## Slight Majority Favors New \$300,000 Structure With Less Than 2,500 Votes Registered

Dale and Moore were ousted from the legislature during the regular session for accepting a \$1000 bribe in connection with an optometry bill. The trial was called last spring but was postponed because of the illness of the chief witness.

being the first to land on this lot of water. Regarding his visit, he wrote: "We will be glad to fly to your city with one or more Hong Kong flyers, but are not certain that a flying plane. Special workers for young people will also be employed. Request for accommodation of the delegates at the Lake Cisco bathing beach early each morning was made, the officials of the encampment indicating that full use of the recreation facilities at the Lake would be made.

### BUILDING AND LOAN PAYS 1¢ P. C. DIVIDEND

The semi-annual dividend of the Cisco Building and Loan association was declared at a special meeting of directors Saturday morning at the rate of 10 per cent per annum on installment and full paid stock and 8 per cent on prepaid stock. The manager, T. Hunter Foley, presented his semi-annual report, attested by C. J. Daniel, auditor, showing the association to be in excellent shape financially with approximately \$45,000 loaned out on residence property. Mr. Foley also announced that the management has secured connections which will make it possible to handle loans on business property, either for construction of new buildings or taking up old obligations. Such connections, he predicted, will make it possible for business house construction to go forward with the same speed as residence building has taken during the spring and early summer.

SAN ANTONIO, July 9.—Roger O'Malley, San Antonio insurance salesman, was in a critical condition here today. He remained awake 150 hours, nine hours longer than the old record hung up in 1927 by a New Yorker, but the strain left him in a serious condition. The 30th hour was up at noon yesterday. He was walking through Brackenridge park when the noon whistle blew. He collapsed.

### CISCOAN IN TENNESSEE BADLY HURT

Asa Skiles, Cisco groceryman, left at noon Saturday for Memphis, Tenn., in response to a telephone call from there stating that his father, L. W. Skiles, 68, had been found on the N. C. & St. L. railway tracks there with his skull fractured. Details of how he came by the injury were not given, but investigation indicated he had been hurt in a fall, the telephone message said. A telegram at noon Saturday stated that he was resting well.

Mr. Skiles had been to Trenton, Tenn., on a visit to a brother, Jim Skiles, who had just died and was buried before the Ciscoan left for home. He had planned to change trains at Memphis and take a through train to Cisco, and his ticket was found in a pocket of his coat. He was picked up early Friday morning by a train crew. A letter written him by his sons here was found in his coat, together with \$10 in currency. He regained consciousness after being taken to the hospital and told attendants his name. Other details of the accident were lacking.

### High School Teacher Guilty in Flogging

TOCOGA, Ga., July 9.—A jury today found W. G. Acree, high school principal, guilty of assault and battery in connection with the flogging of Mrs. Amelia Bowers and her 15 year old son here recently. Acree was accused of leading a hooded and robed band of men in nearly a dozen flogging expeditions in Toccoa since the first of the year. Sentence was deferred pending outcome of trial of other men in the floggings of Mrs. Bowers and Bert Singleton, a farmer, two outstanding cases.

### Says Girl Begged That He Kill Her

EUREKA, Kans., July 9.—Ivan M. Hart, 34, held here following the finding of the body of Mabel Marmont, 23, last night, today admitted, according to authorities, that he killed the girl because she pleaded with him to do so. Hart also revealed that the young woman was his wife. He said they had been secretly married June 15.

### PLANES LEAVE DALLAS

DALLAS, July 9.—Thirteen air planes of the national air tour left Dallas at intervals this morning for Oklahoma City. From there they will go to Wichita, Kans. Eddie Stinson, flying a plane made by his own company, was far ahead in points.

### 101 YEARS FOR NEGRO

DALLAS, July 9.—Sisley Tarver, negro bell boy in a local hotel, today was under sentence of 101 years in the penitentiary following his conviction late yesterday on charges of attempting to attack Mrs. Jean Odell, member of a vaudeville troupe now playing in Dallas, the morning of July 4.

### OWENS ORDERED FREED

KANSAS CITY, July 9.—Judge Arba Van Valkenburg of the United States circuit court of appeals this afternoon signed a writ of habeas corpus for release of O. O. Owens, held in contempt of the supreme court of Oklahoma. Owens will be released from jail Monday. Trial was set for October 10 in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and will be presided over by Judge Van Valkenburg.

### MOVIE TRUST FOUND GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The government took the first step today to smash the so-called movie trust. After a three-year investigation, the anti-trust commission found the Famous Players-Lasky corporation guilty of conspiracy to violate the anti-trust laws. A sweeping order was issued against the corporation and its directors, Adolph Zukor and Jesse Lasky, aimed at wiping out monopolistic tendencies.

The negro is being carefully guarded in a local jail.

### WEST TEXAN SHOOTS WIFE, SLAYS SELF

STAMFORD, July 9.—J. W. Brewer, 47, of Rule, a small community about 20 miles north of here, was dead tonight of wounds said to have been self-inflicted, and his wife, 40, was in a serious condition with a bullet wound in her breast. Brewer first shot his wife with a revolver and then emptied a shotgun into his own side.

### Cotton Acreage Shows Decrease

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The cotton acreage in cultivation in the U. S. was 42,683,000 acres, or 87.6 per cent of the acreage in cultivation June 25, 1926, the crop reporting board of the department of agriculture reported today. Last year's acreage was 48,870,000 acres.

LOS ANGELES, July 9.—John Drew, 73, veteran actor, passed away in his sleep here today while holding the hand of his only child, Louise Devereaux. The remains were cremated shortly before noon today at Truss Lawn cemetery in the presence of Mrs. Devereaux, her husband and John Devereaux, Drew's nephew.

### 1500 BOTTLES BEER SEIZED BY SHERIFF

Sheriff John Hart and his three deputies, C. D. Payne, Bob Hammett and Lee Reid made another series of home brew raids Saturday and confiscated 1,500 bottles of beer. Of the arrests, four were made in Eastland, three in Cisco and one in Pioneer. Charges of manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor were filed against the defendants at Eastland.

### REID SLAPS PROHIBITION, LABOR LAWS

HOUSTON, July 9.—Senator James A. Reed, democrat of Missouri, one of the men most frequently mentioned in connection with the democratic nomination in 1928, today fixed what is regarded by many as the opening gun in his campaign for the democratic nomination next year, before the state bar association here today. He delivered a vigorous attack on what he said is the tendency toward bureaucracy, the child labor law, and said the prohibition law is one of the reasons of a drift toward centralization.

Regarding the child labor law, he said: "If this amendment can be justified, then we ought to allow congress the right to regulate the labor of every human being. When we have taken that step, we shall have transferred the democracy of Washington into socialism of London and Trotsky."

Declaring at the outset it may be conceded that the use of intoxicating liquor is a great evil, Reed stated: "I do not propose to discuss the merits of prohibition. It may be conceded at the outset that the use of alcohol is a great evil. But so is the commission of any other crime. Yet, as to those grosser and more frightful crimes, jurisdiction is left to the states, while congress is given jurisdiction over the lesser evils. The logic of the situation is that if the liquor violations are to be punished by the federal government, then a similar jurisdiction should be granted over every character of crime. If that were done there would be no reason to continue state government."

Members of the Elks club will be in charge of the services at the grave. Rev. H. A. Nichols, Methodist minister at Moran and an old friend of Mr. Chandler, will conduct the services. Burial will follow at Oakwood cemetery.

Mr. Chandler had been ill for some time from pneumonia, and underwent an operation for removal of his right kidney. He failed to respond to the treatment, and death came early Saturday. His partner, John Van Horn, died recently from burns received in an oil well fire near Baird. Mr. Chandler was well known as an oil operator, particularly in the Moran and Sedwick pools. He was formerly of the firm of Elliott-Chandler & Co. He recently purchased the home of Dr. K. J. Scott when the latter moved to the Rio Grande valley. He was 37 years of age, having been born in Calendon, N. D., on January 25, 1890. He is survived by his widow and one son, Roy, Jr., 12 years of age. He also is survived by a brother, Alex Chandler of Nacogoches, Texas.

LAKE CISCO BEACH BENEFITS US ALL

President Guy Dabney of the chamber of commerce hit the nail on the head the other night when he said that when a person patronizes the Lake Cisco pleasure resort he is in reality patronizing himself. He does this in two ways. First and directly, 24 per cent of gross receipts from the swimming pool and pleasure devices and 24 per cent of the net receipts from sale of merchandise goes into the city treasury. This really amounts to at least 50 per cent of the net profits from operation of the whole lake project. And in the second place, money spent at the bathing beach enables it to be developed to a high degree, and thus bring more people to Cisco, both for brief pleasure jaunts and permanent residence. And the more people there are here, the greater will be the amount of business and the profits of our merchants. All of which only emphasizes the fact that Ciscoans should contribute without stint to the fund to be raised for financing the great celebration here July 22. The success of that celebration will mean much to the success of our business here in Cisco. It will focus the attention of the state and much of the nation on Cisco for that day. It will show to the world that Ciscoans are used to doing things in a big way. The Lake Cisco Amusement company will benefit somewhat from the celebration, it is true, but the chances are it will contribute more to the celebration fund than it takes out as net profits. Yet, the city government and every business house in Cisco will benefit to a large extent from the event. Cisco has advertised to the world that it will put on a celebration worthy of the attention of 50,000 visitors; it is up to us all to do our part in financing the celebration so that those 50,000 visitors will want to come back again and again.

A FACTOR IN CISCO'S UPBUILDING

The semi-annual statement of the Cisco Building and Loan Association as published during the last week is further proof of the prosperity existing in this section, and the willingness of Ciscoans to let their money build Cisco. The report shows a very substantial growth since the first of the year, with resources almost trebled in that period of time. The statement as published shows all the assets of the association to be either in cash in the bank or first lien mortgages, with the latter predominating heavily. In fact, practically all funds paid into the association by investors have gone out in the form of loans on residences, and much of the building in Cisco this spring can be traced from the activities of the Building and Loan Association. Through the easy monthly payment plan, the association has made it possible for many to build their own homes who otherwise would have found it impossible, and the association has thus contributed both to the welfare of the individual by making him thrifty and saving, and to the community at large by gathering these savings together and upbuilding the city. The report of the state auditor, commending officers and especially the manager, Tom Foley, for their conduct of the association, is also of interest, and shows that the Cisco association is on a par with the best in the state. THE "AMERICA'S" SUCCESS

In spite of Commander Richard E. Byrd's technical failure to land in Paris, the flight is actually a triumphant success for himself and his three companions. They encountered more difficulties with bad weather and heavy fog than did the fliers who preceded them. Their plane, the scientific instruments, the men themselves were all put to the severest tests. Considerably more is now known about the developments needed to make ocean flying sure and safe than was learned from the pioneer flight of Lindbergh and the follow-up flight of Chamberlin and Levine. If there were any who felt that Byrd's flight was unnecessary, that everything had been demonstrated by the other flights, they have now learned that much investigation and experimentation are ahead. It appears that a plane, with proper compasses functioning, can fly through a fog so dense that the aviators within can barely see its wing tips. It has been demonstrated that a plane, moving rapidly through the air, can communicate with ships at sea and people on land by means of radio. Many scientific observations were taken. Although some of Byrd's records were lost at sea, it is likely that he can set down from memory enough to be of real value in the further study of ocean flying. Long distance flights across the ocean are still far from commonplace. The earlier successes were no more wisely and thoroughly planned than the "America's" flight. They conquered bad weather, but had less of it to struggle with. Until airships can fly through a storm as safely as the great ocean liners there will continue to be suspense and thrills and glory in ocean flying.

THE WITCH DOCTOR

A negro named Dr. Samuel Kojko Pearce has been indicted in St. Louis on a charge of victimizing negroes by selling them voodoo charms by mail. Pearce is said to have done a thriving business in the name of the West African Remedy company and the African-American Institute of Science. According to the indictment, he sold "Tie-em down powders" guaranteed to keep husbands at home, at the rate of \$25 for 25 powders; "bringback powders," to use when the tying down failed, more potent and therefore more costly, selling at \$50 for 25; "lucky turrairie" to keep evil spirits away from the home; black cat wishbone,

"warranted" business or love, horse racing or crap, "charging with Solomon's wisdom stone, "It all sounds attractive, if your mind runs to such things. We may smile in a superior way at such primitive magic, and yet a good many of us still cherish a lurking belief in the efficacy of a rabbit's foot, a lucky coin and the touching of wood or some other substance of magical virtue. And even the most emancipated find it hard to disabuse their minds entirely of a fear of Friday or the number 13. As for remedies, how many Americans who will laugh at the African "witch doctor" stuff take "Indian remedies" with great seriousness! Primitive superstitions die hard.

State Press Wants to Know About Our Bathing Beauties; He'll Find Out If He Accepts This Proposal

State Press of the Dallas News appears worried over the third dimension of the Lake Cisco swimming pool which has been established as the largest in the world, and as to whether "co-swimming" is permitted there. Reprinting an article from The Cisco Daily News, State Press makes as follows in Saturday's issue of the Dallas News: "It is very interesting to learn that Cisco has the biggest swimming pool. But how deep is it, brethren; how deep? Some of us are less concerned for width and length than for depth. The three dimensions are important all together, but the third is most important to some of us who tire easily in swimming and like to touch bottom when assailed by weariness. And having mentioned the three dimensions may we ask if the Cisco swimmer has a fourth dimension? Some philosophers assert that the fourth dimension coexists with the other three, although it has until recently been difficult to identify. Mind, they tell us, is the fourth dimension, for without mind width, breadth and thickness do not exist. The theory is defensible if not altogether plausible at first glance. Without mind it would be impossible to measure the Cisco pool. Without mind, a bathing beauty contest would be impossible there, for our perceptions of beauty are contingent upon the mental impress it makes. However, it was not intended to carry this article into abstractions. The first question was only to ask how deep the Cisco tank is. Now, how deep is it? And is it a co-swimery or something less democratic?" Now, S. P., knowing your own hereclean proportions, we do not think you need to worry over the depth of our swimming pool. Should you be overawed with the size of the remainder of the pool, we have a Kiddies' pool, 75 by 100 feet and with a maximum of two feet in depth, affording you an area about twice the size of the average swimming pool to do your wading in. But should the pretty lady life guard in charge of this section of the pool fail to look after you properly, there is an area of approximately 100,000 square feet ranging in depth from 18 inches to four and one-half feet in which you may swim to your heart's content and may touch the bottom with your toes any time you wish. GETTING OVER JAZZ

What about this jazz age. Are we, as one divine expressed it, jazzing ourselves straight to hell? He may have been a staid deacon of a church, into which he was inducted when he was ten years old; but after his nerves have gone and you can't see him for dust. But usually in time he gets over it all, and settles down and is as good as before, or better.

And so with the world. Its nerve trouble threw it into a swift pace. But that pace is slowing down. There are plenty of signs of it. The first thing we know we shall be jazzing along in the same old trot as before; and we shall be as good as we were before, and better, because experience begets knowledge.

## EASTERWOOD WILL INVITE LINDBERGH TO CISCO

### Dallas to Hong Kong Flyers Also Will Come Here for July 22 Event, "Father of Texas Aviation" Writes

Mr. Easterwood also formally ac-

cepted an invitation to come to Cisco July 22 and bring one or more of his Hong Kong flyers. He also accepted an invitation to make a brief address on aviation. He was asked to fly here in a hydroplane if possible, and land on Lake Cisco so that he might have the honor of being the first to land on this body of water. Regarding his visit, he wrote:

"We will be glad to fly to your city with one or more Hong Kong flyers, but are not certain that we can at this date secure a hydroplane. The machines entered in our contest will hardly be completed by July 22, and would require a special runway for them to take off. The planes are rather expensive and as few take-offs to them as possible will be made by contestants. They are of special design. However, will fly to Cisco and will arrange something special for the day."

### Captain Erwin, Once Long-Haired Piano Player, Tells His Plans For Hong Kong to Dallas Air Flight

DALLAS, July 9.—"I believe that a shrewd man should base his acts of life upon averages."

Capt. William Erwin, third American ace, and first entrant in the \$25,000 William E. Easterwood, Jr., Dallas to Hong Kong, China, flight, was talking as he adjusted the carburetor of one of his planes at Love Field, prior to taking one of his numerous flights. "Everyone recognizes that there is much luck in human affairs.

"In no element is this so true as in the field of aviation—where life is simply a balance of probabilities, more or less—but where there are certain laws of averages to which any man may, and should adhere. I am not trying to imply that I am clever or shrewd, but in my attempted flights across the Pacific, I am going to adhere to every one of those averages all down the line."

Regarding the success of his trip, Captain Erwin has some cold facts to back up his contention that such a flight is entirely within the bounds of possibilities, and as he puts it, "not any great feat of human endurance at all.

**Plans for Flight**  
The main reason for my being so optimistic is the plane which I will use. It is the best obtainable, and will be installed with a 450-horse power Wasp motor, used exclusively by the United States government. I have implicit faith in this machine," he exclaimed.

Another point on which Captain Erwin is banking highly are the stops allowed in the 9,000 mile flight, which, by the way, has to be completed in 144 hours, Dallas including time of stops.

His flight may be either from Cisco to Hong Kong, or from Hong Kong to Dallas, according to

Captain Erwin is a nephew of J. H. Erwin of Cisco. He has visited a number of times here where he is well known, and his friends here are hoping he will be one of the flyers to accompany William E. Easterwood, Jr., here on July 22.

the choice of the contestants. It must be completed by midnight of September 15, it is stipulated in the contract.

"There is, of course, no denying that the trip will be long and hazardous," said Capt. Erwin, "but a most generous time limit has been permitted, and stops are well planned and timely. I feel confident such a motor as I will have will run successfully for twenty-one hours at a time, which is the longest period of time, at the outside it would have to run continuously. As to my physical condition, I positively know that I can survive the test."

It might be added here that Capt. Erwin has entered strenuous training, and is putting in many extra hours each day in the air.

When asked regarding his present plans, Capt. Erwin said: "All my plans are tentative ones at present, subject to change, depending upon rising circumstances, but my plans to date are to fly about Aug. 1 from San Francisco to Honolulu, ship the plane to Hong Kong, go by boat from Honolulu to Hong Kong and fly from Hong Kong to Dallas. My reason for wanting to do this is because I have also entered James Dole's \$25,000 "Mainland to Mainland Flight from Frisco to Honolulu."

"I just sort of happened into it," he said. To be specific, however, he "happened into it" twelve years ago at Tulsa, Okla., where he was playing the piano with a traveling troupe. At that time he wore the long wavy hair and four-in-hand bow tie demanded of musicians. To be sure he looked anything but an aviator not to mention one destined through his fearlessness and skill to become the third American ace.

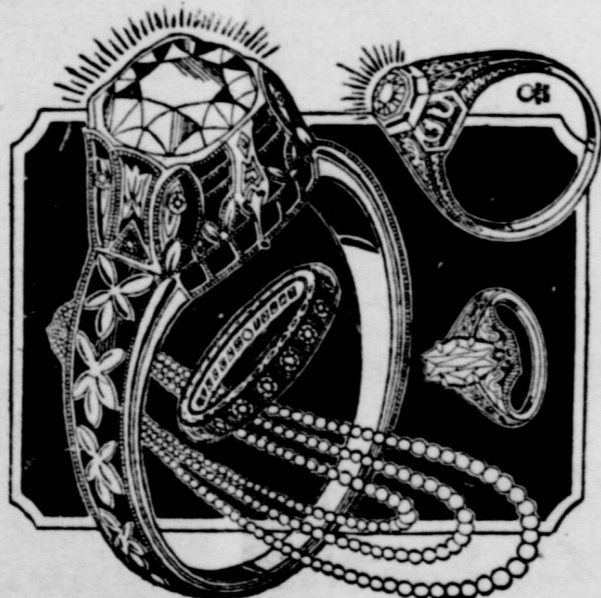

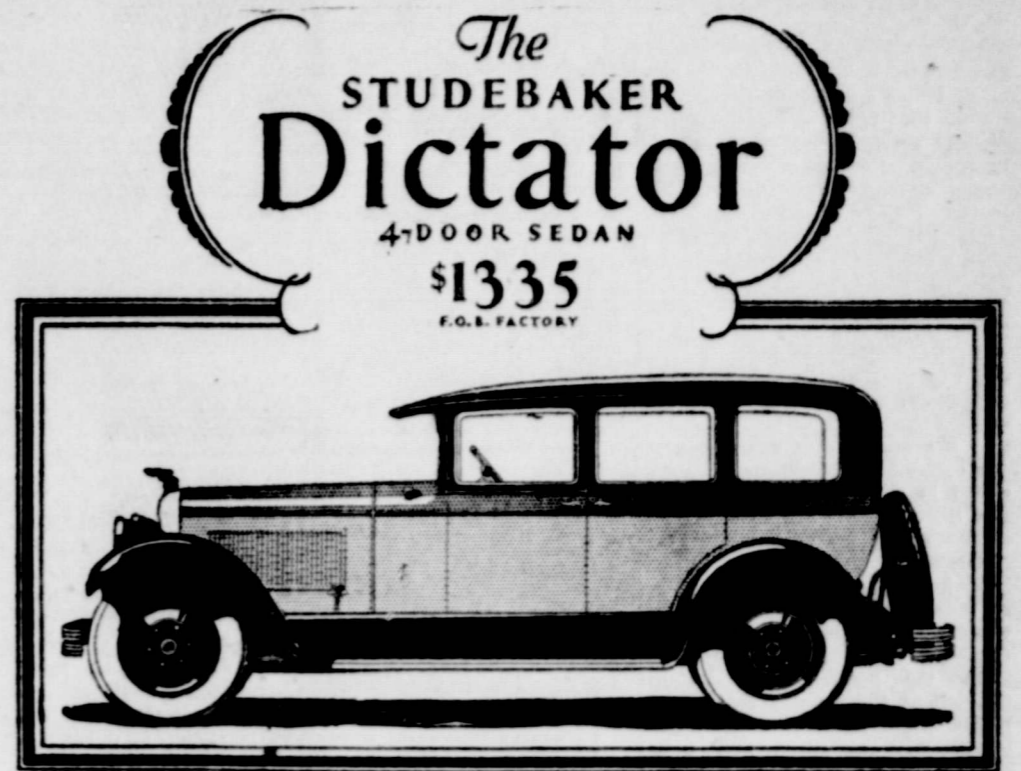

# BILLION WILL BE SPENT ON ROADS, BRIDGES

NEW YORK, July 9.—More than one billion dollars will be spent in construction in other than buildings before December 31. Plans outlined have made it a certainty, according to officials of the National Association of Builders Exchange. Fully half a billion will be spent in building and improving roads and in paving streets. The other half will be required to repair the damage to bridges, dams, levees, roads and other construction throughout the flood districts of the South.

These facts make it evident that the 1927 building year will account for over \$6,250,000,000, and may run as high as \$8,500,000,000. Not much terror remains in the repeated cry that building is to suffer a distinct recession. It is undoubtedly true that dwelling shortages in some sections has been filled. It also is true that replacements and the demand occasioned by the steady increase in America's population make it necessary to spend around four billions on building each year, even when no shortage exists.

### Building Gains

As to 1927 the government has a program of \$225,000,000 and the amount spent on new public schools will far exceed that sum. Permits for erection of dwellings have declined in number since January 1. But these permits are no longer an accurate measure of building activity. They may be used immediately or held over for months or years or they may never be used. Actual contracts let, however, are ahead of those let up to this date in 1926.

In the majority of sections throughout the country real estate prices are holding firm. Rents are pretty well stabilized and little change has taken place in those for residences. Rentals for centrally located business property have shown marked firmness, although not a great deal of advance, according to the National Association of Real Estate Boards.

Cities of 100,000 to 200,000 population have shown the largest percentage of real estate activity, but most of those cities where rentals are higher are in the half million population class. The activity in dwelling property has been strongest in the West and Far West, especially on the Pacific Coast, while there has been a drop in the Northeast and Southeast Atlantic states.

Canada Booming  
As to the Florida situation, there are many residents who sold their property at a high figure who are now in a commanding position. They received enough in cash to give them a profit on what the whole property cost them. Few of those who took mortgages are foreclosing them, being content to draw down 8 per cent interest until values improve.

To the north, resort real estate is active, and building is progressing owing to the decided improvement in transportation in most sections. The "boom" markets seem to have transferred itself to Canada, however, since the International highways and bridges have been opened.

## Tax Amendment Objections Given

The proposed tax amendment to the Texas Constitution is a drastic change in tax methods in Texas. Just to what extent the various tax-paying elements will be affected cannot at this time be satisfactorily answered. The results may be very serious indeed and no one should vote for a change of this drastic character without understanding what the result may be. The wording of the amendment is ambiguous and gives little satisfaction to one who seeks to know what the result will be.

All taxes imposed upon industries furnishing service or commodities to the public are borne by the public, because tax is inevitably added to the charge for the commodity. This is an inescapable maxim of political economy which is too often disregarded by legislative bodies in analyzing tax provisions. The amount of taxes to sustain the state or county administrations should not be made greater or less merely upon consideration of the basis of taxation, but should respond directly

and solely to the need for the tax money, and no more should be collected than needed.

# One-Armed Cisco Officer Always Gets His Men

## Simp Looney Has Made 4,400 Arrests And Only One Prisoner Ever Escaped Him; Has Figured in Noted Captures

Constable C. S. Looney this week received quite a "write-up" in the Eastland County News, published at Ranger, in which he was designated as an officer, who despite the fact that he has but one arm, "always gets his men." The article was inspired by the constable's appearance as a witness in a case at Eastland.

Here is the article: Unique among the peace officers of West Texas is Simp Looney, constable of Cisco.

The one-armed officer—lost his right arm in a cotton gin accident in 1904—has been a deputy sheriff, constable or night watchman in Cisco since 1907.

During that time he has arrested approximately 4,400 and only one has ever escaped from him. That was a man who sprang from a car between Cisco and Eastland, and dashed away into the darkness of night. However, Looney trailed him and finally located him in far-away Indiana, where he was arrested and brought back to Texas.

Only recently Simp and one other officer brought back three men and a woman from El Paso, a distance of more than 500 miles.

**Helped Get Mohler**  
The constable had an important part in the capture of Bob Mohler, who was convicted two years ago for the murder of Hugh Maples, Cisco service car driver. Mohler is serving a life sentence.

After the murder, Mohler disappeared. Simp succeeded in borrowing a picture of Mohler from his home, had a newspaper "cut" made of it and returned the picture without it ever being missed. The circulars were printed with Mohler's picture and they aided in his being found.

The murder of Maples was one of the most famous crimes in the history of Eastland county. The service car driver disappeared. Six months later, his body, bound in barbed wire, was found in a shallow trench in a thicket in Coryell county. It was six months later that Mohler was caught in South Texas. He knocked down an officer but was re-captured at once. At the first trial he was given the death penalty but obtained a new trial and was given a sentence of 90 years.

It was proved by the state that Mohler and Maples left Cisco in Maples' car and that after Maples' death Mohler traveled almost continuously, under an assumed name. The case was entirely circumstantial but every link was so connected that neither jury had any doubt as to Mohler's guilt. He accepted the life sentence and did not appeal the case.

**Arrested Train Robber**  
Many years ago, Constable Looney arrested one of the Newton boys. "It was a cotton stealing case," Simp said. About two years ago, the greatest train robbery in history occurred in Illinois, about \$2,000,000 being obtained. Some of the Newton boys were in this robbery, one of them being the man that Looney had once arrested, he said.

Simp arrested Edward Bush, one of the most noted law violators of Eastland county. Bush has been found guilty in 17 cases and is now under sentence. He is a star witness for the state in the prosecution of the alleged slayers of Jimmie Daniels, Ranger policeman. Among Bush's achievements were an escape on Thanksgiving eve from the Meridian jail; feigning insanity in one trial and then escaping from the insane asylum soon after being placed there; stealing cotton and cars, as well as robbing the depot at Mangum.

Bush injected humor into one of his nervy stunts when he told ainger auto dealer that he wanted to buy a car. The dealer took him out for a demonstration and went to open a gate. Whereupon, Bush stepped on the gas and didn't stop till he got to Houston.

**Simp Is Good Witness**  
The Cisco constable has the reputation—like the Royal Northwest mounted police—of "getting his men." And, like the mounted police, he doesn't have to use his gun. While he carries one, he has never had to shoot anyone, in attempting an arrest.

He is as tireless as a bloodhound once he gets on the trail of a law-breaker and has been known to trail a man through a dozen counties but he always finds him in the end.

Simp is well known all over the county. He is frequently a witness in Eastland. As he has no right hand, he has to hold up his left hand when he is sworn. He knows about as much law as a lot of men.

bers of the bar—at least, as far as criminal law is concerned. He always makes a good witness.

Just a few days ago, he was on the stand twice in the same case and the defense attorneys did not ask him a single question either time. One of the attorneys said afterward in explanation that he didn't like to fool with "dynamite" and he figured that more damage would be done to his client's case, if he began asking Simp questions.

## Pettors Urged To Leave On Lights

LAREDO, July 9. — Protesting against "petting parties" being staged on public highways, the Laredo chamber of commerce has issued a statement where charges are made that life is endangered by pettors who park their cars beside the main highways leading out of this city and turn out the lights.

A campaign is being staged by the state highway department to try and get those who park their cars to leave the lights burning in accordance with the law, and the department has asked that the local chamber of commerce assist in bringing this about.

## NEW GORDON POOL WELL IN WITH BIG FLOW

Another 1,000 barrel well came in late Wednesday in the Gordon pool, eight miles northwest of Cisco. It is the No. 2 Thorpe of the McLeister Oil company which came in at the regulation depth, about 3,800 feet.

This is the fourth oil producer in the rich pool and the second for the McLeister company. There is also one big gas well, the No. 1 Thorpe of Root & Fehl of Eastland, which is making about 15,000,000 cubic feet of wet gas and spraying a small amount of oil.

The four oil producers in the pool are making a total of about 2,750 barrels daily. The two McLeister wells on the Thorpe are making a combined production of a little more than 1900 barrels. The No. 1 Good of the Belva Oil company is making about 550 barrels and the No. 1 Ramsower of the West-Adams Petroleum company (Col. Robert D. Gordon) is making between 225 and 250 barrels on a daily average.

The Gordon well is now more than seven months old and is one of the most consistent producers anywhere in Eastland county. The coming in of the No. 2 Thorpe for a good producer was no surprise. It is located well within the proven area of the pool and was expected to be at least as good a well as its initial production shows.

There are several other wells drilling in the pool, or near it that should be completed within the next ten days or two weeks. One of these is the No. 3 Ramsower of the West-Adams Petroleum company, another is the No. 2 Higgin-

## CROSS PLAINS TESTS HOLDING INTEREST NOW

CROSS PLAINS, July 9. — Two new wells on outside locations, that are nearing pay depths in the new Cross Plains field have served to keep attention well centered on the development of that section over the week. Outstanding interest in this play centers around the test of Brannon and Murray on the Bonnett and Booth land, to the west of former drilling and the drilling wells of Shaw and Rathke on the Miller land leading to the north from the group of producers of that section.

The Brannon and Murray test is drilling the big line at a depth of 1350 feet, and the No. 6 well of Shaw and Rathke is at 1200 feet. The pay is found at an approximate depth of 1600 feet and both wells are expected to test the sand early the coming week.

At the extreme northeast of the territory and an approximate one mile from these tests the outside wells of Hill and West and L. G.

Bradstreet, both located on the Waller land, are sharing in the general interest.

These wells are also testing outside territory to the east of the production at that point of the field though not yet near the depth of the pay.

The Hill and West well is at 950 feet and the Bradstreet test is now down 640 feet. Other wells now drilling on locations closer to the trend of former development are expected to add further information on the probable future trend of the field, and a wide area of new territory will come in for testing within the next two or three weeks following the outcome of these wells.
