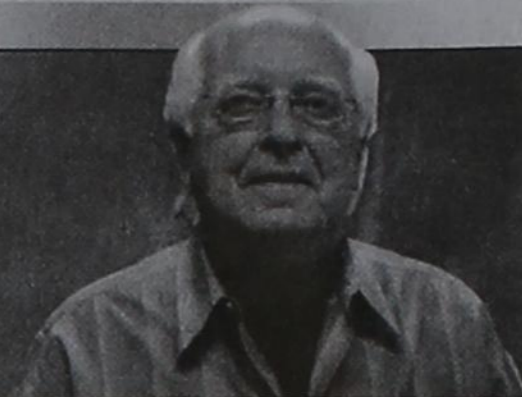

happy birthday medicare & medicaid

Medicare and us.

Local folks like me that are card carrying Medicare members received our copy of the 2016 Medicare & You book recently. On the front cover it says Medicare and Medicaid 50th Anniversary.

They send this slick looking book to all Medicare recipients every year and I'm pretty sure most do not read it. It is 162 pages of terms and definitions and medical stuff.

It also includes important enrollment information but I've been enrolled for years. It says coverage and costs change yearly. Already knew that. Here is how they define it:

"Medicare is health insurance for people 65 or older, people under 65 with certain disabilities, and people of any age with End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD) which is permanent kidney failure requiring dialysis or a kidney transplant."

A couple of months before my 65th birthday my Medicare card showed up. It is for Medicare Part A and Part B, hospital and medical insurance. It costs me about \$109.00 a month deducted from my monthly Social Security deposit.

Medicare Part C and Part D are the Medicare Advantage and Medicare prescription drug coverage plans. These are plans issued by private compa-

nies and may not be accepted in your network. Parmer Medical Center does not accept Medicare Advantage plans. See the Parmer Medical Center ad on page 9 for more info. I mention this since the open enrollment period is October 15 to December 7, 2015.

I have also signed up for supplemental insurance. This pays for most of what Medicare does not pay for. My mother had supplemental insurance through

AARP/United Healthcare. It cost her about \$4,400 a year but it saved our family much more than that during mom's final years. I have a supplemental policy with Dee Ann Hutson and Mutual of Omaha. Cost right now is about \$1,900 annually. Hope I never have to use it.

A Lifestar helicopter transfer from PMC to an Amarillo hospital can cost more than \$35,000. I am in process of signing up for the Lifestar AirMed-

Care membership program which covers all out-of-pocket expense for the helicopter ride. A one-year membership is \$65.00 for the entire household. A 5-year membership for the entire household is only \$300.00.

A brochure for this service is available in the lobby at Parmer Medical Center. I urge you to consider joining this plan. It covers air transfers in other areas of the country also. Stop by the

hospital and check it out. You never know when an emergency might happen at any age.

For more information about Medicare, Medicaid, or Lifestar contact the hospital business office. Don't switch to Medicare Advantage if you might be a patient of PMC. They can tell you why. We are blessed to have a hospital like Parmer Medical Center in our small town.

Happy birthday to Medicare and me.

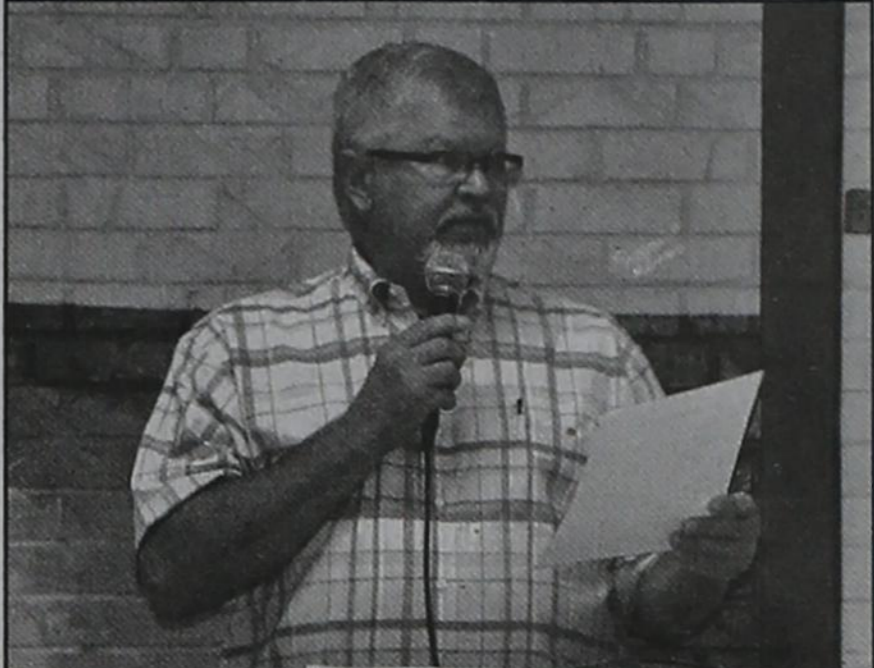

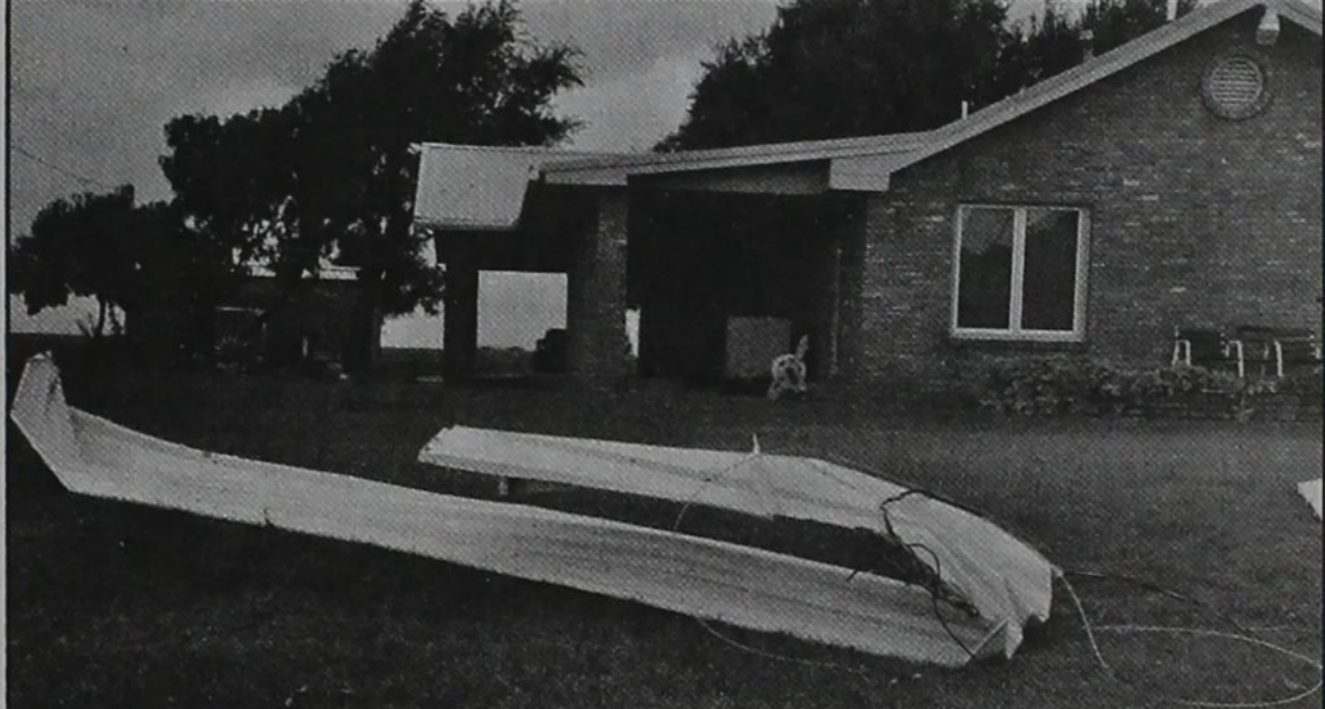
A lot is being said about the new chip cards, credit and debit cards with an embedded chip. I asked Greg Lewellen, the controller at Kendrick Oil about them since they have many Valero and Fast Stop locations. Here is a statement he sent: "Starting October 1 if a customer presents a chip card to make a purchase but the seller processes the transaction using the card's magnetic stripe instead of a chip reader, the seller—not the card issuer—will have to bear the cost if the transaction is fraudulent." The chip system is called Europay, Mastercard, Visa (EMV). Cardholders will eventually receive chip embedded cards. Gas pumps are not required to have EMV equipment until October 1, 2017.

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Friona Flashbacks

News from the week of October 15, 1953

*Probably the luckiest fellow in Parmer County is Larry Ben Berry, 19, of Bovina, who escaped from underneath the tractor that was overturned in a collision without any apparent injuries. Berry was going east a few miles west of Bovina on Highway 60 last Friday, pulling a broadcast binder, when he was struck from the rear by a 1949 Ford driven by Samuel Jasper Gleeson, 84, of Black. *W.H. Long may have started something this week. In the midst of his cotton harvest, he brought a bale to the North Plains Gin Monday

and told Wright Williams, gin owner, to "write the check for this bale to the Friona Methodist Church." *This Friday night will not only be the second conference game, but the football boys will crown the football queen. Carol Blackburn will be crowned as football queen at the half-time, and Gay Ann McFarland, Deniese Magness, Carmel Fields and Phyllis Fairchild will be her attendants. *America's First Sports Car Reaches Market...One of the most widely discussed automobile—the Chevrolet

Corvette—has been placed in distribution. A two-passenger open model (with removable top), the car is the American auto industry's first sports car and the first to carry a plastic body built by mass production methods. The Corvette measures only 33 inches high at the door. Wheelbase is 102 inches. Traditional Chevrolet features include a special 150-horsepower "Blue-Flame" engine and a Powerglide automatic transmission. Production followed special showings of an experimental model in many states.

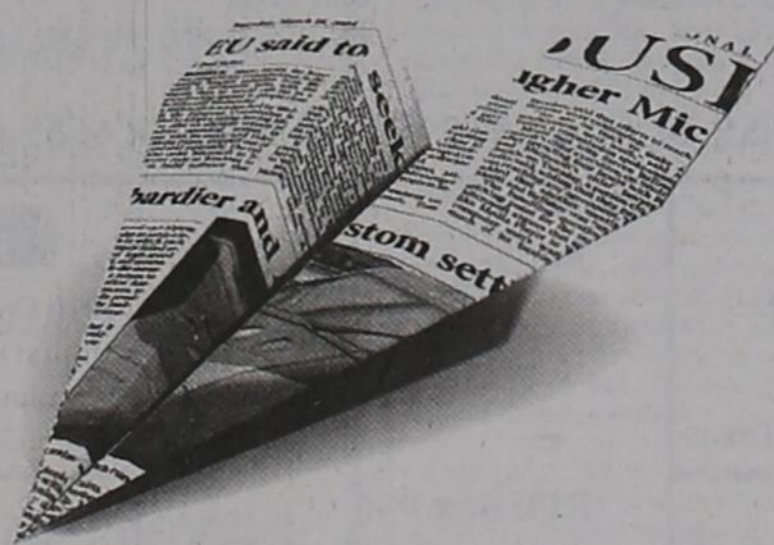

CHANGE IN LAW The Texas Legislature enacted Senate Bill 709, effective September 1, 2015, amending requirements for comments and contested case hearings. This application is subject to those changes in law.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING You may submit public comments, a request for a public meeting, or request a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to consider in the permit process.

The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application. A public meeting about the application will be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. After the final deadline for public comments following the Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If any comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on a mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may approve the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on those issues submitted during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. To request a hearing, a person must actually reside in a permanent residence within 440 yards of the proposed plant. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number; (2) applicant's name and Registration Number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility; and (7) a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period. If the request is made by a group or association, one or more members who have standing to request a hearing must be identified by name and physical address. The interests which the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material air quality concerns submitted during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

Chiefs lose close game at Dimmitt

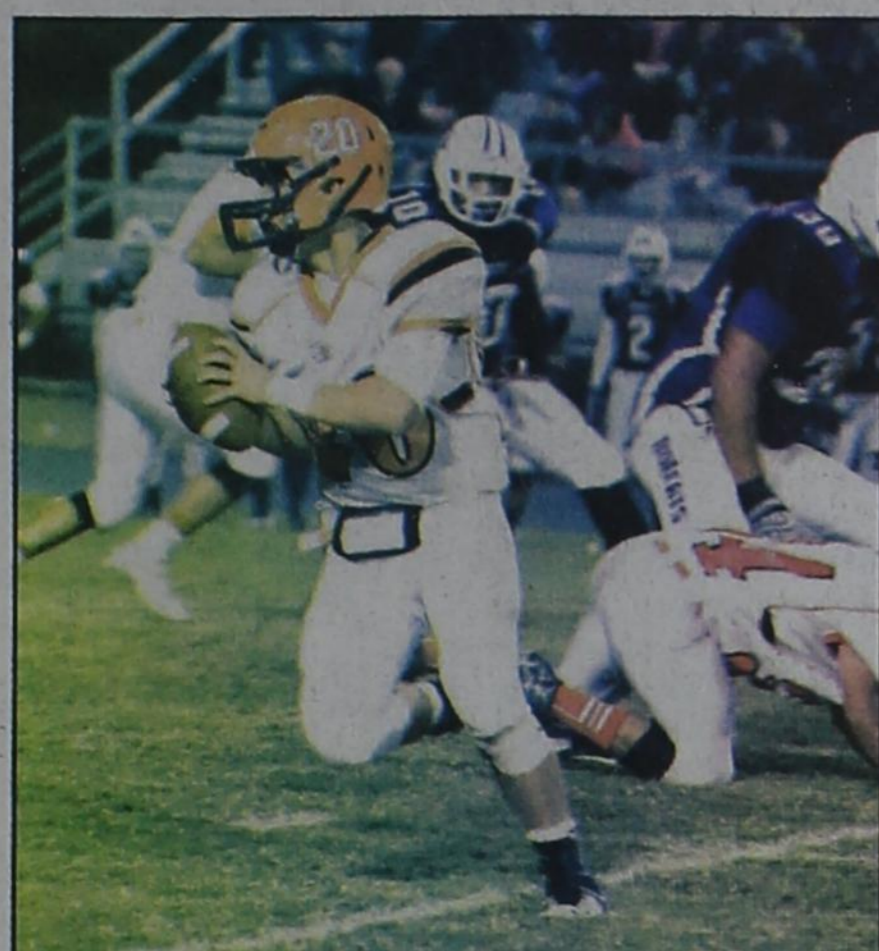
The Chieftains opened district at Dimmitt last Friday. There were two touchdowns by each team but only one good extra point as Dimmitt

DPS reminds Texans

Election Identification Certificates available at Driver License Offices

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans in advance of the upcoming November election that Election Identification Certificates (EIC) are available year-round at all Texas driver license offices for individuals in need of proper identification required to vote. DPS will be deploying mobile stations to various locations across Texas; and alternate approved locations will be issuing EICs in select counties. Additionally, select driver license offices will be open on Saturday, Oct. 24, to issue EICs only.

The 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election in Texas is November 3, with early voting from October 19-30.

Texans can obtain an EIC at:

Any of the more than 220 Texas driver license offices during regular business hours throughout the year

Select driver license offices on Saturday, Oct. 24, from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. (EIC transactions only)

EIC mobile station locations (EIC transactions only)

Alternate approved locations issuing only EICs in select counties

Most residents already have an acceptable form of photo identification needed for voting and will not need or qualify for an EIC. If an applicant already has any of the following documents, they are not eligible to receive an EIC:

Texas driver license - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

Texas personal identification card - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

U.S. passport book or card - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

Texas concealed handgun license - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

U.S. Military identification with photo - unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo

To apply for an EIC, applicants must visit one of the locations listed above and complete an application for a Texas Election Identification Certificate (DL-14C). (For

the Spanish language version of the EIC application, see <http://www.dps.texas.gov/internet/forms/forms/DL-14CS.pdf>).

To qualify for an EIC, an applicant must:

Bring documentation to verify U.S. citizenship and Identity

Be eligible to vote in Texas (Bring a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application through the Texas Department of Public Safety)

Be a Texas resident

Be 17 years and 10 months or older

Be at a state approved location.

The EIC receipt an individual receives will include their photo and can be used for voting until the permanent card is delivered by mail.

The EIC is free of charge to qualifying applicants and is valid for six years. There is no expiration date for an EIC for citizens 70 years of age or older. The EIC can only be used for the purpose of voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification.

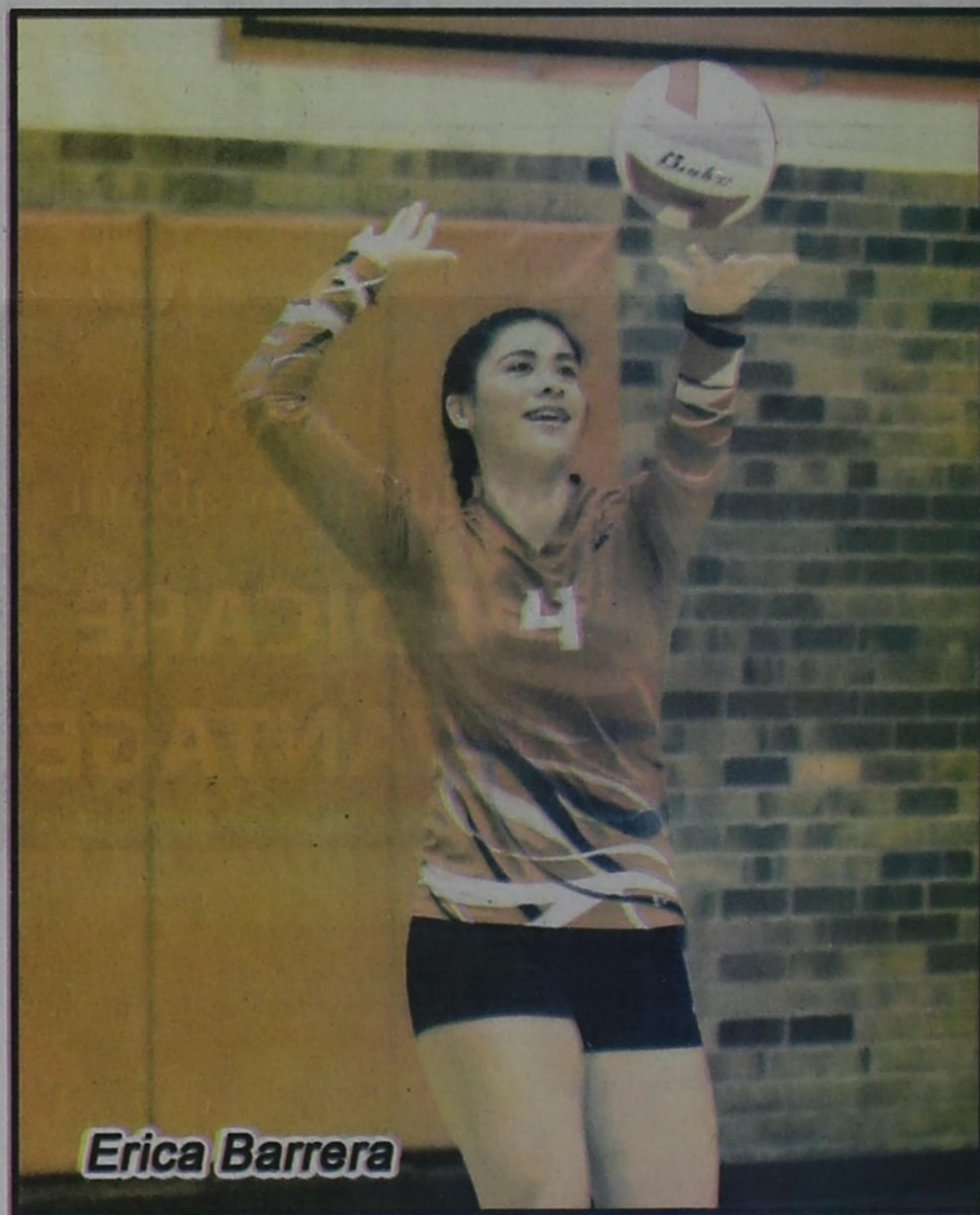
