Callahan County Try Scheduled

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene will drill No. 1 Jack Ball as a proposed 1,700 foot rotary Flppen Sand test well six miles south of Clyde in Callahan County Regular Field.

Drillsite is 350 feet from the south and 250 feet from the east lines of Section 20, BBB&C Survey.

The lease is composed of 166 acres.

Same firm will drill No. 1-B Bian Odum in the regular field seven miles south of Clyde.

Having a proposed depth of 1,300 feet with rotary to test the Moutray Sand, it spots 2,426 feet from the north and 1,655 feet from the west lines of Section 15, BBB&C Survey.

Marvin Lewis of Abilene filed application to drill a 1,400 foot rotary project four miles southeast of Eula in regular field.

No. 7 Bian Odum is 1,905 feet from the south line and 900 feet from the west line of Section 15, BBB&C Survey on a 93 acre lease.

It will test the Moutray.

Davis Brothers of Abilene completed two Callahan Regular Field wells five miles southeast of Eula.

No. 3 J. T. Edwards is located 1,997 feet from the north and 220 feet from the east lines of Section 13, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 17 barrels of 55.3 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 1,275-79 feet, with four sacks of sand and 82 barrels of water.

The 4½ inch casing is set at 1,513 feet and the hole is bottomed at 1,739.

Other well is No. 6 J. T. Edwards, 330 feet from the south and 1,600 feet from the east lines of the northeast quarter of Section 18.

Daily potential was 19 barrels of 39.3 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 1,300-04 feet. It was fractured with two sacks of sand and 61 barrels of water.

Operator set the 4½ inch casing at 1,375 feet, one foot off bottom.

July Sales In Savings Bonds Total \$7,024

Savings Bond sales through July 1968 in Callahan County totaled \$7,024, according to a report received from Howard E. Farmer, chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee. This represents 69 per cent of the county's goal of \$140,000 for 1968.

Sale of U. S. Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas for the first seven months were \$106,830.22 - an increase of 8.9 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967. For the month of July, sales totaled \$15,862.130 - an increase of 11 per cent over July 1967.

Sales of both Series E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares throughout the country totaled \$416 million. Total sales of \$2,996 million for the seven month period represents 54.4 per cent of the nation's goal.

Dr. Grey and his partner, Dr. G. L. Kengle operated a 20-bed hospital in Perryton from 1959 until the retirement of Dr. Kengle in 1967. Dr. Grey also had a General Practice, and served as Aviation Medical Examiner in Perryton.

Survivors include his wife, the former Margaret Faye Moss of Perryton; one son, Ronald Kent; three daughters, Vickie Lynn, Barbara Jo and Kimberly Sue; one brother, Don Grey of Independence, Virginia; and his mother, who resides in the East.

Dr. Grey was pronounced dead on arrival at the Coleman hospital. The body was taken to Stevens Funeral Home in Coleman and later flown to Virginia for funeral arrangements.

1969 Vehicle Inspection Stickers From Now Until April 1969

AUSTIN — The 1969 vehicle inspection period began in Texas Sunday, according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"More than six million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 3,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including

power steering) and wheels and rim (not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds. The minimum fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost or repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.

Speir said the new vehicle inspection sticker will be a two and one-half inch square replica of a DPS patrolman's badge with red background. Motorists are urged to have the 1969 inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that their vehicles are mechanically safe for fall and winter driving.

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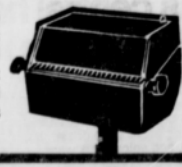
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DOVE BREAST A LA COLEMAN

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SOME POLITICAL HISTORY

EDITOR'S NOTE — The following bit of political history was written by W. E. Gilliland, and published in the Bald Star on Oct. 26, 1916. We suggest you paste this in your scrap book, as it is history not easily found in any books).

Woodrow Wilson was inaugurated President last week for a second term. Mr. Wilson is the first Democrat to succeed himself as President in eighty-four years. The last Democrat to succeed himself as President was Andrew Jackson in 1832. The Democrats held the office of President from 1800 to 1860, except two terms, when the Whigs held it; W. H. Harrison and John Tyler, both of whom died in office. John Tyler, Vice-President filled out Harrison's term and Millard Fillmore filled out Gen. Taylor's term.

The Democrats had four Presidents after Jackson prior to the Civil War - Van Buren, Folk, Pierce and Buchanan; neither of whom were re-nominated by the Democrats. The Democratic party was known as the Republican party from 1792 to 1828 when it took the name of the Democratic party. Jackson's first term.

Washington was a Federalist, but was supported by all parties, and received every electoral vote cast in both elections.

Gen. Zach Taylor, Whig, was the only President elected from a State west of the Mississippi River, he being from Louisiana. Grover Cleveland, Democrat, was elected twice but not consecutively.

Three Presidents were assassinated while in office. Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley.

The split in the Democratic party in 1860 elected Lincoln; while the split in the Republican party elected Wilson in 1912 and again in 1916.

The Republicans, since 1860, have held the presidency for 34 years and the Democrats 12 years. Tilden, Democrat, was elected in 1876, but was counted out by the famous 8 to 7 Commission.

The population has grown from two million, when Washington was elected, first term, to 102 million under Wilson.

Expansion of territory has extended from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean and to the Philippines. From thirteen weak states the United

States has grown to 48 states. From a weak nation without political friends, the United States has grown to be the most powerful nation on earth, and liked by few.

If we had as well organized army as Germany and as great a navy as England, we could dominate the world in war or peace, but fortunately our nation does not seek to conquer other peoples, but want a square deal for ourselves and all the nations of the world; and all the nations of the world "must" respect our rights on land and sea -- That is Americanism.

A news item from Washington says: "Thomas F. Marshall is the first Vice President to succeed himself since the present electoral method was adopted." This is evidently an error, as Daniel D. Tompkins and Jno. C. Calhoun both succeeded themselves as Vice President after adoption of the 12th Amendment to the Constitution Sept. 24, 1804. Jno. C. Calhoun served as Vice President four years under John Quincy Adams, 1824-29 and was reelected, serving until the end of Jackson's first term, 1829-32. If memory is not at fault Marshall is the first Vice President to succeed himself since Calhoun eighty-eight years ago.

Only five Vice Presidents have been re-elected since the Constitution was adopted, viz: John Adams, 1789-97; George Clinton, 1805-12; Daniel I. Tompkins, 1816-24; John C. Calhoun, 1825-33; and Thomas F. Marshall just inaugurated for his second term.

Austin — Until this year no one could vote in any election in Texas unless he had lived in the state for a full year. "Not so now," says Secretary of State Roy R. Berrera.

As the result of a statute passed by the Texas Legislature in 1967, following voter approval of a constitutional amendment in 1966, voting rules have been changed.

Berrera, as the state's chief election officer, advises that any citizen of the United States, 21 years of age or older, who has resided in Texas less than one year and for at least 60 days as of the day of the election, who satisfies the conditions of a qualified voter in the state from whence he came to Texas and would have been qualified to vote had he remained there, may vote in the Presidential Election here this fall.

However, Berrera points out, the voter can not vote on any office except that of president and vice president of the United States.

Furthermore, he must apply for a ballot at the office of the county clerk in the county of his residence - sometimes during a 15-day period beginning September 6. If the voter has an official document attesting to the fact that he was a registered voter in the state of his former residence, he should take that document with him when he applies for his ballot. This will eliminate the necessity of the clerk verifying eligibility at the place of his former residence.

It is important to note too, says Berrera, that once declared eligible to vote, the newcomer must cast his ballot in the county clerk's office - not on November 5, the general election time - but sometimes during the 5-day period preceding the general election.

STATE INCOME TAX DISCUSSED — Constitutional Revision Commission finished its first full review of recommendations for a new constitution after a battle royal on the question of state income taxation. Commission wound up recommending that the current provision allowing an income tax be retained, but there was considerable support for prohibiting income taxes.

Revenue and Taxation Committee, headed by George Wilson of Dallas, president of Lone Star Steel Company, had recommended retention of the clause authorizing such a tax. But Wilson quickly joined forces with Houston Rep. Bill Archer during the full commission meeting in an effort to forbid income taxation.

Wilson said a prohibition on the income tax "would be helpful to our chambers of commerce in recruiting industry." San Antonio Mayor Walter McAllister termed income taxes "socialistic, communistic and Marxistic."

By a vote of 7-5 (most of the 25 man commission were absent or failed to vote) the prohibition of the income tax was approved. But Denton Rep. Alonzo Jamison forced reconsideration of the issue when he moved that the sales tax be limited to its current level. "If we are going to bind the hands of the legislature in the matter of one tax," Wilson and Archer were strongly opposed to restricting the sales tax level, but Dallas Times Herald Editor Felix McKnight, who had voted with Wilson, changed his mind and said he thought decisions on tax policy should not be made by a constitutional drafting body. He moved for reconsideration.

By a 10-2 vote the income tax prohibition was opened for reconsideration, and the prohibition on income tax was then defeated by a vote of 9-6.

Commission will meet again in late September to look after actual drafting work. The proposed charter will be submitted to the legislature in January.

WALLACE CHAIRMAN IN AUSTIN — Bard Logan, State Chairman of the American Party and the George Wallace presidential campaign, has started a week-day schedule of working in Austin in American Party headquarters at 506 International Life Building.

"I have made my wife a 'political widow,'" Logan said. "I'm staying in Austin during the week and trying to get home to San Antonio weekends until the campaign gets too heavy, and she's running my business for me back home."

Logan denied reports that his party moved its headquarters from Austin to New Braunfels, explaining, "I presided at the official opening of the New Braunfels local headquarters, and some people thought we had moved there. But we have not. We are right here in Austin."

TEXAS STOCK EXCHANGE — A legislative committee and the University of Texas at Austin will begin a study this fall on the feasibility of a Southwest stock exchange centered in Texas.

Advocates of the idea say that Texas and Southwestern stock-market transactions have grown so much in recent years that such an exchange soon will be a necessity and may be desirable now.

Rep. Dave Finney of Fort Worth chairs the committee, which includes Reps. Don Cavness of Austin and Dick McKisick of Dallas. The UT research will be carried on by Dr. Ernest W. Walker, professor of finance, and a graduate student.

They will report to the 61st Legislature in January.

CORY NAMES GAS-STORAGE COMMITTEE — Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, chairman of the House State Affairs Committee appointed a special subcommittee to study Texas laws on the storage of gasoline.

Rep. Charles Jungmichel of La Grange will chair the committee, which will include Reps. Bud Atwood of Edinburg, Jack Blanton of Carrollton, Ace Pickens of Odessa and Ralford Price of Palestine.

HIGHWAY PROGRAM — Texas Highway Commission announces a \$60.6 million state Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program for 1969, including 1,177 projects in 224 counties.

Bulk of the work will serve to increase safety on the highways, and another large portion is for the reconstruction of highways and FM roads, including widening, improvements to shoulders and construction of improved surfacing.

In 1968, the program included 859 projects at a cost of \$40 million.

ANTHRAX REPORTED — The Texas Animal Health Commission has received a report of an outbreak of deadly anthrax disease in the area around the juncture of Val Verde, Kinney and Edwards Counties.

Nine premises have reported deaths from the disease among cattle, horses and deer.

Commission has also reported 696 screwworm cases confirmed in Texas in July. Mexico reported 1,982 cases in roughly the same period.

REHABILITATION STUDY — A report by the Texas Research League on vocational rehabilitation has prompted the State Board of Education to appoint a committee to look into the situation.

William H. Evans of Lubbock is chairman of the committee composed of Porter M. Bales Jr. of Tyler, Doyle Corley of New Boston, E. R. Griggs Jr. of Jacksonville, Charles E. Hart of Bryan and James W. Harvey of Archer City.

League was prompted to make its report because of the sudden expansion of the rehabilitation program in the last five years.

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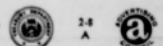
