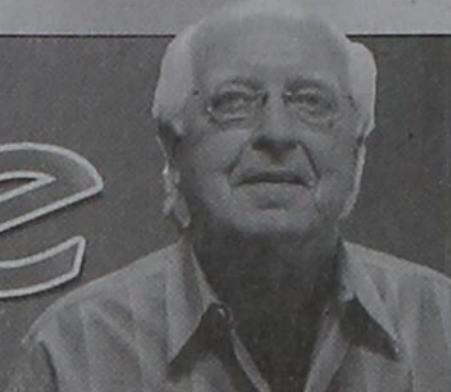

Slow Cooker Spicy Black-Eyed Peas

Original recipe makes 10 servings

- 6 cups water
 - 1 cube chicken bouillon
 - 1 pound dried black-eyed peas, sorted and rinsed
 - 1 onion, diced
 - 2 cloves garlic, diced
 - 1 red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded, and diced
 - 1 jalapeno chile, seeded and minced
 - 8 ounces diced ham
 - 4 slices bacon, chopped
 - 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons cumin salt, to taste
 - 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- PREP: 30 mins
COOK: 6 hrs
READY IN: 6 hrs 30 mins

Directions

Pour the water into a slow cooker, add the bouillon cube, and stir to dissolve. Combine the black-eyed peas, onion, garlic, bell pepper, jalapeno pepper, ham, bacon, cayenne pepper, cumin, salt, and pepper; stir to blend. Cover the slow cooker and cook on Low for 6 to 8 hours until the beans are tender.

Grandmother's Buttermilk Cornbread

Original recipe makes 9 servings

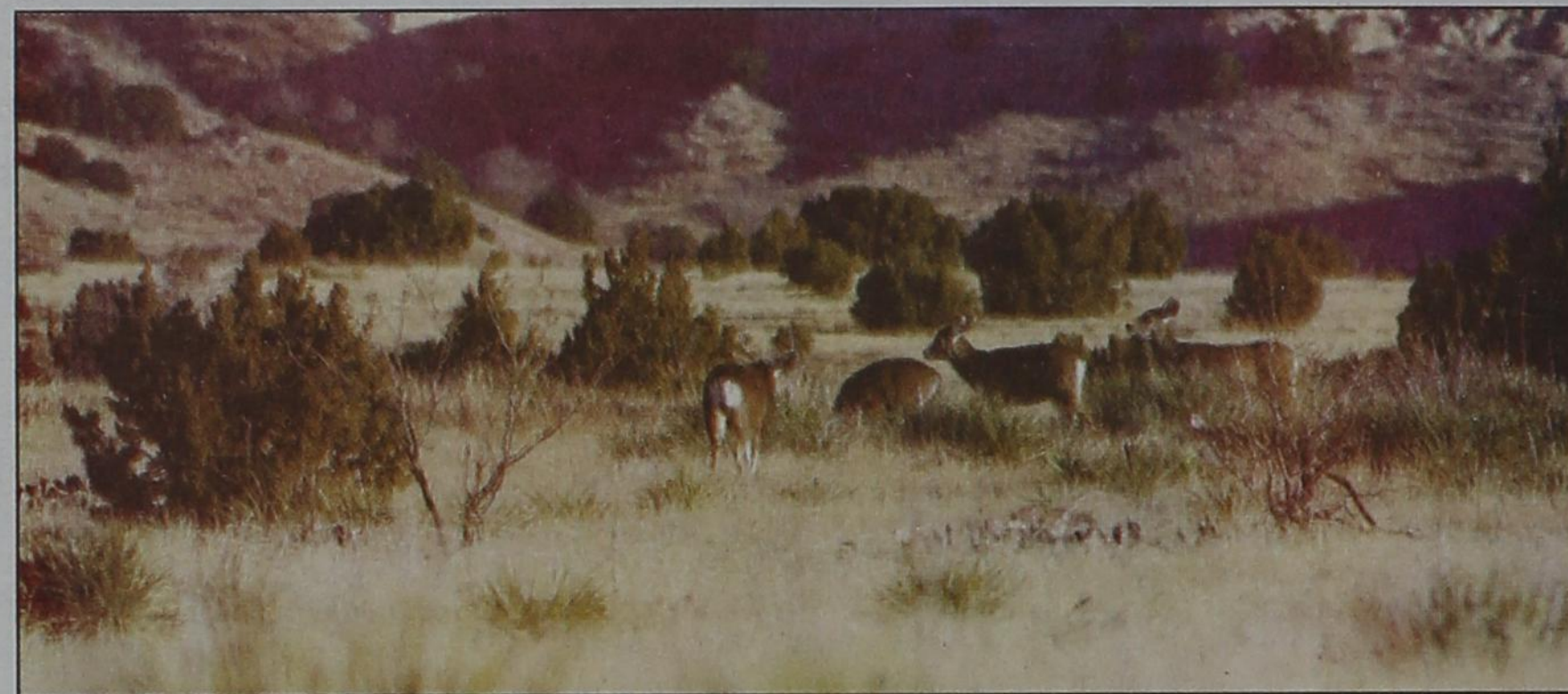
- 1/2 cup butter
 - 2/3 cup white sugar
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 cup buttermilk
 - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 cup cornmeal
 - 1 cup all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- PREP: 15 mins
COOK: 40 mins
READY IN: 55 mins

Directions

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease an 8 inch square pan.

Melt butter in large skillet. Remove from heat and stir in sugar. Quickly add eggs and beat until well blended. Combine buttermilk with baking soda and stir into mixture in pan. Stir in cornmeal, flour, and salt until well blended and few lumps remain. Pour batter into the prepared pan.

Bake in the preheated oven for 30 to 40 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

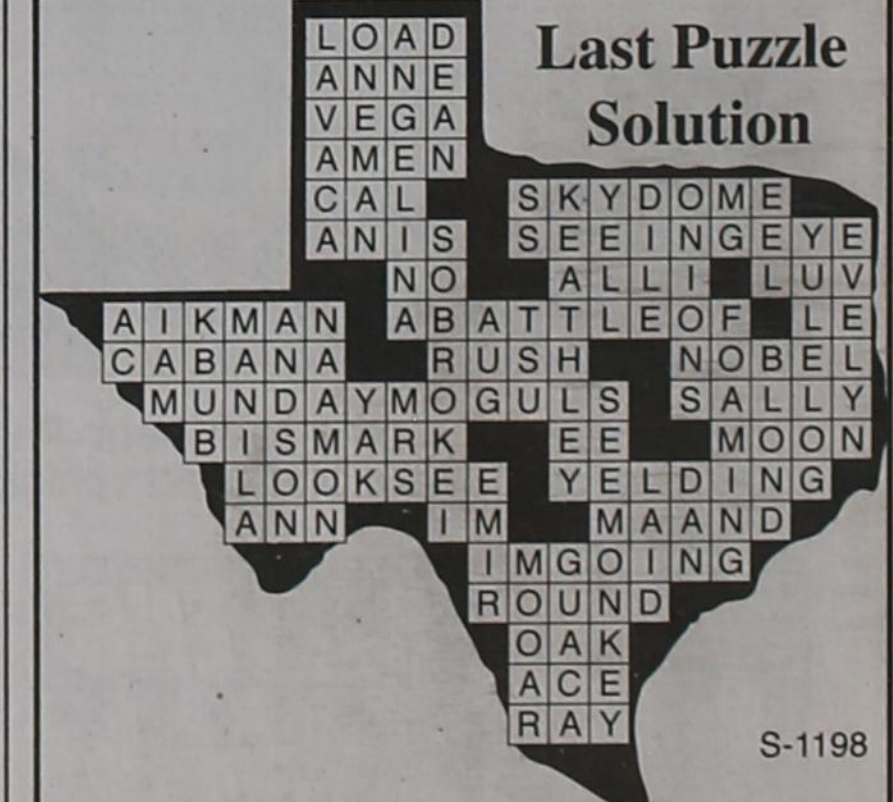

Therefore, when I speak of having a "blessed year" my prayer is that whatever your trials or triumphs, that you would lean

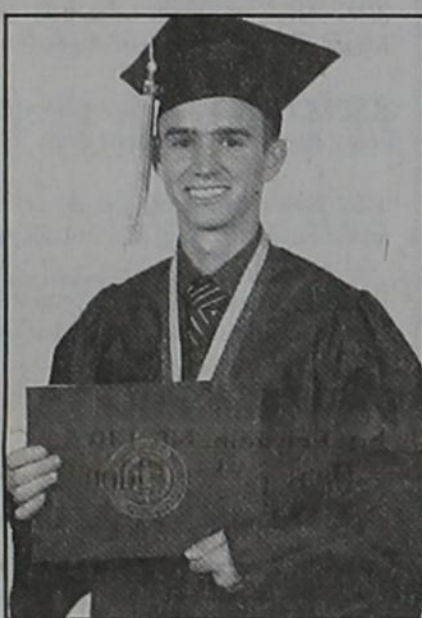
on the Lord more than ever and grow close to Him. Realize that He will allow trials and temptations to come your way, but He is able to deliver you from them, or lead you through them.

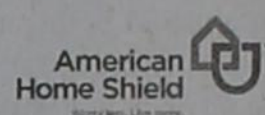
