REDS' BODIES TO BE PARADED

Interest at Encampment Shows Big Increase

OLD HOME TOWN

Boyce House, editor of the Eastland County News, published at Ranger, has taken exception to publicity articles appearing in the Cisco Daily News regarding Ranger's new swimming pool. He refers to them as "sneering" at the Ranger beach and proceeds to attack the Lake Cisco bathing beach in vigorous style. As a matter of fact, the Daily News has never knowingly "sneered" at the Ranger pool in any article. It only reprinted an article written by Editor House or some other publicity man for Ranger and appearing in the state press, describing the pool, and boosting it. But at any rate, here is what the editor of the Ranger paper had to say:

"The Cisco paper just doesn't seem to be able to get reconciled to the fact that Ranger will have a swimming pool of its own. "It will be recalled that two weeks ago, the Cisco News ran a sneering headline over an article about the Ranger pool, and a few days ago, the Cisco paper ran another article in a belittling and patronizing manner about the pool here.

"Among other things, the Cisco article said that the pool here will have an earthen dam and an island, 10 by 12 feet in size, covered by a large oak tree. Of course, it would be so much sweeter if the Ranger pool could have a concrete dam covered by a large million-dollar mortgage.

"One serious drawback to the Ranger pool is its location just six blocks from the heart of town. It should be three and one-half miles away, reached only by a dusty road, so that the bathers would appreciate the swim all the more when he did get there. Then after driving back over the afore-said three and one-half miles of dusty road, he could get into the bathtub at home and get clean again.

"If the Cisco News would analyze the situation, the editor would learn that the Cisco pool has lost hundreds of dollars of Ranger patronage because of his narrow policy of poking fun at a Ranger enterprise. When the pool here is completed, it is safe to say that Ranger people will patronize their home pool, because of the Cisco slurs. And in the meantime most of them are going to the pretty Olden pool, just fifty yards from the Bankhead highway.

"The egg market is getting much better now," declared J. B. Chandler, manager of the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association Tuesday. "Buyers are plentiful at a price of \$10 a case."

Visitors to the city hall Tuesday were being shown an unusual sight—a cluster of eight pecan trees on the sidewalk pathway. The tree, now bearing for its second year, has a number of clusters of six pecans to the cluster, all of unusually large size, and the cluster of eight is said to break all records for this section. The pecan trees at the city hall are well loaded this year, although nuts on the other trees are not so large. A black walnut tree is bearing this year for the first time, and several of the smaller pecan trees have not yet fruited.

MOODY SEEKS MEXICAN WHO KILLED TEXAN

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—Gov. Moody yesterday issued a requisition through the department of state, Washington, on the governor of Coahuila, Mexico, for extradition of Eusebio Bianquino, who is wanted in this state for murder. Bianquino, while en route to San Antonio from Prio county in July, 1924, shot and killed J. T. Holloway, deputy sheriff, who was conveying him to the penitentiary, and escaped into Mexico. Bianquino had been sentenced to life imprisonment for murder in Prio county.

HOPE FADES FOR ERWIN AND OTHERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—Hope for the five missing Dole flyers and their two would-be rescuers, Bill Erwin and Alvin Eichwald, was all but abandoned today. Captain Erwin and Navigator Eichwald, board the plane Dallas Spirit, have been missing since Friday. Not a single authentic clue as to the whereabouts of the three planes and the seven occupants has been found, notwithstanding innumerable ships have searched the route from here to Hawaii. The navy will carry on till Thursday in the search.

HUMBLETOWN COURTS USED FOR TOURNEY

The use of the tennis courts at Humbletown for the playing of the Gray Hardware tennis tournament was given by W. W. Wallace today. Charlie Gray is giving a \$20 Davis Cup tennis racket to the winner of the singles tournament and a Columbia tennis racket to each of the winners on the doubles championship. The entries are being received at Gray Hardware Co. and will close Wednesday at noon. A large number of entries is expected and the competition will be keen in both the doubles and the singles. Amarillo to Get Huge Helium Plant

AMARILLO, Aug. 23.—The proposed federal helium plant at Amarillo which probably will be the largest in the world, is expected to be completed in two months. R. A. Cattell, chief of the helium division of the bureau of mines, is quoted as saying negotiations for land for the plant are now near consummation, and that work on the plant is to start in three weeks. The Amarillo production will be approximately one and a half million cubic feet a month, normally.

Cave Exploit Called Hoax

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Roy A. Ashley's reported disappearance in Nick-A-Jack cave and the crews of rescue workers were a hoax and a fraud, promoted for publicity purposes and for influencing the state highway commission to route a road by the cave, an official report of State Mine Inspector O. P. Pils in the hands of governor Peay today declared. Members of the rescue crews who claimed they penetrated unknown recesses of the cave in search of the geologist-explorer, returned with fabulous stories of the beautiful interior of the cave.

Illinois Youth Is Sought in Murder Of His Own Mother

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—A police dragnet was thrown out in Chicago and other Illinois points today for Harry Hill, 21, son of Mrs. Mary N. Hill, whose apparently murdered body was found in a shallow grave at her home in Streeter, Ill. Young Hill, according to authorities, left Streeter in a light car shortly after the body was discovered.

REBEL CHIEF EXECUTED

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 23.—Execution of Adolfo Reyes, removes the last dangerous and active rebel chieftain in Central Mexico, the newspaper Excelsior states today. Reyes and his 18-year-old secretary were publicly executed by a federal firing squad at Toluca, Monday, after having been found guilty of insurrection by a court martial.

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CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION FALLS MORE

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 23.—Further decrease in crude oil production of the United States for the last week was revealed here today. The figures showed the decrease of 38,740 barrels. The United States produced 2,519,974 barrels during the last week, against 2,558,354 on the previous week. The light oil decrease was 33,254 barrels daily, while heavy oil slump was 5,425 barrels daily.

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TROOPS FAIL TO CAPTURE BANDIT TRIO

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—Members of the local company of the 101st infantry, Texas National Guard, who had joined Texas rangers, county and city officers in search of three bandits who yesterday robbed the University Bank, returned home today after a fruitless search of the Bull Creek section northwest of here. Officers now believe the bandits escaped in a second automobile after abandoning one in the Bull Creek section.

Sabanno Hopes Erwin is Safe

"The Sabanno community is intensely interested in the fate of Captain Bill Erwin," declared J. W. Parkinson of that community, who was in Cisco Tuesday. "Captain Erwin was reared, in part, at Sabanno, and numerous kind folks live there now, including two kinsmen, George and Joe Erwin. Most of us know Captain Erwin personally, and are hoping that he may yet be found alive."

RELATIVES OF PAIR SHRIEK WHEN TOLD NEWS.

BOSTON, Aug. 23.—Russell Street resounded the shriek of two women as Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti went to their doom this morning. In the south Russell street apartment of friends, Miss Luiga Vanzetti and Mrs. Rosa Sacco, received the news. It was relayed to them by telephone from state prison. The cries of anguish of the two grief stricken women, perhaps the most pathetic figures in the case, awoke the neighbor-

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Sacco and Vanzetti to Lie In Diamond-Studded Caskets During Processions in Cities

BOSTON, Aug. 23.—All that is mortal of Sacco and Vanzetti will lie in state in Boston, New York, Chicago and several other large cities, according to an ambitious program drawn up by the defense committee. Embalmed for long keeping, the bodies will rest in diamond studded caskets. Later they will be sent by ship to Italy. Plans for the processions in the various cities in which the bodies will be exposed to public view, were going forward today, and so far as known no governmental protest has yet been received against such procedure.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 23.—Sacco and Vanzetti are dead but the hue and cry of their dramatic passing circled the globe today. The end of the seven years' fight of these radicals—a fight unprecedented in American criminal history, and unprecedented too in world opinion—came early this morning in old Charleston prison. A squadron of 2,300 police encircled them to make sure they did not escape Massachusetts justice. The streets of Boston and other cities saw marching and near rioting in sympathy for them. From Kamchatka to Rio radicals of the world protested innocence of the men and demanded their liberation. In London, Paris, Berlin and Moscow there were riotous demonstrations against America, but they died just the same in grim old Charleston prison, and today their bodies lay on marble slabs in a mortuary.

To the radicals, Sacco and Vanzetti were martyrs to the cause of political liberalism. To the law of Massachusetts, stern and unyielding as the Plymouth Rock, they were a pair of anarchistic aliens who had perpetrated an unusual and brutal crime.

They died as they lived—defiant, contemptuous of the system, that took their lives, unrepentant, unorthodox and protesting their innocence to the end. They went to the chair with their heads up, unafraid and without benefit of clergy. Vanzetti, older, more kindly, philosophical, proclaimed his innocence while in the chair. "I am innocent of all crimes," said Vanzetti, attempting gestures. "Not only of this one, but all."

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ONE MAN KILLED IN GENEVA RIOT

GENEVA, Aug. 23.—Drastic police precautions were taken today to guard the United States consul building following an outbreak last night during a Sacco-Vanzetti demonstration, in which one man was killed and thirty injured, including five policemen. A mob of 5,000 broke all the windows in the United States consulate. There was considerable pillage.

MANY ARE ARRESTED IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—Ninety-nine men and 28 women were under arrest here today in connection with Sacco-Vanzetti demonstrations. They were taken into custody last night when police broke up a parade to a protest meeting.

EUROPEAN PAPERS CONDEMN EXECUTION.

BERLIN, Aug. 23.—News of the Sacco-Vanzetti executions filled all the first pages of newspapers of Central European countries today, and the editorial comment, except in those of German nationalist papers, was in unanimous condemnation of the Massachusetts officials.

OFFICIALS RELAX IN GUARDING BUILDINGS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Officials today began to relax the guard which they have been maintaining on federal buildings for fear of Sacco-Vanzetti outbreaks. No disorders have broken out here and none are expected.

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Sister of Ciscoan Gets Wichita Post

Miss Marjorie Watson, who has been a member of the staff of the Texas state treasury, employed by Gregory Hatcher, treasurer, has been named assistant manager of the Wichita Falls chamber of commerce. Miss Watson is the niece of her sister, Mrs. E. S. Wilkinson, of Cisco, this week before assuming her new duties.

MANY ATTEND FUNERAL FOR E. M. NEWMAN

One of the largest crowds that has attended a funeral in this section in some time was present at Gainsight Monday afternoon when the body of E. M. Newman, Cisco old settler, was buried. He died here Sunday after a long illness. Present at the services were many from Cisco, and a large number of county officials and others from Eastland where a son, Milton Newman, is a deputy sheriff.

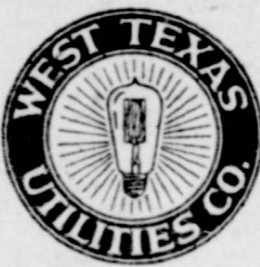

OIL INDUSTRY'S WORLD FAIR TO TALK AVIATION

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 23.—Aviation will come into its glory at the Fourth International Petroleum Exposition, when it will be feted by the industry which first made flying possible.

The directors of the exposition, which has been quite properly termed "The World's Fair of the Oil Industry," have sensed the great interest being universally manifest in aviation and are centering their activity on plans to make all lines pertaining to aeronautical developments the foremost attractions at the exposition this year.

Headlining the aviation features will be the coming of the world famous "We"—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, and his "Spirit of St. Louis." Probably the greatest reception the distinguished aviator will receive on his transcontinental tour is being prepared for him when he arrives here Sept. 29.

Spectacular Event

The city of Tulsa, and the State of Oklahoma are determined to make the occasion one of the largest and most spectacular events in the history of the state. Officials already are making predictions for a gathering numbering in the hundreds of thousands. The famous young American will spend an entire day at the show, conferring with oil men about fuels and lubricants.

A second aeronautical attraction will be the coming of a fleet of commercial planes owned by oil companies. The giant de luxe trimotored plane "Stanford" will bring a group of officials of the Standard Oil company to the show; Texas company officials will fly from Houston, Tex., in a big Ryan monoplane; The Phillips Petroleum corporation will send its Travelair plane from headquarters at Bartlesville, Okla.; The Manhattan Oil company will bring another Travelair plane from Fort Worth; while the Skelly Oil company will have a plane here. Several other companies also are contemplating making the flight here, while a number of aircraft manufacturers will bring their wares to the show.

Added Attraction

As an added attraction, Lieutenant Colonel J. A. Pugelew of Scott Field, Illinois, will fly an army "blimp" to the exposition, and thus two distinctive types of aircraft will be shown.

To further center interest in aviation, plans for making extensive tests of special aviation gasoline to determine their relative efficiency have been announced. These tests will be conducted by officials of the National Aeronautical association. A number of manufacturers of gasoline for aircraft are expected to enter their products in the tests.

Oil men see in the great progress being made in aviation a possible means of reducing the immense surplus of oil, which has gutted the market during the past year. "A hundred thousand airplanes flying in the United States would be of immense benefit in reducing this surplus," President W. G. Skelly of the board of directors of the exposition, has declared.

LONDON WOULD BE UNSAFE IF RAIDED BY AIR

LONDON, Aug. 23.—London, the capital of the Continent, could easily be destroyed from the air. This has been proved, according to the recent air maneuvers conducted by the Royal Air Force which showed that it would be practically impossible to defend Britain's vital centres from an aerial attack. The only defense being counter-attacks on the enemy country.

The tremendous ruin which would be wrought on London, and probably on Britain's industrial areas as well, is focussing public attention on how Britain is to be defended in the event of another war.

In England, as in America, much discussion is made by prominent personages that their country is further behind than any other in the development of aviation.

Others Ahead

"Other nations are way ahead of Great Britain in everything pertaining to the air," says Brigadier General Groves, of the British Empire Air League.

They have made plans with a full knowledge of the possibilities of air attack. We have none, yet Britain can be much more easily attacked by air than probably any other nation.

"There is only one real defence in aerial warfare, that is hit first. You must attack the enemy before he leaves his home aerodrome."

"During the next war large areas of the country will probably be submerged in a sea of gas spread by enemy aeroplanes."

"How to protect civilians from the perils of gas attack, and how to move them in time of need from the town to safe quarters, above and below the ground, are problems which are now occupying some of the best technical brains in the country," concluded General Groves.

Tremendous Advance

There has been a tremendous advance since the World War in the accuracy of bomb-dropping machines. These machines are now being equipped with uncannily efficient secret aiming devices, which greatly increase the chances of hitting a target, even from heights exceeding three or four miles.

Duplap, member of the state board of water engineers, conferred today with Governor Moody, probably concerning what action will be taken on the request of West Texas interests that the board rehear proceedings granting water development permits along the Colorado river to certain power syndicates.
