Ratliffe's Wounds Threaten Death; Mrs. Sam Fox Quizzed About Aiding Bandits' Escape

Posses and individual officers were scouring the country for miles around South Bend today seeking trace of the two bank bandits remaining at large. Officer W. M. Miller and others left Cisco long before daylight this morning for the scene of the hunt, but no word had been received from them at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

After the battle Tuesday in which Marshall Ratliffe was shot and caught, the bandits escaped after being surrounded by the posse which followed close upon their heels. The two men were seen to disappear into an oil derrick and an effort was made to surround it, but the robbers slipped through the cordon hastily thrown about the place. One of them, probably Roy Duke, appeared to be suffering greatly from his wounded arm. Later the trail was picked up as it cossed the Brazos river at three different places, and officers said the tracks showed that the men were failing in their progress, judging by the length of the stride.

The local police station is anxiously awaiting word from the "front lines," and confidently expecting that news of the capture of the men may be received at any time.


