Of the dozen powers that are expected to sign the American treaty "repudiating war as an instrument of policy," Japan is the only one agreeing to accept it without reservations

Europe has learned only to well the American lesson of reservations in practical detail, while agreeing in principle. Japan does not argue or define or note exceptions. She takes the treaty apparently in spirit and letter as our state department offers it.

This situation calls for no criticism of the European powers. They have their own domestic, regional and international reasons for stating their proposition as they have done. 


