sign up by July 15th will be required to pay \$200.00, plus installation charges if they decide to join in the future.

The importance of subscribing now rather than after July 15 is that the more who subscribe now will increase the chances of being able to obtain water for Putnam.

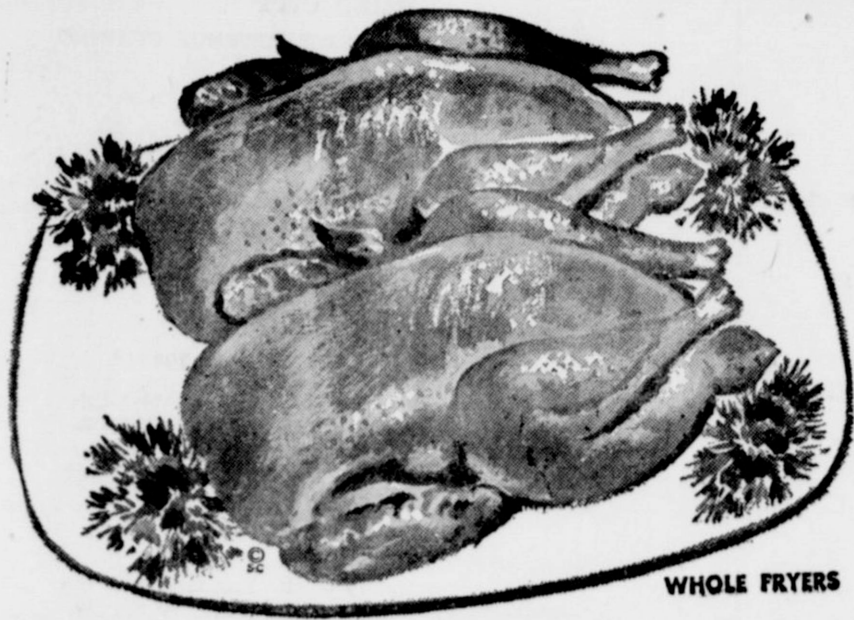
