

## CLYDE BULLDOGS SURPRISE ANSON TIGERS 14-0 FRIDAY

CLYDE — The Clyde High Bulldogs shut out previously undefeated Anson Tigers here last Friday night to the tune of 14-0. The Bulldogs turned back Anson's only penetration late in the first quarter and mounted a 57 yard drive of their own in the second. With 10 minutes left in the half, quarterback Johnny Arms threw 16 yards in the left flat to halfback Marty Clifford for Clyde's first touchdown. The extra-point attempt failed, but the Bulldogs led 6-0. The half ended with Clyde threatening again inside the Tigers 10 yard line.

After the intermission, the Bulldogs defense dominated the third quarter, as Anson took to the air. Key interceptions were made by Clifford who had two for the night and one by Wes Bennett.

Defensive linemen Rick Newman, Mark Stallings, and cornerback Clifford all had one fumble recovery each.

During the fourth quarter Clyde High marched 53 yards for their second touchdown with fullback Mike Mitchell blasting right guard for the final two yards. Quarterback Arms then skirted right end for the bonus points as the Bulldogs put it away.

Defensively, Chuck Swofford, Jimmy May, Mike Dugan and

Jackie Brown made those same kind of hits that stopped Hamilton the week before. Running backs Mitchell, James Stevens and Arms all carried for fifty plus yards each. Arms completed 5 of 11 passes for 81 yards and Curtis Chiappone completed another for 13 yards. Leading receivers for Clyde were Billy Dugan four catches for 62 yards and Miller Scott with one for 22 yards. Ray Walker and Royce Watkins played well in the offensive line. Clyde led Anson 18-14 in first downs and 257 to 243 in total offense.

This Friday the Bulldogs who are 3-1 on the season, travel to Hamilton to battle their Bulldogs in the District 9AA opener. Hamilton is 2-2, having lost only to powerful Clifton and DeLeon teams. Hamilton is paced by All-district halfback Paul Addison, 175, pounds; scoring leader tailback Mike Schrank, 180 pounds; and returning quarterback Delbert Kelm, 165 pounds.

The game should be another squeaker like Clyde fans have become accustomed to seeing lately. Clyde may be without the service of two-way starters Mike Dugan and Mike Mitchell who both received injuries in the Anson contest.

Kick-off time at Hamilton is 7:30 p.m. Friday night.

The Dragons had 13 first downs, 227 rushing yards, only 12 passing yards, out of 4 completions, and two interceptions.

## EULA SCHOOL INITIATING NEW UNITS IN PART-TIME TRAINING

EULA — The vocational agriculture department of Eula High School is one of approximately forty vocational agriculture departments in Texas that is redirecting or initiating new units in Cooperative Part-time Training in Vocational Agriculture during the 1974-75 school year. This will bring the total to over three hundred and seventy vocational agriculture departments in Texas offering this type of training which will be in its tenth year of operation.

The high school program of vocational agriculture education is designed to meet the needs of youth who plan to enter farming, ranching, or other agricultural occupations. The Cooperative Part-time Training courses provide instructions for high school students who have an interest in a vocational need for becoming established in an off farm agricultural occupation. It is also designed to provide technical instruction, on-the-job training, and work experience for high school vocational agriculture students preparing to enter agricultural occupations.

Students spend one hour in class each school day to receive instruction in the occupations for which they are training and three consecutive hours each school day at training stations in order to learn the occupations. Training stations are agricultural businesses in the community that are cooperating with the local school in training students by providing work experience necessary to become competent employees.

Claude Rock, Vocational agriculture teacher at Eula High School, will conduct this phase of the vocational agriculture program and he recently attended a workshop in San Antonio conducted by the Texas Education Agency under the direction of Mr. J. A. Marshall, Director of Agricultural Education, Texas Education Agency. The purpose of the workshop is to provide the vocational agriculture teacher with training in organizing and conducting the cooperative part-time program in off-farm agricultural occupations.

A voter registration application may be obtained at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office in the applicant's county of residence. The application may be filed either in person or by mail.

Callahan Co. Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell explained

ed that a registration is valid for three years and is automatically extended for the succeeding three-year period by voting in a primary or general election. Consequently, many voters who have participated in prior elections need not make application to renew their registration. The only exception to this is if the voter has moved from one voting precinct to another, he will need to register in the precinct in which he is now living.

## USDA Proposes Amendments To Food Stamp Program Regulations

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today proposed amendments to the food stamp program regulations which provide permanent procedures for retroactively restoring a household's benefits wrongfully denied, delayed or terminated thru administrative error. Since January 1974, interim procedures have been in effect.

In the proposed regulations USDA asks comments on three methods for restoring lost benefits. All of the methods involve offsetting the household's purchase requirement with the lost benefit entitlement.

The proposed regulations differ from the interim procedures in these areas:

Recipients can receive lost benefits without going through the fair hearing process if the client, food stamp caseworker, and supervisor agree.

Lost benefits will be restored only for the 12 months preceding the discovery of the error.

Recipients' lost benefits will be reduced by the amount of any outstanding claims against them.

Comments must be received by October 30, and will be open to public inspection.

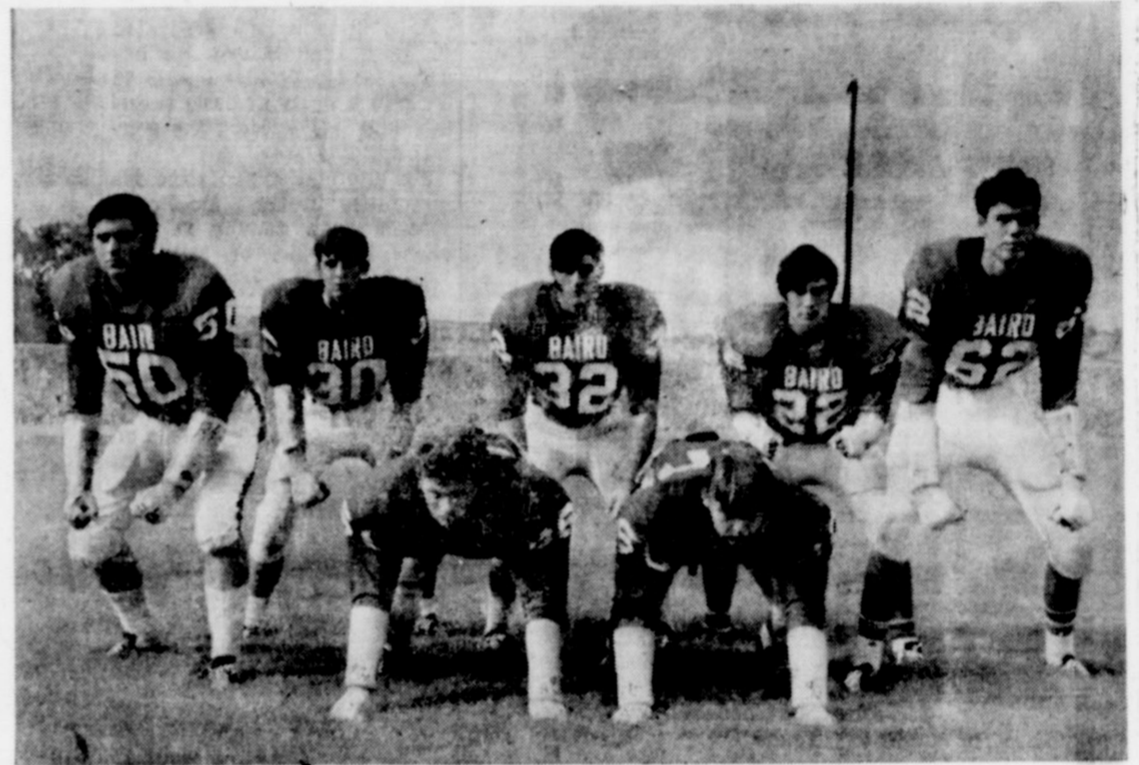

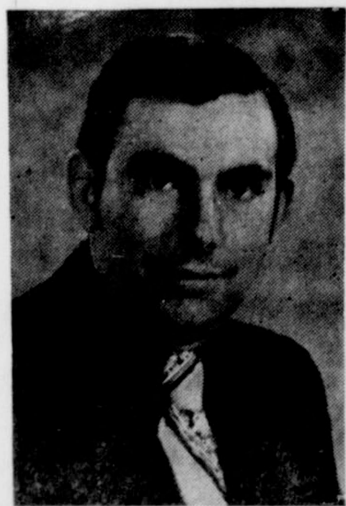
## "THE 20TH CENTURY CHURCH"

# IMMUNIZATION MONTH OCTOBER DESIGNATED CHILD

Young children wish that Christmas came every month, and personnel in the public health field have that same feeling about Immunization Action Month.

This special month - being observed in October for the second year - puts the emphasis on immunizations, an effective weapon in the State Health Department's battle against disease in Texas.

Only through continued emphasis on immunizations - particularly in pre-school children - can the so-called childhood diseases be conquered, says State Health Commissioner Dr. James Peavy.

October is set aside for a cooperative effort to reverse the trend of declining levels of protection among one to four year old children against polio, measles, rubella, mumps, diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus. Being used in this effort are intensive educational and motivational programs to increase the utilization of immunization services.

Texas last year had an enviable decline in immunizable diseases, and there has been no paralytic polio in the state since 1972. But, warns the State Health Department, unimmunized youngsters can provide a reservoir for disease. All parents are urged to check their children's immunization records and correct any deficiencies which they find.

The State Health Department along with its local health departments and public health regions, the federal Center for Disease Control, and other agencies, has a two-part October campaign. It is directed at private and public health care providers and parents for the purpose of increasing immunity levels among the pre-school populations.

In addition to television and radio spot announcements and newspaper stories, the immunization campaign is being taken directly to parents and mothers.

The Texas Department of Public Welfare has joined with the Health Department to insert an immunization message into all food stamp authorizations for October. The insert, modified to include immunization schedules in Spanish, will be mailed to approximately 400,000 food stamp recipients. It is anticipated that another 70,000 mothers who receive aid to dependent children also will receive the message.

In addition, 1,200,000 immunization messages will be mailed to public utility consumers throughout the state.

Day care center directors will receive a recently developed leaflet on immunizations. The leaflet explains the parents' obligations concerning the child's health statement, TB skin test, and immunization status. This leaflet is being distributed to

more than 3,000 child caring facilities throughout Texas. Local health departments during October will review their immunization records to determine which clinic children have not completed their full immunizations. Special posters in Spanish and English have been devised to notify parents.

And, throughout the state, special immunization aides will continue their efforts in contacting all parents of newborns concerning immunization.

The State Health Commissioner is solidly behind these increased immunization activities during October - and every month in the future - and urges parents to have their children protected against possible life-taking, crippling diseases. After all, our children are the only future we have.

## Cisco Junior College Surpasses 1,000 Mark-Serving Record Number

CISCO — Cisco Junior College enrollment for the current fall semester has well surpassed the 900 mark, as earlier predicted by college officials, and the school is currently serving an all-time record number of people with several new community programs added to the college's regular semester-length courses, Dean Carroll Scott has announced.

The enrollment figures were released following the college's final extension registration in Merkel Monday, Sept. 24. The totals show 1047 students taking courses leading to associate degrees or vocational certificates in Cisco and its five extension locations, 373 people signed up for continuing education programs under the heading of adult education and community service, and 93 area high school students taking technical - vocational programs in a contract program whereby CJC provides facilities and teachers for prep school juniors and seniors. Students in the three areas of service combine to make a grand total of 1513 persons currently being served by the college, an increase of some 40 per cent over the total head count of the fall semester of 1973, Mr. Scott said.

The dean pointed out that the 373 figure for continuing education program should grow substantially throughout the school year as various programs are made available to specific interest groups as opportunities arise. Continuing education programs have not been figured in past enrollment counts, Dean Scott added.

Dr. Norman E. Wallace Jr., president of the college, expressed satisfaction at the growth reflected in the enrollment figures. "When we're growing we are serving more people of the Big Country - and that's why we're here." The CJC

president also predicted that the school's enrollment for the spring and summer semesters would show substantial increases.

## Richard Mackey Rites In California

BAIRD — Richard Charles Mackey passed away September 26 in Antioch Calif. at age 64. Mr. Mackey was born in Drake Oklahoma, where he received his schooling. As a young man he was a truck driver, and spent most of his younger life in Texas. He and his wife Ella Mae lived in Clyde, prior to moving to Antioch in late 1944. There he was employed by Standard Oil Company prior to that he and his wife starting the Mackey Grocery Store in 1951. They retired from the Grocery Business in 1964.

Funeral services were held Tuesday October 1 at 2 p.m. in the Higgins Funeral Chapel in Antioch. The Rev. Allan Brown of the Church of Christ in Antioch officiated.

Mackey was buried in the View Cemetery.

Mr. Mackey is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ella Mae, and two sons; George of Antioch and Forrest of Sacramento, his mother Elma Mae Mackey of Antioch, and three sisters Lil Leah Dean, Beth Saunters, both of Antioch, and Mrs. Vida Paige of Cross Plains and one grandchild.

Vietnam-era veterans discharged during the four-year period before August 1, 1975, to apply for low-cost Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI), according to Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Office Director.

An estimated 2.7 million veterans separated from April 2, 1970 through July 31, 1974, are eligible for the insurance. It is designed as interim protection during readjustment to civilian life.

Servicemen discharged since August 1 will receive application forms automatically, Coker added. Nonrenewable, five-year term coverage is available in \$5.00 increments up to \$20,000. Monthly premiums for the maximum coverage is \$3.40 for veterans aged 34 and under, and \$6.80 for those 35 and over.
