Four Billion Tax Valuation is Expected

AUSTIN, July 6.—Assessed taxable values of Texas will go above the \$4,000,000,000 mark this year for the first time in the history of the state, it was estimated Thursday by Comptroller S. H. Terrell, who has received the tax valuation estimates from 128 counties out of 252 in the state. Last year the taxable values aggregated \$3,938,994,094 and the prospective increase is more than \$12,000,000 and may go much higher.

J. Frank Norris, Fort Worth preacher, Rev. Earl Anderson and his followers that work would continue despite a restraining order issued by Judge Young when nearby residents opposed the building because it failed to comply with the building code. Rev. Anderson was jailed on Young's order yesterday for alleged violation of the injunction.

Larger Water Line Put in at Lake Bathhouse

The Lake Cisco Amusement Co. has just re-installed part of its water line from the bathhouse to the city's main line, using a larger size pipe. This change has been necessary on account of the recent heavy rains which caused small driftwood to accumulate in large quantities next to the dam. Considerable trouble has been given from time to time when the lines have been stopped with these particles of drift.

Shaver's Wife Joins Critics of Gov. Smith

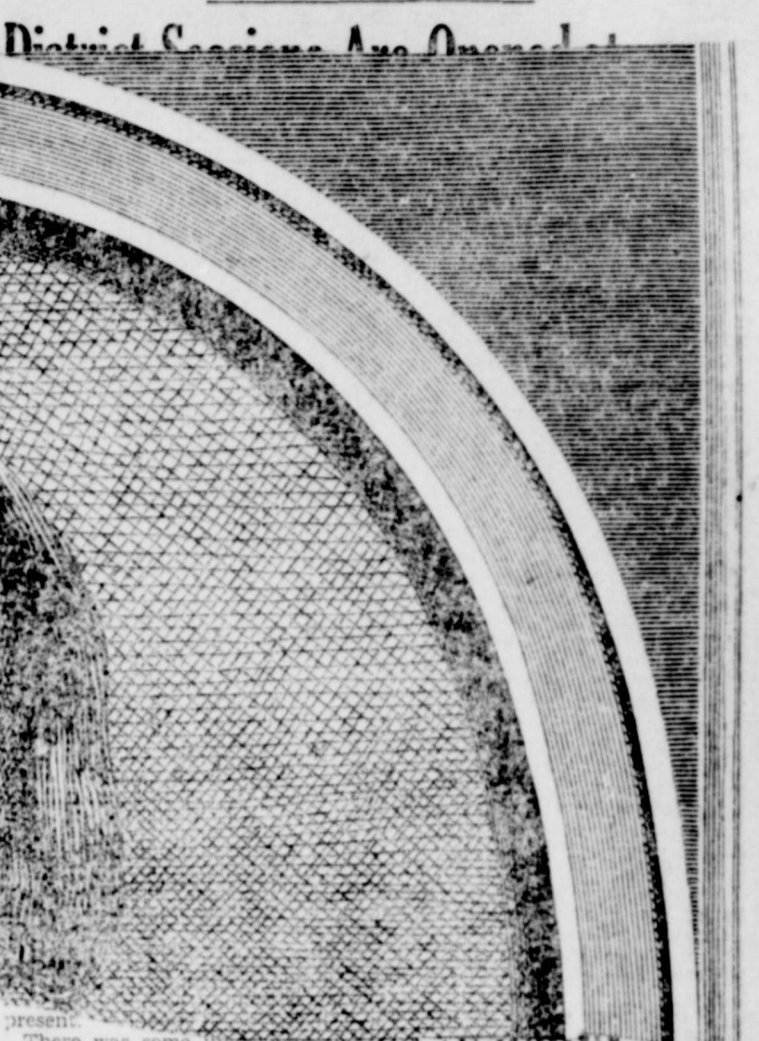

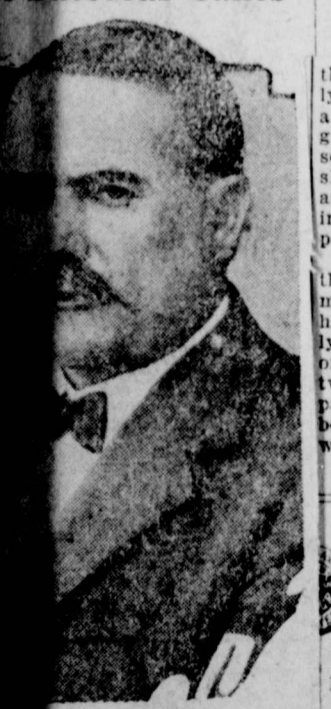

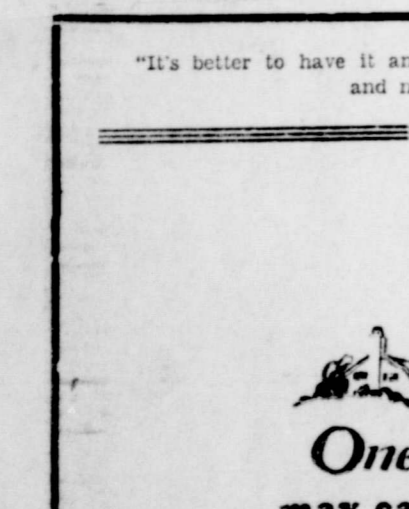

KLAN BOSSING SEN. MAYFIELD, RIVAL CHARGES

COMANCHE, July 6.—References of Senator Earle B. Mayfield to dividing the people of Texas by "raising questions that serve only to divide our forces" drew fire from Congressman Tom Connally Thursday afternoon. Connally is a candidate for the United States senate, opposing Mayfield.

"If there has been discussion in the ranks of the Democratic party of Texas it is a sin that Mr. Mayfield and not I am called to account for," Connally said. "Earle B. Mayfield deceived the people of Texas six years ago and gained their vote by deception. When the results had been announced he went into the court house and swore under oath a betrayal of his secret brethren who had elected him through duplicity. He betrayed the members of the Ku Klux Klan, but by his votes in the senate he has not gone back on the imperial wizard. He swore in the court house that he had not been a Klansman while he was running for the United States senate, but grand dragons of the order wrote letters to members calling him 'Klansman Mayfield,' and he attended meetings under cover at night."

"However, that may be I dare him to look an audience of Texas Democrats squarely in the eye and tell them whether he is still taking orders from the imperial wizard. Let us see if he will deny the wizard as he did the klansmen themselves. I am not raising the issue of the Klan. Mr. Mayfield did that six years ago. It was the Klan that won the senatorship for him then. But do the offices of the state belong to the people or to secret political societies and their leaders who deceive the people?"

MILEAGE BILL FOR CONGRESS RILES BLANTON

LIBERTY, July 6.—Making his third speech of the day here Thursday, Thomas L. Blanton, Abilene, candidate for the United States senate, promised his audience that if he is elected he will prevent the government from allowing congressmen their 20-cent mileage appropriation, which, he declared, costs the people many thousands of dollars annually.

"We congressmen from Texas receive \$700 a trip under this law when it costs only \$75 to go to Washington," the speaker said. "It is graft and although I failed to stop it in the lower house, if I go to the senate, so help me God, I will have this graft stopped. I know how to do it. During the three sessions of the Wilson administration Texas congressmen got \$2,100 for mileage and \$1,900 of it was graft." Blanton, who has served in the lower house for 12 years, quoted from a Texas newspaper of 1921 how he had stopped the congressional salary increase and said that he had saved \$1,750,000 for four years.

"I kept this salary increase killed for four years," Blanton said, "and then in 1925, one night at midnight, when you good people of Liberty were fast asleep, they passed the bill giving \$10,000 salaries. It was a crime against the people of the country. Now Senator Shepard is worth \$50,000 a year to Texas, but there are 250 members of the house and senate who are not worth the salt in their bread."

SMITH CHIEFS PLAN REGIONAL HEADQUARTERS

NEW YORK, July 6.—Establishment at Washington of a national headquarters to direct the presidential campaign of Governor Alfred E. Smith with four or five regional headquarters at strategic points throughout the country is being considered by Democratic leaders.

Governor Smith is understood to have given his indorsement to the proposed plan, which must await the approval of the Democratic national committee, which meets here on July 11.

The tentative plans call for regional headquarters in New York, handling the campaign in all the states east of Ohio and north of Maryland; midwestern headquarters in Chicago; southern headquarters either in Atlanta or Mobile, and western headquarters in Denver. Plans for additional headquarters in Boston and Los Angeles also are being considered.

George R. Van Namee, who managed the governor's pre-convention campaign, seems the probable eastern manager, with J. Bruce Krenner, national committeeman from Montana and former McAdoo leader, favored for the Denver post. Fred W. Johnson of Wyoming, president of the Western States Smith for President club, is also being considered for this latter post.

Governor Smith is said to favor giving the regional directors a free hand in the conduct of the campaign in their territories. Friends close to him say he will dictate the general policies to be followed by himself but he feels that those familiar with the conditions in their own art of the country should be left free to direct their organizations without too many orders from national headquarters.

SLAP AT BOLTERS TAKEN BY FORMER POSTMASTER GENERAL

Trio Refusing to Support National Ticket Will Get Few Votes, Burlleson Predicts; Most Harm Outside State

AUSTIN, July 6.—Albert S. Burlleson, postmaster general in President Wilson's cabinet, and warm supporter of Governor Alfred Smith for president, suggested somewhat caustically here Thursday that Texas Democratic candidates who have announced intention to "bolt" the party and not support the New York governor, carry more weight outside of Texas than within, and for that reason should have their names left on the July primary election ballot for an explanation by the home folks at the polls.

In a statement decrying bolting, Burlleson objected to any effort to remove the bolters' names from the ballot, declaring "they have done all the injury to our national nominee they can."

"This injury results not so much in Texas where they are known," he said, "but beyond its limits, where, because of their candidacy for important state offices, they are given an influence to which they are not entitled."

"Outside of Texas, voters do not know just what queer, erratic and unusual people can, by the payment of a small entrance fee, have their names placed on our Democratic primary ballot. They do not understand just how unimportant and of what little consequence such people really may be. Would it not be wise to leave the names of these bolters on the ballot so that the result of the primary election should show just what value Texas Democrats place on them?"

"A man who has been elected in a Ku Klux-ridden senatorial district after bolting the state ticket, in an election where Ku Kluxism was the issue, can do his party little injury by adding one more bolt to his record. In my opinion, the votes such people will receive in a Democratic primary will be truly insignificant. I prophesy now that Governor Moody will receive in the primary election more than 10 times the aggregate vote of all these recalcitrants."

W. E. Hawkins, Breckenridge, and Mrs. Edith Wilkins, Dallas, candidates for governor, and State Senator Tom Love, Dallas, candidate for lieutenant governor, have refused publicly to support Governor Smith for president.

State Highway Commissioner Cone Johnson also has said that he will not support Smith.

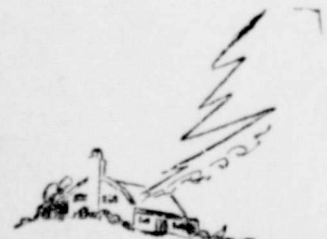
