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## COOLIDGE DEAF TO 2 RADICALS

### MORAN WOMAN KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK

#### OLD HOME TOWN

Judge Eugene Lankford and family have just returned home from a 4,000-mile automobile trip to his former home at Devils Bluff, Ark., and Carysbrook, Va. "We had only one puncture and that was in a garage," he said. The family was accompanied home by Mrs. John Lankford of Devils Bluff, Ark. Judge Lankford said that although he was born in Tennessee, reared in Arkansas, and moved to Texas by choice, the old homestead of his family is in Virginia where he spent part of his five weeks of vacation. He declared the country along the Atlantic seaboard is very beautiful with wonderful hard-surfaced roads, along which have been built so many fine country residences that one never knows when he leaves town and gets into the country. At Asheville, North Carolina, he said he saw many Texans attracted there by the scenery and climate, and that in fact, Mrs. John Lankford said they saw so many Texans vacationing in that section that she wondered who was looking after business at home. However, when they got to Dallas she remarked: "Why, they've all come back home!" Judge Lankford declared that the Asheville region was very beautiful to look upon and that in fact the whole country there looked like a picture. It was cool, too, but the air was humid. "One can go anywhere in this country that he chooses. He may see beautiful country and be glad to make the visit. But when it comes to a beautiful climate, a spot where one may go to bed at night exhausted but is sure to get up the next morning feeling full of life, and a good place to live, I'll take Cisco every time," he declared.

#### WIFE OF CISCO LAUNDRY TRUCK DRIVER IS DEAD

Mrs. Carlos E. Breazeale, 18, wife of the Putnam, Moran and Albany agent of the Cisco Steam Laundry, was fatally injured in an automobile wreck near Dallas on the Dallas-Hutchins pike about 1 o'clock Saturday morning, according to word reaching here shortly afterward. Charles Brown, owner of the Cisco laundry, received word of the accident here and went immediately to Moran to get Mr. Breazeale who was then taken from here to Dallas by his brother, Foster Breazeale, book-keeper for the laundry here. According to the reports here, two others were injured in the accident, Lowell Golden, 18, of Dallas and Ruth Geddis, 18, of Shawnee, Okla. Their injuries were said to be serious. Other members of the party included Marie Oliver, Ray Trimble and J. B. Nichols, all of whom were unharmed. Mrs. Breazeale's skull was fractured, and she died a few hours after being taken to a Dallas hospital. She had been hurled from the back seat of the automobile when it left the road and plunged into a ditch, although the car did not turn over. According to members of the party, Nichols was driving and he swerved the car around what he thought was a car parked in the road without lights. He swerved too far, and the car went into the ditch. Mrs. Breazeale was visiting her mother and sister in Dallas when the accident occurred. She had been sick and had gone home to recuperate. Where the funeral services will take place was not known here Saturday, although it was believed burial will take place at a small town near Dallas where the family formerly lived.

#### College Boys Rum Runners

DIXON, Ill., Aug. 6.—The venture of two college students in high finance in the booze running business came to grief today after John Nielson, 24, and Norman Welch, 22, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, were arrested with 50 gallons of alcohol in their car. The young men claimed to be students in the state university where Welch is preparing himself to be a minister.

#### Mexican Labor Secretary Out

LAREDO, Aug. 6.—American business men returning from Mexico City today say that a report is current in official circles there that Luis E. Morones, secretary of labor in President Calles' cabinet, will be relieved of his post soon. The U. S. government is understood to have made representations to the Mexican government suggesting replacing Morones with some one less hostile to the United States.

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#### Parker Has Shipped 300 Cars of Melons

#### Anti-Saloon Chief Guilty of Contempt

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 6.—Convicted of contempt of the state supreme court Edward F. Shumaker, Indiana anti-saloon league superintendent, today was sentenced to serve 90 days on the state farm and fine \$250 and costs.

#### LEVINE HAS BIG QUARREL WITH PILOT

LE BOURGET, France, Aug. 6.—New legal action was threatened against Charles A. Levine by Marcel Droughin after a tense scene at the latter's garage. Droughin, who Levine quarreled with at Droughin's mechanics and Inter-continental auto company, came to the field and arranged to have the replacement engine shipped to America. Droughin was then called and the quarrel ensued. Droughin's lawyers announced he would take drastic action to force Levine to sign a definite contract with the aviator.

#### Haskell Sheriff Finally Steps Out

HASKELL, Aug. 6.—The deadlock existing here since July 1 that has caused Haskell county to be without an active sheriff was suddenly broken yesterday when J. C. Turnbow relinquished all claims to the office and was succeeded by Wayne Perry, who qualified to serve. Turnbow had been out of the city for several days. He was elected in last summer's election and served until July 1, when, after having been given 25 days in which to file a sufficient bond the commissioners' court decided that the law had operated to make him ineligible to perform the duties of the office and so declared the office vacant.

#### Roberts Family In Auto Wreck

Dr. T. T. Roberts, accompanied by Rev. Thomas Lenox, left here Saturday morning in the latter's automobile for Midland in answer to a message that members of the Roberts family had been in an automobile wreck there. The message gave no details, although it was understood none of the family were injured. The automobile, it was said, was badly wrecked.

#### Coleman Wildcat Standing in Oil

A rank wildcat, five miles from production, was reported Saturday from Coleman county where Ross and Farth No. 1 J. A. Lewis was reported standing 400 feet in oil in the ten-inch hole. The oil was struck at 1,068 feet, and now appears to be good for 25 barrels a day. The well is right on the highway between Coleman and Santa Anna. The oil is of high gravity.

#### Baird Youth Dies From Concussion

ABILENE, Aug. 6.—Guy C. Smith, 16, nephew of Rex A. Smith and Glen Smith of Abilene, died at 7:45 a. m. Friday at the Baptist sanitarium of concussion of the brain, the result of meningitis and following a ten days illness.

#### Ten Cents a Mile For Air Passengers

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 6.—Air passenger service between Dallas and Chicago by way of Kansas City will be started by the National Airways September 1, according to Manager Paul Henderson, who arrived here today. The fare will be ten cents per mile, or \$55.20 from Dallas to Kansas City and \$44.00 from Kansas City to Chicago.

#### \$50,000 Fire Loss Suffered in Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH, Aug. 6.—Fire caused an estimated fire loss of \$50,000 at the Ladd Furniture warehouse here.

#### 10,000 Persons See Dallas Plane Christened by Governor on Eve Of Attempted Round the World Flight

DALLAS, Aug. 6.—In the presence of 10,000 persons, Governor Moody this afternoon unveiled the "Dallas Spirit" giant Swallow airplane, in which Captain Bill Erwin will attempt to fly around the world. Governor Moody dived on Col. Lindbergh's flight and compared Erwin's exploits to those of both the aviator and immediately thereafter in flying to Hong Kong and then across Asia, Europe and then back to Dallas. The governor said that whether or not Erwin is successful does not detract from the great heroism. Captain Erwin spoke briefly, in which he told how proud he was to represent Dallas and to fly so wonderful a ship. Both Erwin and Mrs. Erwin were presented with wrist watches.

#### Moody Changes Mind About Aviation Since Refused Ride Here

Gov. Moody, governor of Texas, has become an aviator since leaving Cisco recently. At that time, the governor was in a hurry to get to Fort Worth to make connections by railroad to San Antonio. It was desired that he stay here as long as he could, and an airplane was tendered him by Col. William E. Easterwood of his staff, to take him to Fort Worth. The governor declined the tender, however, and a special train was operated for him by courtesy of the Texas & Pacific railroad whose vice-president, J. A. Somerville, was here.

#### Ranger Woman Will Recover

Mrs. M. J. Brown, 28, Ranger, seriously injured Friday night when hit by a touring car as she stopped with her companion to render aid to a man hurt in a previous accident five miles south of Strawn on the Bankhead highway, will recover, advises said Saturday.

#### SUSPECT IN ROBBERIES IS BROUGHT HERE

Deputy Sheriff Payne Saturday brought to Cisco one of the four suspects arrested in Fort Worth in connection with robbery of the Elliott drug store, Deluxe cleaners and Shirley barber shop, in an effort to identify him as one of several men who were seen loitering around Cisco several days prior to the robberies. He had given his name as Thomas, and was unable to explain how he happened to have a bullet wound in one foot. Following the Cisco robberies, two men abandoned a Chrysler automobile at Springtown near Weatherford after a gun battle with a merchant they were attempting to rob, and loot from the drug store and the cleaners' was found in the car.

#### Ciscoans Fly Here For Visit

FORT WORTH, Aug. 6.—A defective steering apparatus was attributed as the cause of a collision near Weatherford Friday morning which cost the life of Frank Van Hooser, 39, of Weatherford, who was said to have been standing on the side of a truck which crashed with a Merchant Fast Motor Lines truck. Van Hooser died two hours after the collision from his injuries. The driver of the truck on which he was riding said that he was unaware of the fact that the man was on his truck.

#### East Side Methodist Revival Continuing

The East Side Twelfth street Methodist revival which is still in progress continues to draw interest. Today is to be "homecoming day" for all members of the church, and all are being urged to be present. Sunday school will be held at 10 a. m., followed by preaching at 11 o'clock. In the afternoon Rev. Armstrong will preach to men only, according to the pastor, Rev. W. L. Conell.

#### Rich Amarillo Oil Land in Controversy

AMARILLO, Aug. 6.—A suit attacking validity of the Matilda Robinson survey in Moore county was filed in United States district court here today. The survey embraces approximately 1280 acres, including some of the richest oil producing areas in the Panhandle. The suit is based on the Confederate donating act which the plaintiff claims was passed in violation of the state constitution. A number of oil companies are named defendants.

#### Home of Baltimore Mayor Bombed by Radicals

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 6.—Extra police were called out today to guard public buildings. The order resulted from bombing of the Emmanuel Presbyterian church today. A great hole was torn through the wall of the church. The basement was wrecked, and the masonry weakened so that police lines were thrown about the building. Crowds of curious residents gathered in the streets and they reported hearing three pistol shots before the explosion. The pastor had denounced radicals in a sermon here last Sunday in which he touched on the Sacco-Vanzetti case.

#### FIRE INJURIES CISCOAN WHEN HOUSE BURNS

E. R. Bahan suffered painful but not serious burns about the face and hands about 11 o'clock Friday night when he ran into the blazing interior of his home, 911 West Fourteenth street, to secure his 4-year-old child after an explosion had set fire to the residence. The residence was almost instantly ablaze all over, and was totally destroyed, the fire being so far advanced when firemen arrived that all they could do was to protect nearby property from the flames. Cause of the explosion was not definitely determined, although from its character it is believed it must have been from escaping gas.

#### 16,000 NEW YORK POLICE ON DUTY AFTER BOMBING

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Police Commissioner Joseph A. Warren ordered 16,000 policemen on duty following bombing of two subway stations a few minutes before midnight. Although he did not believe the outrages were part of an organized effort, he recalled all members of the police force back from vacations until after the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti.

#### BOMBING STOPS MAYOR'S VISIT AT FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH, Aug. 6.—Bombing of the home of Mayor W. F. Broening of Baltimore was responsible for the mayor's cancellation of plans to visit the biennial convention of the Dramatic Order Knights of Klomason, which will be held here August 8 to 12. Mayor Broening, with a number of other friends from Baltimore, was due to arrive here at 1:30 Sunday afternoon.

#### EXHIBIT FOR DALLAS FAIR PLANNED HERE

Plans for the Eastland county exhibit to be held at the Dallas Fair this fall were discussed here Friday night at a meeting of secretaries of the various chambers of commerce of the county and the agricultural workers. It was decided to enter the best exhibit in the history of Eastland county in an effort to win a place even higher than that achieved last year when seventh place was awarded the entry. The secretaries were guests of the Cisco chamber of commerce at a dinner at the Country club, followed by a boat ride up Lake Cisco and a plunge in the swimming pool. ### President Powerless to Act In Sacco-Vanzetti Case; One Suspect Held in New York Bombing Outrage

RAPID CITY, S. D., Aug. 6.—President Coolidge is absolutely powerless to intervene in the Sacco-Vanzetti case, it was announced formally today following receipt of several telegrams urging executive clemency. The fate of the two rests entirely with the governor of Massachusetts. President Coolidge could only send his personal views to Fullett, who would be under no obligations to carry them out, it was asserted. The president has not even reviewed court records of the trial. The guard around the summer white house has been ordered to be extra vigilant until after the execution of the two radicals this week for murder.

### "SIDEWALK CHIEFS" AND REAL FIREMEN

It is doubtful if Ciscoans really appreciate fully the work that their volunteer fire department does for them. There is scarcely a fire but what plenty of "sidewalk chiefs" appear to criticize the efforts of the firemen and tell just how it should be done. Yet not one of those most voluble in their criticisms and suggestions ever make the sacrifice necessary to be a member of the fire department. The bulk of those firemen receive no pay whatsoever. They respond to the call of duty at all hours of day and night, under all sorts of weather conditions. They risk their very lives at every fire and often suffer damage to their clothing and other personal belongings. They do the very best they know how to do, and many times that best outshines the work of better organized, well paid city departments. The Daily News feels that such work as the firemen did Friday night in saving adjoining property from catching afire during the Bahan fire is worthy of praise instead of criticism; our fire boys did more than any "sidewalk chief" could ever hope to do.

### RETURN OF THE SURREY

The news that Edsel Ford has ordered an old-fashioned surrey and expects to ride in it with a horse pulling it is no more surprising than the statement of the carriage maker who has the order that the demand for such vehicles is fairly brisk. Any demand at all would seem brisk in these motor days. We have heard that horseback riding is becoming more popular and is no longer reserved for the enjoyment of the well-to-do. Individuals of moderate means have taken to that form of recreation, not keeping their own mounts but renting them by the hour from riding schools. That seems fairly reasonable. A horse is an intelligent and companionable animal, and riding one affords real exercise and exhilaration. But driving one, from the front seat of an old-fashioned surrey, does not, at first thought, appear so attractive or understandable. Won't it be necessary to build carriage roads, too, if surrey-riding becomes at all general? A riding horse on a bridge path is in nobody's way. A horse-drawn vehicle on a public highway is not merely an annoyance to motorists, it is very likely to clutter up traffic and cause serious accidents. Only time will reveal what Edsel Ford wants of a surrey and whether the rest of the country is to take up carriage driving as a regular habit.

The D'Autremont brothers, Oregon murderers, say they're going to devote the rest of their lives to "the betterment of their fellow-prisoners." Not, let us hope, overlooking themselves.

### A MENDED HEART

A negro in Lexington, Ky., with a bullet hole through his heart, was rushed to the hospital. The bullet had gone into the front wall of the left ventricle and out through the rear wall. By all precedent and tradition he should have been dead. He was actually dying, from the shock and the gushing blood from that leaky heart valve. A skillful surgeon got busy. An unexpected blood clot helped him. The surgeon opened up the chest, got to the heart and sewed it up, cleaned out the cavity, sewed up the chest wound and called it a job. A good job it was, too. Next day the patient was conscious and taking nourishment, evidently on his way to recovery. Very likely in the future the surgeons will consider such an operation a

mere detail of the day's work. And they'll probably have a stock of hearts in storage, along with kidneys, stomachs and other parts, to use when a heart has been damaged beyond repair.

Never was there a greater piece of twaddle. It is an actual fact that few men really amount to much until after they are forty. There are not many Lindberghs, you know. One trouble with us of this world is that we take ready-made, someone's opinions, concocted by dyspeptic pessimists in fits of blues, and we accept them and believe them and parrot them and take them to ourselves; they catch the fancy and on they go. Besides it is a lot easier for a man who has not made good and who has reached forty to say, "Well, I never can make good now," and then lie down on the job, than to stiffen his backbone and declare, "I have not made good yet but I am going to make good."

Lady Astor, campaigning for a seat in the House of Commons, announced from the platform that one argument in her favor was that she had five children. ## Many Millable For Cisco Building

### Big Companies Clamoring to Make Loans in Cisco for First Time; Much Building Expected Here Now

For the first time in history, major financial companies are clamoring to make loans on Cisco business and residence property, thus marking the transition of Cisco from a country town to a growing young city, according to local agents for investment companies. A year ago Cisco residents were having extremely hard time in obtaining loans for legitimate and very necessary construction projects, but at present there is plenty of "cheap money" available to carry out development of this city. A number of local agencies for outside investment companies are now operating in Cisco, representing companies with assets of many millions of dollars. With the recognition of the stability and future of Cisco finally obtained from the financiers, it is now possible for any Ciscoan of good reputation and even moderate income to build and even moderate home.

Interest charges have been cut down and payments have been scaled down to small monthly sums extending over a long period of time. "Pay like rent" is fast becoming popular in Cisco, and the many new homes now being erected over the city attest the success of the plan. The low monthly payments have made it possible for many to own their own homes who could only dream of this condition a year ago, and it is expected that within a short time Cisco will be known throughout the state as a city of home owners, who invariably make the best citizens.

The pioneer in home financing in Cisco is the Cisco Building & Loan association. It was reorganized last year, and since that time has had remarkable growth. Under management of Tom Hunter Foley, the company has grown in a year's time to several times its former size with assets increasing proportionately, but demand for buildings and building finances have grown even more rapidly. As the result, the management of the association has been forced to go to the north and east to obtain enough money to satisfy the demand, and has obtained connections with two of the largest financial organizations in the country. The manager of the association now represents the Farm and Home Savings and Loan association of Missouri, the second largest building and loan association in the country. It has total resources of \$38,023,442.17, and has earned and paid dividends totaling \$7,926,575.91. It always carries on hand not less than one million dollars cash in the bank. Mr. Foley also represents the Illinois Standard Mortgage Co., of Chicago, Ill., a company which in the past has confined its loans to those of \$100,000 or more. This company makes loans on business as well as residence property, and its loans are guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Metropolitan Casualty Insurance company, which has assets of \$12,796,275.01.

M. D. Paschall & Sons represent the Continental Savings and Building association of Dallas, one of the oldest financial agencies in Texas. It has a capitalization of \$50,000,000, and has made loans here on business and residence property.

E. P. Crawford represents the Standard Savings and Loan association of Detroit, Mich., one of the strongest companies of its kind in the country.

Building conditions at the present time are said to be especially favorable in Cisco. Fort Worth, Waco and other Texas cities which have been in the throes of a big building boom for the last several years catching up with the demand which had not been supplied in the days of the world war and immediately following, are now said to be about caught up. Loans made in these cities are now maturing and being paid off, and the money thus made available is seeking borrowers at favorable points in West Texas. Cisco has been able to attract this money and that from farther north where the same conditions prevail, because of the great public improvements made here in the past, and the present development of the Lake Cisco projects, it is said. The president of one of the big companies was in Cisco the last week and after an inspection of the entire Oil Belt declared Cisco was the best city in this section for making of loans. The other cities, he said, have not yet reached the point of stability attained by Cisco, and so for the present he advised that the loans be confined almost entirely to Cisco. However, especially good investments in the other cities were given approval, and it is likely that Cisco will become the financial center for the surrounding territory.

In addition to an abundance of money, conditions in the material market favor building at this time.

A large amount of dusting machinery will be available for field work. Andres Anton, breeder and originator of the Anton variety of cotton will give special attention to it. As a result of this combination of favorable conditions, it is expected that building will be stimulated the remainder of the summer and fall, and that several large buildings contemplated will be built.

# AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER BIG AUTO MONTHS

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Trends of trade in the automobile industry, confirmed by purchases and contract releases of parts and raw materials, indicate little change among the leading manufacturers for the next two months. The ones that have been doing well will continue to do better, and those which have been doing poorly have little chance of immediate strengthening of position.

August and September should prove a strong sales period, according to Robert C. Graham, who is reorganizing the Paige Detroit Motor Car company, and who has long been a factor in the truck business. He pointed out that summer was at least a month late.

"This would mean," he added, "that sales ordinarily made in the earlier part of the season will be registered in August and September."

Speaking solely of the industry in general and not in regard to his own interests, he continued:

**Many Want 2 Cars**

"Although there is considerable interest now in small sized cars, there will always be a market for the larger ones because of their greater power, speed, safety, comfort and passenger capacity. Moreover, we are just entering the era of the two or more car families. Although there are now over 15,000,000 families owning an automobile, only 2,700,000 now own two cars. There are over 12,000,000 families which are prospective two-car owners."

The Institute of technology established by one of the big manufacturers at Flint, Mich. is now in operation and the students are being given courses in all phases of the industry, with special stress on the service angle.

Engineers still are making deep studies of new color combination and new striping and the effect they give.

Automobiles are being styled with as much care as a Parisian frock. New types of bodies and new models are constantly being evolved by the larger manufacturers. Some are installing high gear ratios to provide higher speed at the requests of individual customers.

All over the country roadmen are being worked at top speed to complete paved highway units for motor traffic, which now is recognized as having a real and valuable effect on general business. In Michigan, the highways, 354 miles of which were added this year, have linked the cities in to almost a single manufacturing unit. The same is true of New England, and of many sections of the middle and far west. North Carolina has benefited especially in the south.

The traffic has tended to stimulate high inventories, and industrial shutdowns due to delays in shipments of materials have become almost a thing of the past.

The final figures of production for the first six months for all manufacturers are not yet available, but conservative estimates placed it at 1,880,000 vehicles. This compares with 2,167,000 for the first half of 1926. In reality, however, it shows an increase for most of the concerns.

## STEPHENVILLE FARM SCHOOL IS POSTPONED

STEPHENVILLE, Aug. 6.—Due to the inability of some of the tractor and machinery manufacturers to get their men and equipment here by August 5, it has been necessary to postpone the farm machinery and agricultural school to August 15 to 27. This will enable us to have available a much larger teaching staff and aggregation of equipment.

The main feature to be emphasized in these courses will be feeding, breeding, housing, judging, marketing, culling, diseases and sanitation. Visits will be made to representative poultry and dairy plants.

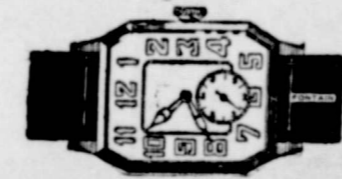

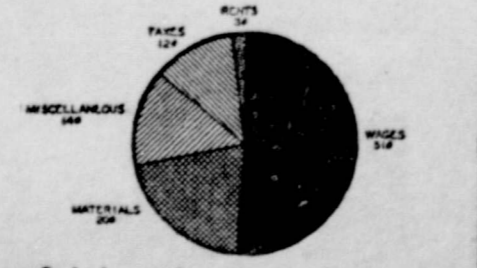

GREEN LANTERN TEA ROOM WILL OPEN SATURDAY

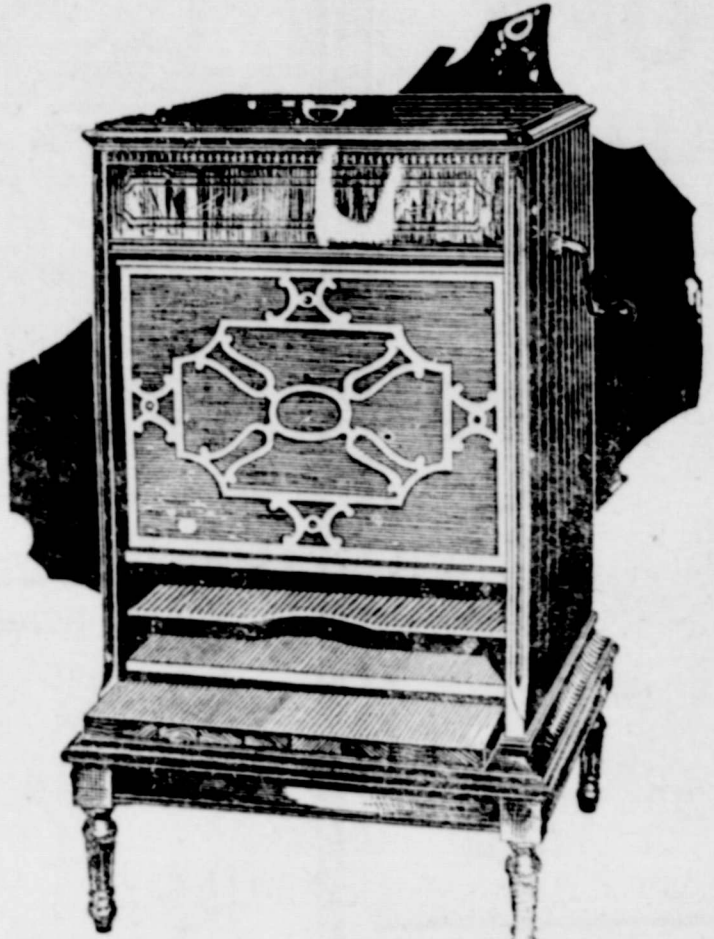
