friction between President Coolidge and Hoover, which set Washington buzzing with gossip last spring, was given by Basil Manly, direcof the People's Legislative Service, in the People's Business, official organ of the organization.

After detailing the alleged steps in the development of Hoover's op-position to the Coolidge-Kellogg policy in Mexico, which led up to the president's announcement on April 15 that even if Secretary Kellogg resigned Hoover would not be appointed to succeed him, Man-

"Whether Hoover can or will renain in the cabinet after President Coolidge returns to Washington is a question that only time can answer."

With the president's much-debated statement that he did not 'choose' to run in 1928, Hoover as promptly hailed by politicians and part of the press as the choice administration and the Muary legatee of Coolidge's po-

litical strength. If Hoover has the backing of Mr. Coolidge, politicians point out that he would be foolish to withdraw from the cabinet as his position would provide the backbone of his support for the nomina-

Subsequent developments, how ever, have falled to bear out the statement that Hoover is the president's choice as his successor. In fact, reports from Rapid City indicate that Mr. Coolidge has no intention of backing any of the aspirants for the nomination, much less Hoover.

If it is true that Hoover is still at odds with his chief over the Latin-American policy and that he can expect no support from the administration, but on the contrary is likely to find the president behind a rival candidate, capital politicians predict Hoover's resignation in the fall.

Under such circumstances, it is pointed out, Hoover's only chance would be to cut loose from the administration and go into the field and round up delegates to support him in the convention.


