New beginning for Farmers Co-op Gin

The stockholders of the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin held their 54th annual meeting on Monday, August 29 at the Friona Junior High Cafeteria.

After a meal catered by Danny's Hens and Fins of Lubbock the board got down to business. President Mitchell Wiseman

addressed the assembled group and stated, "We are looking at a new beginning and getting back on the positive side."

Secretary-Treasurer John Jarecki read the minutes from the 2015 Annual Meeting, which was approved by the stockholders.

Jimmy F. Rogers, of the CPA firm of Rogers, Cross, Hanby & Co. LLC, reported to the board that even though the gin had not ginned a bale of cotton in over a year the gin was in good shape due to planning ahead. He stated that they are good and stable financially.

Rogers announced that previous booked credits would be cancelled. Letters will be sent to members at year-end.

Wiseman introduced the new secretary, Deon Hunt, who will be taking the place of Erma Brown who was the secretary for 29 years. He announced that the vacated board member seat of Kevin Welch had been filled by Russell Harkins.

New gin manager Duncan Welch thanked everyone for the opportunity to run the gin. He said that, minor repairs had been done to the gin due after two years of no use and he is looking forward to the upcoming cotton crop. Approximately 3,000 acres of irrigated and 3,500 acres of dryland are expected to be ginned right here in Friona.

Nominating Committee member Riley Rector took the podium to report that the committee would be nominating Mitchell Wiseman, John Jarecki and Davy Carthel to be elected to the board. After a brief discussion Wiseman, Jarecki and Carthel were unanimously voted onto the board. A new nominating committee was named. Those members are Garrett Clark, Kevin Schilling and Daniel Wiseman.

The evening ended with door prizes drawings and cotton candy.

DPS enhances patrols for Labor Day enforcement

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is asking Texas drivers to use extra caution when driving during the Labor Day holiday weekend. From Sept. 2-5, DPS Troopers will join law enforcement from across the state in looking for drivers who disregard traffic laws, including impaired drivers, speeders and safety belt violators.

"Texans are killed on our roadways every day because of reckless drivers who get behind the wheel after drinking, and DPS works around-the-clock to help prevent these tragedies," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "During the Labor Day weekend, Troopers will be on the lookout for impaired and dangerous drivers, and we are urging drivers to do their part by strictly

obeying traffic laws and finding alternative transportation if they plan to drink."

During the 2015 Labor Day holiday enforcement period, DPS Troopers made 488 DWI arrests, and issued 8,515 speeding citations, 1,091 seat belt/child safety seat citations and 1,062 no insurance citations. In addition, Troopers made 278 fugitive arrests and 224 felony arrests.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Labor Day holiday:

Don't drink and drive – designate a driver or take a cab.

Eliminate distractions, including the usage of mobile devices.

Buckle up everyone in the vehicle – it's the law.

Slow down – especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.

Slow down or move over for police, fire and EMS vehicles as well as tow trucks and TxDOT vehicles stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated – it's the law. (When you see a fellow motorist on the side of the road, slow down or move over a lane for them too, if it is safe to do so.)

Don't drive fatigued.

Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.

Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before your trip begins.

 O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?"*

There have been singers that can't even sing the right words because they are too busy trying to hit that high note. The National Anthem does not end with a team name. It ends with "The Home of the Brave" and it doesn't take that much time to sing or listen.

So stand up, be counted and, if you feel like it, do the simple act of placing your hand over your heart for the freedom of this country. Above all, SHOW SOME RESPECT!

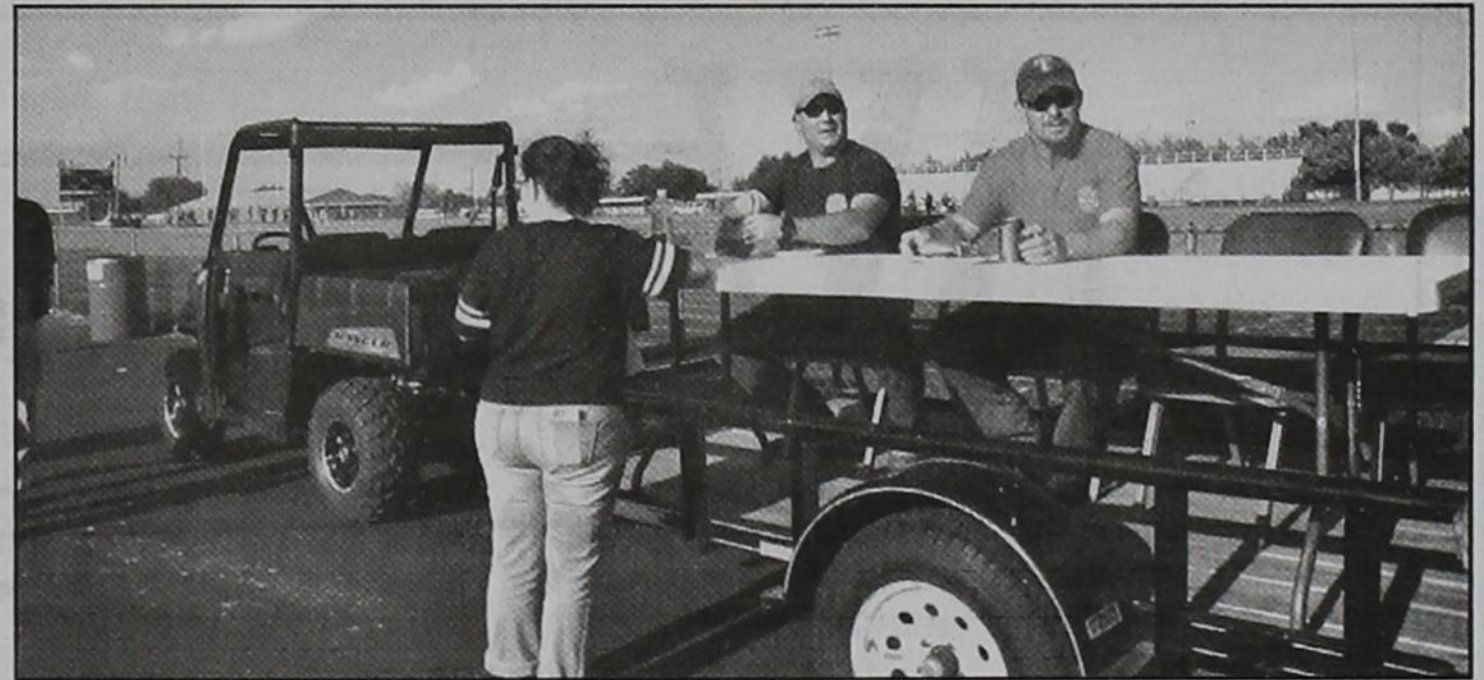

Game Wardens prepare for a historic dove season

Local wardens are preparing for an increase in hunters as Texas citizens will enjoy the longest dove season in 80 years.

A new 90-day season this fall means hunters will have 20 more days of opportunity compared with previous years. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is integrating those additional days early in the season to take advantage of mourning dove migrating into the state. Dove hunting season will now run from September 1st-November 13th in the North zone, where the panhandle region is located.

Public information officer Aaron Sims tells us that Lubbock district game wardens are as excited as area hunters are for the season to kick off. "Game warden patrols change throughout the year depending on what's going on around the state. I can tell you that after a long hot water safety season, we are all ready for dove season to roll around. There's really nothing like waking up extra early, sipping some coffee on a cool morning while listening for the first shots to ring out." Sims says that all area wardens will be out in force ensuring hunters are abiding by the laws. "One of the many things we are out there looking for is to make sure the wildlife resources are protected and that hunters are abiding by their daily bag limit." The daily bag limit for dove is 15, which means that a hunter cannot exceed taking 15 dove in a single day.

Roughly 10 percent of the nation's 350 million mourning dove reside in Texas, along with about 9 million white-winged dove. Each fall, over 415,000 Texas dove hunters take to the field in pursuit of these acrobatic, fast-flying game birds. Based on field observations by TPWD wildlife biologists, prospects for the 2016-17 hunting season are good to excellent.

"During the start of breeding season (March) in Texas, habitat conditions for dove were good to fantastic, thanks to the carryover of precipitation from 2015," said Shaun Oldenburger, TPWD Dove Program Leader. "Biologists witnessed good early production on both white-winged and mourning doves throughout the state until the May rains arrived. However, good production was witnessed in June and July as more sporadic, isolated storm events continued across the state."

Based on early survey results at TPWD, mourning dove numbers may be some of the highest in more than a decade in the Panhandle with similar numbers as 2015 in the rest of the state. White-winged doves continue to increase in numbers across the state, but the growth is gradually slowing.

All hunters are reminded that licenses expire each year on Aug. 31, so a new license for 2016-17 is needed prior to going dove hunting. Licenses may be purchased at local sporting goods retailers, TPWD

Law Enforcement offices, online through the TPWD website at www.tpwd.state.tx.us/buy or by phone at 1-800-895-4248.

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

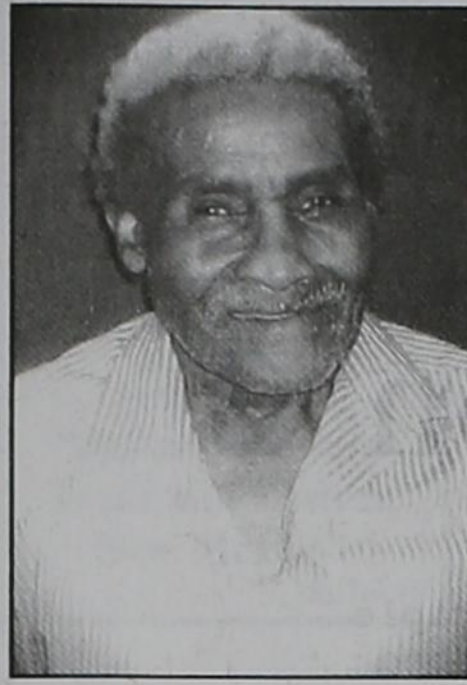
Feller told me I need to learn to accept help when it is offered. Sometimes God sends us His strength through others.

Texas Health and Human Services Agencies begin major transformation

At the direction of the Texas Legislature, the state's health agencies have begun a massive restructuring to make the system more efficient, effective and responsive for all Texans.

On September 1, about 4,000 employees and more than 120 programs and functions will officially "move" to the Health and Human Services Commission from four other health and human state agencies.

The move marks the first of two waves of the state's significant health agency transformation designed to help Texans find and receive services more efficiently.

This first phase moves many client services and administrative functions to HHSC, which administers Medicaid, CHIP and

other services. The second wave, set for September 1, 2017, moves certain regulatory programs, state hospitals and state supported living centers to HHSC from other agencies.

"This is a monumental effort that's happening behind the scenes. Most people won't notice a change, other than hopefully it's easier for them to find what they need," said Executive Commissioner Charles Smith. "It's a work in progress, and we're putting the system together in a way that puts Texans first."

The most visible aspect on September 1 will be the launch of a revamped website for Texas Health and Human Services. A major section of the site will be dedicated to services, with subgroups by service types, such

as services related to aging, disabilities, women and children, food and fitness, child protection and others. The site will have a cleaner look and more intuitive navigation to help people find health and human services information.

One of the more significant structural changes starting September 1 is the consolidation of client services into a single division at HHSC, rather than have them exist at several agencies. This Medical and Social Services Division will create a central structure, connecting behavioral, medical, preventive care, disability, developmental and other services into one area to better meet the needs of the whole person.

The changes are part of the system's consolidation from five agencies to three. The transfor-

mation will eliminate the need for the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services and the Department of Aging and Disability Services to operate as separate agencies by 2017. The transformation also includes moving selected programs from the Department of State Health Services and the Department of Family and Protective Services to HHSC. DSHS will focus its efforts on core public health functions, and DFPS will focus on prevention and protective services.

An analysis of the system and the passage of legislation last year outlined the directive to transform the Health and Human Services system into a more efficient system to better provide services and benefits to Texans. No programs were eliminated as a result of the system overhaul

A politically correct world gone amok

At a time when many institutions of higher learning are reinforcing the notion of political correctness, the University of Chicago has drawn a line in the sand, reports the Association of Mature American Citizens.

The school put the student body on notice that it will not condone such things as so-called "safe spaces" on campus, places where there is no such thing as a first amendment right of free speech lest someone is offended because of what someone else has to say.

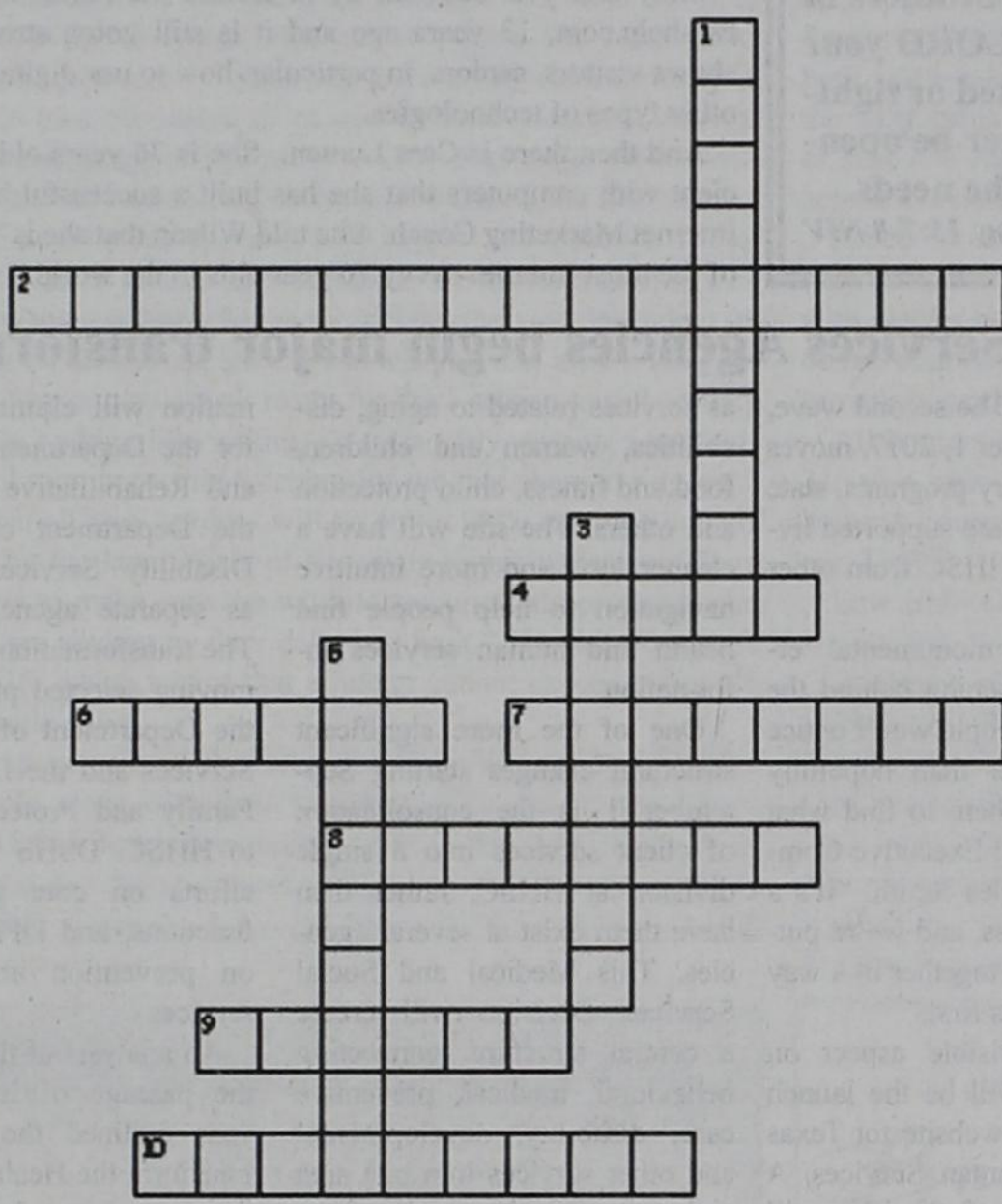

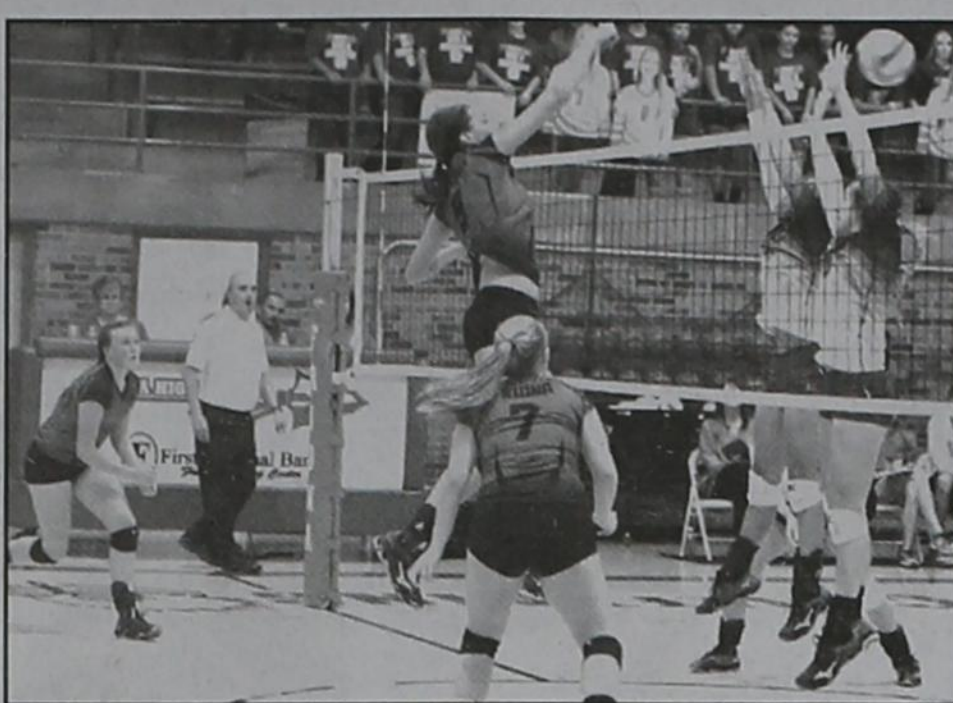
What started out as a nice night for football turned into a lightning delayed after midnight finish as the Farwell Steers scored a 35-23 opening night win.

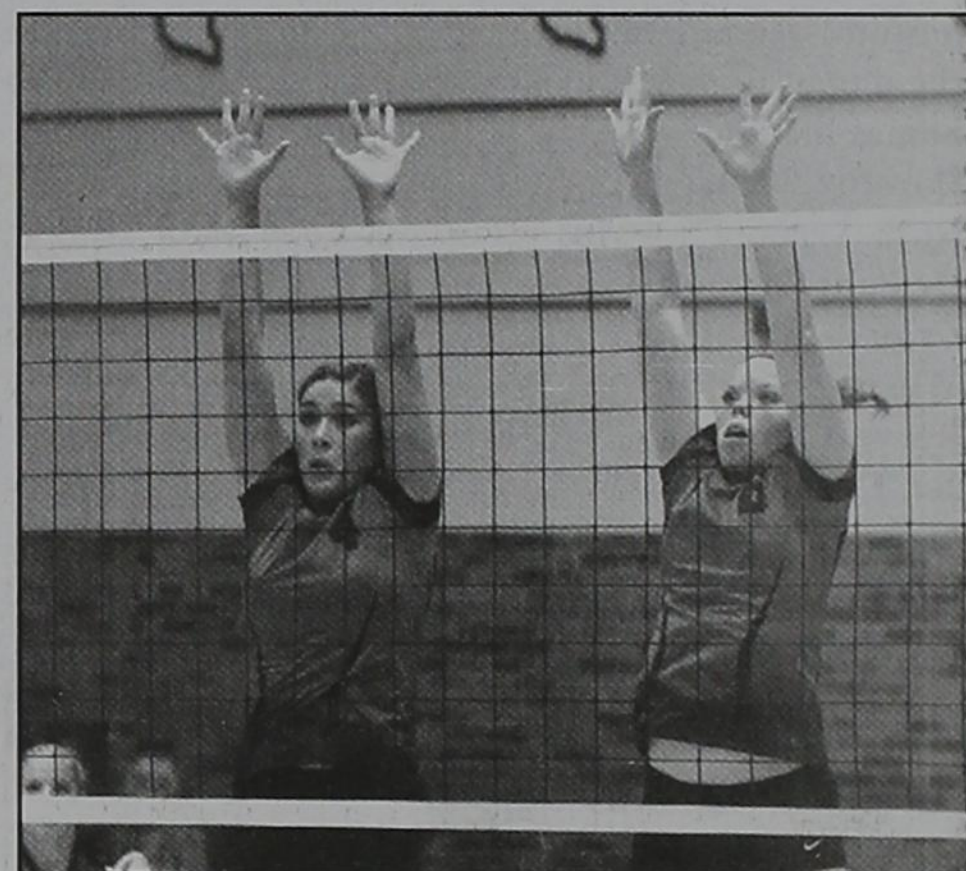

Fall armyworms are on the march

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agents in a few of the agency's districts have reported increased armyworm activity in hayfields and pastures over the past few weeks. Dr. Vanessa Corriher-Olson, AgriLife Extension forage specialist in Overton, said producers should expect an increase in armyworm numbers following recent rains and cooler temperatures in areas of the state.

"I was getting calls about them before the rain," she said. "They like cooler temperatures and wet conditions in the spring and fall, so we could see a swell in their numbers."

Armyworm moths can lay up to 2,000 eggs that hatch in two to three days, according to a 2015 report by AgriLife Extension entomologist Dr. Allen Knutson. There are four to five generations per year.

Corriher-Olson said armyworm caterpillars are picky eaters that prefer high-quality, fertilized forage typically found on fields maintained for hay production. They are a common pest of Bermudagrass, sorghum, corn, wheat, rye grass and many other crops in north and central Texas.

Producers should scout each morning for armyworms, she said. Armyworms are night feeders that try to avoid daytime temperatures.

Armyworms are green, brown or black in color and can be identified by the white inverted Y on their head. They can grow up to 1 inch in length when mature.

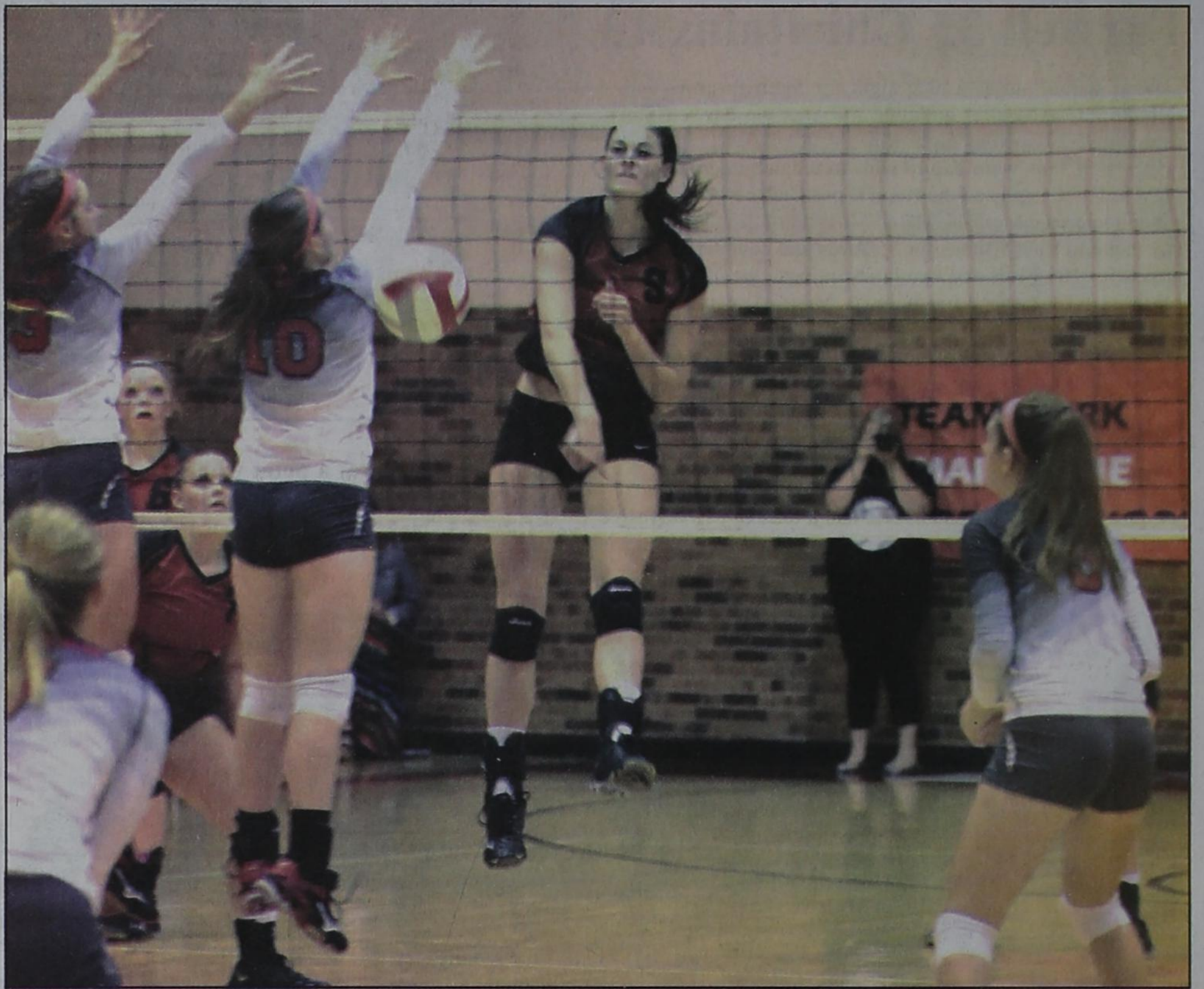
The pest got its name because they appear to march across hay fields, consuming the grass in their path.

The threshold for insecticide spray treating a pasture is three or more armyworms per square foot, Corriher-Olson said. Armyworms in those numbers should be treated immediately. Armyworms in the last two or three days of their larvae stage consume 85 percent of their diet.

Corriher-Olson recommends insecticides labeled for armyworm control in pastures and hayfields. She said applicators should always follow all label instructions on pesticide use and restrictions.

"You don't need to wait a day if their numbers are at threshold," she said. "They are going to do a lot of damage quickly. If you find them in the morning, spray that day."
