Another try out of the plan will be made in Devil's river, where large gars are working havoc with the fish population. and snakes can be brought to the surface with a degree of voltage not injurious to game fish was the belief of the engineers, though turtles went to the bottom and recovered when the current was turned off.

The trap was laid by two wires. One was zigzagged across the bottom in an area of water 100 yards square just above a dam. The drawn slowly across the surface by men on each side of the reservoir.
