Chase ends in juvenile arrest

A 15-year-old male juvenile out of Castro County led law enforcement on a chase Sunday night that reached speeds of 100 mph. The juvenile burglarized a residence in Dimmitt where he stole a shotgun and a rifle plus ammunition, an ATV, and a Ford F350 pickup.

A Parmer County deputy spotted the pickup headed west on Highway 86 and a chase ensued. Sheriff Geries, other deputies, plus police from Friona and Bovina were alerted by radio of the chase. The pickup turned north on Hwy 60 at Hub headed to Friona. Sheriff

Geries placed spike strips on the Hwy 214 overpass which eventually caused the right front tire to go flat.

The pickup went through the 5th St. and Grand intersection at a high rate of speed, rammed around on a few residential streets before heading back south on Highway 214. The pickup lost the wheel off the right front but the pickup continued at high speed running on the brake drum rim.

Geries said they did not know at the time who was driving the truck. Since there were weapons in the truck they were extra cautious. He said the pickup

drove over 20 miles on the rim, often turning off his headlights then back on and traveled in the opposite lane of Hwy 214 at times. The pickup appeared to finally stop north of Clay's Corner but when law enforcement approached the pickup took off again into a wheat field. Deputies finally stopped the truck with a couple of maneuvers that caused damage to two Sheriff's vehicles.

The juvenile was arrested and sent to the juvenile detention center in Lubbock. County Judge Trey Ellis said charges in the case would probably be filed in Dimmitt later.

Old faded flowers should be discarded and other items wanted to keep should be picked up before the 14th and replaced afterward if desired. See you May 14 at 5:00 p.m.

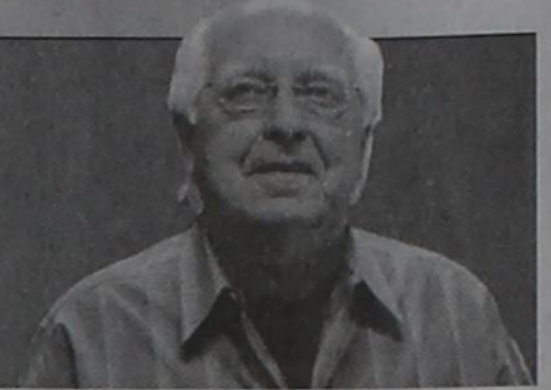

--The Chipotle Restaurant chain is removing genetically modified ingredients from their menu, but guacamole still costs extra.

--Tyson Foods is cutting human antibiotics from their chickens.

--Billionaire Bill Gates is said to be investing in companies that are trying to create alternatives to meat.

--Michelle Obama has messed up the minds and tummies of school children

all over America by trying to make them eat healthy food they do not like. (She wasn't elected to an office so why do we have to mind her?)

America wastes 30-40% of its food supply each month, equivalent to 20 pounds wasted per person per month. So says the United Nations Environment Programme website.

The National Public Radio (NPR) website has an article titled "To End Food Waste, Change Needs to Begin at

Home." It says food is the largest single source of waste in landfills, even more than paper or plastic.

The government would like for you and me to quit being selfish pigs and trying to eat so much. If you need help with your food addiction Google food waste and get some help.

There seems to be a movement to stop food stamp re-

ipients from buying certain foods. They want the food stamp folks to buy more vegetables and fruits and stop buying steak and lobster. And no donuts for the kids either. Food stamps are now called the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

The Legendary Lady

During the early days of small town newspapers in the "South" there had to be a few nice folks around who were willing to jot down news of social events which took place in the surrounding rural communities. News of these "happenings" would be shuffled off to the larger town nearby--the one that actually published a newspaper. These friendly folks were known as "country correspondents."

June Floyd started out her newspaper career as a country correspondent in the late 1940's and stuck with it until she passed away in 1998. She was a real honest-to-goodness "people person" befriending everyone she ever met. Through the years she moved up the ladder at the Friona Star (if there ever actually was a ladder at the Friona Star) by helping out in just about any capacity which might be needed.

During the time when Friona was home to "Plains Publishers" the company printed papers as far away as Denver and Albuquerque;

military base papers from Roswell, Clovis and Altus, as well as area weekly newspapers--Olton, Vega, Hart, Happy, Bovina, Farwell, and of course the Friona Star. June was a big part of it all; setting type, meeting deadlines, running the addressing machine, and even chasing a train down the tracks while pitching bundles of newspapers onto the train.

Besides being good at gathering the facts, and writing the news, she was a great cook, always trying out new recipes and bringing yummy items down to the Star office for official sampling by any and all who were present.

She also loved sewing, needlework, quilting, gardening, canning, etc. But her favorite thing to do was to spend quality time with her family of four daughters, Geneva, Marilyn, Frieda, Susan, and one son Gerald; plus many grandchildren and great-grands.

When June and husband Glenn moved into town from their farm, just off Hwy. 214,

she walked nearly everywhere in town, not for lack of transportation; but she simply loved to walk no matter what the weather was like.

At age 82, her heart began to wear out and she spent her final few months in Craig Memorial Home in Amarillo. June had her trusty yellow tablet by her side during those final days, so any time a visitor from home showed up she would jot down whatever news might be forthcoming. Family and friends were asked to deliver her yellow tablet notes to the Friona Star for her weekly column.

She wrote her final news-filled column on March 18, 1998 from her hospital bed. It appeared on page nine of the same Friona Star issue which contained her obituary on page two March 20, 1998. She must have known that it was to be her last column, but she didn't want to go without saying goodbye to everyone. Now 17 years later, June Floyd is still remembered as the Legendary Lady of the Friona Star.

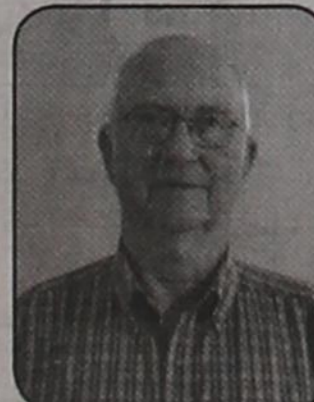

HPWD Board approves study of Dockum Aquifer

Many landowners and operators within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) service area have expressed interest in the Dockum Aquifer as an alternative water supply to the Ogallala Aquifer.

Because of this, the HPWD Board of Directors has approved a study to gain a better understanding of this aquifer. Many of the tasks in the scope of study will be conducted by HPWD staff.

"In some areas of the district, Dockum wells provide water for irrigation, livestock, municipalities, and oilfield production. It is hoped that this study will provide a better understanding of the aquifer-including water quality and quantity," said HPWD Board President Lynn Tate of Amarillo.

The Dockum Aquifer is found deep below the Ogallala Aquifer throughout the 16-county HPWD service area. Dockum water wells are frequently drilled to depths of 900 feet or more in Deaf Smith County, where most of the current exploration occurs. This results in a significant cost to landowners and operators.

Water quality is also a concern due to the brackish properties of the Dockum Aquifer across much of the district. According to several published studies, total dissolved solids

(TDS) in the Dockum likely exceed 5,000 milligrams per liter (mg/l) across most of the district. However, water quality in some areas of Deaf Smith, Randall, and Swisher Counties is less than this, and is suitable for municipal water supply.

Initial work in the HPWD Dockum Aquifer study includes:

- * Creating an inventory of existing Dockum water wells within the district. (HPWD did not require permits for Dockum wells until 2011. There are many existing Dockum wells that have not been inventoried as a result.)

- * Reviewing and entering data from water well drillers' logs.

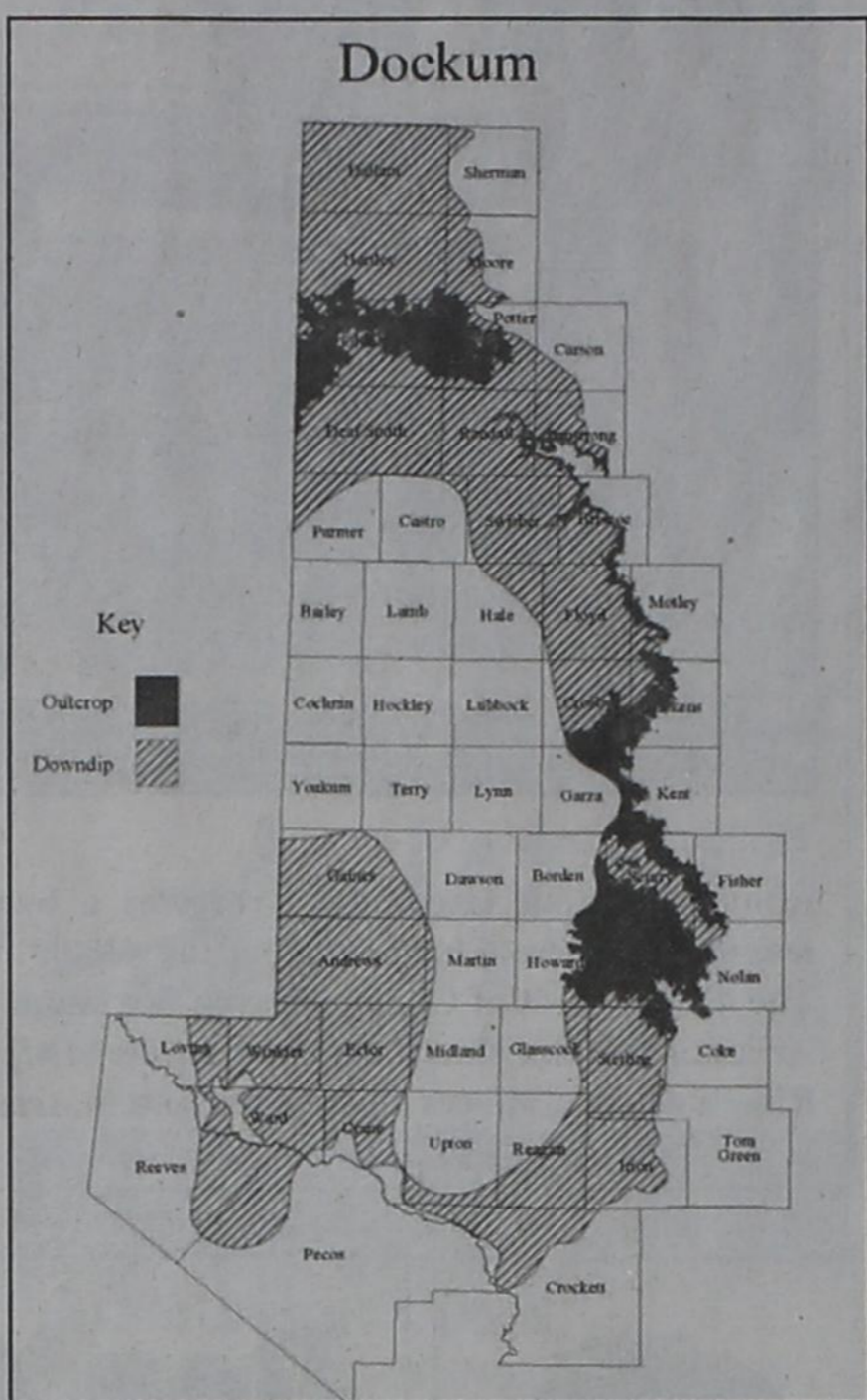
- * Identifying existing wells that are suitable for water level measurements, water quality testing, and geophysical logging.

- * Developing a water level observation program for Dockum wells in 2015.

- * Implementing a water quality program for Dockum wells in 2015.

- * Partnering with the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) or others to conduct geophysical logging of selected wells in 2015.

- * Reviewing the updated Groundwater Availability Model (GAM) to evaluate the structure and surfaces of the aquifer.



- * Conducting a literature review of Dockum-related publications and analyze them for recommended work.
- * Performing a gap analysis to determine suitable test hole sites in areas where there are no Dockum water wells.
- * Analyze data collection in 2016 and determine needs for additional evaluation.

"For years, there have been many unknowns about the Dockum Aquifer. It is the Board of Directors' hope that this study will shed new light on this secondary groundwater resource," Tate said.

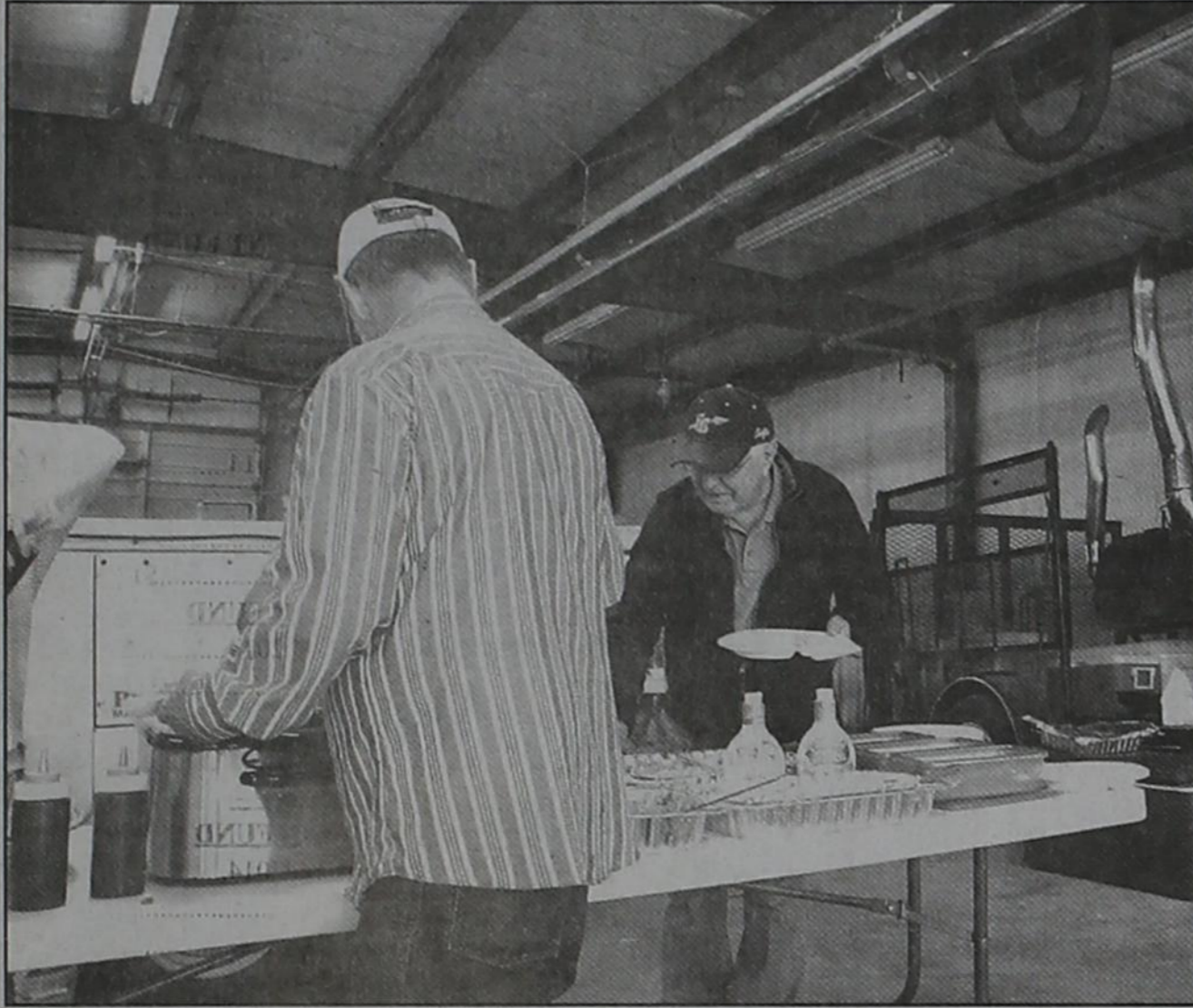

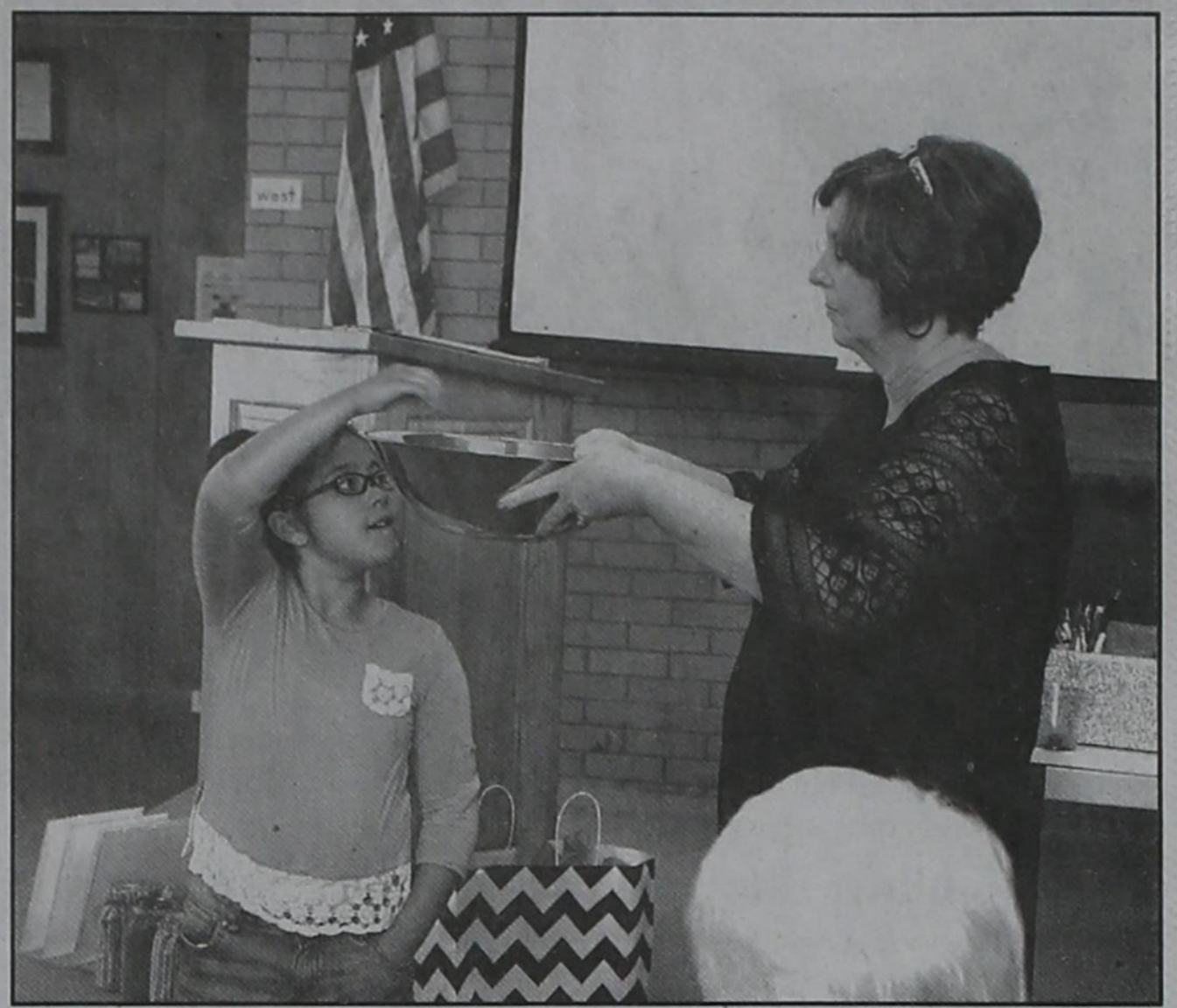

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review
(Insert description of appraisal district's informal review process. If any, then give name and telephone number of person taxpayer should contact.)

If you wish to have an informal review of your property with our staff, please come to our office in Bovina, M-F, 8:30am to 5pm except holidays.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline
On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to District Court, Binding Arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment
You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Assistance Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

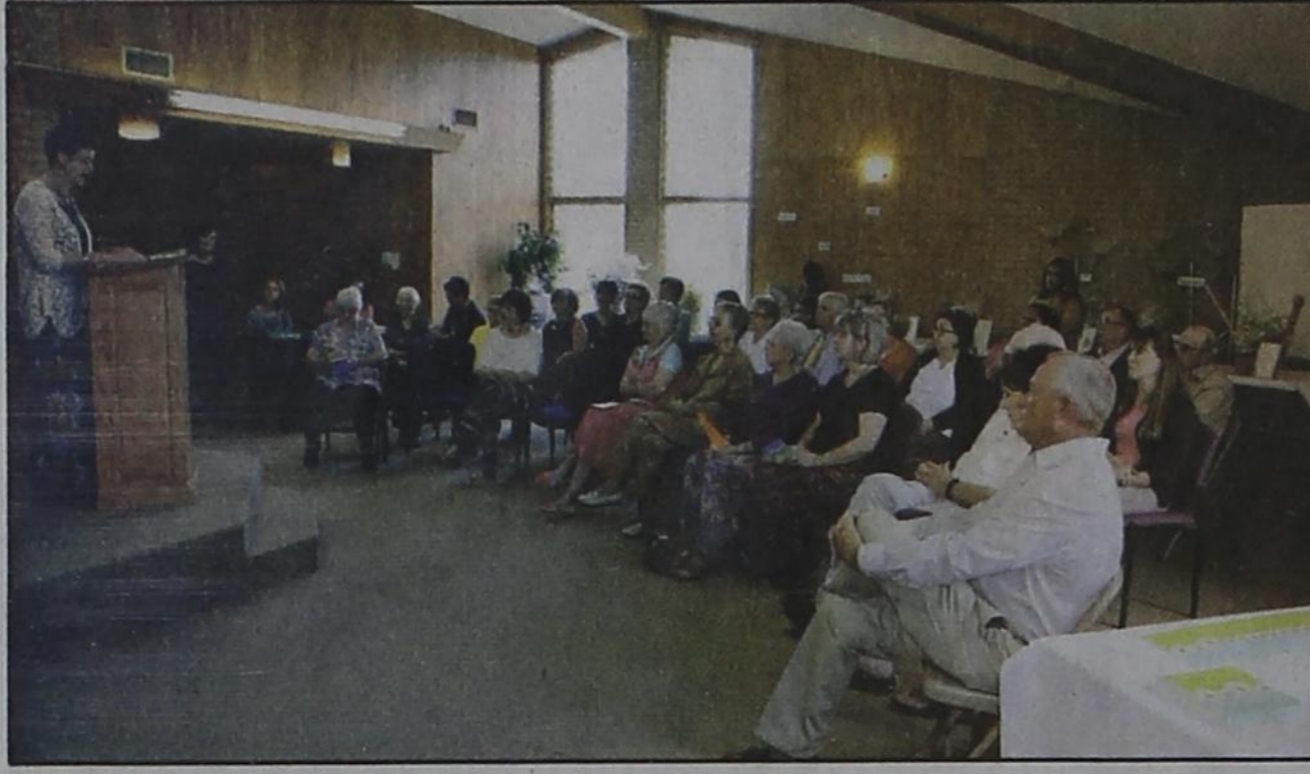

Renew online, skip trip to DPS office this summer

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is encouraging residents to get ahead of the summer rush at driver license offices across the state by renewing their license or identification card early or online. The summer months tend to be one of the busiest times at driver license offices, and many Texans are eligible to skip the trip to the office completely via online renewal of their license, identification card or change of address at Texas.gov.

"Texas driver license offices are especially busy during the summer when students and families are on vacation," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "During these busy months, DPS encourages eligible customers to take advantage of our convenient options for online and phone renewal of driver licenses and identification cards or visit a DPS driver license mega center - if they are required to visit an office."

If a trip to a driver license office is necessary, customers in the major metro areas should consider visiting mega centers in their area. Located in the Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio metropolitan areas, driver license mega centers offer high-capacity facilities and technology designed to improve efficiency and customer service.

Mega centers feature an innovative queuing system that offers customers the convenient option to reserve a spot in line before going to the office. Customers can virtually enter the line via cell phone, online or using a land line telephone.

In addition, DPS encourages customers to take advantage of this same technology to get in line before arriving at an office, which is available at several other locations across the state. To find an office that offers this option, see <http://dps.texas.gov/DriverLicense/onlineScheduling.aspx>.

Licenses must be renewed in person every 12 years, so an updated photo can be taken and eyesight can be tested. If residents need to come into the office to renew, they can do so within one year prior to the expiration date, which means they can pick a time that is convenient for their schedule.

In order for a customer to be eligible for online renewal, the card holder must be a U.S. citizen and the expiration date on the card must be within one year. When the card is renewed, the expiration date on the new card will be six years after the current card's expiration date, whether customers renew early or not.

Additionally, in order to renew

online, the card cannot have been expired for more than two years. Requirements for renewing online are available at Texas.gov, the official website of the State of Texas. Customers can also renew by phone at 1-866-357-3639. The eligibility requirements for phone renewal are the same as for online renewal. The fee is the same for online, in-person and telephone renewals.

Customers may obtain a replacement driver license or identification card online if they are able to provide the 20-character code on the front of their current license or card.

Visit the DPS website to make sure you have the proper paperwork (including documents needed for residency requirements) before making the trip to the office: <http://www.dps.texas.gov/DriverLicense/ApplyForLicense.htm>.
