Cotton Outlook for Cisco Territory Very Good

Farmers Told How to Poison Boll Weevils Where Prospective Yield Will Justify Expense; Farm Notes

The outlook for the Cisco cotton crop seems unusually good at this time. Boll weevils have been found in most of the fields visited during the past several weeks, but they are being held in check in most cases by hot weather. A few of the fields visited, where the prospective yield is over one-third of a bale per acre, might well be poisoned. Poisoning is being done successfully all over the cotton belt. Some very definite rules for this work have been worked out at the U. S. Government Experiment Farm at Tallula, La. These rules are briefly given below:

1. Poison thoroughly, or not at all.
2. Use a good grade of calcium arsenate powder at the rate of 5 to 7 pounds per acre for each application.
3. A good dust gun is absolutely essential. Dusting with a sack is sufficient for leaf worms, but will give very poor results for the boll weevil.
4. Make three applications of poison four days apart. In case of rain within two or three days of any application the process should be repeated.

The most perfect job of poisoning will not get all of the weevils, but will hold them in check sufficiently for a good crop of cotton to be set.

According to a number of articles noticed recently the price of cotton is apt to be much better during the coming season than last season. The United States department of agriculture sends out the following information: "World cotton consumption continues at a rate considerably in excess of last year. Our cotton is being sold in Europe at a very low price, as compared with prices of previous years, and consequently the consumption of American cotton has been very much greater than in previous years. United States export figures for the period July to April, 1926-27, were over ten million bales as compared to about seven million bales for the same period of last year."

A representative from Dallas was in Cisco last week in search of a whole milk supply. Dallas has been getting a large amount of milk from Sherman and other cities to the

north. Sherman is spending \$150,000 on a milk condensing plant and has signed up 5,000 cows, which will cut off a part of the Dallas supply. The visitor was soon informed that Cisco has no surplus milk and that some seventy to eighty thousand pounds of creamery butter is being shipped here annually.

A postal card addressed to the United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., will bring you Farmer's Bulletin No. 876, "Making Butter on the Farm," Bulletin No. 743, on feeding dairy cows, is also good.

R. H. Rush, former county agent of Eastland county, sends the following information as to the use of commercial fertilizers around Cisco: "At Cisco the Cisco Floral Co. used 150 pounds per acre with no results. N. S. Kinard, 125 pounds per acre on corn and cotton and made one-third more. W. J. Poe used 100 pounds per acre on maize and made one-third more. R. A. Latham used 100 pounds per acre on cotton and could see no difference in yield on account of drought. J. N. Rompe used 150 pounds per acre and left rows without it. The fertilized cotton made twice as much."

WILCOX FINDS POULTRY AND TRUCK PAYING

Samuel Wilcox no longer depends upon cotton for a money crop, but plants sweet potatoes, watermelons, peas, beans and okra, and raises chickens and turkeys on the side.

Mr. Wilcox, who lives southeast of Cisco, has a small sandy land farm that lends itself well to truck growing. He found that on the small acreage he was able to plant and cultivate, he could not make enough cotton to pay expenses and live, especially after the weevil became so persistent in his deadly work on the plant. So he decided to turn to truck growing and poultry raising.

He has sold okra, beans and peas since they came on the market. He is now busy marketing his melon crop which is bringing in nice returns. Peas are not very high in the market now, he says, but they are prolific and make up in quantity what they lack in price. He has about four acres in sweet potatoes, which are doing well, and from which he expects to harvest at least 800 bushels of potatoes. The ordinary price for potatoes ranges from \$1 to \$3. He expects to get a reasonable quantity of his on the early market and hence may be able to get around \$3 per bushel for those.

Mrs. Wilcox does most of the

poultry raising. She has sold several hundred fryers, and has a large drove of turkeys that will be ready for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday markets. She will make almost as much from her poultry as he will from all his other crops.

Eastland County Grand Jury Hits Home Brew Manufacture in Presence Of Children; Many Indictments Voted

The Eastland county grand jury finally adjourned Saturday afternoon at Eastland following an extended session, and as its closing act made a report to the court in which the unsanitary condition of the courthouses and the county jail was noted, with the suggestion that the buildings had been neglected in the past, and a warning against making of home brew was voiced. Many parents in Eastland county have developed the habit of making home brew in the presence of their own children, the report stated, and attention to the fact that such practice is in violation of the law was called.

Following is the report in full as returned by the grand jury, of which P. W. Campbell, B. S. Huce and R. Q. Lee of Cisco were members:

To the Hon. George L. Davenport, Judge of the 91st district court:

We, your grand jury, duly empaneled for the June term, 1927, of said court, respectfully submit to your honor the following report:

We have been in session 18 days during which time we have examined 273 witnesses and upon their testimony have returned 52 true bills of indictment, of which ninety were felonies and two were misdemeanors.

We have used our best judgment in returning bills, seeking to indict people whom we believed to have been criminally inclined. We may have erred in our judgment in some instances.

We desire to commend the officers for the assistance given the grand jurors in carrying on their investigations. We suggest that the officers throughout the entire county, both county officers and city officers, co-operate in all matters pertaining to enforcement of law better perhaps than they have in the past.

It has been called to our attention that there are a number of papers in the county who are being cared for by the municipalities out of local charity funds, and we recommend that the Commissioners court investigate these cases carefully and arrange, if in their power, to have these cases transferred to the county poor house or to distribute such funds as may or might be available for their support.

We have examined the court house and jail and find that neither the court house nor the jail is kept in the best sanitary condition and we recommend that the proper officers of the county look into these matters and see if a better sanitary condition cannot be brought about. This grand jury has received information that petty jurors have complained about the unsanitary condition of the jury rooms, and that some jurors choose to transfer their covers from the beds to the floor rather than to sleep on the beds in the jury rooms. This is only a conscientious suggestion made by this grand jury and we do not mean to criticize but we feel that in some instances our court house, jail and public buildings are being neglected.

We believe that there are laws on the statute books that are inadequate and not supported by public sentiment, and we believe that our lawmakers should give serious thought to such matters and endeavor to correct them.

We especially wish to thank the County Attorney J. Frank Sparks, and Assistant County Attorney Sterling Holloway, and the Sheriff's department and Judge George L. Davenport, for their assistance given and courtesies shown.

Our investigation has disclosed a situation in our county of such

a nature and character as to challenge our attention. We reluctantly report a very prevalent practice of the manufacture and use of beer. It has been brought to our attention that a great many citizens of the county make beer in their own homes in the presence of their children and use the beverage freely. We are constrained to believe that the head of every family, and even any child who has reached the age of accountability, is cognizant of the fact that the manufacture of beer is in violation of the laws of our state. We feel that such practice is not conducive to a wholesome respect for the laws of Texas on the part of the younger people of our county. We deplore the attitude of quite a large per cent of the people which permits them to indulge in the violations of the law in this respect, and commend to them a very thoughtful consideration of their own responsibility to the law, and of their duty as citizens to foster a real respect for law in their community.

Having completed our deliberations, we ask this honorable court to discharge us from further service.

TEXAS LEADS IN FARMER'S AUTOMOBILES

WICHITA, Kans., Aug. 1.—Texas leads all the other states in the number of farm-owned automobiles with 285,276, according to a report made public by the research bureau of the Coleman Lamp and Store company here. Illinois ranks second in farm cars with 233,196, the report sets forth. Ohio is third, with 231,977. Then comes Iowa with 229,000, Pennsylvania with 219,288, New York with 204,391, and Wisconsin with 204,182. Number of farm-owned automobiles in the United States has doubled in the last six years, the report points out. There are now 4,528,422 cars on American farms, compared with 2,100,000 in 1921. "Widespread use of automobiles for farm work has greatly increased agricultural efficiency in recent years," says the report. "Adoption of other labor saving devices including milking machines, tractors, safety pressure gasoline lanterns providing adequate lighting, and cultivators have enabled farmers to boost their earnings by accomplishing more work. Household drudgery of farmers' wives has been greatly lightened by introduction of gasoline pressure stoves providing quick clean heat, washing machines, and running water." Seven states have more than 200,000 farm-owned automobiles, the report points out, while nine more record more than 100,000 cars in operation on farms.

MOODY MAKES STATEMENT ON AMENDMENTS

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.—Governor Dan Moody made a post-election statement Tuesday, in which he said the road to justice is long and tedious, but that the people ultimately travel it. He said nothing about a special session. With the amendments defeated, it is not certain now that a special session will be called this fall. It may come later in the winter, as advocated by a number of members. Moody's statement follows:

"The result of the election could be foreseen some days ago. Public lethargy contributed largely toward the defeat of the amendments. The organized opposition of corporate interests was sufficient to defeat the tax amendment in the absence of any campaign of education in its behalf, and the opposition to it was damaging to the judicial amendment. These were the two important amendments, and both were for the benefit of the masses of the people.

"The road to justice is still long, tedious and expensive. The congested dockets of the courts make the administration of justice very slow, and in many instances the cost of a lawsuit is beyond the reach of the average man. The judicial amendment was intended to improve our judicial system and contribute toward bringing justice more nearly within the reach of rich and poor alike. It was a measure for public economy in a necessary function of government, the administration of law.

"The tax amendment was intended to lighten the burdens that our unequal system of taxation imposes upon the farmer and the home owner. Wasteful and unequal system of taxation which penalizes agriculture and home ownership is an obstacle to the development of the country. The imperfections that work this injustice remains the problem of the people of Texas."

Mass Meeting Called to Frame New Judiciary Reforms After Defeat of Amendments Monday

DALLAS, Aug. 2. — Following defeat of the four amendments in Monday's special election, call for a mass meeting to be held in Dallas next fall for the purpose of drafting a new amendment to the judiciary laws to provide what those in charge say will be "real court reform." was issued here today. The call is as follows:

To the People of Texas:

The press of Texas began the fight which has just ended so happily in the overwhelming defeat of all the constitutional amendments voted upon today. With no end in view but the public welfare, the newspapers have thrown open their columns for the publication of the facts bearing upon these amendments. The results show that the people have been studying the facts as thus presented.

The defeat of the proposed judiciary amendment is a mandate which calls for real judicial reform, for an end to the intolerable confusion, uncertainty, delay and cost of litigation, and for the abolishment of the courts of civil appeals. This was the issue directly made by the proponents of that amendment, which was designed to perpetuate those courts. The people have declared their will and they know how to enforce their demands.

In obedience to the instructions and authority given by the Texas Press association at its late meeting in El Paso, and in accordance with the sentiment expressed by the people at the polls yesterday we issue a call for a mass meeting representing the state at large, to be held at Dallas during the next state fair, concurrently with the session of the Texas Press association. The purpose will be to adopt plans to carry on the fight in the next campaign for the reform of the courts and for better enforcement of the law. All

TRUCK BREAKS DE LEON MAN'S BACK; MAY DIE

DE LEON, Aug. 2.—Jesse Barker, 34, married and father of one child, Monday fell from a heavy truck and the wheel passed over his back, crushing a vertebrae, paralyzing the upper portion of his body. No hope is held for his recovery.

A son of Jack Boyd, living near De Leon, let an axe slip while chopping wood Monday and lost much blood before a physician closed the wound.

Bill Jenney, 62-year-old clock maker who for the last 32 years has been winding and tending the 1,050 clocks of the Savoy hotel in London, claimed many years ago that at any hour of the day or night he could tell the time within half a minute. This uncanny ability baffles the British Medical society, members of which have tried by numerous tests to dislodge what they call his "acute psychosomatic poise."

GRAND JURORS TOLD ABOUT BOND THEFT

FORT WORTH, Aug. 2.—W. P. Bomar, of the firm of Broad & Bomar, from whose offices here approximately \$100,000 in negotiable securities was stolen last December, appeared before the Tarrant county grand jury today to testify in the bond theft. Indictments will probably be returned against J. H. Lane, in custody in California, and three others.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 2.—Positive identification of thousands of dollars worth of bonds stolen from a Fort Worth firm in 1926, found in the apartment of J. H. Lane and

L. M. Driver, led to their arrest as suspected members of a national criminal ring, according to the sheriff's office today. More than \$100,000 in gilt edge securities was recovered from a grip owned by J. H. Lane. A majority of the loot was identified by R. H. Hardy, vice president of the Fort Worth National bank, as part of the \$125,000 worth of bonds taken from a dynamited safe in the office of Broad & Bomar.

CROSS PLAINS HOTEL BURNS TO GROUND

CROSS PLAINS, Aug. 2.—Fire of undetermined origin discovered Monday morning destroyed the 30-room Grace Hotel and adjacent plant of the Cross Plains bakery. Both buildings were of frame construction and buildings and contents are a total loss.

The fire appeared to originate in the walls between the buildings and guests in the hotel escaped through burning halls and in most instances clothing and all personal effects were lost though none injured. The loss totals about \$15,000 with but little insurance. The Cross Plains chemical truck had returned only a few hours earlier in the night from Pioneer, where a call for assistance was answered when fire broke out in a drug store, rapidly spreading to additional buildings with a loss of about \$8,000 before being brought under control. The burned buildings in Cross Plains will be replaced immediately with buildings of fire-proof construction.

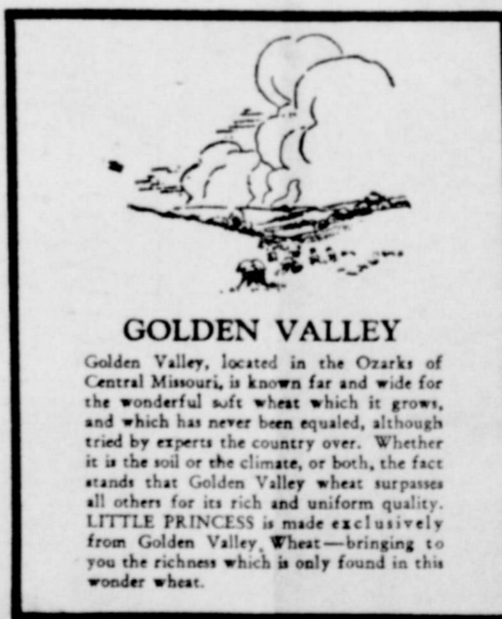

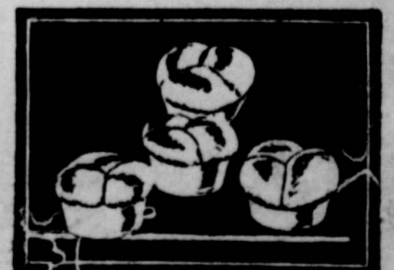

4 CANDIDATES FOR CONGRESS OVER COUNTY

RANGER, Aug. 3.—It begins to look as if Eastland county would have at least one, and possibly four candidates of its own for congress in the coming campaign. Judge N. N. Rosenquest of Eastland former county judge of Stephens county, former district attorney of the old 22nd judicial district and present governor of Texas...

Friends of R. Q. Lee of Cisco, former president of the West Texas chamber of commerce and the builder of the Cisco & Northwestern railroad, now owned and operated by the Texas & Pacific, are urging him to enter the contest for Mr. Blanton's place in congress provided Mr. Blanton does not offer for re-election.

Hon. M. H. Hagaman of Ranger, present Eastland county representative in the state legislature and one of the most competent men in this district, has many friends who will urge him to enter the race for Congressman Blanton's seat in the event Mr. Blanton is not a candidate for re-election.

R. N. Grisham of Eastland, who once made the race against Mr. Blanton, is also spoken of as a possible candidate from the 17th district should Mr. Blanton retire or become a candidate for the United States senate in the coming campaign. Directors of the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association in a special meeting Monday afternoon closed a contract with D. J. Moss of the Bankhead Feed Mill whereby the association agreed to use and recommend the Bankhead feed so long as its quality comes up to standard. The Bankhead association will thus become distributors of Bankhead feed, and will create distributing points throughout the district served by the association. In compensation, the association will receive a brokerage fee.

Following the meeting, J. B. Chandler, manager of the Bankhead association, gave out the following statement: "Directors of the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association feel that Eastland county can develop not only a cooperative association for marketing of eggs, but by this act can develop an outlet for the product of the small grain grower of the county and produce a high quality feed at a smaller expense to the poultryman. Egg producers are now able to save 20 to 50 cents per 100 pounds on poultry feed by buying the Bankhead product, which is as good as any on the market today. We also feel that since the merchants and banks of Eastland county have backed up the association in the past with their money and efforts, we should in turn back up the business interests of the county where the quality of products is the same and prices are fair. We feel that the arrangement will be highly advantageous both to the Bankhead mill and to the poultry and egg producers of 'The Egg Basket of Texas,' and invite the cooperation of all members of the association and those who wish to see the association the complete success it is due."

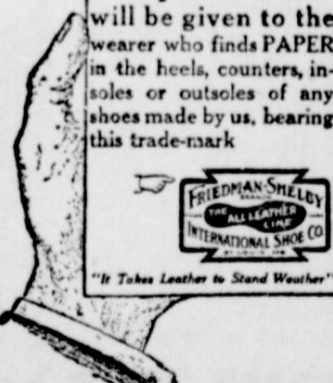
