Mosquito Control Needed

After spending several days in this folder a paste-up girl took me and all the other stories out and begin trying to make us fit on a page calleda "stuckup." Since the newspaper business was new to me, I came to the conclusion that the stories lucky enough to get glued to this particular paper were sure of a place in the next issue of the Star.

During the process of getting the stories sorted and placed on the page, I heard many expressions that didn't make much sense to me. Some of them were. "This one won't fit." "It is too long, shall we cut it off?" "Doesn't look like there is going to be room for this one." and "We are going to have some left over."

At this point my thoughts ran something like this, "A lot people have done a lot of work on me, so surely I will not be one of the ones there isn't room for."

The deciding factor came late in the day after it was decided that by leaving off three sentences that were not really important I would just exactly fit. Some of my fellow stories didn't have such good luck though and some even got pulled off the "stuck-up.

When the "stuck-up" was completed, there were several processes we had to go through yet. First, we went into a camera and came out on a film. Then the film went into another machine and was imprinted on a plate. With the help of chemicals, all the stories, ads and pictures came clearly into view on the plate.

Later several plates went onto the press and impressions were made on sheets of paper. These sheets of paper came

out of the press in sections, then the sections were put together to form papers.

After the papers were completely assembled, they were stacked neatly in piles and I was still curious about my future. Some of the stacks went through an addressing machine, some were wrapped singly and some were stacked beside the typewriter where I had my be-

This stack was later divided into smaller stacks and these smaller stacks were delivered to the local hospital, cafes and drug store.

As each reader unfolded his paper and began to read I hoped he would not overlook me. Even though I was small, I felt that I filled my place and wondered how other stories that didn't make the grade felt. Perhaps they can console themselves with the fact that there will be a Star next week.

I only hope that none of them become misplaced, dated or meet with some other disaster and never get printed.

Two other young people, wh. have left our community for college, but who will always be a part of the area, and who could also have felt bitterness







This year we have a \$3 duck stamp. And ducks are in very short supply. The kick-upprice of the duck stamp was intended to make more money available for providing more wetlands for

our waterfowl. Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife of the U.S. Department of Interior told a group of outdoor writers in Hot Springs some time ago of some of the

plans and problems. "Two years ago a task force of Service employees, representing a cross section of field and Washington personnel, was assigned the job of determining the most important needs facing fish and wildlife in the field of federal responsibility," he said. "Advice and recommendations were sought from all possible sources.

"Of the many national problems considered, the one involving preservation of our wetlands stuck out like a sore thumb. It was quite obvious that the steadily continuing loss of our potholes, marshes and lakes, so necessary for migratory waterfowl and other aquatic wildlife, was a problem of first magnitude requiring solution if duck hunting was to continue as a national sport."

He said many were critical of the use of the former \$2 fee for surveys and studies. Accordingly, the new \$3 fee will be used solely for land acquisition of new areas.

The bill also authorizes the opening of not to exceed 40 per cent of these refuges to public hunting. The \$3 duck stamp is mandatory immediately, as is the hunting provision. The earmarking, however, doesn't begin until July 1, 1960.

Texas will benefit in this land acquaition program. Already the state, with the aid of Federal Excise tax funds, has bought a marsh area in Jefferson County and is developing it. This property was opened to hunting on a limited basis by the Game & Fish Commission in 1958. Although there is a construction program now going on, it probably will have some hunting during the coming limited season.

Unfortunately, the breeding grounds of our migratory waterfowl for the most part are without the boundaries of the United States.

We have some ducks that remain in Texas throughout the year, but there are only a few. Some even breed in the northwes rn states, but again they are few by comparison. Most of our ducks reproduce in faroff Canada, their colonial nesting grounds. Those not killed in Texas migrate back there each year for their breeding, and return to Texas when the first cold blast of the north moves them out.

This year they have been hardhit by the drought. Just how much good can be achieved by more refuges in the states is a difficult guess. But since the experts are studying the program, we must go along with them and agree that good will come of it.

"The picture is not so good," Mr. Janzen said. "If it does not improve much more than we can now resee, we have no choice but to recommend severe restrictions on waterfowl hunting this fall.

"We still hope that Mr. Duck Hunter will have enough faith in the future of this sport to contribute his \$3 for a duck stamp, even though his hunting prospects this fall are pretty

Who some parts of the country have lost materially in their potholes, this situation is not quite so bad in Texas. There was a time when ducks had very little water when they came to Texas. They alighted in Panhandle grain fields and then

moved on to the coast. Then came our program of building dams in Texas. We now ave more than 100 lakes in Texas of a capacity of 100 acres or more. A number of them are extremely large ones. In addition there is hardly a small farm without a stock tank, and every large ranch has scores of them. When you fly over Texas and look downat the lakes, they dot the earth like

thousands of small diamonds.

Ducks and geese like these resting spots, and many of them remain. They'll always stay where there is food and water. They play up and down the Red River and the Sabine to the coast and all along our coast. In fact, the lower coast of Texas each year is host to more red heads and canvas back ducks

than all the rest of the United

States combined. So with a short duck season we have little choice but to go along and buy our \$3 duck stamps. Most of us will kill about as many, anyway, because







They can be plumber, baker, beautician or what have you, and they are still good human beings. World War II was not won by reading Macbeth. It was won by men and women and a great majority of those males and females never got past the high school grades; some not even to high school itself.





Whether you are a firm or passive reader of news items, you are, we are sure, aware of the fact that Farm Bureau is actively opposed to U.S. Secretary of Labor Mitchell's writing into the national registry the labor regulations he claims to have jurisdiction over. These include farm and retail dealer employees.

They will, unless something is done to prevent the registration standing as Mitchell intends, mean that you, the farmer, or retail dealer, will come under the minimum wage and hour law that covers industry. The exclusion of such coverage, obtained by Farm Bureau years ago, and constantly defended by Farm Bureau since, has been accepted as justifiably reasonable because of the peculiarity of seasonal farm operations.

Now then, if you are not in favor of Federal Regulations when you hire an employee and use him, it is high time you write your congressman, representative and Mitchell and let them know how you feel. You can be sure that Farm Bureau representatives in Washington are working and standing ready for hearings that will be held before the final

maximum yield capacities.

Of the 400,000 acres of irrigated farmland in Parmer County, probably 260,000 or slightly more is devoted to grain sorghum production this year. A good growing season, more fertilizer, better varieties, and more intense farming methods have combined to push the expected yield up considerably this year.

Irrigated yields run all the way from 3000 to 7000 pounds per acre, but the average has been coming up yearly and is strength that can be gained by approaching the 4000 mark. 

Moisture isn't exactly the topic of the day, but in a comtemplative mood recently we fell to thinking about the relative values of the terms "rain" and "showers".

When does a shower leave off and a rain begin?

In the reference material around our desk we don't find anything that would shed any light on this question, although we are sure there must be an authority for it someplace or another.

Doubtless the meteorologists have agreed among themselves when a shower becomes a rain. but we don't know what the dividing line is.

So far as we can tell, the popular notion has grown up among farmers of the Plains that a shower is what happens when the moisture comes quickly and usually amounts to less than an inch.

A rain is what we call it when we receive amounts that run over an inch, or when the precipitation is extended over a considerable length of time. The one-inch-barrier, so to speak, is understandable, but this factor doesn't seem to hold much logic. Just the same, it is definitely to be reckoned with.

On several occasions, we can recall spells of damp, drizzly weather that hung on for many hours, perhaps even several days. Often, these soggy sessions don't produce much moisture, and yet we've heard almost invariably the word "rain" connected with the .40 or so that may come during these times.

Try using the sandpaper method first. With a piece of O sandpaper, begin at center top of crown and gently sand in the same direction around the crown, side crown

and the brim. If this fails, use naphtha or other cleaning fluid. Dipa small brush, as nail brush, in the cleaning fluid, shake out excess liquid and brush hat until the soiled spots disappear. Remember to work outdoors

when using cleaning fluids. White or light colored felt hats may need special treatment. Saturate corn meal with naphtha or other cleaning fluid. Rub the mixture into the felt with a clean stiff brush. When fluid has evaporated, brush out the corn meal and air the hat before storing.

I have a new supply of the "Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables." If you are canning this year be sure and check with me. The time has been changed so that many of the products are easier to can. For instance for snap beans, the procedure is as follows: preparation-wash-; trim ends, snap or cut into 1 or 2 inch pieces, pack tightly to 1/2 inch of top of jar. Cover with boiling water, leave 1/2 inch space at top of jar, close and process at 10 lb. pressure; pint. jars 20 min. or 40 min. in pressure sauce pan. Quart jars, 25 min. at 10 lb. pressure.

Technique is important in pressing. In general, the specialist says, work on the wrong side of the fabric. Occasionally this is impossible and you may have to press such things as pocket welts on the right side. For this, use a press cloth. Always smooth material carefully under the iron and press on the straight grain of the fabric whenever possible.

In sewing cotton or linen, press when well dampened or use a steam iron with high heat. Press woolens with a damp cloth between iron and dry woolen, or use a steam iron. Use high heat for wool, but don't press too dry. To shrink out ease, pat with hand to hold steam in the wool fibers.

Press silk or rayon with steam iron or use a pressing cloth, dampening cloth as you work. Use medium heat and press with a light touch. Open seams with point of iron lightly before using press cloth. Be careful not to water-spot the

Press velveteen, corduroy or velvet with a turkish towel over the ironing board or stand an iron on end, cover it with a damp press cloth and draw the wrong side of fabric back and forth over the steaming cloth. Brush lightly while steaming to remove stubborn

To get a really professional Roberson, extension clothing specialist of Texas A&M College. Begin by pressing the creases out of your fabric before cutting, and carefully press after each step. The time and effort will be well worth while. The most meticulously handled dart or seam can look "homemade" if not properly pressed.
