DOES DEMPSEY'S PUNCH PUT END TO HIS VICTIMS

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—If you care to string along with Leo P. Firpo, and that's all a matter of taste, Jack Sharkey never will be heavyweight champion of the world, regardless of whether Tunney lasts five years longer or only five minutes. It is Firpo's notion that the body pounding Sharkey absorbed from Dempsey has left him a broken man and that his contention will be proved the first time Sharkey steps out with a really good fighter.

In fact, no man who was badly beaten up by Dempsey ever has been the same, according to Firpo. "Look at Willard after Toledo," he declaimed, forgetting that no one could look at Willard for four years thereafter because the man wouldn't, or at least didn't, fight. "He was just a hulk when Dempsey got through with him."

"Look at Carl Morris, Bill Brennan, Billy Miske and Georges Carpentier. What did they do after Dempsey got through with them? Nothing."

And Firpo, Too

"Look at Luis Firpo. They say he almost licked Dempsey. I say that he was beaten up so badly that he couldn't lick anybody afterwards."

"After seeing Sharkey take that beating about the body for two of those rounds, I was almost sorry for him, almost but not quite," continues Leo in his best bar side manner. "I knew I was seeing a very promising young heavyweight ruin his career and it just seemed too bad. However, it had to be done and it was done. Sharkey will never be the same fighter again."

That is a very good story. I like it. And, because it appeals to me a bit, I am going to tear into it to see what makes it tick, if anything. Like Dempsey's opponents, it may not be the same after I get through with him.

Everything ready, do Millo? Lights! Camera! Action!

Willard might have been broken or unbroken for all anyone knew, since he couldn't have been much after four years of retirement. Besides he came back to fight as little and get as much money as possible.

Proves Nothing

Morris was a has-been or never-was when he met Dempsey and, in either case or both, nothing can be proved on that count.

Brennan was knocked out via a broken leg in the first round and tore Dempsey to slithers in the second for eleven rounds. He went out in the twelfth with a rabbit punch. He seemed to be able to make his usual fight in succeeding engagements, although careful living was beginning to impair what ability he had.

Carpentier had fought at least ten years when Dempsey got him. He must have been going down the yon side of the hill at the time

and, besides, he wasn't even a light heavyweight.

Miske was a dying man at Benton Harbor and naturally Dempsey's punches helped him very little.

Firpo might or might not have come back, the only sure thing being that he didn't. He simply could not drag his punch after him.

Still, Leo has an argument. These men either were not much good in the first place or even less so in the last. He has a very good argument on Sharkey, for the latter is supposed to have a tender torso anyhow and no one will deny that it has had plenty of reason for increased resentment during recent months.
