WATCHFUL WAITING IN CHINA

The American position is hands off in China. Our government has taken a strictly neutral position, in view of the present situation, evidently awaiting the outcome of the national drive on Peking. This is obviously a safe and logical thing to do. In the past the United States, like other powers, has recognized the Peking government as the only authority in China. The powers seem to have pursued this policy partly from fear of Nationalist "radicalism" and partly from inertia. An existing government in a historic capital is seldom turned down until a rival civil power makes good by establishing its authority beyond question. Presumably our government and the others will be prepared to recognize the Nationalists if they demonstrate their power by taking Peking and driving the northern army into Manchuria. It would be folly then to do otherwise; for there would be no alternative authority to deal with as the representatives of China, and to continue denying the Nationalists recognition then would be to turn them again toward red Russia for sympathy and counsel.
