AUSTIN BANK ROBBED OF \$7,000

Three Youths Hold Up University Of Texas Institution and Escape With Cash and Liberty Loan Bonds

AUSTIN, Aug. 22.—Three young unmasked bandits robbed the University bank here today of \$2,000 in currency and \$5,000 in Liberty bonds and escaped in a Buick touring car. The robbery occurred shortly after the bank opened. The bandits entered with drawn pistols and forced Bruce O'Keefe, teller, and three other employees, to lie on the floor while they gathered up the money and bonds. About \$1,000 in bills of small denomination were overlooked.

Miss Maude Potts, secretary to M. C. Parrish, president of the bank, who was not seen by the robbers, described them as between 22 and 25 years of age, medium height and well dressed. She slipped out the back door and notified police, but the bandits had departed in the direction of Georgetown before the officers arrived. Practically 90 per cent of the deposits of the bank is owned by students in the university.

CISCOANS GO ON 1500 MILE DAIRY TOUR
TWO OKLAHOMA BANK ROBBERS HELD.
MADILL, Okla., Aug. 22.—Within an hour after they robbed the Pinkston bank, ten miles south of here early today, Joe Leonard, 40, of Kansas City, and Charley Ross, 40, of Tulsa, were captured by Sheriff E. Long of Marshall county, as they attempted to board a freight train here. The bandits, both of whom were said to be old timers, entered the bank about 8:30 and forced Bruce Lay, president, into the vault. They scooped up about \$2,000 in currency and escaped in an automobile. Sheriff Long found about \$800 of the bank's funds on the bandits. Another \$50 was found on the bank floor where it had been dropped.

This well is in the new Smith-Ellis pool between the Fry field and Grovesville and is the third well brought in by Roxana in this pool. Reports say the well has been gauging 100 barrels an hour since completion.

PLANES FAIL TO FIND MAN LOST IN DESERT
PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 22.—Two army transport planes from Kelly Field, Texas, failed Saturday in a search over the desert north of Glendale for Alfred Z. Menard, shell shocked veteran of the world war, missing since last Tuesday. A note was dropped from one of the planes on the Phoenix landing field saying no trace of the man was found. The search will continue until the army pilots are successful or decide they can be of no assistance. Menard left the ranch of his brother, George Menard, at Glendale after leaving a note stating that he intended to lose himself in the desert.

SHORE-TO-SHIP MAIL FLIGHT IS PREVENTED
NAVAL AIR STATION, Squantum, Mass., Aug. 22.—Heavy fog off the Massachusetts coast early Sunday defeated the fleet, which was to ship air mail flights. The fog forested the PN-10, United States Navy flying boat, to return to the base here after the big plane had battled the thick weather for an hour and a half in an effort to reach the liner Levianth, 375 miles off the coast.

Eppie Robinson and Rebecca Williams, negroes, and Charles Culbertson, negro man, were charged with manufacturing intoxicating liquor. All were taken to Eastland to jail to await action of the grand jury.

BLOWS FROM FISTS OF MAN KILL CHAUFFEUR
COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 22.—Chris Christianson, a New York chauffeur, was killed here Sunday by a man's fists. E. S. Wagner of Cushing, Ok., was arrested and held in jail.

Christianson, with a party of friends, had been sitting in a restaurant early Sunday opposite a booth occupied by Wagner and friends. Wagner claimed a girl in his party had been insulted and Christianson was knocked to the floor.

Christianson arose and was felled again. This time he did not move and physicians later said death had been instantaneous.

ASK FULLER TO SAVE MEN ONCE AGAIN

MONTREAL, Aug. 22.—Chief Justice William Howard Taft of U. S. supreme court today stated flatly to International News Service over the telephone from Murray Bay that he would not return to the U. S. to receive a petition in behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti, scheduled to die tonight. "No, I am not going," Justice Taft said, refusing further comment on the case. He can take no action here, being outside the borders of the U. S.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 22.—The lives of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, doomed to die in the electric chair at midnight tonight were again placed in the hands of Governor Alvin T. Fuller this afternoon. Falling in all their desperate efforts to secure federal intervention to prevent midnight execution of the two men, counsel for the two came back to the state house this afternoon and appealed to the governor as the only agency left to save the men.

Chief Justice William Howard Taft of the United States Supreme court, virtually refused to consider the case when he pleaded that he could not consider the case while vacationing in Canada, and that time was too short for him to return across the border. Associate Justice Harlan F. Stone, summing off the Maine coast, refused to issue a stay after Arthur D. Hill, chief defense counsel, had made a desperate flying trip by automobile and boat to his home. Associate Justices Holmes and Brandeis had previously refused to act. Confronted with these setbacks and disheartened, too, defense counsel came back to Governor Fuller and put the lives of the two men in his hands once again. They presented to the governor a clear cut plea for another reprieve, declaring the case is now in actual litigation in the United States supreme court in Washington through the docketing of a plea for a review filed this morning, and claiming new evidence has been found since the governor completed his investigation a few weeks ago. New affidavits from witnesses claiming to reveal new facts in the case were presented.

There remained apparently but one avenue of hope outside of the governor. This was the appeal of defense counsel to Judge Fisk of the state supreme court for a stay of execution. Defense counsel, however, had little confidence in this move so little in fact that Elias Field said that he did not know whether he would see Judge Fisk about it this afternoon.

APPEALS FOR NEW WRIT ARE FILED.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Formal appeals for a writ of certiorari or review for Sacco and Vanzetti were docketed in the United States supreme court at 10 o'clock this morning. The action will have no effect in staying the execution, and cannot be heard until the court reconvenes October 3.

SACCO AND VANZETTI REFUSE TO REPENT.
BOSTON, Aug. 22.—Sacco and Vanzetti, on the eve of their electrocution today, refused to return to the faith of their fathers. Father Michael Murphy, prison chaplain, visited the doomed men in the state house. Father Murphy said each professed to die as he had lived. Miss Luiga Vanzetti visited her brother and Mrs. Sacco spent some time with her husband. Both Sacco and Vanzetti appeared cheerful today.

25 Dry Agents To Be Dropped

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Twenty-five agents in the New York prohibition office will be dismissed tonight, Seymour Lohman, prohibition director, said. Examination of the books of Chester T. Mills, former New York director, revealed his payroll was \$94,000 higher than his allotment.

CISCO REVUE GIRLS RANK AT FT. WORTH

Miss Juanita Gilbert, "Miss Fort Worth" in the recent Lake Cisco Bathing revue, won first place in the Fort Worth revue held at Lake Worth Casino Sunday night. As a result, she will be Miss Fort Worth at the Atlantic City pageant. Approximately 20,000 persons saw the revue, it was estimated. Miss Genevieve Lyon of Eastland, who as "Miss Kleiman" won third honors at the Lake Cisco revue, was awarded third cash prize of \$100, while Miss Leta Robertson of Clyde, winner of first place in the Cisco event, received a \$10 prize. Miss Eulalia Gavitt of Brady, second place winner in the Lake Cisco revue, was also an entrant in the Fort Worth affair. Miss Myrtle Crow of Dallas, another Lake Cisco entrant, received a \$10 award at the Fort Worth pageant.

ROBBERIES REPORTED AT TWO PLACES

Theft of a watch, chain, two shirts, a black belt and a solid gold ring was reported from Baird Monday by Sheriff Hughes, but the report did not state who was robbed or give other details.

The robber was traveling in a Chevrolet automobile with a trailer, the report stated.

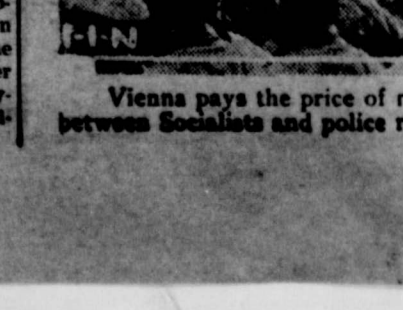
MRS. CHAPLIN GETS DIVORCE FROM CHARLIE

"Today Or Never" Searchers Say In Hunt for Erwin and Other Dole Flyers; Bill Fell Gently, Belief

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—Hope for the seven missing Hawaiian flyers waned to its lowest ebb today. The Dole planes Miss Doran and Golden Eagle were last seen six days ago by lighthouse keepers on the desolate Farallones. The Dallas Spirit, piloted by Lene Star Hill Erwin and guided by Alvin Eichwaldt disappeared last Friday. Erwin's radio told of a tail spin and then whined into silence. Airman fear he plunged into the sea and then floated beneath the surface. His plane was heavily fueled for a 32-hour flight in search of Augie Pedlar, Vilas Knope and Miss Mildred Doran in the Miss Doran, and Jack Frost and Gordon Scott in the Golden Eagle.

Today was scheduled to be the last day of the search for these two planes. The search for Erwin's plane, the Dallas Spirit, will be continued until Thursday, however. The airplane carrier, Langley, with her brood of 30 observation planes, and the airplane tender, Arctostock, with four seaplanes in her care, will today reach the approximate location where Erwin and his companion dove into the ocean. The airplanes will join a fleet of destroyers. Together they will scrutinize the area in which Erwin's plane is believed to have fallen. Prayers were offered in both Honolulu and in San Francisco yesterday that Erwin, Pedlar, Knope, Eichwaldt, Frost and the brave flying school mark may yet be found alive. Church services in San Francisco were devoted entirely to intercession for the flyers.

The oil tanker Neches is sailing to the search area to refuel destroyers at sea. It will be "today or never" in the minds of many of the navy men. Those who believe Captain Erwin's monoplane may not have gone spinning into the deep below the ocean's surface, declare that if it is afloat anywhere, the plane is within 50 miles of the Langley. That radius they expect to scour so thoroughly today that not even an egg crate could escape their notice. The search will then be taken farther south until Tuesday night.

Wild speculation was evoked today by the statement of E. O. Watson, radio expert, that the last signals received from the Dallas Spirit indicated it had fallen in a tail spin into the ocean. Operator Cross of another station declared the signals indicated the plane had fallen gently.

CISCO TENNIS PLAYERS HOLD TOURNAMENT

An open tennis tournament for all Cisco men and boy players has been arranged to begin Thursday, it was announced Monday by High School Athletic Director W. B. Chapman. Charles Gray of the Gray Hardware company has offered a Davis Cup racket to the winner of the singles contest, and a Columbia racket to each member of the winning doubles team. Entries should be filed with Mr. Gray by Wednesday noon, giving the name, address and phone number of the contestants. Pairings will probably be announced Thursday.

Coach Chapman said he was anxious for members of the high school tennis squad to enter the tournament which would give them valuable practice in preparation for the coming year. In the past, Cisco tennis players have usually lost to Eastland, enabling the Mavericks to win the all around athletic championship, in spite of the fact that the Lobos won the track meet, since all tennis events total 40 points, while the track meet scores but 20 in determining the all around championship.

ENCAMPMENT GETS UNDER WAY SUNDAY

Roberts, president of Randolph college, delivered the address Sunday morning, urging a unity among all congregations, and in the afternoon related interesting incidents on his recent tour of Europe. Jack Huppertz, state secretary of the Christian Endeavor Union, held the first meeting of the young people, and planned a special day for them. In the evening the Interchurch Orchestra of Eastland played a sacred concert, followed by a sermon by Rev. Thomas Lenon, pastor of the First Christian church of Cisco on "Will the Old Book Stand?"

Tonight, beginning at 7 o'clock, the Interchurch Orchestra of Eastland will give a 45-minute sacred concert, followed by the sermon of the evening. Eastland is presenting the program for today.

ADDITION ON PENNEY STORE TO BE BUILT

Easterwood Will Pay Erwin's Widow \$5000, If He's Dead

DALLAS, Aug. 22.—In the event Captain Erwin is lost or found dead, in his attempt to locate the missing Dole flyers, his widow will immediately be presented with a cashier's check for \$5,000 by William E. Easterwood, Jr., donor of the \$25,000 prize for a flight to Hong Kong, he announced.

"No one in Dallas has a higher regard for Bill Erwin than I have," he said. My sympathy goes to his wife and to his mother and father. In the event he is not found alive, I will immediately present his widow with a cashier's check for \$5,000.

"It is too bad that he lost his life in an attempt to save others, but no man can do a more noble or gallant deed than to give his life in an effort to save others."

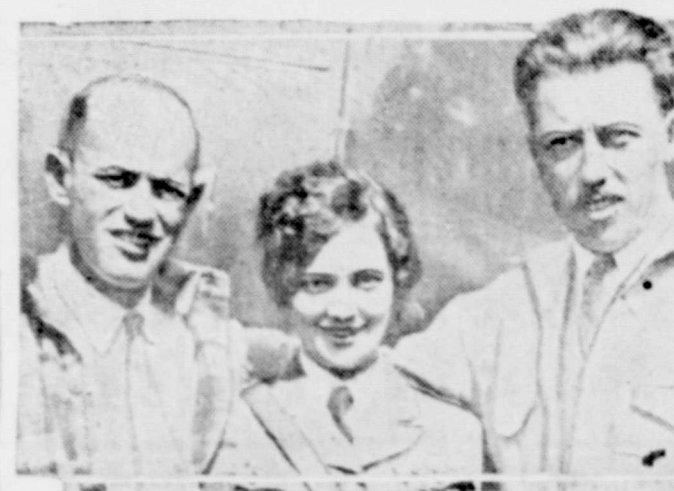

Pencil in Book Costs State Much

AUSTIN, Aug. 22.—School children cost the state thousands of dollars annually by putting pencils in their books.

Lee Thrift, head of the text book division of the state department of education, is living up to his name in an attempt to stop this loss.

Notices are to be sent to schools before the fall terms open, asking that care be used to prevent such damage.

Thrift says that most of the books that come back to the department damaged are due to the pencil habit. The pupil leaves a pencil between the pages of a book, closes the book and straps it tightly with other books. The result is that the cover is broken or the binding ruined.

Roberti, Italian Heavyweight, Eats Oats to Aid His Wallop

TEACHERAGES IN TEXAS NOW NUMBER 1000

AUSTIN, Aug. 22.—William Ellers, state rural school supervisor, has submitted a report to the state department of education showing that school districts of Texas now have more than 1,000 teacherages. They are valued at \$1,314,489.

Texas was the first state to establish "teacherages." This was done before the Civil war. Most of them are elaborate buildings. One at McAllen, Hidalgo county, cost \$40,000. Only eight of the total 1,028 cost less than \$1,000. Twenty-four of the numbers are for negro teachers.

A teacherage is to a school district what a parsonage is to a congregation. The first was built at Blum, Guadalupe county, in 1809. It was occupied by Professor Schluventes until 1862 when he joined the Confederate army. In 1862, the second teacherage was built in the same county. It and succeeding buildings erected in the Schumerville district have been occupied continuously since.

In recent years most of the teacherages have been built in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and in West Texas.

LITTLE LEFT OUT OF 1927 STATE FUNDS

AUSTIN, Aug. 22.—Texas' fiscal year will end August 31, at which time appropriations made by the 40th legislature become available and the departments will start new accounts.

Appropriations for the fiscal year ending with this month totaled \$14,829,647. There will be little left over in any of the departments. Whatever is left must be turned back to the state general fund. Nothing can be carried over for use in the succeeding year.

As a result departments are checking up on stamps, supplies and similar needs. The closing days of August always are the biggest days in receipt records at the Capitol station branch post-office.

For the coming year, appropriations total approximately \$20,000,000. About \$2,000,000 of this represents appropriations for the prison system, not formerly included in the state budget.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Roberto Roberti, the new imported Italian heavyweight who made an impressive start in his American ring debut by knocking out Emmanuel Jonidis in the first round gains his stamina by eating oats. According to his associates, Roberti mixes the oats with his bran every morning at breakfast, and moreover seems to like it.

Although there is nothing fishy about Lou Gehrig's stunt of eating pickled cels to strengthen his home run swing, there is something about Roberti's "oats" wallop that might be called horsy. It has the kick of a mule. After exchanging wallops with Jonidis for one minute and forty seconds, the Italian heavyweight felt the call of the wild oats and kayoed the Greek fighter with a short right uppercut to the button.

Roberti got the idea of dining on oats when he was in the Italian army.

"If the horses get so husky on a diet of oats, why can't I?" he ruminated. The thing was done and nobody the worse off except the nag whose dinner was appreciated. And so it is that when Roberti's manager tells his hopeful to "put on the feed bag" his meaning is literal and not slang.

One of Roberti's tasks in the army was to kill injured horses with one blow of his fist. That is all very well for Italian horses, but Roberti is likely to run up against a tougher proposition in some of this country's "trial horses" of the ring.

Many other pleasing legends are being circulated concerning Roberti's amazing feats of strength. While working in a marble quarry carrying marble slabs, he did the work of three men, proving that he was not a plumber.

This folk lore gained such credence in the United States that his first scheduled opponent ran out on him. Roberti was on the Paulino-Whis card. After taking one look at Roberti at the weighing-in ceremonies, the Italian's opponent hurriedly dressed and hit the road.

Although Roberti is crude in the ring, he seems to be a rare prospect. He carries his 214 pounds lightly and does not waste punches. His speed was surprising against Jonidis.

'Duster' is Named Because of Sand

COMANCHE, Aug. 22.—Sand whipping over the ridge upon which a group of frame buildings stood as a nucleus of a Comanche county village gave to that place its name. When the little town was undergoing the throes of early development the postoffice department was exacting in its demand for a suitable name. Three times titles were submitted only to be rejected upon each occasion. Finally the department wrote to a hardy pioneer of the struggling village and he recalling

the sting of sand billowing over the mound upon which the infant town stood suggested the appropriate appellation of "Duster." And so it is today that Duster is listed as one of the rising communities of Comanche county.

WENTZ GETS 600 BARREL ALBANY WELL

ALBANY, Aug. 20.—L. H. Wentz, who has been drilling a north offset to the first well drilled by the Hope Petroleum company about two years ago on the Reynolds fee, brought in a well this week that is estimated to be good for 60 to 80 barrels of oil. It topped the sand at 1,254 feet and was drilled 16 feet into the formation.

This well is located in the south-west quarter of a 40-acre tract of the G. E. Reynolds fee, section 13, block 11, T. & P. survey.

It was purchased last month from the J. S. Cosden, Rose & Hoover at a reported consideration of \$80,000.

BRYAN, Aug. 22.—Despite the handicap of having no legs, Roy Montgomery of Bryan, who proved himself to be a fast runner in politics by winning the office of county treasurer of Brazos county by a vote of 2,217 against 862 for his two opponents, will now try his speed as a business man.

Montgomery was the victim of an explosion about 10 years ago, and both of his legs were amputated. He formerly was manager of one of the largest plantations in the Brazos bottoms.

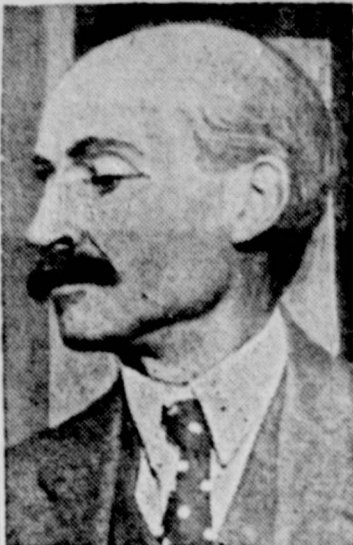

KERRVILLE, Aug. 22.—Twenty feet footed antelope are now being caught on the wild ranges of an Calgary, Alberta, Canada, ranch to be shipped to the Schreiner estate near Kerrville in October. The animals, thousands of which once roamed over the vast expanses of West Texas prairies, will be given an opportunity to "come back" in the hills here. They are to be liberated on L. A. Schreiner's 3,000 acre ranch and game preserve near Kerrville. There they will mingle in a rugged haunt already inhabited by other game life, including four buffalo, purchased last fall from the Colbert ranch at Stamford; a flock of pheasants, and numerous deer and wild turkey. Preserving wild life is a hobby with Schreiner, Kerrville banker and capitalist. His estate is protected so that no shooting is allowed and every encouragement is given to propagation of wild game life, both native and introduced.

AUSTIN, Aug. 20.—Of the thirty-three applications for executive clemency made by convicts to Governor Dan Moody today, twenty-nine were refused and four granted on recommendation of the board of pardons. Two were given furloughs and two conditional pardons.

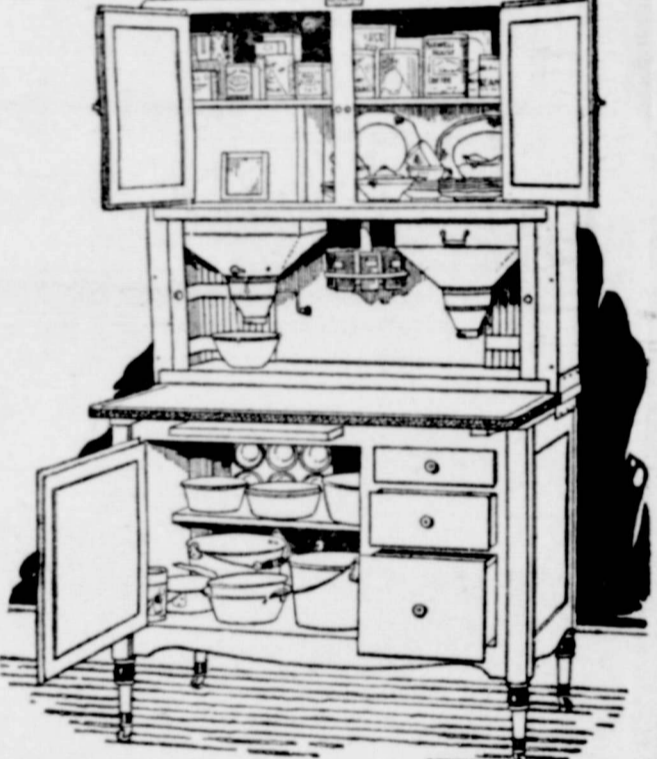

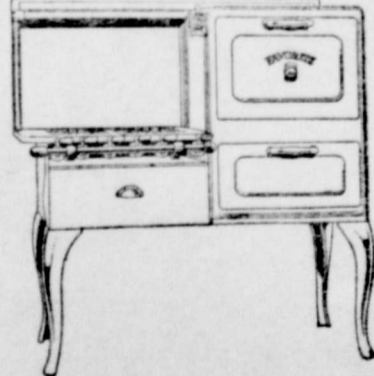
