Commissioners court update

Parmer County commissioners held a special meeting Friday January 22 and a regular meeting Monday January 25. Meetings are in the county courtroom in Farwell.

At Friday's meeting commissioners made an offer to purchase the building located at 301 Gardner in Bovina. The building is at the intersection of Hwy 60 and 3rd St. The county has rented the building for many years for the Justice of the Peace and DPS offices. The county extension office was recently moved to the location from Farwell.

The main business at Monday's meeting was to hear from Wade Lawson of Mammoet Wind Inc. of Rosharon, TX. The company builds wind turbines. A new application for tax abatement was submitted. County Judge Trey Ellis said five men from Denmark were also at the meeting.

They discussed restrictions, etc. for roads and vehicles to be used in constructing wind turbines. The area where the company plans to build the turbines is bounded by: Highway 214 on the east, FM2013 on the north, FM1731 on the west, and Highway 86 on the south. The turbines are said to produce 600mw. Construction is estimated to begin on July or August.

Reports were also given by county auditor Larry Johnston, county treasurer Altha Herington, and Sheriff Randy Gerles. The next regular meeting of the commissioners will be Monday February 8.

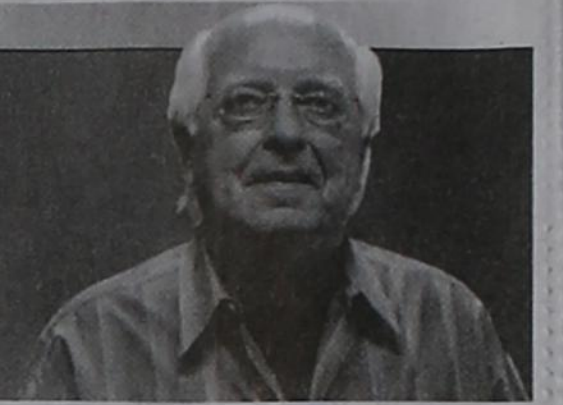

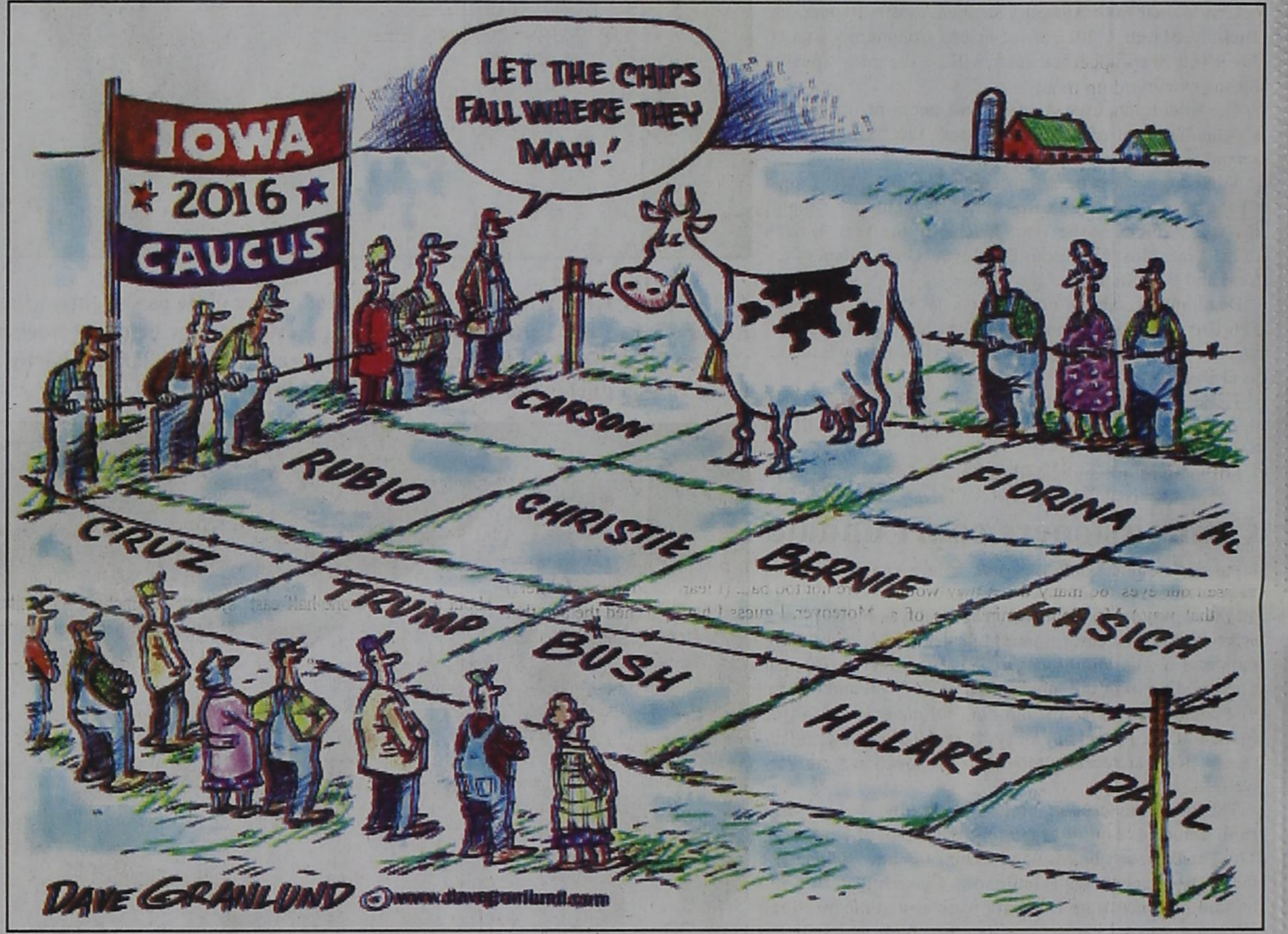
Iowa, iowa, and more iowa

News from the week of January 29, 1953

*The Friona diversified agriculture area has again scored a first—with a potato processing plant under construction here this week.

Herman Neff, potato grower and businessman, is constructing the shed on the Santa Fe tracks east of the Phillips 66 wholesale in Friona. Henry White and Bill Hannold are holders of the construction contract.

*Friona fireman were called up on Sunday afternoon when two express cars of the Grand Canyon Pullman unit of the Santa Fe Railway caught fire as the train sped eastward through Friona. The fire was fought for several hours as the train stopped on the main track about a mile and one-half east of Friona.

No local mail was lost in the train fire, but much baggage and second-class through mail was a total loss. Some of the baggage belonged to returning Korean war veterans aboard the train.

*Poles are being distributed this week along the route of the Rural Telephone Cooperative lines to be built in Parmer County, with the construction now going full speed ahead to provide rural phone service to the area around June 1st, an official of the cooperative said this week.

Lines have been placed in some other sectors already, with 135 phones already installed, 100 miles of wire up, some 350 poles in the air, and 750 miles of line staked. The entire system will include 953 miles of line in Parmer, Deaf Smith,

Castro and Bailey Counties.

*With street markers and house numbers throughout Friona as an immediate objective, members of the Progressive Study Club plan a campaign for solicitation of funds this week.

Estimated cost for markers at each of the 125 intersections is \$400.00. There are 465 water meters, connections in the city, it is observed that should every one of these houses contribute \$1.00 to the program, a sufficient amount would be raised. Those donating will receive house number free of charge.

I know, you think I have lost it but hear me out.



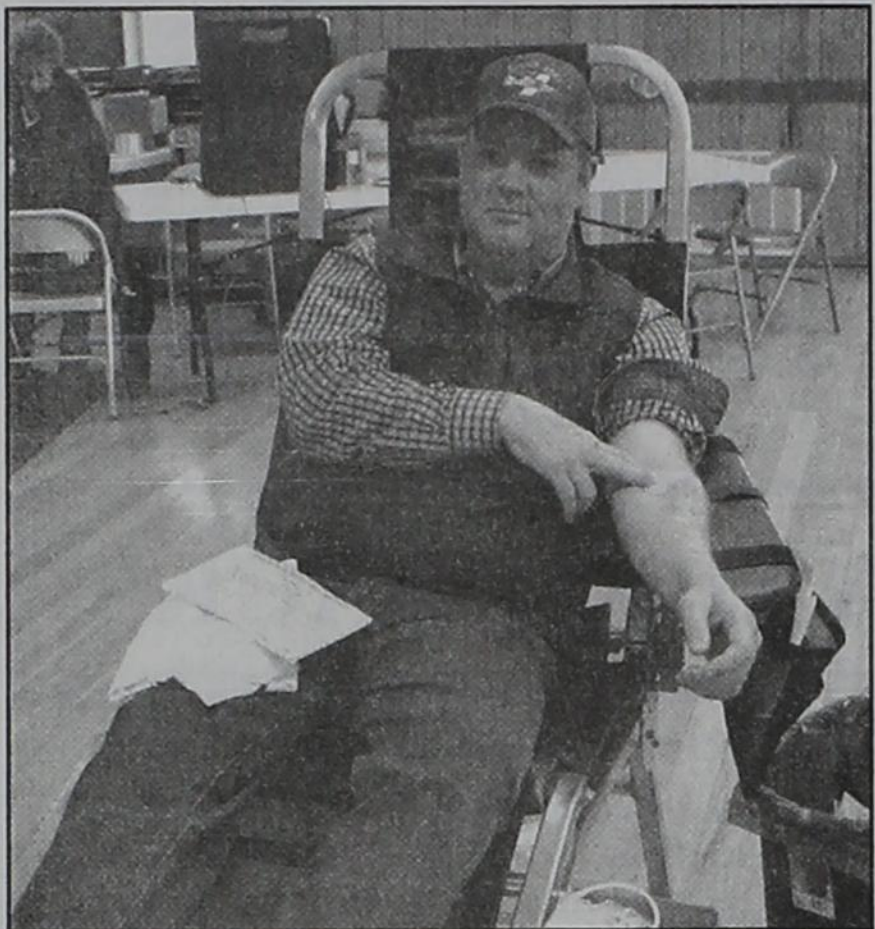

A Veterans Story: Sylvester Fangman

(As part of the Friona High School Veterans Project a number of the veterans have offered their stories of their time in the service.)

Sylvester Alexander Fangman was born in Pilot Point, Texas to Henry and Minnie Fangman on July 19, 1922, the fourth child of eight children. His family moved to Friona, Texas where his father was a farmer. Sylvester graduated from Friona High School in May of 1940. He enlisted in the United States Army Air Corps on the 29th of May 1942. He received his basic training in Pocatello, Idaho and, on February 23, 1944, he was shipped overseas.

A Staff Sergeant with the USAC's 464th Bomb Group, Sylvester was a tail gunner on a B52 Stratofortress. On his second to last mission over Atzgersdorf, Austria, he was shot down on May 29, 1944 along with 10 other crew men (one was mortally wounded). Sylvester sustained a broken arm and faced enemy fire as he parachuted from the plane. He received gunshot wounds on the left side of his body-in his arm, abdomen and leg-during his descent.

Sylvester was fortunate: an Austrian farming family witnessed his landing and rescued him. The family, very aware of the closeness of the German army, hid him in their barn, provided him food, and did what they could to tend to his wounds. This put them in grave danger if they were discovered.

With gangrene setting in, the family realized that, without medical assistance, Sylvester would die. They learned from the Austrian Resistance that the Allies were to be near their home in a few days. As the Allies would only be at that location a short period of time, they decided to transport Sylvester to them. Three of the farmer's children hid him under straw in their wagon, traveled through enemy lines, and brought him to safety. As he said goodbye to his saviors, Sylvester realized he had little to give them to show his undying gratitude. Sylvester gave the boys the boots he was wearing and the meager amount of money he had in his pocket; to the girl, he gave his wrist watch.

Sylvester was transported by the Allies over the mountains into Italy. He spent three months in an Italian hospital and one month in a Miami hospital, before he returned to his family.

Sylvester received a Bronze Star and the Purple Heart for his heroic service. He was uncomfortable talking about his time in the military. When asked about it, his usual answer was "I was proud to serve my Country". Sylvester was truly part of the Greatest Generation.

A Bungalow big enough for two...



We were extremely fortunate last week to be the recipient of an early Friona photograph sent to Dr. Pam Ray, our Friona High School Principal, by a Mr. John Estes who found the old photograph at an antique sale and chose to see it safely home. It is a photograph dated August 5, 1909 and shows some of the early prospective settlers coming to Friona and Parmer County to purchase some of the 100,000 acres of land which had once been part of the 300,000 acre XIT Ranch. This photograph is from a slightly different position than some we have seen earlier. Land, purchased for as little as \$1.50 per acre, was then sold for as much as \$22.50 per acre.

There in the background is the early 1900's bungalow style home/land office built by George G. Wright in about 1906. Mr. Wright was the head of sales for the Syndicate's Capitol Freehold Land and Investment Company and later the George G. Wright Land Company. Early Friona had two grocery stores, a boarding house, a bank [Friona State Bank est. 1908], a Post Office est. 1907, a pharmacy, a 2-room school-

house, a livery stable, a newspaper office [Friona Sentinel est. 1907], a 21-room Friona Hotel and Flanders Photography Gallery (the reason some of these quality photographs exist). Original Town included 368.2 acres.

Bungalows got their start in India in the 19th Century as small tropical structures. From 1907 to 1926 the Bungalow became one of the most popular architectural designs, along with the Craftsman designed by the Greene Brothers of California. Having never seen the inside of this small landmark structure, I have always been curious about it and the floor plan. Until 1906 the Bungalow was considered a summer home, small cottages by the sea or by lakes used as retreats. These well-built, well-designed structures became very popular. Most bungalows featured a low-pitched gabled or hipped roof, 1 to 1 1/2 stories and sometimes 2, large porches supported by strong columns, broad eaves and exposed rafters, open floor plans with a front entry leading directly into the living room, lots of windows and doors to allow for good ven-

tilation, large fireplaces with built-ins, dormers and were trimmed in rock, local woods and/or metals.

This bungalow seems to be about 30 to 40 feet wide with a large front porch and red brick trim on each corner and on the porch columns. It has two chimneys so the living room/office probably has a fireplace. It may have had a dining room and kitchen and maybe a couple of bedrooms. Some of the later 1920's models included a hall and an indoor bathroom. It features a screened-in back porch to take advantage of the breeze/wind. Described as, 'simple, but very livable', this is still an attractive structure and as you can see in the photograph, it had an orchard and a rock gate on the east, and from an earlier photograph, a fountain on the west side.

Fleets of 18 to 20 Pierce Arrow automobiles transported the prospective settlers from the excursion trains which arrived twice a month carrying from 250 to 500 passengers on every 1st and 3rd Wednesday to tour the lands for sale. This photograph is a glimpse of yesteryear for sure. Thanks, Dr. Ray, for sharing...



DPS Reminds Texans: Election Identification Certificates available at Driver License Offices

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans in advance of the upcoming Primary Election that Election Identification Certificates (EIC) are available year-round at all Texas driver license offices for individuals in need of proper identification required to vote. DPS will be deploying mobile stations to various locations across Texas; and alternate approved locations will be issuing EICs in select counties. Additionally, select driver license offices will be open on Saturday, Feb. 20 and Feb. 27, to issue EICs only.

The 2016 Primary Election is March 1, with early voting from Feb. 16-26. The last day to register to vote is Feb. 1.

Texans can obtain an EIC at: Any of the more than 220 Texas driver license offices during regular business hours throughout the year

Select driver license offices on Saturday, Feb. 20 and Feb. 27, from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. (EIC transactions only)

EIC mobile station locations (EIC transactions only)

Alternate approved locations issuing only EICs in select counties

Most residents already have an acceptable form of photo identification needed for voting and will not need or qualify for

an EIC. If an applicant already has any of the following documents, they are not eligible to receive an EIC:

Texas driver license – unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

Texas personal identification card – unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

U.S. passport book or card – unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

Texas concealed handgun license – unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

U.S. Military identification with photo – unexpired or expired no longer than 60 days at the time of voting

U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo

To apply for an EIC, applicants must visit one of the locations listed above and complete an application for a Texas Election Identification Certificate (DL-14C). (For the Spanish language version of the EIC application, see <http://www.dps.texas.gov/internet/forms/forms/DL-14CS.pdf>).

To qualify for an EIC, an applicant must: Bring documentation to ver-

ify U.S. citizenship and Identity

Be eligible to vote in Texas (Bring a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application through the Texas Department of Public Safety)

Be a Texas resident

Be 17 years and 10 months or older

To avoid delays or complications, DPS urges potential applicants to make sure they have the necessary documentation before arriving at the office, mobile station or alternate approved location.

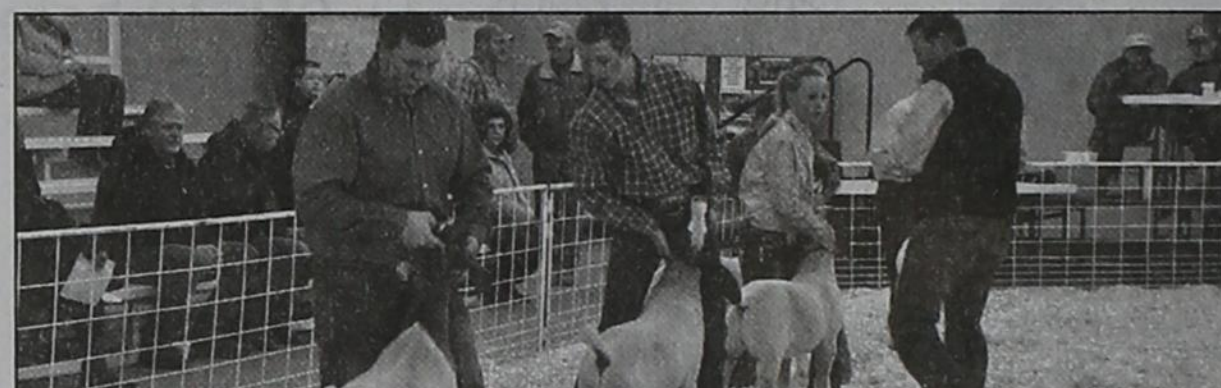
The EIC receipt an individual receives will include their photo and can be used for voting until the permanent card is delivered by mail.

The EIC is free of charge to qualifying applicants and is valid for six years. There is no expiration date for an EIC for citizens 70 years of age or older.

The EIC can only be used for the purpose of voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification.

- TDA Laws and Regulations Update, Cheryl Goswick, Texas Department of Agriculture inspector, Amarillo.

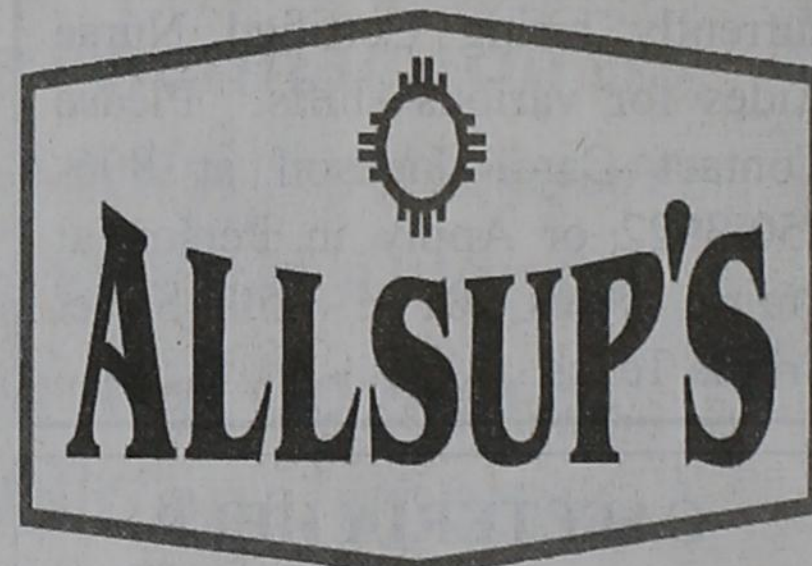
