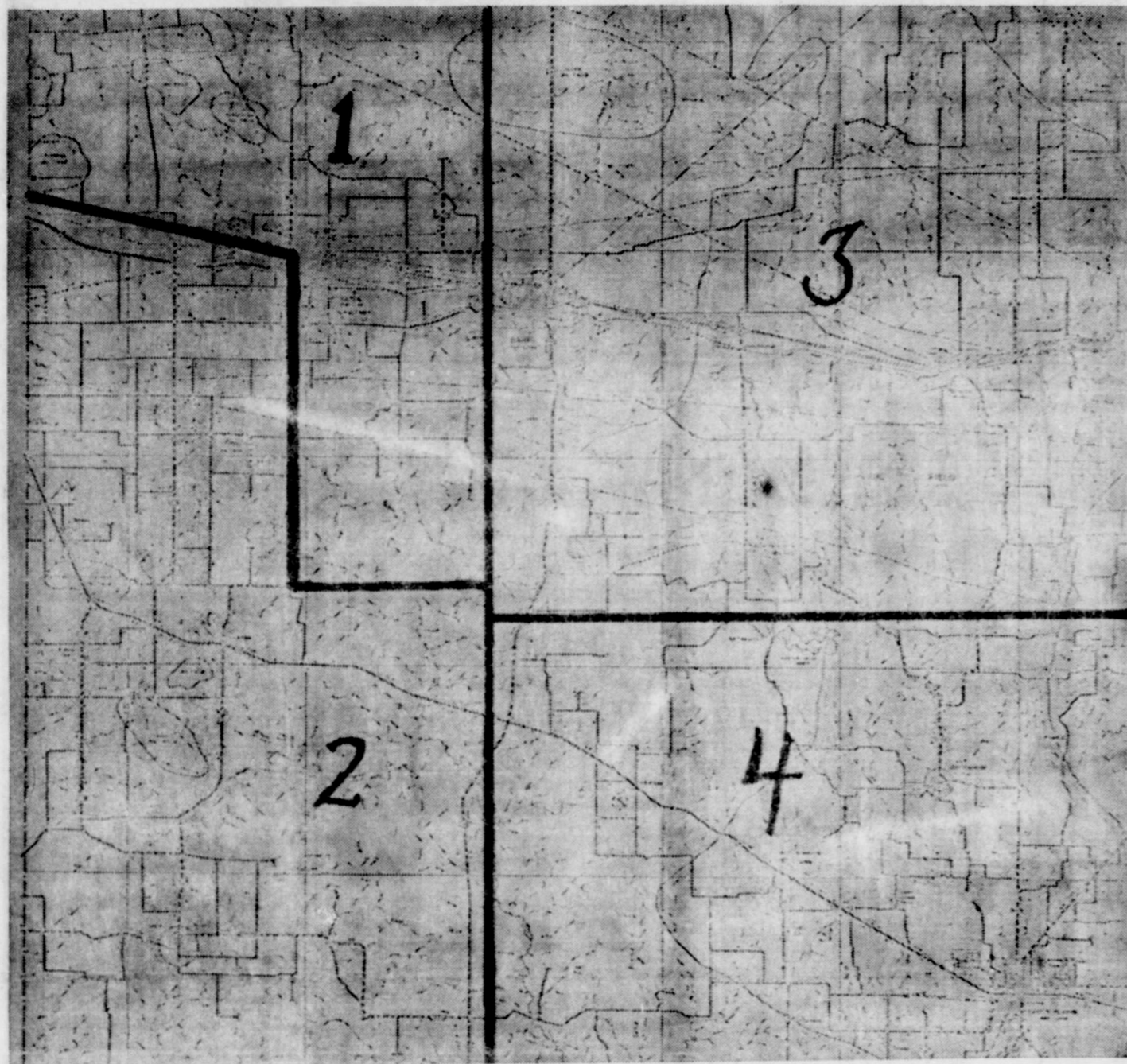


County Proposes Re-Districting Plan



Shown above is the proposed re-districting of Callahan County. A recent court decision requires the county to be divided into four precincts of approximately equal population. County Commissioners have studied

the problem at length and have agreed that the proposal as shown by the map, may be the best division possible.

BAIRD — After a long study of the many factors involved, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County has agreed on a proposed re-districting of Callahan County. The recent court decision requiring a county to be divided into four precincts of approximately equal population has resulted in the need for a change in the Commissioners Precincts in this county. Although the Court's decision

does not appear to take these factors into consideration, it was necessary to attempt to divide the county as equally as possible, not only in regard to population but as pertains to roads and area. Nevertheless the heavy population of the Clyde area presented a distinct problem to the Commissioners in trying to decide how to draw the proposed lines. Based upon the latest figures for poll registration, the Clyde area alone contained over 1800 registered voters, whereas, each precinct requires approximately 1300 voters to be divided equally. This necessitated a division of Clyde and brought about a smaller precinct for Precinct No. 1 than was desired. The Commissioners have studied this problem at length and have agreed that the proposal as shown by the map may be the best division possible. However, in a desire to have other ideas and opinions, they appointed Jack Scott of Cross Plains, Frank Chrane of Oplin, Weldon Edwards of Clyde and John D. Isenhower of Putnam as a Citizens Advisory Committee to look into the proposal and further study the division as regards population, roads and area.

Clyde School Bond Passes By Narrow Margin, 312 - 302

CLYDE — Voters in the Clyde Independent School District decided to accept a \$750,000 school building program, Saturday, by

a small margin. The bond issue carried 312 to 302.

Votes by boxes were: taxpayers box - 298 for and 292 against and the non-taxpayers box 14 for and 10 against.

To be funded by the bond issue will be a new elementary school, a new science facility, music building, and library for the high school, and remodeling of existing school buildings.

The School Board was to meet Tuesday to canvass officially the bond election vote, and to hold a public hearing on the school tax rate.

If the Saturday count stands, bids will probably be let about the first of the year.

The new elementary school will be built on a 17.4 acre tract about 3/4 mile west of the present campus. The elementary building will house kindergarten class through grade five and would be completed by January, 1976.

Present primary and elementary classroom buildings will be remodeled to house high school vocational courses. The present high school would become a middle school for grades 6-8.

The building which presently holds elementary and junior high students will be used for high school classrooms.

The new science building, library and music building will be built adjacent to this building.

The tax rate has tentatively been set for \$1.30 per \$100 valuation, based on 40 percent of appraised value.

Robert D. Harber Dies Sunday

CLYDE — Robert D. Harber, 81, of Hatchell, died at 4:20 p. m. Sunday at Clyde Nursing Home, after a five-week illness. Funeral services were held in Abilene Tuesday, at 2:30 p. m., with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Born March 12, 1893 in Hays County, he moved with his parents to the Caps community in 1907. He lived there until the early 1940's when he moved to Hatchell. He was a retired grocer, postmaster and farmer, and was a member of the Hatchell Church of Christ.

He married Dora Elizabeth Wetsel on June 7, 1914 in Abilene. She died in 1970.

Survivors include three sons, J. C. of Abilene, L. C. of Snyder and Robert L. of Clyde; two daughters, Mrs. J. C. Weir of Jal, N. M. and Mrs. W. C. Wilmett of Plains; three brothers, Oscar of Ballinger, Curtis D. and O. C., both of Abilene, two sisters, Alma and Jackie Harber, both of Abilene; 14 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

City of Baird Attempting to Meet State Regulations on Dump Ground

BAIRD — It is a great challenge, but the City of Baird is in the process of meeting the regulation requirements of Texas Air Control Board and the Texas State Department of Health. They are requesting the City to discontinue outdoor burning and initiate a satisfactory disposal system, which is to provide a city dump under the same regulations governing metropolitan areas as larger cities. This entails, in brief, landfills in three pits, one for dead animals, one for limbs, brush, etc., and one for other garbage, boxes, etc.

Regulations state each pit must be covered with six inches of sand at the end of each day, the final closing of each pit requires two feet of soil.

In order for the City of Baird to meet these regulations, the City has purchased at a cost of \$29,117.00, a new 941B Caterpillar Tractor, equipped with a ripper and 1 1/2 yard bucket, to dig the pits, compact the material dumped into the pits, and to cover this material with the required 6-inches of sand.

To take care of some of the brush that can no longer be burned, the City has bought, at a cost of \$4,200.00, a Trailer-mounted Brush Chipper with a 300 Ford 6 Cylinder Industrial engine to chop up the brush into small chips. This will require less pit space, as the chips would not have to be buried and could be used on fields or gardens as a mulch.

In order of the City of Baird to carry out these plans, it will be necessary that a man be on duty at the Dump Ground to operate this equipment and to see that the trash is dumped in the proper pits. In order for the dump ground attendant to be able to control the dumping of

trash, it will be necessary for him to live there at the area. With the mobile home set up, water well equipped with pump, septic tank installed, electric lines run to supply the home with electricity, this means a total of \$40,000.00 being spent to meet the governmental demands. There will be added expenditures in clearing the old rubbish that has been dumped all over the area in past years. The old rubbish will have to be disposed of the same as any new that is carried out there.

There will also be the added expense of the attendant's monthly salary, maintenance and operating expense of the equipment.

It has only been a few months since a new packer trash truck was purchased. This was a \$9,000.00 expenditure to improve the trash collecting here in the city.

There are at this time 20 regular employees of the City, with a monthly payroll of \$7,774.00. At the regular Council Meeting of August 27, it was voted to give these employees a 10 percent salary increase, as the cost of living is such it is difficult, with an average monthly income of \$388.70, to meet their individual family expenses.

This is only a portion of the expense necessary to operate a small city. Just thought you should know where some of the money you pay the City of Baird for taxes and utilities goes.

Lone Star Gas Receives Railroad Commission Order for Rate Increase

DALLAS — Lone Star Gas Co. received a Texas Railroad Commission order today authorizing an increase in the intra-company charge for gas ultimately sold to residential and commercial customers and for distribution unaccounted for gas.

Based on a 1972 volume of 130 billion cubic feet for such gas, Lone Star requested in May of 1973, an increase of 8.1c per thousand cubic feet. The request was for the recovery of a return and other costs associated with the company's 400-mile West Texas pipeline, a return of \$9.6 million for advance payments and prepayments as of the date of filing to obtain new gas supplies and to recover the cost the company had incurred to purchase gas, as of the date of filing. The Commission authorized a return on the investments and recovery of the cost of purchased gas. An earlier examiners' report recommended no return on the pipeline. A 3.56c increase was granted by the Commission in this proceeding.

That portion of the increase which represents the increased

cost of purchased gas will be flowed-through to residential and commercial customers, where authorized. Lone Star must apply to the cities and towns it serves for the approval of the balance of the increase.

The Commission also ordered a continuation of the automatic gas cost adjustment provision authorized in 1972, which permits a flow-through of 65 percent of the increase in the weighted average cost of gas on a semi-annual basis. Lone Star had requested a monthly 100 percent adjustment.

ARE YOU SURE YOU WANT TO BE "LIBERATED"?

God created you and gave you a beautiful and exalted place to fill. No woman in history has ever enjoyed such privileges, luxuries, and freedom as American women. Yet, a tiny minority of dissatisfied, highly vocal, militant women insist that you are being exploited as a "domestic drudge" and "a pretty toy." And they are determined to "liberate" you — whether you want it or not!

What is "liberation"? Ask women in Cuba. Castro "liberated" Cuba! Remember?

WHAT IS THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT?

On March 22, 1972, the U. S. Congress passed the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) and sent it to the states for ratification. If it is ratified by 38 states, it will become law, enforced by the federal government, superseding all state laws on related subjects.

The Amendment reads: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any states on account of sex." Simple, isn't it? Deceptively simple. Sounds good, doesn't it? BUT HAVE YOU LOOKED AT THE HOOK INSIDE THE BAIT?

THE MOST DRASTIC MEASURE

Senator Sam Ervin called the ERA "the most drastic measure in Senate history." Why? Because it strikes at the very foundation of family life, and the home is the foundation of our nation. Can you possibly avoid being drastically affected by the ERA? NOT A CHANCE!

Actually, it is a Loss of Rights Amendment. How will it affect YOU?

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR RIGHT NOT TO WORK?

If you are married, you may choose to work outside your home. But you may choose to stay at home, to rear your children, to be supported by your husband. The ERA will abolish this right. It will invalidate all laws which require the husband to support his family and will make the wife equally responsible for support. You can be forced to supply half the family support, or all of it, if you are a better wage earner (pp. 944, 945, Yale Law Journal, which was inserted in the Congressional Record by Senator Birch Bayh, leading proponent of ERA).

What about your children? You can be forced to put them in a federal day care center, if one is available. And to see that one is available is a major goal of the National Organization for Women (NOW) — leaders in the movement to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment.

Under the ERA, if a wife fails to support her husband, he can use it as grounds for divorce (Yale Law Journal, p. 951).

This can work a special hardship on senior women who have spent their lives rearing their families and are not prepared to enter the job market.

WILL THE ERA HELP DIVORCED WOMEN?

Divorced women will lose the customary right of child custody, child support, and/or alimony, and can be forced to pay child support and alimony, if her husband wins custody of the children (Yale Law Journal, p. 952).

WHAT ABOUT OTHER EFFECTS ON FAMILY LIFE?

Wife and children will not be required to wear the name of husband and father. They can choose any name they wish. Can you imagine the resulting confusion?

According to leading law counsels, the ERA will permit homosexuals to "marry" and adopt children.

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR RIGHT TO PRIVACY?

The aim of NOW and other pro-ERA groups is to totally "desexigrate" everything. Professor Paul Freund, Harvard Law School, testified that ERA: "would require there be no segregation of the sexes in prison, reform schools, public restrooms, and other public facilities."

This includes all public schools, college dormitories, and hospital rooms.

DO YOU WANT YOUR HUSBAND TO SLEEP IN BARRACKS WITH WOMEN?

If your husband is in the armed forces, or a fireman, what can you expect under ERA? It will be illegal to have separate facilities—so your husband will be sharing sleeping quarters, restrooms, showers and/or foxholes with women.

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR RIGHT NOT TO BE DRAFTED?

Some women are crying for "equal rights" in the armed forces. But do you want them to abolish your right NOT to be drafted? ERA will do this. All women

will register at age eighteen, subject to all military duties including combat.

If you have small children, "whichever parents was called first might be eligible for service; the remaining parent, male or female, would be deferred" (Yale Law Journal, p. 973). Do you want this for your daughters? Men, do you want your wives and daughters living in barracks with men? Going into combat with them?

DO YOU WANT PROTECTIVE LAWS AGAINST SEX CRIMES?

The ERA will abolish "seduction laws, statutory rape laws, laws prohibiting obscene language in the presence of women, prostitution and 'manifest danger' laws" and all laws against forcing women into prostitution (Yale Law Journal, pp. 954, 964).

WILL THE ERA PROVIDE BETTER PAY FOR WOMEN?

Not at all. Proponents of ERA incessantly sing the tune: "We want equal pay for equal work." They do not tell you that this is already guaranteed under:

- (1) The Civil Rights Act of 1964, Subchapter VI: Equal Employment Opportunities (42 U.S. Code 2000e-2).
- (2) The Equal Opportunities of 1972 (Public Law 92-261).

So the "equal pay for equal work" argument is deceptive—merely a smokescreen to hide the real intent of the ERA.

WILL THE ERA HELP WORKING WOMEN?

As noted above, it will NOT provide higher pay or increased job opportunities. It will NOT cause a husband to do more work around the house. It WILL, however, very adversely affect women in industry, by invalidating ALL PROTECTIVE LAWS FOR WOMEN—laws regulating weight lifting restrictions, rest periods, excessive working hours, and maternity leaves.

The ERA will do nothing for teachers. Their protection is already guaranteed by law. It WILL, however, adversely affect education by eliminating all single sex schools—military schools, seminaries, or women's colleges.

HOW WILL THE ERA AFFECT CHURCHES?

The National Organization for Women (NOW) is demanding that women "be ordained in religious bodies where that right is still denied." To refuse to do this will be illegal under ERA. One goal of NOW is to abolish the tax-exempt status of all churches.

A WOMAN'S UTOPIA?

At women's lib rallies, Russia is proudly cited as a country where women have equal rights. Harry Trimborn, staff writer, Los Angeles Times, visited Moscow and described just how "great" it is (L. A. Times, Dec. 23, 1970): "The women do the work and the men tell them how to do it. Like sweeping the streets, bricklaying, loading cargo ships, collecting garbage, building dams, digging ditches and mining coal... then she must spend at least 50% of her off-work time shopping and cooking. She can expect little help from her husband."

A Russian woman must put her baby in a state-operated child care unit. She (as well as men) can be jailed for refusing to engage in "socially useful labor" or for leading a "parasitic way of life."

This is a living picture of "liberation"!

CAN A STATE REVOKE ITS RATIFICATION OF ERA?

Absolutely! When 38 states ratify the ERA, it will become the 27th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution. At one time, 33 had ratified. Nebraska and Tennessee have rescinded their ratification. "Clearly a state can change its mind either way before the amendment is officially declared to be ratified," (Prof. Charles L. Black, Jr., of Yale University Law School, Congressional Record, May 8, 1973, p. s8522).

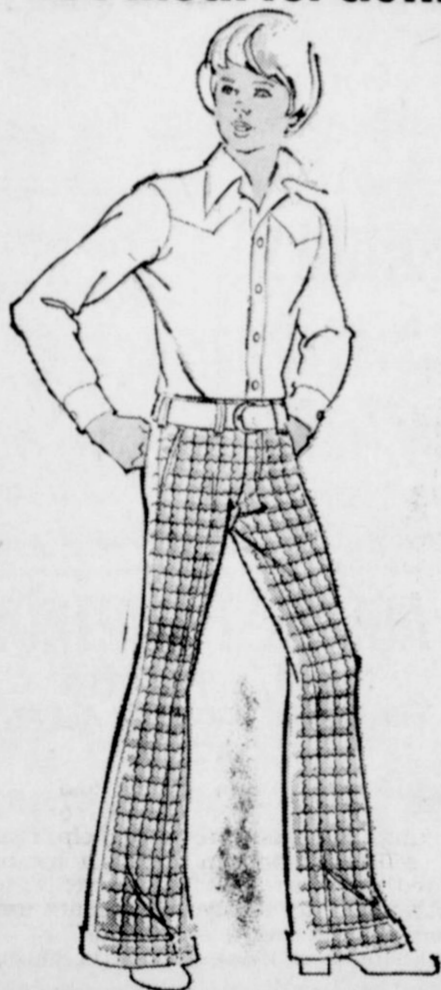

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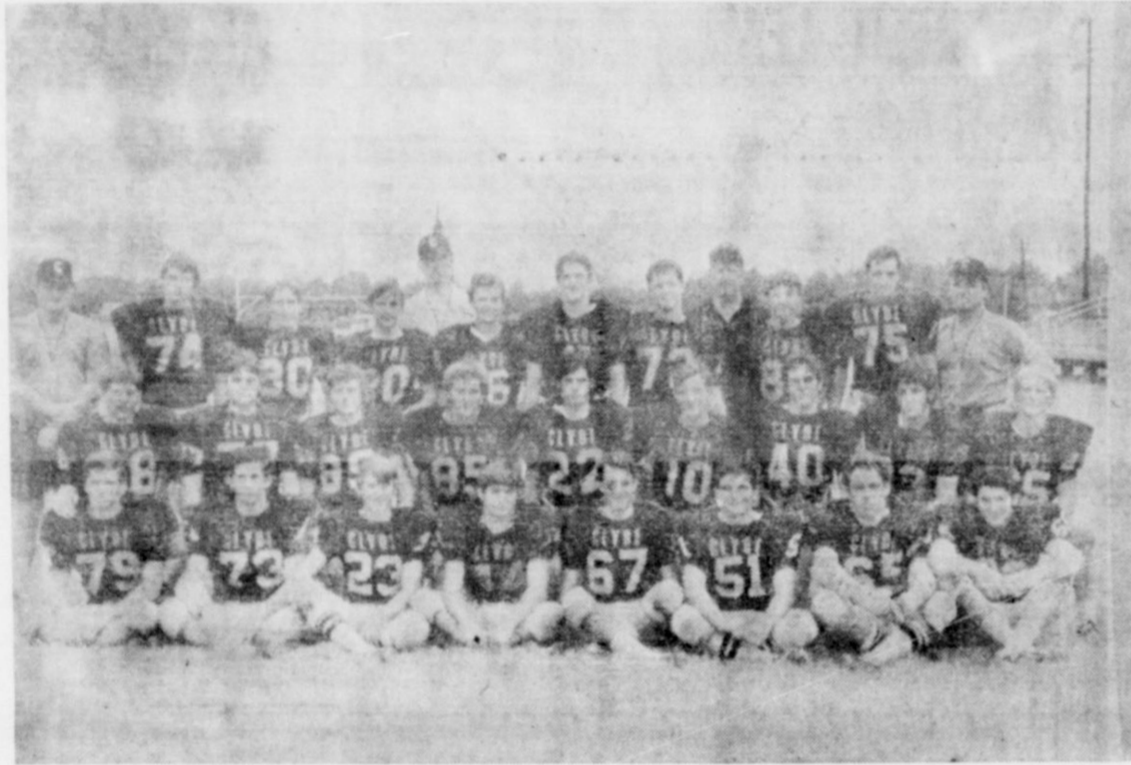


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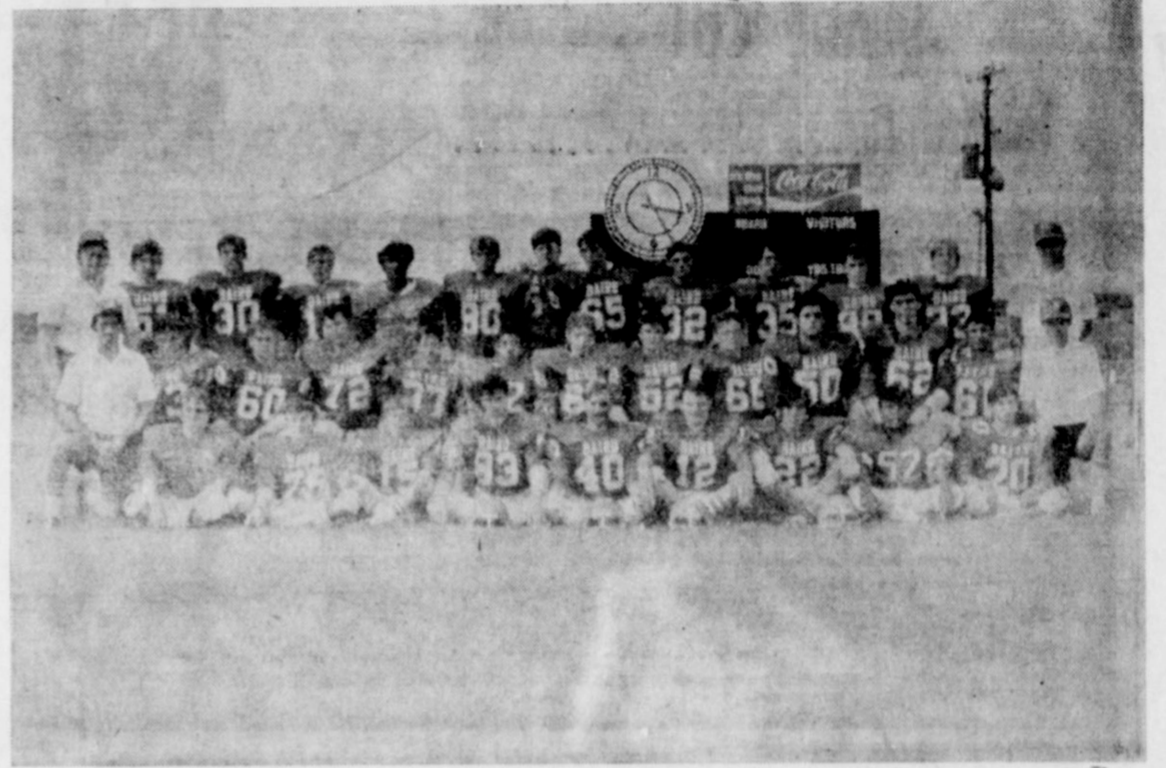
