

In the proposed regulations USDA asks comments on three methods for restoring lost benefits. All of the methods involve offsetting the household's purcase requirement with the lost benefit entitlement.

The proposed regulations differ from the interim procedures in these areas:

Recipients can receive lost benefits without going through the fair hearing process if the client, food stamp caseworker, and supervisor agree.

Lost benefits will be restored only for the 12 months preceding the discovery of the error.

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
