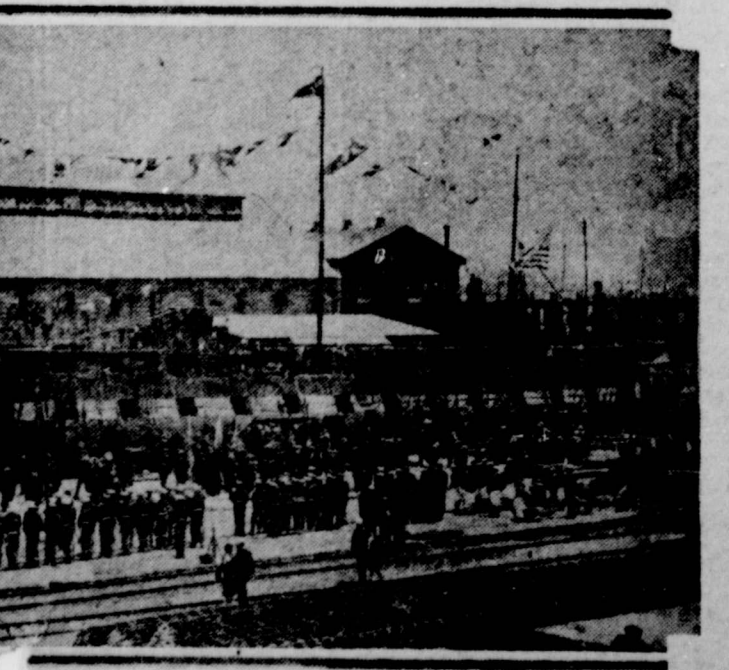

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# INDEPENDENCE DAY INCREASES RETAIL TRADE

NEW YORK, July 1.—Houses are being set in order in preparation for the end of the fiscal year and the completion of the first half of the 1927 calendar year. This does not mean that business is slowing down, but it does indicate that for the time being no striking new commitments are being made in business, industry or trade. Inventories are being straightened out and business men are devoting a few days to outlining their policies for the ensuing six months.

This trend has not affected retail trade. In fact, the approach of the July 4 holiday, which will cover a more extended period this year than usual, is stimulating department store, chain store and mail order sales at the moment. The volume of buying of sporting goods has been extraordinary and the demand for vacation equipment and apparel is approaching a point seldom exceeded.

**Mills Run Steadily.**  
This trend will help the apparel trades materially. The second quarter of the year has been somewhat disappointing since the weather has been unfavorable to heavy sales of men's and women's clothing and hosiery. Sales have been down about five per cent as compared with the corresponding period of 1925 in some sections. The drop in sales volume has not been universal.

The steel mills are expected to run steadily at present rates until the end of next week. The holiday period will be utilized to make necessary machinery adjustment and repairs in many plants. The possibility of a huge sheet steel merger in western Pennsylvania and Ohio still is hovering in the offing.

The automobile industry continues divided. A half dozen makers grudge every minute the holiday imposes, for they have purchasers for every car they can turn out. Others welcome the holiday as a time for looking over the situation and outlining future policies in view of late trends in models and methods.

The oil production of the country continues at a high rate and it is a good thing for the industry that the consumption of gasoline and fuel oil is as high as it is or the industry would be still further disrupted. Were it not for occasional meetings between the miners and operators which have led to little, few would know that a coal strike is in progress. The non-union fields are turning out a goodly supply which, with current stocks in storage, has proved entirely adequate for needs. The holiday will check all coal production to a considerable extent.

The volume of building contracts let has been sufficiently high to cause a decided firmness in the building materials market. Hardwood lumber is high and in demand and it is now believed some time must elapse before the effect of the Mississippi flood disappears as a factor in this line. Soft woods are easier and curtailment of the mills continues. There is some unemployment reported among the lumber trades in the Pacific northwest.

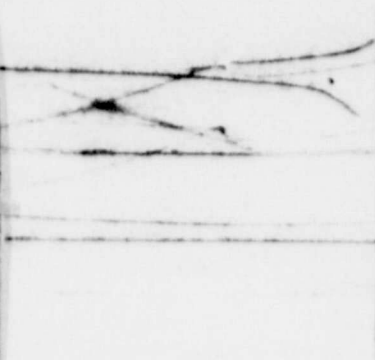

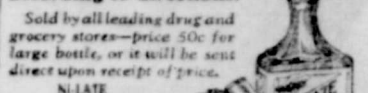
