Chieftains thump Floydada 27-14

The Chieftains got off to a fast start for the homecoming crowd Friday night with three Chiefs gaining over 100 yards in the game.

Leading rusher was sophomore quarterback Marco Monreal with 112 yards on 15 carries. Sergio Flores picked up 110 yards on 19 carries and two touch-

downs. Teammate Julius Orozco also had two touchdowns on five carries and 65 yards.

The Chiefs offense had 455 yards in 68 offensive plays and 23 first downs. Monreal completed 8 passes in 14 attempts for 61 yards. Jonathan Hernandez had three catches for 16 yards, John-

ny Ojeda also caught three for 18 yards, and Chris Rodriguez had one catch for 26 yards. Hernandez punted six times for 211 yards, a 35.16 average.

The Chieftains are 2-2 and will welcome Dalhart to Chieftain Field Friday September 23. The following week is an open date. District begins with River

Road here October 7. That is the Pink Out game. Littlefield comes October 14. The band will have their laptop drawing at halftime.

We are at Muleshoe October 21, Shallowater comes here October 28, and the final regular season game is at Slaton November 4.

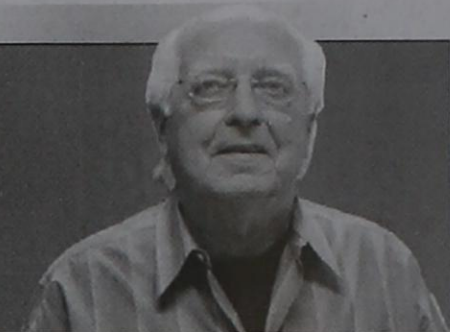

tious is now forbidden. Say the wrong thing on Facebook or in the Twitter sewer and you will be, as my granddaddy would say, be taken to the woodshed.

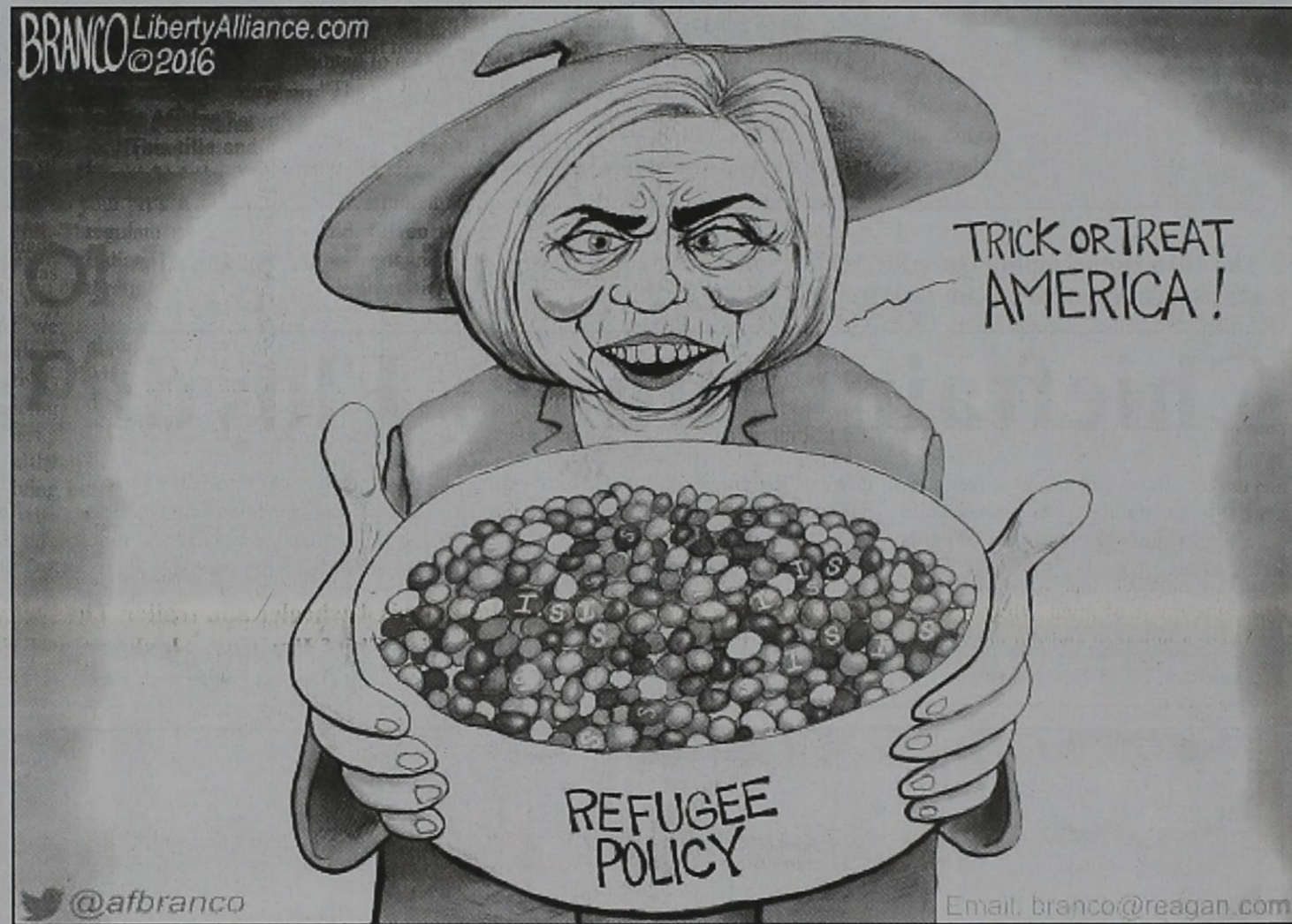

That blinky thing!

Blinkers, turn signals and direction indicators...all names for that blinking light on the rear of our cars.

Many years ago, I was told that if you live in a farming community you could tell the farmers because they turned without using their blinkers. The reasoning was that they were on the farm all day and there was no traffic on a turn row or dirt road.

I have lived in small towns and the big city of Lubbock. There are farmers everywhere.

Long ago, there was a farmer here in Friona that took the same route everyday. He would leave home, stop at the coffee shop, and then head out to his farm north of town. He took this route early every morning, and every day at lunch, he would come back into town turning at the same corners at almost the same time. He would go back out to the farm after lunch and when the day was done, he went home. He did not vary from his route each day.

Most locals understood when they saw him that he was go-

ing to turn at the same corner at the same time every day of the week. They knew he was not going to use his blinker and as he got older, he would forget to look both ways before turning. This resulted a few accidents over the years.

We are creatures of habit and he was no different.

I was told, as his habit became a hazard, he was asked why he still went to the farm long after he retired. He said it was to keep him busy. He also was said to have stated, "I have turned at that corner every day and everyone should know that."

I ran across a number of older folks in Lubbock that were of the same frame of mind. Blinkers were a nuisance and did not help. Everyone should know they were turning.

I never got my license to mind read but I learned to drive cautiously because 'no blinkers' was a normal every day occurrence. I haven't had any accidents due to this but I am still cautious.

Don't get me wrong, I have been driving and daydreaming

and almost missed my corner. I have found that going around the block is much easier than explaining to an officer why I slammed on the brakes and blinker at the same time to skid around my corner. Besides that, my purse is usually open and the sudden turning motion causes everything to end up in the floor-board.

I will admit that I was pulled over by a very nice police officer in Hereford recently because I was apparently daydreaming at a stoplight and forgot to turn on my blinker. As he approached my car, I heard my grandmother come out of my mouth and ask, "Honey, what did I do wrong?" He ran my license, tag number, and said I was free to go at which time I said, "I am so sorry, honey, and I won't do that again."

Speaking of my grandmother, as she got older she had less patience with blinkers and stop signs. An example of this was when my grandmother needed something from the store, which was about six blocks from her house in Altus, Oklahoma. She climbed into her car, put it in reverse and took off. The people that saw the car said that all they saw was her bun and two hands on the wheel. Thankfully, there were no cars going through the intersections with stop signs. She apparently put the pedal to the metal and was at the store extremely quickly without ever using the brakes or blinkers.

My uncles took away her license and the car after that incident.

Grandma grew up on a farm so I like to think that the farmer in her came out and that was reasoning enough not to use the blinker.

Therefore, if you see me using my blinker excessively be thankful my grandmother didn't teach me how to drive.

Week of September 21, 1961

*Albert Field, Friona City Manager, officially submitted his resignation to the City Council Tuesday.

*Miss Kay Bureson sat on the throne as Miss Joy Ingram adjusted her crown following the Thursday night contest to select the Maize Days Queen. Miss Janet Buckley and Miss Sharon Reeve were first and second runners-up.

*Newspaper history will be made next week when Plains Publishers, Friona publication firm, begins printing the Lovington Leader.

*The Chieftains scored their first touchdown of the season against the Morton Indians Friday.

But their chances of making a fair showing against New Mexico Military Institute took a sudden turn for the worse Tuesday evening.

Six starting players abandoned the team. They are Ranza Boggess, Dwight Bates, Reggie Hayes, Hank Outland, Creig Coon, and David Carson.

Coach Kenneth Miller reported that only eight players turned out for practice Monday. The rest of the team is reported to have gone to the fair in Amarillo.

Fifteen players were left on the Chieftain squad as of Tuesday.

*Joe Talley delivered Friona's first load of maize to the Friona Wheat Grower's Elevator in Friona Wednesday afternoon.

*Hungry fair-goers lined up and passed through the lines at the barbecue tables where the Friona Fire Dept. served 2500 pounds of dressed beef during the Maize Days celebration.

No one speaking at her funeral had trouble coming up with anything to say.

The other family is struggling to understand him and the positive changes he started making about a month before he passed; many why's and what if's are unanswered; many regrets for things that can't be changed now. Sadly, this family is grieving in a totally different way from the other family.

When we pass, we can make it as smooth and easy as we can for our families, or we can make it difficult for them. Our relationship with Jesus and how we live our lives will determine how things go for our families when we pass. It's our choice.

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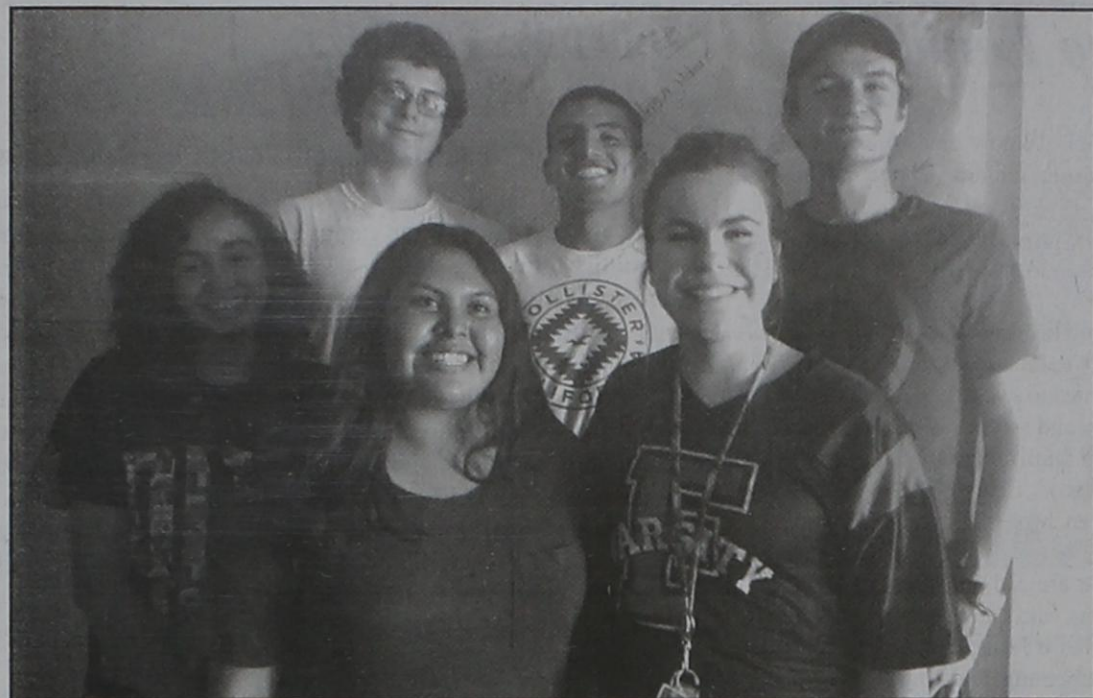

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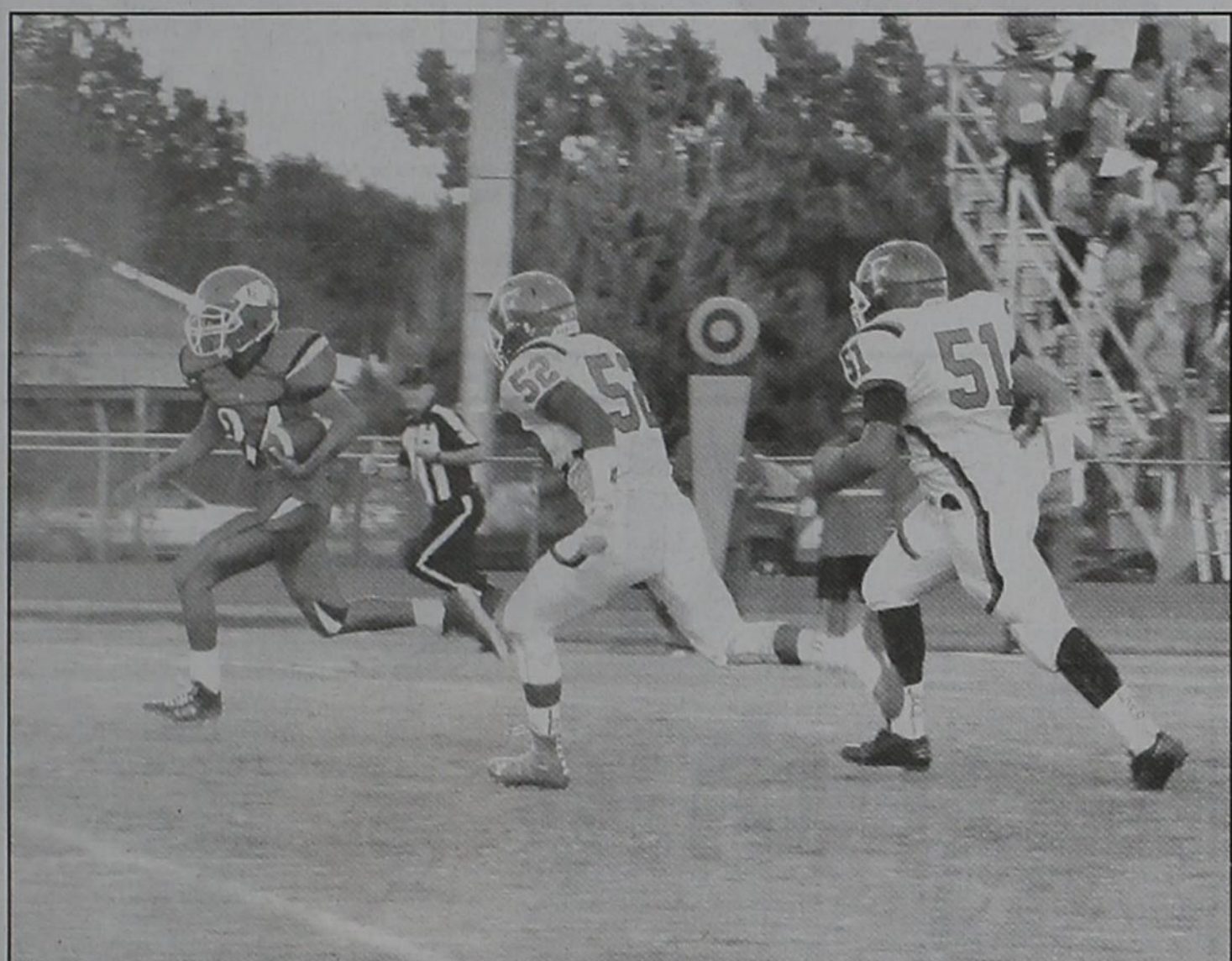

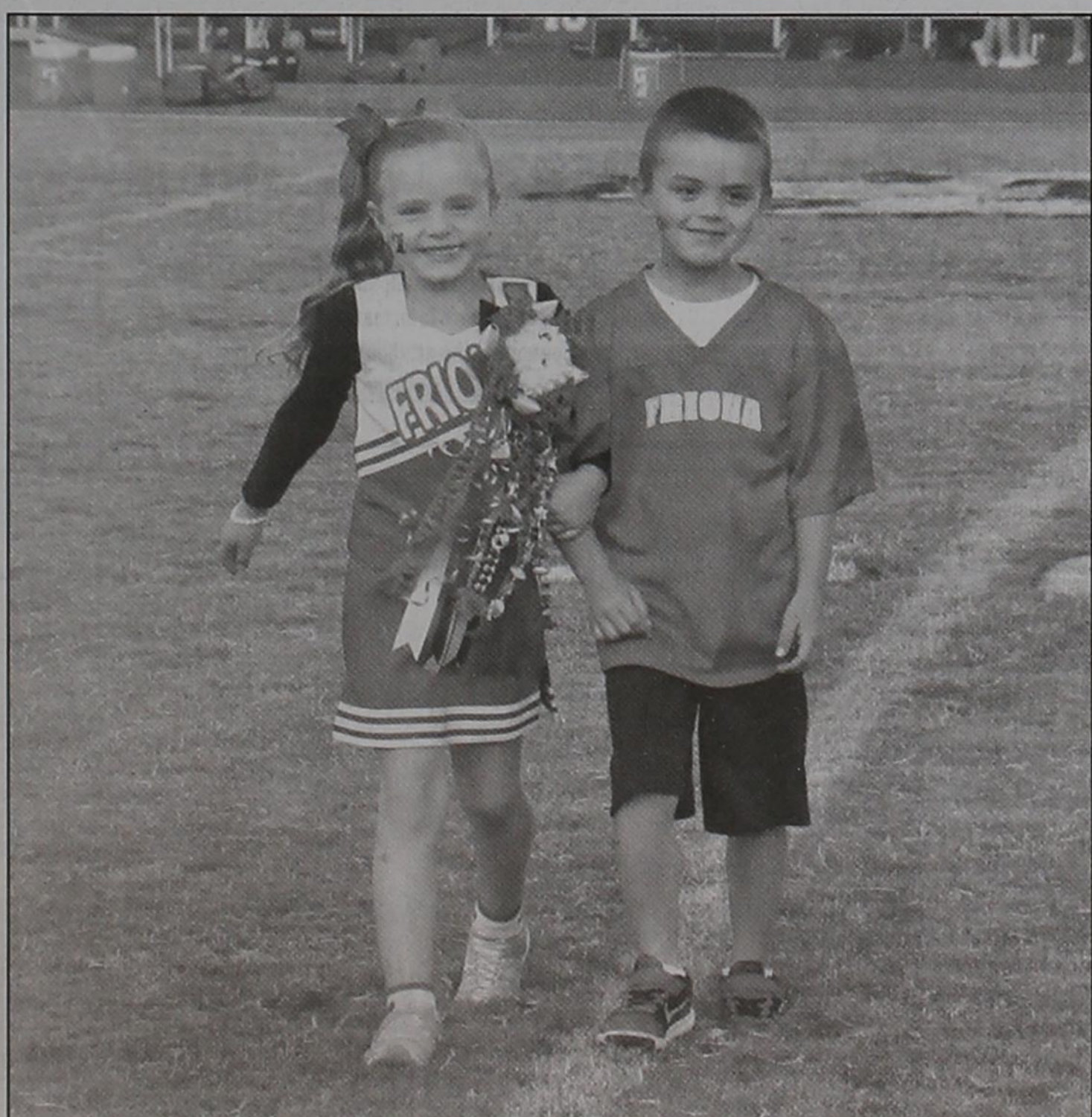

Bailey County cotton field day Oct. 5

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service office in Bailey County will conduct a cotton field day beginning at 9:30 a.m. October 5 at the Chris Locke Farm north of Maple.

The farm is located 4 miles north of the Maple Gin on Farm-to-Market Road 1731, turn west at the County Barn on County Road 91 for 2 miles then turn north on County Road 61 for a half mile to the field on the right.

"We will be touring a cotton replicated agronomic cotton evaluation, or R.A.C.E. trial," said Curtis Preston, AgriLife Extension agent in Bailey County. "Our speakers will be AgriLife Extension personnel and seed company representatives who will be presenting information about the trial."
