Coolidge Will Do 'Everything He Can' to Help Ticket, Work Says After Turning in His Resignation

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 3.—Chairman Hubert Work of the Republican national committee departed from Superior Monday with definite assurance from President Coolidge that he would help the Republican cause in the forthcoming campaign.

Dr. Work also presented Coolidge with his resignation from the secretaryship of the interior. The chief executive took the resignation but its acceptance was withheld pending, presumably, the selection of a successor. It is expected that Coolidge will follow his custom of announcing simultaneously acceptance of the resignation with appointment of a new secretary.

After a four-hour visit at the summer white house, Dr. Work said that he had not asked President Coolidge how he proposed to contribute to the Republican campaign and that he did not suggest possible ways to the chief executive. He was satisfied with the chief executive's assurance that he would "do everything he could," Dr. Work said, and left to Coolidge the selection of what avenues he thought best to aid.

Quiet, Dignified Race

The interior secretary said that reports that Coolidge has definitely promised to speak in New York state and New England during the campaign were false.

Secretary Hoover Chairman Work said, proposed to conduct a "quiet, dignified, instructive and educational" campaign. The Republican nominee had no intention to undertake a countrywide stumping tour. Dr. Work added, although he proposed to deliver several addresses over the radio.

"Picture in Every Home"

"I don't think Hoover will make much of a campaign," Dr. Work said. "Why should he? He is known to every voter and will be better known every day. No man was ever nominated for the presidency who had a greater background, more varied experience and wider con-

TAPS SOUNDED AT RANGER FOR CUSTER SCOUT

RANGER, July 3.—W. R. Nixon, 87-year-old survivor of pioneer days, died at his home here Sunday morning after an illness of several months. Funeral service was held at the home Sunday afternoon. Burial followed at Evergreen cemetery where he was laid to rest at the side of his wife, who died several years ago.

Nixon was born on Leiper's reservation, four miles below Camp Cooper, on the Clear Fork of the Brazos river, 20 miles south of the present site of Throckmorton, Texas. His mother was a full blooded Comanche Indian and his father was an English physician.

Before he died, Nixon gave his version of the fight in which General George Custer and his men were massacred. Nixon and Buffalo Bill Cody were sent by Custer to procure aid from General McKensie. When they returned, they found Custer and all of his men slaughtered. Nixon helped to bury Custer.

Nixon was with Custer in 1876 and had been associated with him about four months before the massacre. He served under General McKensie at the Red Cloud agency, Utah, and was a guide for the United States army.

He enlisted in the civil war but was sent to a Ranger camp at what is now Breckenridge and served four years as a Texas ranger under Captain Jack Cureton. He spent three years as an interpreter at Fort McKavitt and guided General Shafter for over three years. He was one of a party who effected the escape of Jim Leslie, Fay Larkin and Jane Weatherbee, who were prisoners of the Mormons in a cave in Surprise Valley in the Utah mountains for over fourteen years.

He is survived by one son, W. H. Nixon, Ranger, and two daughters, Mrs. Mattie Williams, Ranger and Mrs. Hattie Theford, Perrin.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM IS PLEASING TO LEADERS OF FARMERS

Plank Praised by G. O. Peck, Governor of Nebraska; Republicans Renew 'Broken Pledges' Says Peck

CHICAGO, July 3.—The Chicago platform extends the protective system to agriculture, no doubt on the theory that the protective system is a permanent economic institution.

"Insult Added to Injury" CHICAGO, July 3.—Comparing the platform of the Republican and Democratic parties as drawn in their national conventions, George N. Peck, chairman of the executive committee of 22 Monday issued a statement upon his return from Houston, charging the Republican party with giving the farmers of the middle west "a renewal of broken pledges." The Democratic platform, he stated, adopted a plank for agriculture "which is the most favorable."

The executive committee of 22 was formed in a conference of agricultural representatives of the north central states called together in Des Moines in January, 1925, at the instance of Governor John Hammill of Iowa.

"At Kansas City the farmers were definitely advised that the protective system is not intended for them," Peck stated.

"The party which farmers of the middle west had made and supported, turned its back upon them, emphatically giving them a renewal of broken pledges which are less definite than those of four years ago."

Adding insult to injury the party nominated as its standard bearer the arch-enemy of a square deal for American agriculture, whose solution of the farm problem is to keep on starving out farmers until production is reduced to the demands of the domestic markets. If England herself were directly prescribing an American agricultural policy she could hardly do better for England.

"In Houston the farmers were given the greatest consideration in every way. Their reception was most cordial, their views on a platform were solicited and a real plank was adopted which is the most favorable for agriculture ever written in the platform of any political party in our history."

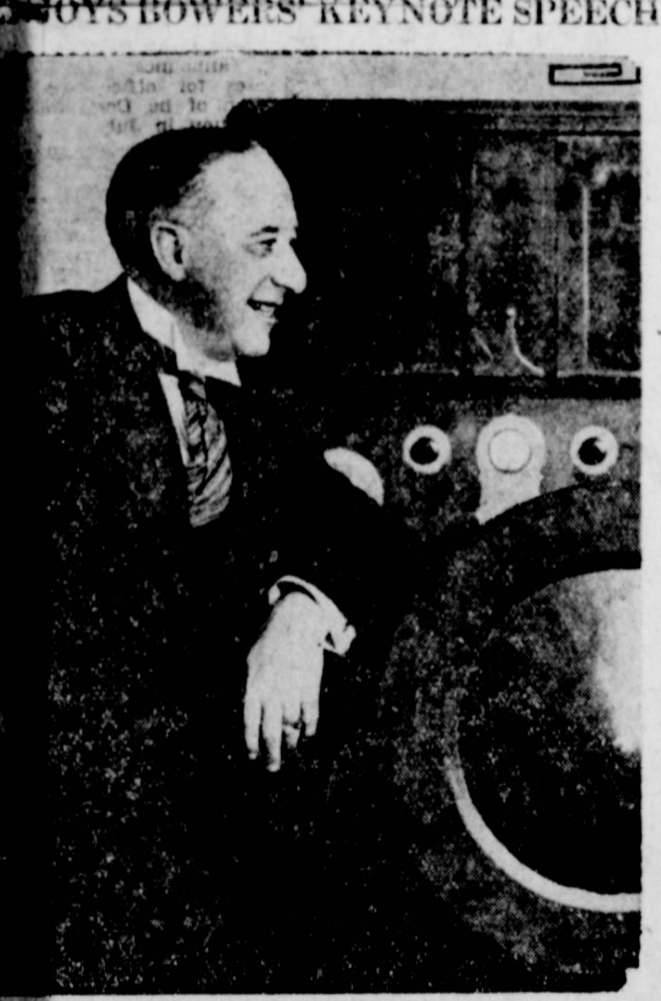

NAVAL OFFICER FROM TEXAS IS PLANE VICTIM

NEWPORT, R. I., July 3.—Two naval officers lost their lives Monday when a navy seaplane doing a series of loops plunged 1,000 feet into the harbor. The men were Lieut. The seaplane had completed three loops and had started the fourth when it went into a tail spin and struck the water with terrific force. Commander Alford was carried below the surface of the water. Butler managed to keep above.

Alford, who was 41 years old, was a native of Willis Point, Texas, and a graduate of the United States Naval academy in the class of 1905. Butler was 32 and has been living in Newport.

Alford was awarded the navy cross during the World War while commanding the destroyer Nicholson for combatting submarines.

SMALL CROWD HEARS BLANTON IN EAST TEXAS

NACOGDOCHES, July 3.—Congressman Thomas L. Blanton spoke to a small group of farmers and business men here Monday in the interest of his candidacy for the United States senate.

Blanton dealt with his record in eliminating petty graft from congress and with his efforts to help put out the big grafters in the eleven years he has been in congress. He promised to eliminate much more of the graft if elected to the senate. At no time during his hour and a quarter did he refer to any of his opponents in the race.

Fertilization of Seed on Large Scale Instead of Soil Is New Method Developed in California

BERKELEY, Cal., July 3.—A high as a 15-fold increase has been obtained, as compared with no crop at all where untreated seed was planted in phosphorous lacking ground.

On Large Scale The great value of Professor Gericke's discovery lies in the fact that his methods permit treatment of seed on a large scale at low cost. Further experiments, however, will be made in the field before the method is given widespread application.

This is the third important discovery that the Berkeley scientist has made recently in his program of experiments purposing to make certain plants wholly or in part independent of the soil or of soil conditions.

The first was the perfection of a method of growing floral plants in water solutions containing the elements necessary for normal growth; a process of commercial interest.

The second was a method of storing the important fertilizers in sufficient quantities in young tomato plants while they were growing in coal frames to produce a markedly greater crop.

The basis of all these experiments, Professor Gericke explained, is the fact that plants may absorb more food than they need for growth.

Value to Farmers By this means he makes it possible for grain to be grown in soil deficient in phosphorous without the more costly fertilization of the entire field.

Agricultural experts point out that this development, if proved feasible in foreign fields, will be of great value to farmers in many parts of Europe, Australia and Africa, where extensive districts deficient in phosphorous are found.

The lack of this essential chemical element, according to Professor Gericke, is due to long and extensive cultivation of the soil and partly to the fact that certain soils convert phosphorous to an insoluble which plants cannot use.

The seed treatment method, storing the necessary phosphorous within the seed itself, obviates both these difficulties.

In tests at Berkeley during the last three years it has been found possible actually to increase the weight of the seed to ten to thirty per cent, varying with the species. In the case of barley so treated, as

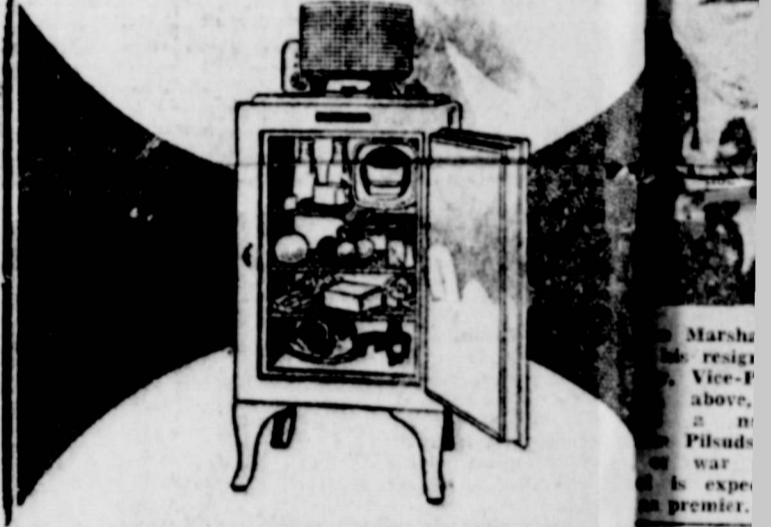

Cole Says Dallas Will Have to Assert Self at 1929 World Convention to Match Cordiality of Northern City

Cole, local agent for the Pacific railroad, who was late to the Rotary International convention at Minneapolis, returned home, filled with admiration and loud in praise of the hospitality of Minneapolis as a city.

He joined the Texas delegation at Fort Worth, where he was the Rotary International representative of 14 Pullmans and two Pullman sleeping cars en route to the opening session, June 15, at Minneapolis. He found Minneapolis uncomparably more hospitable than any other city he had ever visited. The temperature was augmented by showers every day. I was very hot and needed it every day I was there.

There were over 12,000 voting delegates from all parts of the world. The opening session held in the municipal auditorium, with special trains with additional delegates arriving each day. Minneapolis cordially received the delegates and Texas delegates and Texas delegates who will be host to the convention next year, if we expect to compare favorably with Minneapolis in taking care of the Rotarians. The convention city, assisted by St. Paul, must have commenced this preparation to entertain the convention a year ago, so through were all arrangements. The entertainment committee seemed to have anticipated every wish of the delegates. There were 2,400 automobiles at the disposal of the delegates, and they insisted that these cars be used to ride over the city at our pleasure.

"A special program with a spectacular pyrotechnical display at Lake Calhoun was arranged for the delegates. Here several bands played delightful music and prominent Rotarians from all nations delivered addresses. The music and words of the speakers were carried to every corner of the scene by amplifiers, enabling everyone to hear distinctly, even when the speaker was not in view.

"I felt quite at home at Minneapolis, as the town reminded me so much of Cisco, only on a far larger scale. And the mannerisms and hospitality of the people were not unlike those of Ciscoans.

"But I certainly came back home more thoroughly than ever sold on Rotary, for I learned much of its objectives and aims from those who spoke at the convention—some of the ablest men of America and foreign countries. The speakers stressed the importance for closer fellowship between nations as well as individuals. I was greatly interested in the appeal of a Chinese delegate for closer relations between nations, as well as to end the internecine strife now being waged among the people of China.

"A feature demonstrated at this convention was the determination of Rotary to bring about closer relations between capital and labor, which is one of its objectives.

"Returning home I came by Estes Park, Colorado where I had a most delightful visit, taking several reels of scenes in that famous resort which I have had developed on my return. It was uncomparably cold in the mountains of Colorado.

"Traveling in an auto I wore a light overcoat, with lapel over me, and still got cold. But I did not object to the cold, as I felt I needed some refrigeration after the warm summer days in Cisco, and in face of the remainder of the heated term yet to be endured. On the whole the trip was one of the most delightful vacations I have ever spent. From the time we left Fort Worth till I reached Cisco, there was not a thing that occurred to mar the trip in the slightest."
