CISCO READY FOR

CISCO PLANS TO ENTERTAIN 50,000

OLD HOME TOWN

"Advertising in the Cisco Daily News surely gets results," declared Mrs. Morris Simon Saturday. "The other day someone put an advertisement in the paper for an apartment to rent, and by mistake gave my address. Since then, I have been answering phone calls and receiving callers almost by the score, all of whom were seeking the apartment."

J. T. Elliott is a conscientious man. He therefore has a problem on his hands. As secretary for the chautauqua association this last season, it was his duty to look after the money. He reports he has had all bills accumulated and now has \$1.17 on hand. He appealed to R. W. Manell, president of the association, for advice on what to do with the money, but Manell refused to advise and referred him to Old Hometown, to ask the public what should be done. Hometown himself would be willing to bear the responsibility of disposing of the cash, since he has always in the past been an expert at the practice.

T. E. Clark, farmer living on Cisco, Route 2, is sorry he has let his garden grow so long. Spanish vines left in the garden have proved a breeding ground for squash bugs, which have now moved to his watermelon vines. Two entire acres in watermelons are now threatened with destruction by the bugs, two or three of which can destroy a plant in a single night, according to Mr. Clark. He asked E. H. Varnell, Cisco farm expert, for advice and was told that kerosene emulsion is the only deterrent for the bugs, and this will kill only the young ones. The old ones can be trapped by placing boards between the rows, he said, the bug crawling under the boards in the day time and being killed readily by mechanical means.

Bankhead Poultry Producers Plan Own Dressing and Storage Plant; Committee Named on Arrangements

First definite steps toward securing a cold storage and dressing plant for the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association were taken Friday afternoon when directors of the association met at the chamber of commerce. A committee comprised of Manager J. B. Chandler and J. E. T. Peters, secretary of the chamber of commerce, was named to investigate and make arrangements for construction of the building. It is planned, if possible, to get some one to build the plant and let the association lease it.

Manager Chandler told the directors that the association already this year has suffered a loss on eggs and poultry sufficient to pay the lease on such a plant for an entire year. This loss was occasioned by the necessity of selling eggs at low prices during the period of greatest production. Had storage been available, about \$1.50 per case of eggs could already have advanced that much in the last month, Mr. Chandler declared. Another waste is occasioned by the fact that male chicks have been sacrificed at whatever price they would bring just as soon as their sex could be determined, it was declared, the market for broilers and fryers here making it unprofitable to bring the male birds to this stage. With a dressing plant, a much better price could be obtained, and these chicks would not be wasted, he added.

The association discussed market conditions at length, and it was decided that in the future, stress will have to be placed on quality to a greater extent than in the past. As a result, it was decided to pay a premium of four cents a dozen more for No. 1 eggs than for No. 2 eggs. A premium of six cents a pound will be paid for fryers and broilers weighing 1 1/2 pounds to 2 1/4 pounds, as compared with these of 1 1/2 pounds to 1 3/4 pounds.

Mr. Chandler told the directors that occasionally he has complaint from merchants in the county regarding the price asked for Bankhead eggs to be retailed. He pointed out, however, that only this last week he wired a buyer outside the state an offer of 25 cents at \$1.75 a case above the market price here, and that the buyer responded with an order for 75 cases instead, showing what buyers away from Eastland county think of Bankhead eggs.

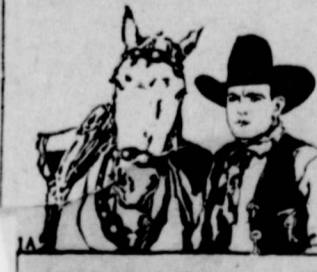

New Cross Plains Field Remains Most Active in Development; One Completion Reported During Week

CROSS PLAINS, July 2.—With another new well showing production from the top of the sand, two more new locations rigging up, and a group of drilling wells at various depths reaching toward the pay, the new Cross Plains field continues the most active spot in local development. The new completion is being made by the Navarro Oil Co., on a location near the east line of the Bennett and Georgia tract, following a line to the north from the discovery well of Brown & Co. that opened development in that part of the field. The new well found the pay at 125 feet and indicates a very slight rise in the sand over the field further south. Water trouble proved to be from a stratum of sand directly overlying the sand in laying completion. The last string pipe has been set at 1612 feet, on top of this line but since the show water developed the pipe is being underreamed to 1620 feet and will be properly seated at that depth well will be drilled in.

The present stage of completion is less than one foot of the sand has been drilled with a nice show of wet gas and a considerable quantity of oil is being bailed. This is in the north the No. 1 well of the same owners on lease, and all indications point to a well of at least 100 barrels in the same vicinity, but leading to the north, in outside territory. Shaw & Harbo are at 900 feet on their Miller No. 6, and are rick time with a bad fishling at a depth of 637 feet on No. 6 location of the same lease.

More than a quarter mile to the east the outside test of Brannon Murray has reached a depth of 80 feet. This well will receive more than average attention due to its importance to a wide scope of territory in that direction.

Two Wells on Waller

Outside development to the east the group of producers in the line of the old Baum, original every gasser is being led by wells on the Waller land. One of these wells is being drilled by 1 & West on the south 40 acres of the Waller land, and the other in offset to the north, located on north 60 acres of the same tract. This well is being drilled by G. Bradstreet and is down 475 feet. The Hill & West well is being at 809 feet.

Approximately a half mile west these tests, and in territory between the group of producers of section and the development of the southwest edge of the territory, the Mook-Texas Co. and M. Wakefield are rigging up a test on the southeast corner of the west acres of the T. E. Baum tract. It will go far to test the future possibilities of the field, opening in the scope of country that leases the leases that have been made most of this initial development.

The outstanding feature of this play of development is the trend character of the locations, most instances reaching the isolated corners of the property in a desire to test to the full the trend of the production, during the present period of development. Several hundred acres of territory surrounding former property is involved by the new drilling, and an even amount will remain to be drilled, due to the fact that the well drilled in that section the pay and the outside received no exploration prior opening of the field.

Christian Building Church

The building is one block south of Luttrell's garage, and the church is in the center of the new block from state highway, and will show up beautifully from the highway. The building, when completed, will cost approximately \$15,000.

McLELLAND WELL TO DRILL ON FOR OIL

The Moody & Adams, Inc., who recently completed the big producer on the J. C. Dyer lease, about five or six miles southeast of Moran, have put up a steel rig over the McClelland well which is an offset to the east of the Dyer well. The McClelland well is producing from the first big gas sand found in that territory and, according to information is about 150 feet above the oil sand found in the Dyer well. The old sand was found at 3849 feet on the Dyer.

The McClelland well was brought in sometime last summer and made a good gasser. The Texas Co. has been buying the gas since that time. At the time that well was brought in the company had the misfortune of losing the rig by fire and the rig was never rebuilt. Since the discovery of the oil in the Dyer well, the company has decided to drill the gasser on down to the oil sand, and is practically assured of an oil well. The company is rigging up the derrick and will begin drilling in the near future.

Ranger Already Figuring on Team It Will Meet in Bi-District Tilt; Loboes to Meet Two Defeats, Claim

"They're already talking football over Ranger way. The Bulldogs, champions of the district, began to figure on who their bi-district opponents will be, judging from articles appearing in the Ranger press. According to the Eastland County News, published at Ranger, the "spell of the Loboes" has been broken and the Cisco team will meet at least two opponents this coming season whom they will not defeat. In fact, the paper adds that it is being talked that the Loboes will have a very difficult task in defeating even Eastland.

The Ranger weekly, taking up a text in an article in the Cisco Daily News of recent date in which Coach W. B. Chapman was described as having cast aside his usual gloomy mood, asserted in effect, that Chapman is merely whistling in the dark to keep his courage up, since he realizes the formidable opposition his team must face this fall. To all of which, might be replied, that Eastland always has an excellent team along in July and August, but somehow, it just don't seem to get anywhere when the season begins.

But here is the Ranger paper's "dope": "You rank my team too high," is the broadcast hurled from one direction. And from the other quarter comes an equally emphatic protest, "You don't rank my team high enough."

All of which demonstrates that a sports editor can't please everybody—in fact, it looks as though he can't please anyone. Coach Blair Cherry of the Ranger Bulldogs writes a letter from Fort Worth to the effect that he thanks us for the championship but that he still has to try to build a machine that will win the title and that the outlook is gloomy. However, the sports scribbler did not award the district championship to the Bulldogs. All that was said was that, in June, the Bulldogs look a little stronger than any other team in the district. But it was further stated that it was a long time until October when the conference season opens and lots of things can happen in the meantime. Furthermore, it was pointed out that Abilene looms up like a dark cloud; Cisco will be out for revenge for last season's pair of defeats; Eastland may prove a sad surprise to other teams; and Shotwell, who produced the state champions in 1923, will be on the job at Breckenridge.

No Cinch For Anyone
The prediction was further made that the race would be the hottest in the history of the district and that every team would lose at least one game. So we maintain that we did not award the championship to anybody. It looks like a free-for-all. Five teams will have to be reckoned with. But we still believe the Bulldogs at this time look as good as any of the rest.

A "now" pertaining to the coach who "agrees to no pessimism about his team."
This comes from none other than W. B. Chapman, the genial coach of the far-famed Cisco Loboes. According to the Cisco Daily News, Coach Chapman "took issue with so-called dope printed in Eastland and Ranger papers placing Cisco somewhere down near the bottom of the probable standing next fall."

In the first place, no Eastland newspaper has published and surmises as to next season's race as we presume that the Eastland County News is the publication that is meant. The Eastland County News is a publication of, by, and for Ranger.

Then in the next place, this paper did not place Cisco "somewhere down near the bottom." Far from such. In the "so-called dope" complained of the statement—in effect—was made that a hard task

faced the coach in replacing such men as Meadows, Huestis, Wester, Yencor, Murray and other men lost from last year's eleven. But the statement was further made that Cisco has always shown remarkable recuperative power in filling gaps.

Why the Change?
The fact that the Lobo coach, who is always smiling and care-free on any subject in the world except the prospects of his team about which he has each season until now been sad, has suddenly grown so optimistic is an indication that he, too, realizes that an atmosphere of confidence must be created surrounding Cisco and the grid squad in order to restore the prestige that was shattered last year when the Bulldogs twice conquered the Loboes.

For two seasons almost every foe that Cisco faced was so dazzled by the glorious reputation of the team that the opponents were beaten before they started. Now that Ranger has dethroned the monarch, the other teams of the district will respect the deadly fangs of the Lobo but they will not go into the battle already whipped.

And with no intention of arousing the ire of anyone, some close followers of the grid pastime are making this prediction:

The Loboes will face two teams in the district race next season that they will not defeat.

And then to add further sting to the prophecy, they state:

Cisco will have plenty to do to beat Eastland.

At any rate, we're glad to see the boys taking all this interest in the approaching season. And the Eastland County News, the sports forum of the Oil Belt, invites free and full discussion, assuring the coaches that the sports editor feels complimented that they are reading his stuff and to show that he appreciates it, he wants to assure them that he will go out to see their teams play next fall.
