Business owners are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to showcase their businesses. The directory will also include churches, civic organizations, and emergency numbers.

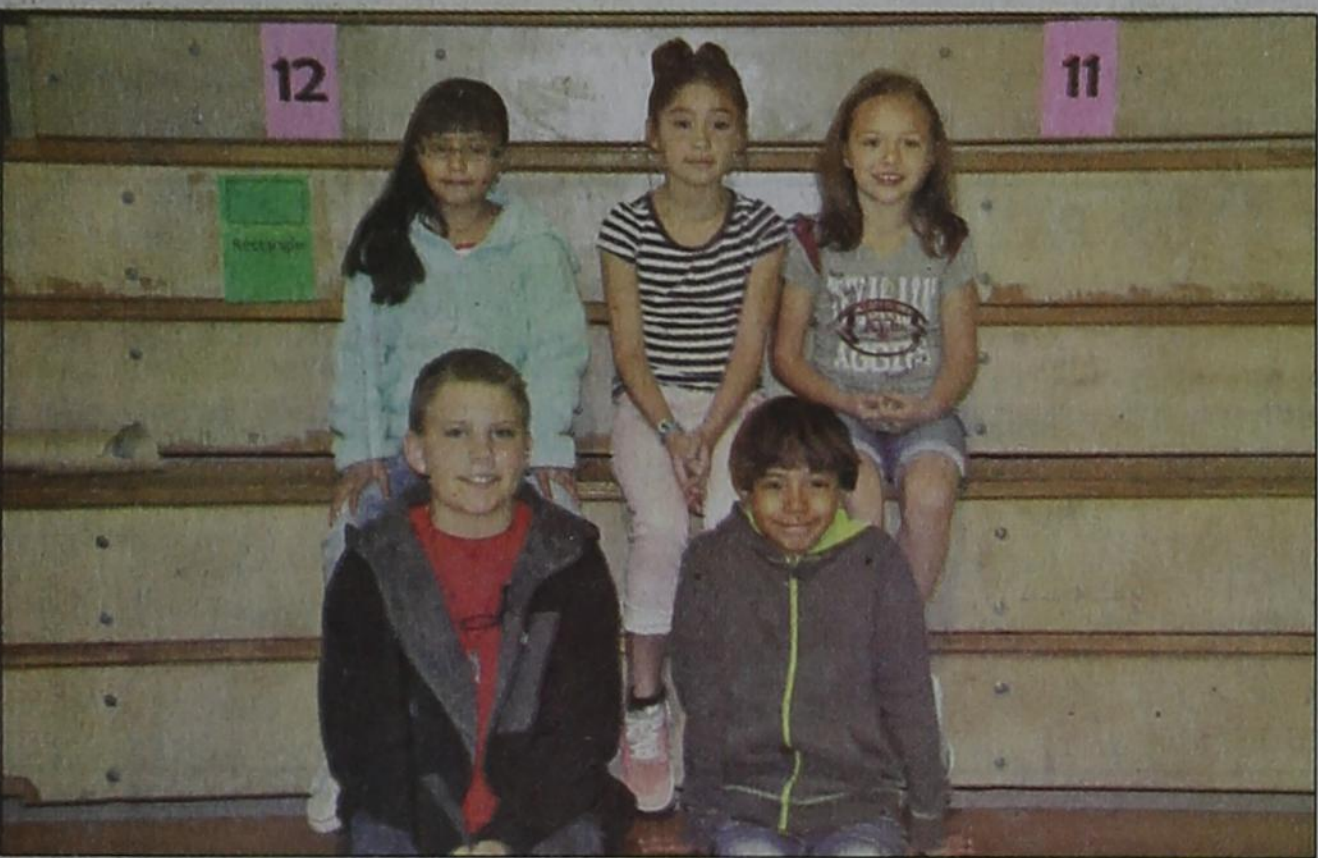

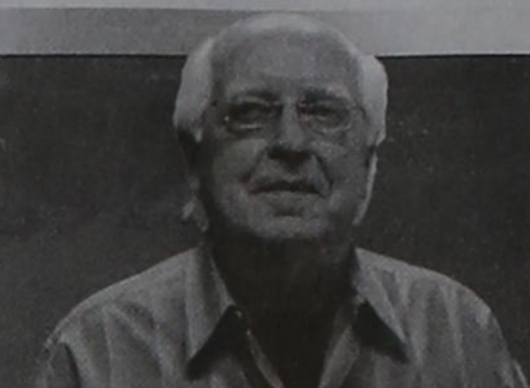

As the cruise business grew and ships became megaliners carrying several thousand clients, the cruise lines looked for destinations besides the Nassau, San Juan, St. Thomas circuit. At one time all 7-day cruises left from the Port of Miami.

As the cruise business grew other cruise ports became necessary such as Ft. Lauderdale, New Orleans,

New York, and Galveston. Soon the west coast began selling cruise departures. Throughout all of the growth, cruise line executives coveted Cuba as a destination. I know because I was on several cruise line "advisory boards."

My travel agency sold a lot of cruise business. Cuba is coveted because it is only 90 miles from Florida. It would allow ships to reach further destinations after a closer stop. Or substitute Cuba for a farther away stop.

Make no mistake, even today cruise lines, resort hotel chains, tour operators, and airlines still covet the potential tourist traffic that Cuba offers. To all of them money and rules, not dictators.

Carnival Cruise Lines will

begin cruises to Cuba on May 1, 2016. They have formed a cruise line called Fathom. The ship is the 704 passenger Adonia, a reconditioned ship purchased from another cruise line. It is an adult only ship. Prices for the 7-day "cultural experience" range from about \$3,000 to \$8,000. The ports-of-call are Havana, Cienfuegos, and Santiago de Cuba.

My travel agent son Casey says there are many restrictions for Cuba cruise passengers, such as what they can buy and keeping a "cultural" journal of the trip.

Cuba is a beautiful island. After the Castro boys croak Cuba will live on and grow and prosper.

It's about time.

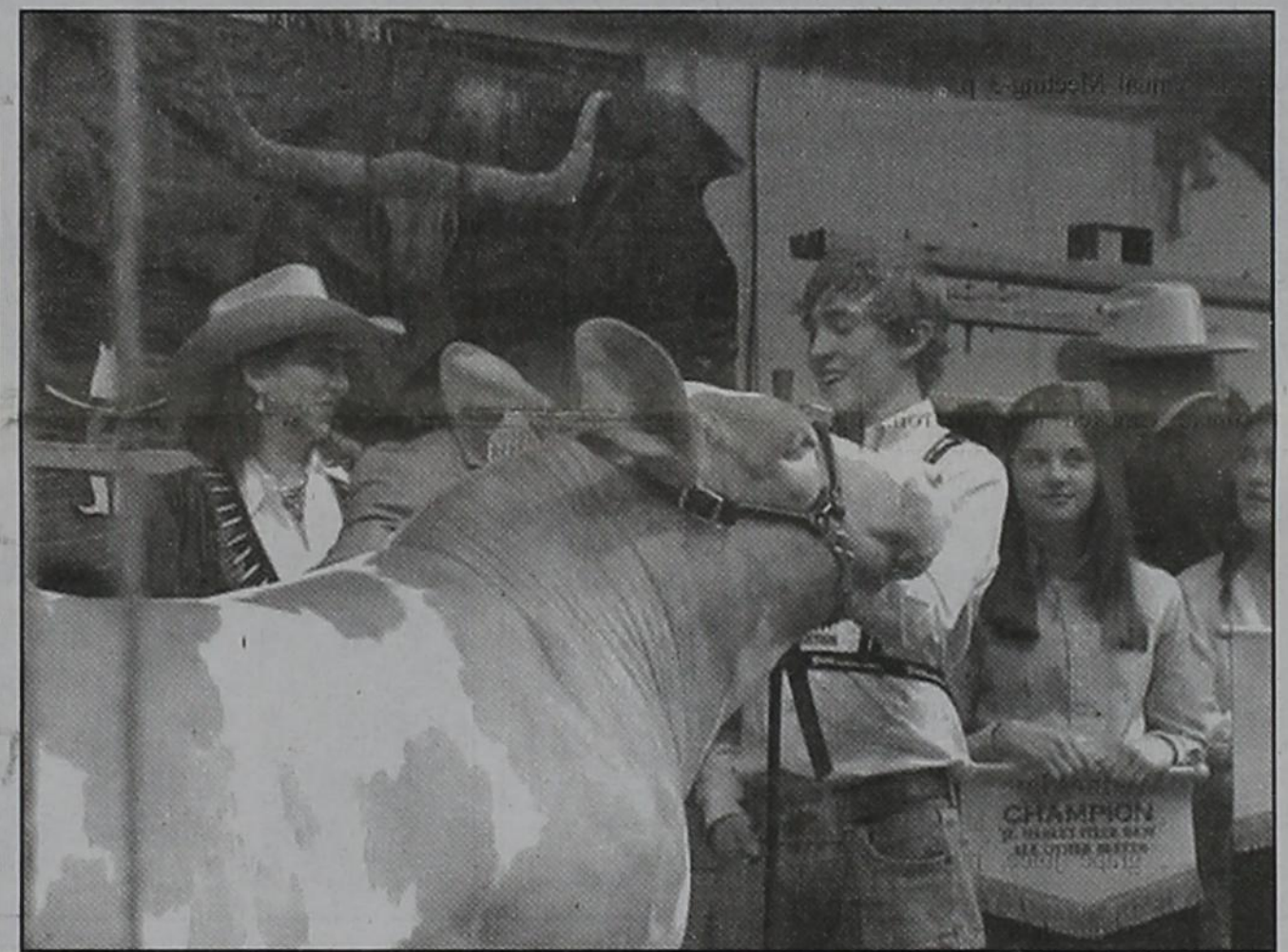
The dress never seemed to stay starched throughout the church service and wrinkles would make their appearance before leaving the building.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

News from March 20, 1969

*The best and wettest snowfall of the year blanketed the Friona area last weekend, and brought good general moisture to farmland.

*Seven Friona High School girls recently qualified for State Future Homemakers of America degrees, which is the highest honor a girl can receive. Qualifiers are Jane Rushing, Jennisa Fallwell, Pat Roberts, Darla Perkins, Brenda Blackburn, Karla Patterson and Kay Riethmayer.

*Fireman of the Week... Ruben Taylor.

*Danny Carthel and James Schlenker were presented the Lone Star Farmer degree certificates which were technically won last summer, but

had not been officially presented.

*Brigadier General Ross Ayers of Friona had his appointment as Adjutant General of Texas confirmed by the Texas Senate last week, and took his oath of office on Tuesday.

General Ayers served with the 36th Infantry Division during World War II. For his outstanding service to the United States, he received the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, the French Cross of War and the World War II Victory Medal.

The new Adjutant General is a 1934 graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock and received his MA from the University of

Texas in 1946. He was graduated from Army Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

General Ayers began his military career in 1932 when he enlisted in the 131st Field Artillery Battalion, 36th Infantry Division. In March 1939, he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant (Artillery) in the Texas National Guard.

In November, 1940, General Ayers entered active Federal service with his field Battalion and was promoted to 1st Lieutenant in 1941, to Captain in 1942, and to Major in 1944.

General Ayers was assigned as Battalion Commander of the 232nd Field Artillery Battalion in the Texas National Guard and promoted to Lieutenant Colonel in 1947. He became an assistant executive officer in 1960 and was promoted to Colonel in 1961.

He was assigned Commanding Officer of the 36th Division Artillery in 1963 and was assigned as Commanding General of the 36th Separate Infantry Brigade in November, 1965 when it was organized.

What Makes Jesus Different?

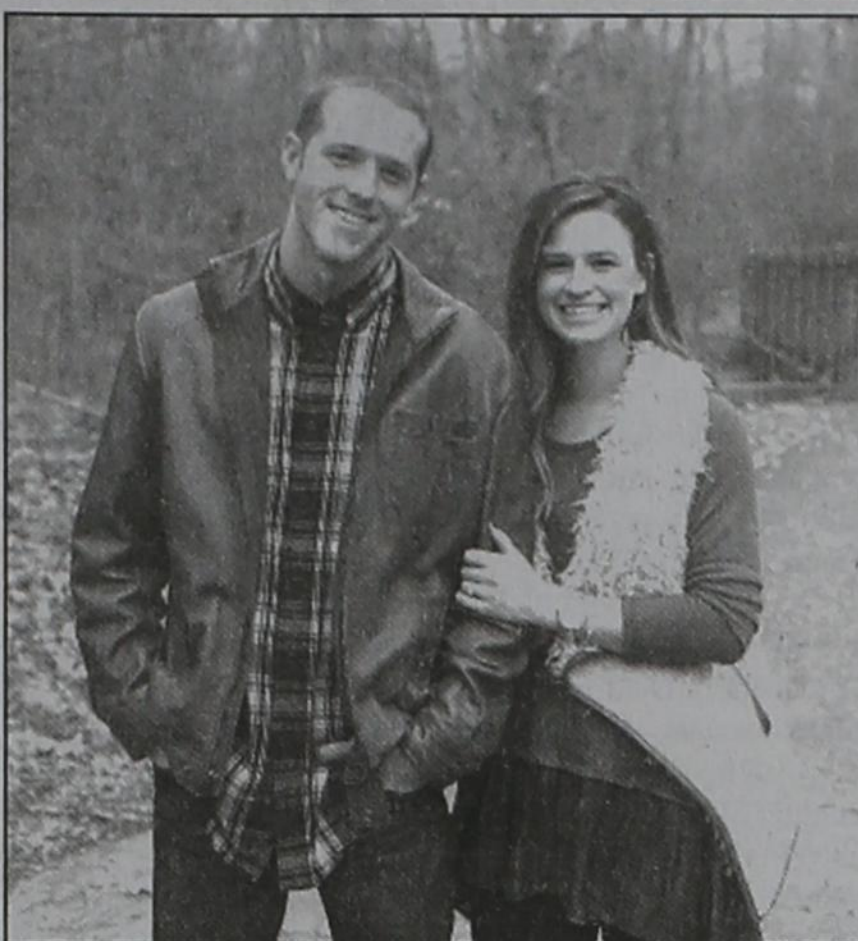

Texans reminded to stay vigilant

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans to remain vigilant with respect to potential crime and terrorist activity in their communities, and to report suspicious behaviors to the department's iWATCH website at www.iwatchtx.org. The iWATCH program was created as a partnership between communities and law enforcement, and utilizes citizen-sourced tips related to criminal activity.

"In the wake of today's cowardly attacks in Brussels, our thoughts and prayers are with the victims and everyone in Belgium," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "We are also reminding Texans of the crucial role they play in helping law enforcement protect the public from groups and lone-wolf actors intent on harming others. Fighting crime in today's threat environment can be greatly enhanced through the combined efforts of the public and law enforcement, and we urge individuals to report any illegal or suspicious activity they witness to iWATCH or their local authorities."

In addition to the acts of terrorism in Brussels, Belgium, and other attacks around the world, senseless attacks have also occurred closer to home in recent years, including tragic shootings at Fort Hood, and a 2015 shooting incident in Garland, Texas. Concerned citizens can visit the iWATCH website to fill out a report, which includes contact information and specifics about a particular incident. A report usually takes fewer than five minutes to complete, and once submitted, each report is reviewed by law enforcement analysts. The website also lists a phone number for possible anonymous reports.

Here are some examples of behaviors and activities to report:

- * Strangers asking questions about building security features and procedures.
- * Briefcase, suitcase, backpack or package is left behind.
- * Cars or trucks are left in no-parking zones at important buildings.
- * Chemical smells or fumes that are unusual for the location.
- * People requesting sensitive information, such as blueprints, security plans or VIP travel schedules, without a need to know.
- * Purchasing supplies that could be used to make bombs or weapons, or purchasing uniforms without having the proper credentials.
- * Taking photographs or videos of security features, such as cameras or checkpoints.

DPS urges residents who see something unusual to simply speak up. Preparations for terrorist attacks may often be seen, but rarely reported. When in doubt, report the suspicious activity through iWATCH. For more information on the iWATCH program or to submit a report, visit www.iwatchtx.org. To make an anonymous report, individuals can contact DPS at 1-866-786-5972. (iWATCH is not designed to report emergencies. If a situation requires an emergency response, call 911.)
